Mayor Batey called the meeting to order at 6:44 p.m.

2. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mayor Batey announced upcoming activities, including the June First Friday event, a Linwood Neighborhood wide yard sale, the Milwaukie Museum's 50th Anniversary, the annual bulky waste pick-up day event, Juneteenth and Pride community events, and a Transportation System Plan (TSP) community workshop.

Mayor Batey read a Dogwood-themed Haiku poem.

3. PROCLAMATIONS AND AWARDS

A. Pride Month – Proclamation

Mayor Batey and **Council President Anderson** introduced the proclamation and thanked public works staff for cleaning-up a recently vandalized pride flag in a city park. Pride Month event organizers **Nicole Ausmus** and **Trevor Adams** commented on celebrating Pride Month. **Batey** proclaimed June to be Pride Month.

B. Juneteenth – Proclamation

Mayor Batey and **Aneesa Turbovsky**, Equity Steering Committee (ESC) member, remarked on celebrating Juneteenth. **Batey** proclaimed June 19 to be Juneteenth.

4. SPECIAL REPORTS

A. New Business Introductions: Keeper Coffee & pFriem Brewing

Sagor introduced Rudy Kellner, with pFriem Brewing, and Britt Huff, with Keeper Coffee, and expressed the city's appreciation for the businesses opening in Milwaukie.

Huff and **Kellner** commented on their experiences opening businesses in Milwaukie and historic city hall. The group discussed how the businesses planned to participate in upcoming community events, how they have interacted with city staff and worked to engage with youth community members.

Sagor provided a brief report on comments from May 20, noting plans for Mayor Batey and staff to visit the middle housing development off Harrison Street and announcing that Council would hold a middle housing town hall on July 28. No audience member wished to address Council.

The group noted that the script included the name of an individual who had been nominated for the Park and Recreation Board (PARB) but had withdrawn from consideration and that the appointing resolution included the individual's name.

It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to approve the Consent Agenda as revised, removing the withdrawn PARB nominee.

8. PUBLIC HEARING

A. Quarterly Budget Adjustments and Updated Fee Schedule Adoption – Resolution (part of this agenda item was removed)

<u>Call to Order:</u> **Mayor Batey** called the public hearing on the proposed budget adjustments and fee schedule adoption, to order at 7:36 p.m.

<u>Purpose:</u> **Mayor Batey** announced that the purpose of the hearing was to receive a staff report, take comment, and deliberate on the proposed budget and fee adjustments.

<u>Conflict of Interest:</u> No Council member declared a conflict of interest.

<u>Staff Report:</u> **Osborne** reviewed the proposed budget adjustments including the movement of federal American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) funds, closing out the new city hall purchase fund, and an administrative adjustment related to a Council expense.

Sagor reported that Council would hear a request to adjust building division funds to allow for the hiring of an additional inspector at the next Budget Committee meeting in

August. The group noted that the additional position would be funded by the building division fund which had enough money to cover the additional staffing cost.

Mayor Batey, **Osborne**, and **Sagor** remarked that the ARPA adjustment was related to the parks construction work and that the Council adjustment was related to the purchase of a book by a Council member in fiscal year (FY) 2024.

Correspondence: None.

Audience Testimony: No audience member wished to address Council.

<u>Close Public Comment:</u> It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to close the public comment part of the budget adjustment hearing. Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Anderson, Khosroabadi, Massey, and Stavenjord and Mayor Batey voting "aye." [5:0]

Mayor Batey closed the public comment part of the hearing at 7:43 p.m.

<u>Council Decision:</u> It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to approve the resolution authorizing budget supplemental for the 2025-2026 biennium. Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Anderson, Khosroabadi, Massey, and Stavenjord and Mayor Batey voting "aye." [5:0]

Resolution 27-2025:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKIE, OREGON, AUTHORIZING BUDGET SUPPLEMENTAL FOR THE 2025-2026 BIENNIUM.

Sagor reported that the city had received an audit-related letter from the Oregon Secretary of State's office which would be shared with Council.

9. COUNCIL REPORTS

A. Legislative and Regional Issues – Discussion

The group discussed bills under consideration by the state legislature that the city had been watching and whether Council should submit letters about various bills. **Council President Anderson** provided an overview of House Bill (HB) 2025, the legislature's transportation funding package.

Council Reports

Councilor Massey reported on the impact of federal funding uncertainty for the North Clackamas Watershed Council (NCWC) project to remove the Kellogg Creek Dam, and recent Park and Recreation Board (PARB) issues and leadership changes. **Massey** and **Mayor Batey** provided an update on recent North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District (NCPRD) issues, including the district's proposal to cut staff at the Milwaukie Community Center and add park use fees.

Councilor Khosroabadi reported on recent North Clackamas Chamber of Commerce and Clackamas County Community Action Board CCAB) meetings.

Council President Anderson reported attending a Linwood Neighborhood District Association (NDA) meeting that focused on the proposal to build a picnic shelter at Furnberg Park. **Mayor Batey** and **Anderson** noted that the NDA would discuss the picnic shelter proposal in September.

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Mayor Batey reported on issues addressed at Clackamas County Coordinating Committee (C4), Metro Mayors Consortium, and Metro supportive housing services (SHS) bond measure meetings.

Councilor Massey noted that the Portland General Electric (PGE) utility pole electric vehicle charging service had changed providers.

10. ADJOURNMENT

Mayor Batey announced that after the meeting Council would meet as the Milwaukie Redevelopment Commission (MRC).

It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to adjourn the Regular Session. Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Anderson, Khosroabadi, Massey, and Stavenjord and Mayor Batey voting "aye." [5:0]

Mayor Batey adjourned the meeting at 8:55 p.m.

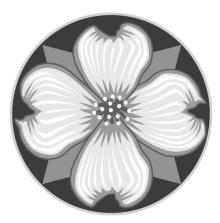

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the fight for equality continues for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, intersex, asexual, and other historically marginalized members of our community (LGBTQIA+), and the responsibility falls on all of us to form a more inclusive and equitable society, and

WHEREAS June 28, 2025, marks the fifty-sixth anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising, six days of demonstrations sparked by the targeting and arrest by police of gay, lesbian, and transgender bar patrons in violation of their civil rights, an event widely recognized as the beginning of the modern gay rights movement, and

WHEREAS history has failed to properly recognize the role of the leaders of the Stonewall Uprising, including Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, transgender women of color who helped spark this movement, and

WHEREAS in 2000, President Bill Clinton declared June to be "Gay & Lesbian Pride Month" to commemorate the Stonewall Uprising, and in 2009, President Barack Obama expanded the commemoration by declaring June to be "Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Pride Month," and

WHEREAS despite the progress of recent years, LGBTQIA+ Americans continue to face discrimination and new attacks by state governments and other political figures on the legitimacy of their human rights including their very right to exist.

NOW, THEREFORE, I Lisa Batey, Mayor of the City of Milwaukie, a municipal corporation in the County of Clackamas, in the State of Oregon, do hereby proclaim **JUNE 2025** as **LGBTQIA+ PRIDE MONTH** in Milwaukie in support of our LGBTQIA+ family, friends, and neighbors and to proclaim that love is love, you are valued and welcome, and your city stands with you.

PROCLAMATION

A PROCLAMATION FOR THE COMMEMORATION OF JUNETEENTH AS AN ANNUAL CELEBRATION OF BLACK AFRICAN AMERICAN LIBERATION.

WHEREAS President Abraham Lincoln first issued the Emancipation Proclamation effective January 1st, 1863, declaring enslaved people in the Confederate States to be legally free. However, that proclamation could not be enforced in lands under Confederate control. On April 9th, 1865, Confederate forces surrendered, effectively ending the Civil War. On June 19th, 1865, Union soldiers arrived in Galveston, Texas, the westernmost state of the Confederacy, bringing news of the president's order freeing enslaved people two-and-a-half years after it was first decreed. This day, marking the end of chattel slavery in the United States, has since come to be known as Juneteenth; and

WHEREAS Oregon's Constitutional ban on both slavery as well as residence by free African Americans lay the foundation for generations of economic hardship, exclusion, and discrimination against Oregon's Black African American community; and

WHEREAS through other systems of oppression such as sharecropping, Jim Crow, exclusionary and destructive housing and transportation policies, denial and disruption of voting access, and mass incarceration, the plunder of Black bodies and Black wealth continued past slavery and persists to this day, affecting the physical and mental health, safety, education of and opportunities available to Black African Americans; and

WHEREAS despite these obstacles, Black African Americans in Oregon have been and continue to be dynamic and vital community members and leaders within our state; and

WHEREAS Juneteenth has been celebrated in Oregon since 1945, when Clara Peoples moved to Portland from Oklahoma to work at the Kaiser Shipyards and introduced it to her co-workers; and

WHEREAS the City of Milwaukie. the State of Oregon, and the federal government now recognize Juneteenth as a legal holiday.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Lisa Batey the Mayor of the City of Milwaukie, a municipal corporation in the County of Clackamas, in the State of Oregon, do hereby recognize and proclaim **JUNETEENTH**, **June 19th**, as an annual celebration of the past, present, and future of Black African American liberation and those who continue the work to realize that liberation.

IN WITNESS, WHEREOF, I have set my hand on this 3rd day of June 2025.

Councilor Khosroabadi called the meeting to order at 4:03 p.m. and noted that Mayor Batey and Council President Anderson were participating by video conference.

1. Transportation System Plan (TSP) Update, Part 2 – Report

Dyar continued to review updates to the TSP, discussing the application of multimodal functional classifications of transit modes and routes across the city.

Councilor Stavenjord arrived in-person at 4:06 p.m.

Councilor Massey and **Dyar** remarked on whether the TSP captures conflicts between different types of transit modes. The group noted the role of the city's engineering team in reconciling conflicting transit modes when designing new infrastructure.

Councilor Stavenjord and **Weigel** commented on known nodes of transit conflicts, such as heavily used intersections and where Milwaukie roadways connect to City of Portland or Clackamas County roads. **Garbely** reported that engineering had met with county staff for specific project routes that cross jurisdictional lines. **Dyar** and **Matt Hughart**, consultant with Kittleson and Associates, explained how the city designated transit modes and where those designations conflict with neighboring jurisdictions.

Council President Anderson arrived in-person at 4:20 p.m.

Mayor Batey and **Dyar** remarked on bicycle and pedestrian designations along Johnson Creek Boulevard and other routes. The group observed that the maps in the TSP had been informed by the Transportation System Plan Advisory Committee (TSPAC) and that some were aspirational and did not reflect current conditions.

Mayor Batey expressed concern that the TSP prioritized cyclists over pedestrians.

Council President Anderson and **Mayor Batey** commented on differences in bicycle stress designations. **Dyar** and **Garbely** reported that the city was not meeting many stress designations and **Hughart** discussed ways to achieve lower stress designations, noting challenges of meeting aspirational designations. The group remarked on how the city could reduce cyclist stress levels on existing roads.

Hughart and **Weigel** provided an overview of the TSP update project timeline. The group noted that the TSP should be updated about every 20 years to reflect changing community priorities related to transportation projects.

Mayor Batey asked if the 2007 TSP project list had been reviewed, noted there should be aspirational and regional projects in the TSP, and asked that a crosswalk across 37th Avenue to the Minthorn Springs Natural Area be added to the projects list.

Council President Anderson asked about projects that might be grouped together and whether TSP projects could be presented with funding mechanisms. **Councilor Massey** expressed interest in presenting the years of work on the TSP update to the public and **Sagor** noted how the updated TSP would inform the city's next budgeting process.

Council President Anderson appreciated that the TSP had aspirational projects.

Hughart reviewed the evaluation criteria for prioritizing TSP projects. **Councilor Khosroabadi** commented on using an equity approach to prioritize TSP projects. The group remarked on the number of pedestrian projects on the TSP projects list.

Mayor Batey liked the evaluation criteria for the TSP projects and believed the criteria should be used for bigger projects and not smaller Spot Program projects. **Weigel**, **Sagor**, and **Garbely** remarked on the importance of evaluating all size of projects.

2. Behavioral Health and Houseless Services – Update

Sagor, **Burdick**, **Brandi Johnson** and **Don Holden** with the community services organization LoveOne, **Suchanek**, **Husher**, and **Lamm** provided an update on ongoing health and houseless services work. They noted the use of outreach specialists to supplement the city's work, efforts to secure additional funding for outreach work, how Milwaukie Police Department (MPD) and Ledding Library staff were working with other agencies to track cases and provide resources to community members in need.

Councilor Khosroabadi asked about funding concerns and barriers to service. The group noted how LoveOne and other services were currently funded, reported that a cold weather emergency shelter would open in downtown Milwaukie this year, and remarked on whether the number of long-term camps and the need for social support service had increased in Milwaukie. **Johnson** and **Suchanek** noted that barriers to access included a lack of housing and unrestricted funding, the slow pace of connecting county and healthcare services, and observed that instability in income created challenges.

Mayor Batey reported on an expected audit on how the metro area counties had spent their Metro Supportive Housing Services (SHS) funds.

3. Legislative and Regional Issues – Discussion

Stauffer reported the status of bills in the state legislature that the city had been tracking, and the group discussed the status of various bills and whether Council should send letters of support or opposition to state legislators. **Stauffer** asked Council to think about agenda topics for the May 13 Council visit with the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde.

Council President Anderson called the meeting to order at 6:32 p.m. and announced that Mayor Batey was participating in the meeting via Zoom.

1. CALL TO ORDER

A. Pledge of Allegiance.

B. Native Lands Acknowledgment.

2. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Council President Anderson announced upcoming activities, including a tour of the Kellogg Creek Restoration Project site, a restoration event at Elk Rock Island, a city manager open door session, Earth Day events, and a prescription drug and sensitive document shred event. **Mayor Batey** noted the return of First Friday events and the annual State of the City (SOTC) address on May 2.

Mayor Batey read a flower-themed haiku poem.

3. PROCLAMATIONS AND AWARDS

A. Outstanding Milwaukie High School (MHS) Student – Award

Kim Kellogg, MHS Principal, introduced Erowyn Stovall and Council congratulated them on their academic and extracurricular accomplishments.

B. Earth Day – Proclamation

Gavares commented on the city's climate action work and plans to celebrate Earth Day. **Council President Anderson** proclaimed April 26, 2025, to be Earth Day in Milwaukie. **Sagor** noted that the first Earth Day was marked in Camas, Washington.

4. SPECIAL REPORTS

A. None Scheduled.

5. COMMUNITY COMMENTS

Council President Anderson and **Sagor** reviewed the comment procedures. **Sagor** provided follow-up reports from the April 1 comments, reporting on city responses to a proposed no-cause commercial evictions ordinance and concerns from Ardenwald Neighborhood residents about a new middle housing development and related street parking and right-of-way (ROW) improvement questions.

Mara Reynolds, Milwaukie resident, remarked on an incident involving local law enforcement officers and an individual accused of stealing food from a gas station. **Council President Anderson** noted that state law prevented local police officers from assisting federal immigration officers.

6. CONSENT AGENDA

It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to approve item 6. A. Council Minutes.

Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Anderson, Khosroabadi, Massey, and Stavenjord and Mayor Batey voting "aye." [5:0]

Stauffer noted that the motion had not included item 6. B.

It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to approve item 6. B.

B. Resolution 21-2025: A resolution of the City Council of the City of Milwaukie, Oregon, extending the term end date for members of the Transportation System Plan Advisory Committee (TSPAC).

Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Anderson, Khosroabadi, Massey, and Stavenjord and Mayor Batey voting "aye." [5:0]

7. BUSINESS ITEMS

A. Downtown Open Container Conversation, continued

Sagor explained that downtown business owners had asked the city to consider a downtown open container policy and noted staff actions taken to-date to review the idea. **Burdick** provided an overview of the complexities of implementing and enforcing existing laws should such a policy be adopted; staff conversations with the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission (OLCC) were noted; and how other cities handle similar open contain areas were noted. **Sagor** and **Burdick** remarked on how the city's event permitting process could possibly be updated to add an open container zone.

Councilor Massey, **Burdick**, and **Sagor** discussed how big an open container zone might be, noting it could possibly include most of downtown.

Councilor Stavenjord, **Burdick**, and **Sagor** remarked on how the presented zone had been created and noted that any private entity wanting to activate an open container zone would need to acquire high liability insurance. **Councilor Stavenjord** noted that the Stavenjord family owned a business within the proposed zone.

Council President Anderson, **Burdick**, and **Gericke** commented on why some businesses had been included in the zone and some had not, whether some businesses would want to be in the zone, and they noted the challenges of acquiring event insurance and what incidents such insurance would cover.

Council President Anderson, **Burdick**, and **Sagor** noted what city event and OLCC permits might cost for an open container zone wide event and how much liability insurance would cost event planners. **Sagor** appreciated the business' interest in activating downtown and wanted to make sure everyone knew the costs of such a zone.

Mayor Batey asked if sections of the zone could be engaged or if the entire zone would need to be activated. **Burdick** and **Sagor** suggested the zone could be revised and OLCC could be asked for input on the map; they commented on the need to consider signage and reported on how cities in other states handle similar zones. They discussed how the City of Eugene's proposal for a similar zone had been denied by the OLCC and how the open container zone in Hood River, Oregon, was enforced.

Reynolds expressed concern about the size of the proposed open container zone and suggested it be limited to Main Street.

Andy Fisher, Downtown Alliance of Milwaukie (DAM) chair, thanked the city for considering the proposal, suggested that DAM would probably be interested in only activating parts of downtown, and asked about ways volunteers could reduce the cost of such an event. **Burdick** remarked on OLCC-approved ways that volunteers and smaller zones could reduce costs. **Sagor** and **Burdick** commented on the difference between beer gardens and open container zones, and OLCC regulations regarding opening and carrying containers of alcohol in public spaces.

Council President Anderson asked Council to weigh-in on whether the city should continue to consider this policy and what adjustments to the proposal might be made.

Councilor Stavenjord and **Burdick** commented on ways businesses could make public events featuring alcohol safe for participants and whether the proposed zone should be limited to the street only.

Councilor Khosroabadi suggested the proposal created questions about the presence of alcohol in public spaces shared with children and the Milwaukie Police Department's (MPD's) ability to enforce such a zone. **Khosroabadi** remarked on whether it was appropriate to increase access to alcohol and asked for more feedback from OLCC, and suggested the idea generated more public safety risk.

Councilor Massey suggested the city was trying to solve an undefined problem that might not need to be solved given recent increased business activity downtown.

Mayor Batey recalled previous beer festivals in downtown Milwaukie and believed those experiences had generated the proposal and expressed interest in further feedback from OLCC about activating parts of the zone and how beer garden fencing and monitoring is regulated. **Batey** suggested if OLCC was opposed to a larger open container zone than the city should consider drawing smaller zones.

Council President Anderson asked business owners when such a zone would be activated and **Mike Lesch**, Beer Store Milwaukie owner, explained how the proposal had come from issues that had arisen during First Friday events. **Lesch** addressed the concerns expressed about public safety and enforcement and hoped the city could find a way to encourage participants to visit all parts of downtown.

Council President Anderson believed the proposed zone was too large and remarked on ways to reduce the zone map and encourage visitors to see more than just certain parts of downtown. Anderson agreed with concerns about increasing access to alcohol. **Council President Anderson** suggested there was not a Council consensus to continue looking at the large-scale proposed open container policy but maybe in smaller ways. **Councilors Stavenjord and Khosroabadi** and **Mayor Batey** suggested Council needed more information from the OLCC before coming to a consensus.

Council President Anderson remarked on Council's role in approving events permits that activate an open container zone. **Councilors Stavenjord and Massey** and **Mayor Batey** believed staff should approve permits, not Council.

Council President Anderson summarized there was Council interest in receiving more feedback from OLCC and continuing the discussion about the proposed open container policy. **Sagor** noted steps staff would take to continue the conversation.

8. PUBLIC HEARING

A. None Scheduled.

9. COUNCIL REPORTS

Councilor Khosroabadi reported on housing and social services issues discussed at the last Clackamas County Community Action Board (CAB) meeting and presented a draft Council letter in support of the proposal to build a picnic shelter at Furnberg Park. The group discussed the letter, and it was Council consensus to send the letter.

Mayor Batey presented a draft Council letter of support of Oregon Senate Bill (SB) 229 that would fund a Bridge Meadows project in Milwaukie. Council reviewed the letter, and it was Council consensus to send the letter.

Council President Anderson reported on an impromptu neighbor meeting about the 29th Avenue Greenway and asked for Council support to receive an update on this greenway from staff. **Sagor** provided a brief overview of what the city had done on the 29th Avenue Greenway and confirmed there were no plans to further improve that greenway although a development application was expected to be submitted soon that could generate further conversations. **Councilor Massey** was hesitant to schedule an update on the greenway until other conversations were known.

Sagor encouraged the public to support local businesses.

Councilor Massey and **Sagor** noted that seven Canadian geese had been found dead in Milwaukie Bay Park on the morning of April 15 and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) was investigating.

10. ADJOURNMENT

It was moved by Councilor Stavenjord and seconded by Councilor Khosroabadi to adjourn the Regular Session. Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Anderson, Khosroabadi, Massey, and Stavenjord and Mayor Batey voting "aye." [5:0]

Subject: Appointments & Reappointments to City Boards and Committees

ACTION REQUESTED

As outlined in the Milwaukie Municipal Code (MMC), Council is asked to consider approving a resolution making appointments and reappointments to city boards and committees (BCs).

HISTORY OF PRIOR ACTIONS AND DISCUSSIONS

All individuals recommended for appointment have been nominated by interview panels consisting of members of Council, the BC's staff liaisons, and the BCs.

Those listed below for reappointment were previously appointed by Council to the BC positions they currently hold. In recent years, it has been Council's policy to reappoint BC members if they are eligible for another term and are interested in continuing to serve.

November 5, 2019: Council adopted Resolution 69-2019 initiating a BC youth member program.

November 17, 2020: Seven youth applicants were appointed to BCs.

On May 3, 2022, and March 21, 2023, Council directed staff to continue youth recruitment efforts.

June 4, 2024: Fived youth applicants were appointed to BCs.

ANALYSIS

Authority to fill city BC vacancies is granted to the Mayor and Council by Section 26 of the City Charter. To fill vacant positions, members of Council, and appropriate staff liaisons and BC chairs, conduct interviews with applications received by the city. The interview panel makes appointment recommendations to Council, which considers and typically approves recommendations through the regular session consent agenda. Appointed individuals serve for a term length determined by the MMC. Upon the completion of a term, if the individual is eligible, they may be reappointed by Council to serve another term.

BC appointments are made when a term has expired or when a position has been vacated. BC terms expire on June 30, but appointments are also made as needed to fill vacancies.

All BC positions are term limited, meaning there is a limit to the number of times that members can be re-appointed. Of the 27 recommended appointments below, three are being reappointed to their current position for the first time (noted with a single *), 11 have been reappointed once before (noted with two **), and one has been reappointed twice before (noted with three ***).

BUDGET IMPACT

It is vital for the city to have functional BCs that reflect the community it supports. By making the proposed appointments, Council is helping to ensure that the BCs can continue that vital work. The proposed BC appointments have no financial impact; however certain BCs have authority to make fiscal decisions recommendations.

CLIMATE IMPACT

Making appointments to BCs such as the Park and Recreation Board (PARB), Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC), and the Tree Board ensure we have robust representation of community voices that will help to shape and meet Milwaukie's climate goals.

EQUITY IMPACT

Staff strive to make participation with the city's BCs as accessible as possible by holding hybrid meetings and offering BC applications translated into other languages. The recommended BC appointments would help the city fulfill its commitment to ensure diverse and inclusive representation across its BCs. The nominated individuals bring experience and expertise to each of their nominated positions.

WORKLOAD IMPACT

By holding an annual recruitment process, staff can dedicate less time throughout the year to arranging interviews and BCs can continue working uninterrupted.

The office of the city recorder (OCR) worked with BC staff liaisons to confirm that the individuals listed below would like to continue serving in their current BC positions.

Subject: On-Call Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) Services

ACTION REQUESTED

Council is asked to adopt a resolution authorizing the city manager to sign a contract with OCD Automation. for on-call SCADA services in the amount of \$350,000 for a five-year term.

HISTORY OF PRIOR ACTIONS AND DISCUSSIONS

1997: City water, wastewater, and engineering staff worked closely with SCADA engineers, designers, and other utilities to design what the city needed in its SCADA system. The system was ultimately designed and built by Technical Systems, Inc. (TSI).

1998: A system was installed and based on radio telemetry carried on dedicated radio frequencies licensed to the city. The system is operated through a highly secure operational interface between the computer software, radios, programmable logic controllers (PLCs), and short haul modems.

March 26, 2018: The city signed a contract with Tetra Tech to develop a SCADA Master Plan to provide recommendations to upgrade the SCADA. The plan was finalized in July 2019.

January 7, 2020: Council authorized the city manager to sign an engineering services agreement with Tetra Tech to provide design services related to the city's SCADA project.

June 6, 2023: Council authorized the city manager to sign a public improvement contract with TSI in the amount of \$1,928,682.50 to provide construction services related to the upgrade of the city's SCADA.

ANALYSIS

The Milwaukie Public Works Department utilizes a SCADA system to monitor and control water treatment operations, water distribution infrastructure, and sewer collection pump stations. The system provides remote monitoring and operation capabilities for two water treatment facilities, seven wells, three reservoirs, two interties, one water pump station, and five sewer pump stations. Communications are supported via 900-megahertz (MHz) radios, long-term evolution (LTE) wireless, and fiber. The system was most recently upgraded in 2024.

The City conducted a formal solicitation for proposals from qualified consultants to provide ongoing SCADA system support, including troubleshooting, repair, calibration, maintenance, and future performance upgrades for instrumentation and control components. Submissions were due on April 10, 2025. The city received a submittal from one vendor, OCD Automation.

OCD Automation's proposal was evaluated, and it was determined that it met all solicitation requirements. The city has utilized OCD Automation in the past to troubleshoot previous SCADA issues that occurred with its previous SCADA system.

Council is asked to approve a resolution authorizing a FY 2025 proposed supplemental budget.

HISTORY OF PRIOR ACTIONS AND DISCUSSIONS

June 4, 2024: Council adopted the 2025-2026 biennium budget via Resolution 30-2024.

May 12, 2025: The Budget Committee discussed the proposed budget adjustment.

ANALYSIS

Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 294 allows for budget adjustments when a condition arises that was not known at the time the budget was adopted. Since the biennium budget was adopted, certain conditions and situations have arisen that necessitate changes in financial planning. These adjustments are presented below.

Federal American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) parks funds were budgeted for, received, and recognized as revenue in the 2021-22 fiscal year. However, approximately \$800,000 of these funds weren't spent until the current fiscal year. Because these funds were already recognized as revenue in a prior fiscal year, they are being recognized as an increase in beginning fund balance in the current year and will be offset by an expense.

Additionally, the city is abolishing the City Hall Fund in accordance with ORS 294, as the fund is no longer necessary. The city is moving the fund balance of \$146,847 to the city manager's budget within the General Fund where the funds will be used for arts projects as originally intended.

Lastly, a \$2,500 adjustment is being made to move funds in the General Fund from the Council budget to the library budget to account for books purchased in the prior fiscal year.

BUDGET IMPACT

The ARPA parks budget adjustment will reduce the restricted fund balance in the General Fund by \$800,000. The City Hall Fund closure will increase the General Fund balance by \$146,847. The last adjustment is a reallocation of funds within the General Fund and has no impact on fund balance.

CLIMATE IMPACT

Completing the parks projects will have a positive climate-impact by helping to maintain a healthy ecosystem and clean air and water.

As conversations continue about how to sustain and modernize funding for Oregon's transportation system, we write to keep the Senate and House Democratic and Republican caucuses updated on the scope of discussions and the forward momentum currently underway.

We have made significant progress toward addressing the following objectives:

- Stabilize funding for ODOT, focused on core services of maintenance, operations, safety, and preservation, while maintaining the 50/30/20 split among the state, counties, and cities
- Reduce the reliance on fuels taxes to fund state and local transportation systems in the medium and long term, and modernize funding structures to adjust to the transition to higher fuel-efficiency vehicles and electric vehicles, ensuring all users of the systems pay their fair share
- Balance highway cost allocations between light and heavy vehicles and ensure consistent review and action to maintain that balance and fairness
- Simplify the weight-mile tax from 85 tax rates down to 10 tax rates, and streamline collection of the associated revenues
- Raise the taxation point of diesel to where gasoline is taxed in order to significantly reduce administrative burdens on small company fuel sellers and farmers, as well as to provide stronger enforcement for fuels tax evasion
- Invest in rail, transit, pedestrian safety (like Great Streets and Safe Routes), and other key components of a multi-modal transportation system, addressing the impacts of our transportation system on the climate

- Provide ongoing dedicated revenues to complete major state highway projects already prioritized as well as potential future projects
- Identify targeted efficiencies in ODOT's budget to focus on delivery of core services and major projects
- Ensure internal and external accountability measures are in place, including appropriate legislative oversight of major projects, and propose reforms to management structures, operational processes, and major project delivery

We have made progress on some of the funding tools that will be utilized to meet the above objectives, including:

- Gas tax
- Registration
- Title Fees
- Road usage charge
- Updating DMV fees to cover the true cost of services

These "levers and dials" are interlinked, and the mix of funding tools is being narrowed, adjusted, and modified, keeping in mind the impact on consumers, businesses, and our overall economy. We expect to release negotiated numbers soon.

Finally, to ensure we meet all the objectives of the package, we have identified additional policy changes and funding mechanisms that could significantly help the legislature address transportation and related economic and climate concerns over the long term. Under discussion are:

- Commitment to fund transit services, pedestrian safety projects, and rail
- DEQ wind-down of emissions testing
- Exercising appropriate legislative authority to replace the current Climate Protection Program with a market-based emissions reduction program, linking to other West Coast markets and generating ongoing revenue
 - o Gas and diesel-generated credits dedicated to the state highway fund for core operations and major projects
 - A portion of remaining credits dedicated to wildfire mitigation and prevention, community hardening, suppression, and recovery
 - A portion of remaining credits dedicated to grants to community-based non-profits for climate impact programs, substantially aligned to what was envisioned in the current CPP
 - A portion of the remaining credits dedicated to reducing transportation emissions by supporting multimodal modes of transportation, such as pedestrian safety programs, transit, and rail

Draft language on policy proposals will be forthcoming for legislative review. A fully transparent and public process will help evaluate and refine the proposals, and we anticipate wrapping up negotiations in the weeks ahead, passing a final package of policy and budget proposals before adjourning *sine die*.

Dear Chair Roberts and Members of the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District Budget Committee:

The Milwaukie City Council submitted a letter last week advocating for preserving Older Adult Services programming at the Milwaukie Community Center.

I am submitting this additional letter from my vantage point as a member of the District Advisory Committee (DAC). I am quite regular in my attendance at DAC meetings — I believe I missed only one in the past year. I suspect that other DAC members, like me, were completely taken aback by the proposed cuts to the older adult services programming in the proposed budget which was shared with us less than three weeks ago.

In November, North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District (NCPRD) Director Kia Selley shared that about 28% of NCPRD general fund programming subsidies go to older adult services — another 28% go to recreation, another 28% to sports, with the remaining 16% to the Aquatic Center. The implication was that older adult services were not central to the mission of the NCPRD, and should not be funded from the NCPRD general fund.

That position might make sense in other parks districts, but both the original 1990 Cooperative Agreement between the County and the City of Milwaukie and the measure that was subsequently put to voters called out maintenance of senior services at the Milwaukie Center (former name) as a central goal. Section D of the 1990 Agreement specified that the County, through the Milwaukie Center, "will continue to administer and provide a combination of educational, recreational, and social services to the community. [] These programs will continue to be primarily geared towards the needs and interests of older residents in the North Clackamas Area." The Voters' Pamphlet for the establishment of NCPRD was more explicit in calling out "SENIOR SERVICES: The district will maintain and fund the Milwaukie Center. It will also offer more programs."

Thus, the premise that NCPRD should not be funding older adult services is contrary to the intent of everyone involved, including voters, when the district was formed. This focus on ensuring older adult services makes logical sense, as "senior centers" had popped up in most cities in the 1970s and 1980s, and providing similar services for residents of the large unincorporated area was surely on the mind of County Commissioners at the time. Utilizing the Milwaukie Center to



serve the wider area was an opportunity the County Commissioners of the day capitalized upon. If the NCPRD Board believes that the NCPRD general fund should be refocused away from older adult services, it is incumbent on them to forge a solution to the funding challenges.

At the November 13, 2024 DAC meeting, Director Selley told the DAC: "We will prepare a briefing for you [on other funding options for older adult services]. . . There will be a lot of thoughtfulness put into this approach. The optimal approach would be to find partners and partnerships so that services continue. Maybe there's a different way to do things that reduces the amount of NCPRD subsidy. I want to be really clear that tonight I'm not suggesting that we are cutting older adult services. It's just in a landscape of limited resources, what are your priorities to maintain? So I appreciate you sharing this feedback with me." See https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nCmox4l1YUM, starting at approximately the 1hr 30min mark.

At the next DAC budget discussion, on February 12, 2025, following on questions about the role of County Social Services Department, as well as the role of cities, in providing older adult services, Director Selley said: "Kandi Ho and I were just talking about how it would be really useful to do a deep dive on this particular topic, because it is so unusual in terms of NCPRD's role. So we hope to cue that up late spring or early summer." See https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=oVUhFCSNS4U starting sometime after the 54min mark.

Thus, the dramatic cuts presented earlier this month came out of the blue, as the DAC had been told to expect further briefing and discussion on two separate occasions. It was clear from the budget presentation at the May 14 DAC meeting that these dramatic cuts were *not* made on Director Selley's initiative, but rather at the direction of either the NCPRD Board or County Administration.

As I suggested at the May 14 DAC meeting, the NCPRD Board should establish some sort of task force or other gathering of relevant players to forge an appropriate path forward to more stable funding for older adult services. In the meantime, the NCPRD Board should fulfill the commitment made by their predecessors back in 1990 and fund this programming at the level the community has come to expect and depend upon.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN

THE CITY OF MILWAUKIE AND CLACKAMAS COUNTY

MAY 1, 1990

The following agreement is conditioned on the approval of the proposed North Clackamas Regional Parks and Recreation District tax base on November 6, 1990.

Regarding the formation of a parks and recreation service district for the North Clackamas area (henceforth referred to as the Service District), the City of Milwaukie and Clackamas County agree to the following:

A. PARKS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

SERVICE DISTRICT

- The Service District will acquire land and develop regional parks and recreation facilities for the North Clackamas area. These regional facilities (and their anticipated year of completion) include:
 - A State-of-the-Art Aquatics Complex (fy 93-94)
 - 4 Lighted Softball Fields (fy 93-94)
 - 2 Lighted Soccer Fields (fy 93-94)
 - 2 Multipurpose Fields (fy 93-94)
 - 2 Riverfront Parks (In Oak Grove and Gladstone) (fy 91-92)
 - Approximately 75 Acres of Natural Areas (fy 91-92)
 Walking Trails Linking North Clackamas Park, the Southern Pacific Property, and Mount Talbert
- 2) Between 1991 and 1996, the Service District will expend a total of between \$500,000 and \$800,000 (in 1990 dollars) in funding and resources for land acquisition and the development of neighborhood parks facilities within the City of Milwaukie.
- 3) Between 1991 and 1996, the Service District will expend within each of four other subareas of the district funding and resources equivalent to a total of \$500,000 to \$800,0000 (in 1990 dollars) for land acquisition and the development of neighborhood parks facilities.
- 4) The Service District may undertake improvements to parks currently under the jurisdiction of the City of Milwaukie. These improvements are subject to the approval of the Milwaukie City Council, with the advice of the Milwaukie Parks Commission.

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CITY OF MILWAUKIE

1) The City of Milwaukie, with the advice of the Milwaukie Parks Commission, will decide how the total \$500,000 to \$800,000 in neighborhood facilities funding, provided by the Service District between 1991 and 1996, will be allocated. This funding may be used to do one or more of the following:

*

- Acquire land for neighborhood or mini-parks
- Build neighborhood parks (5-6 acres each)
- Build mini-parks or vest parks (1-2 acres each)
 Improve or rehabilitate existing parks facilities
- Expand existing parks facilities
- Improve school district ballfields or play facilities within the area
- Build walking and biking trails within the area
- Other similar capital improvements for parks purposes
- Improvements to and/or expansion of senior centers
- 2) The City of Milwaukie will retain the deeds to all parks facilities currently under the City's jurisdiction. These parks and facilities are listed in Attachment #1.

The Milwaukie City Council, under the advisement of the Milwaukie Parks Commission, must approve all capital improvements to these facilities undertaken by the Service District before such improvements can be made.

All proposed name changes to these parks are also subject to the approval of the Milwaukie City Council, under the advisement of the Milwaukie Parks Commission.

All parks and facilities owned by the City of Milwaukie, but maintained and operated by the Service District will have signage explaining this dual relationship. Signs within these parks would make statements along the lines of: "This park built by the City of Milwaukie and maintained by the North Clackamas Regional Parks and Recreation District".

3) The City of Milwaukie may construct new parks or make improvements to parks currently under its jurisdiction over and beyond the \$500,000 to \$800,0000 allocation described above. These improvements will be at the City's own expense and will not be covered by Service District funds.

Within budget constraints, the Service District may maintain such parks if the City of Milwaukie so desires.

B. MAINTENANCE OF PARKS FACILITIES

SERVICE DISTRICT

- The Service District will be responsible for the maintenance of all new indoor and outdoor park facilities constructed by the district (see #1 and #2 under capital improvements).
- 2) Between fiscal years 1991-92 and 1994-95, the Service District will provide the City of Milwaukie with sufficient funding to maintain and operate those parks facilities currently under the City's jurisdiction.

This "pass-through" of funding will be equivalent at a minimum to the current, 1990 City of Milwaukie budget allocation for parks and recreation (\$174,795) plus a 6% annual increase for inflation.

- 3) In fiscal year 1995-96, the Service District will assume responsibility for the maintenance of City of Milwaukie parks facilities. These facilities are listed in Attachment #1.
- 4) Upon assuming maintenance of City of Milwaukie parks facilities in fiscal year 1995-96, the Service District will guarantee employment for City of Milwaukie parks staff at equal or greater pay and according to the guidelines established in ORS Chapter 236.

CITY OF MILWAUKIE

- The City of Milwaukie will continue to maintain those parks currently under its jurisdiction through June 30, 1995. The funding "passed through" to the City of Milwaukie by the Service District during fiscal years 1991-92 through 1994-5 shall be used exclusively for the maintenance and operations of parks facilities.
- 2) As of July 1, 1995 the City of Milwaukie will transfer maintenance responsibility of its parks to the Service District. This transfer will include a complete transfer of parks and recreation staff according to ORS Chapter 236. If the City desires to sell any parks and recreation associated equipment, including mowers, tractors, and vehicles, to the District and the District is interested in purchasing these items, this equipment will be sold at fair market value.

C. RECREATIONAL PROGRAMMING

SERVICE DISTRICT

- The Service District will provide extensive aquatics programming, coordination and scheduling of fields services, and summer youth recreation programs for the entire North Clackamas area. Some recreational classes to supplement existing recreation programs may also be provided by the Service district.
- 2) As of July 1, 1995, the Service District will provide City of Milwaukie residents with a Summer Youth Recreation Program equal or better than the program currently operated by the City's Parks Department.
- 3) As of July 1, 1995, the Service District will assume responsibility for the scheduling and management of all sports fields (such as soccer, softball, and baseball) located on parks currently under the jurisdiction of the City of Milwaukie.

CITY OF MILWAUKIE

- The City of Milwaukie will continue to provide recreational programs as it sees fit through June 30, 1995. These programs may be funded with parks maintenance and operations funds provided by the Service District.
- 2) The City of Milwaukie may provide recreation programs in addition to those provided by the Service District. These programs will be at the City's own expense and will not be covered by Service District funds.

D. MILWAUKIE CENTER

SERVICE DISTRICT

 Between fiscal years 1991-92 and 1994-95 (i.e., through June 30, 1995), the Service District will provide the City of Milwaukie with funding to maintain and operate the Milwaukie Center.

This "pass-through" of funding will be equivalent at a minimum to the current, 1990 City of Milwaukie budget allocation for the Milwaukie Center (\$165,955) plus a 6% annual increase for inflation.

The Service District will also provide the City of Milwaukie with an additional "pass-through" of funding of \$98,000 to maintain and operate the Milwaukie Center upon completion of

- 2) In fiscal year 1995-96, the Service District will assume responsibility for the maintenance and operation of the Milwaukie Center.
- 3) Upon assuming maintenance and operation of the Milwaukie Center in fiscal year 1995-96, the Service District will guarantee employment at equal or greater pay for the Milwaukie Center staff in accordance with ORS Chapter 236.
- 4) Under the jurisdiction of the Service District, the Milwaukie Center will continue to administer and provide a combination of educational, recreational, and social services to the community.

These programs will continue to be primarily geared towards the needs and interests of older residents in the North Clackamas area.

5) The Service District and the City of Milwaukie may use the Milwaukie Center facilities for such activities as public meetings consistant with building policies.

CITY OF MILWAUKIE

- 1) The City of Milwaukie will continue to maintain and operate the Milwaukie Center through June 30, 1995.
- 2) As of July 1, 1995 the City of Milwaukie will transfer maintenance and operations responsibility of the Milwaukie Center to the Service District.
- 3) At the time of transfer (July 1, 1995) all Milwaukie Center policies developed by the Milwaukie Center Community Advisory Board will be adopted by the Service District. This Board will also continue its present role as primary policy advisor with regards to the activities and operations of the Milwaukie Center.
- 4) As of July 1, 1995, half (9) of The Milwaukie Center Community Advisory Board's members will be appointed by the Service District Board and half (9) will be appointed by the Milwaukie City Council.

Milwaukie Center Community Advisory Board decisions regarding capital improvements, programs policies, and maintenance and operations policies will have to be approved by both the Milwaukie City Council (deed holders to the property and facilities) and the Service District Boards.

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Milwaukie Center Community Advisory Board will also provide the Service District Board with budget recommendations.

- 5) The City of Milwaukie will make major capital improvements to the Milwaukie Center and its parks, as designated in its Capital Improvement Plans, by December 31, 1994 using its Neighborhood Parks Allocation funds and/or a portion of the City General Fund.
- 6) The City of Milwaukie will continue retain the deed to the Milwaukie Center and all subsequent capital improvements or name changes by the Service District must be approved by the City Council, under advisement of the Milwaukie Center Community Advisory Board.

- The Board of County Commissioners will serve as the governing body (referred to as the "Service District Board" in this document) of this County service district, which will be officially called the North Clackamas Regional Parks and Recreation District.
- 2) An Urban Parks Advisory Board (UPAB), composed of 6 members (1 from each of 5 subareas of the district and 1 from each senior center) will advise the Board of County Commissioners on all capital improvements, maintenance and operations, and recreational programming activities to be undertaken by the Service District. The Milwaukie City Council will appoint the individual representing the Milwaukie parks subarea. The Milwaukie City Council will also appoint the Milwaukie Center Board member during the 4 year transitional period between 1991-2 and 1994-5. As of July 1, 1995, the Milwaukie Center Board will designate one of its members to serve on the UPAB.
- 3) Each of the seven subareas of the District will also have its own Neighborhood Parks Advisory Board to make recommendations on the allocation of the \$500,000 to \$800,000 in neighborhood facilities funds.

The approval of both the Neighborhood Parks Advisory Board and the Service District Board will be necessary before neighborhood facilities funds are allocated. All Neighborhood Parks Advisory Boards will hold public meetings within their subareas in order to receive input from the public concerning the allocation of neighborhood park funds.

The Milwaukie City Council, with the advice of the Milwaukie Parks Commission, will serve as Milwaukie's Neighborhood Parks Advisory Board.

F. WITHDRAWAL OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKIE FROM THE SERVICE DISTRICT

 The City of Milwaukie may choose at any time to withdraw those parks currently under its jurisdiction (as of November 1, 1990) and the Milwaukie Center from the Service District. (Parks are listed in Attachment \$1.)

In this case, where the City withdraws its parks and senior facilities, no reduction in the tax rate will be provided to City of Milwaukie residents. City of Milwaukie residents will continue to receive all of the benefits of in-district residents (lower user fees, priority use of facilities, etc.).

2) If the City of Milwaukie chooses to withdraw those parks currently under its jurisdiction and the Milwaukie Center after improvements have been made to these facilities using Service District funds, a pass-through of funds (i.e. rebate) will be provided by the Service District to the City for maintenance and operations.

For parks, this pass-through would be equivalent to one-fifth of the Service District's neighborhood facilities maintenance and operations budget minus the amount expended by the Service District in the City of Milwaukie subareas on District-owned facilities.

For the Milwaukie Center, this pass-through would be equivalent to the portion of the District's senior center funding allocated to maintenance and operations of the senior facilities built after 1990-91 plus 6% annually.

4) The City of Milwaukie may choose at any time to withdraw entirely from the service district subject to legal restrictions established in the Oregon Revised Statutes and Boundary Commission regulations, provided that the City's share of any outstanding bonded indebtedness has been retired or is paid off.



QUESTION:

Shall the County form a North Clackamas parks and recreation service district with a \$1,989,803 tax base in 1991-92?

SUMMARY:

PARKS: North Clackamas has few parks and is growing rapidly. This measure will preserve open space for the future. The district will build parks, walking trails, two indoor pools, bike paths, and playgrounds. It will also provide recreation programs, natural areas, softball and soccer fields. The district will maintain new and existing parks.

SENIOR SERVICES: The district will maintain and fund the Milwaukie Center. It will also offer more senior programs.

AREA: This district will serve unincorporated areas east of the Willamette River, north of the Clackamas River, west of the urban growth boundary, and south of the Multhomah County limit. It includes the City of Milwaukie.

FUNDING: About one-third of the costs will come from donations, grants, and fees. The tax base will fund the balance. The estimated first year rate is 66¢ per \$1000 of assessed property value. This amounts to \$3.30 per month for a \$60,000 home. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

WHOSE IDEA WAS THIS?

* Concerned residents of North Clackamas initiated the formation of this district. These citizens desired more parks and recreation in their rapidly growing area.

WHAT WILL THE DISTRICT PROVIDE?

* PRESERVE OPEN SPACE: North Clackamas has less parks per resident than any other area of urban Clackamas County. The district will provide:

- 10 neighborhood parks

(I don't think Amaya's email included Alec's recent note, so I'm adding it back in below my response. I am copying Alec as well, since I don't think he was on the To-list for Amaya's note.)

Amaya et al,

For reference, I'm (re-)attaching the site plan that Alec sent earlier with a proposed walkway leading to Home Avenue from the four rear units at 5026 & 5036 SE Harrison St. We received and reviewed the idea and confirmed it should meet the applicable code requirements, which focus on providing a pedestrian walkway to a public street—Alec's proposal would do that. The walkway needs to be at least 3 ft wide and constructed with a hard surface material. So, that is a workable alternative if Alec chooses.

My understanding of the other question below about whether the proposed quadplex on the lot where the re-routed walkway would go is as follows—the proposed quadplex would still be built, with the shared walkway running across the northern portion of that lot (Lot 4 from the 2022 subdivision). I'll let Alec confirm—I don't think he received Amaya's email with the question.

I wanted to provide an update on a couple of the issues mentioned in this thread.

First, regarding the parking situation on Harrison Street, I will be formally requesting a modification to the site plan. My proposal is to shift the pedestrian access for the four rear units, which do not have dedicated parking, to Home Avenue instead of Harrison. As you know, there is more on-street parking available on Home Avenue, and I hope this change will help alleviate some of the parking congestion on Harrison that many of you are concerned about. Please be aware that this would be a deviation from the previously approved plans, so its approval is not guaranteed. I will certainly keep you informed of the outcome.

Second, I want to clarify that I own the south side of the development only. Regarding the arborvitae on Home Avenue, I also agree that they present a significant safety concern. I have already contacted Tim Salyers to request that the street be temporarily closed at Home Avenue until this issue can be resolved. Unfortunately, I do not have control over the trees themselves, and it appears the current property owners are resistant to having them removed.

I hope this provides some clarity, and I will continue to update you as I have more information.

Thanks again for the continued correspondence on this. As I noted previously, I will address the range of issues brought up in this thread during the May 6 Council meeting. This will include:

- Clarification re: the land use decisions and state regulations that got us to where we are today, and a response to the overlay idea proposed below: While I truly appreciate the frustrations raised and the ideas proposed, the city is limited in many ways due to new state laws and can't adopt code that contradicts what is mandated under House Bill 2001 (Middle-Housing Bill) or the state's Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities (CFEC) rules.
- Clarification re: city authority regarding contractor license review and approval: I also appreciate the questions raised on this topic. We are consulting with state building code staff to confirm our understanding of what cities can and can't consider in terms of approving a building permit.
- Update on code enforcement re: arborvitae: Please know we agree with the need for these shrubs to come out for visibility reasons. Code enforcement has communicated a deadline of May 4 to the property owner, and I believe they may be coming down today.
- Response to feedback on the Harrison Street connection

Allison, to your question about what you and other neighbors can do, I recommend you tune in or attend that May 6 meeting to hear my full response and, if you'd like, provide further public comment at that time for staff and Council to consider.

To clarify how that May 6 meeting will look: When we get to the community comments portion of the meeting, the Mayor will ask me if there is any response to comments submitted at or since the last meeting. That is where I will provide my full response. Then members of the public are welcome to testify and provide further comment (up to three minutes each). Council and staff do not respond to newly received comments at the meeting; any new comments provided will be responded to (if they require a response) at the following meeting. Council can also consider putting an agenda item on a future meeting if they so choose.

Thanks again for including us in this thread. Staff will likely limit our responses until that May 6 meeting just so we can ensure a full, complete, robust response to all points raised. I also have again removed all Councilmembers except the Mayor to avoid violations of the public meeting law but will be forwarding this to all Council for their awareness.

Hello everyone,

I would like to voice my support for Allison's proposal to reconsider the extension of Harrison St. and would also like to know the next steps to try to make this happen. As construction has moved forward, we have already experienced frequent issues with work crews parking illegally as there are simply not enough places for them to park their vehicles. I anticipate that as the houses are built and occupied, these problems with parking will continue due to the increased number of cars in the neighborhood. I would like to see the Harrison St. extension revised to be a two way street with curbed sidewalks on both sides. This would also likely eliminate the problem of cars parking on the sidewalk while allowing emergency vehicles to easily enter the area. Additionally, building the street out would provide more on street parking to whoever would be living in the new houses, which would do a lot to address one of the primary concerns that I have (not enough parking and unsafe and illegal driving and parking of vehicles near our house).

I would also like to note again that the arborvitae are still creating a significant safety concern that I have repeatedly contacted code enforcement about, with no

resolution of the issue. It was my understanding that removing vegetation over 3 feet high that blocked visibility was a condition of approval for the development and I would like to see this addressed as soon as possible, preferably before construction continues as warnings alone clearly are not working to resolve the issue. It is difficult both to see cars when crossing Home Ave in a car and to be seen by cars when using the crosswalk as a pedestrian. We have had cars not see us until the last minute while walking our two young children in their stroller. It is extremely frustrating to have public amenities be difficult and unsafe to use because of one person's refusal to follow regulations. For reference, I've attached a photo of the arborvitae and the responses I have received from code enforcement.

Hi Everyone,

I want to thank everyone for being engaged with the development happening on Harrison Street. Engagement whether in opposition or support is what being part of a community is and shows people are passionate about making this a lasting and vibrant place to live.

I want to lay out some information that I think gets to the heart of some of the opposition to development on Harrison Street:

- The Mission Park neighborhood and surrounding area was zoned R5 until June 2022.
- The proposal to continue Harrison street and divide the existing lots facing Home St. into additional new lots on Harrison was approved in March 2022, while zoned R5.
 - I know this led me to believe there would be no more than four new homes in the neighborhood. I think many of us in the neighborhood were very surprised, and feel a bit tricked, about the exponential change in allowed density.
 - The timing of these changes further feels like we were purposefully deceived about what was going to happen in the neighborhood.

Proposals

There are two things I would like to see examined regarding the neighborhood:

- 1. I would like to propose an overlay zone that limits density building to 50% of the maximum allowed by city code when there is an existing parent lot that has maximized density building within 100 feet.
 - a. This is in line with the spirit of density housing while maintaining the character of a neighborhood. Duplexes, etc. could still be built within 100ft of the maximized parent lot, but it would prevent one single area from being oversaturated with one single type of dense housing.
 - i. Ex. The parent lots at 5026 and 5036 Harrison Street are being built to maximum density currently. My lot, which is within the 100 ft, would be limited to 50% of the allowed maximum.
 - ii. Additionally, if something like this had been in place prior to construction, only 5026 or 5036 Harrison Street would have been allowed to build to maximum density, in this case four small homes. The neighboring lot would have been limited to two homes or a duplex.
 - b. I'm proposing this specifically for our neighborhood, although I would encourage the city to look at this at a larger scale. Adopting a compromise policy like this will likely prevent many future situations similar to this one in other neighborhoods.
- 2. I would like to propose the extension of Harrison street is re-evaluated and takes the new increased population of the neighborhood into account.
- a. The decision to make it a one way was made when the assumption was R5 compliant homes would be built on the new lots. Now under MD zoning, the one way status, width of the street, visibility, number of cars entering the neighborhood from 51st, etc. may no longer be appropriate or safe.

Next steps

What are the appropriate steps I can take as a citizen to request these two proposals?

- From the other emails on the chain I've learned there is a City Council meeting on May 6th.
 - I will plan on attending.
- I can provide public comment here.
 - Is this how I can ensure my concerns are addressed at the May 6th city council meeting?
- Emma, Brett- What else can I or the community do to follow the processes in place to express our concerns and work with the city towards a mutually
 agreeable solution?

I believe I speak for all of the members of our community impacted by this project when I say thank you to Cameron for investigating this particular builder as it appears the City has not looked into this yet or, worse yet, has not informed the community of its findings. We request you provide this email chain with confirmation this builder is meeting all of his legal requirements before he moves forward with the project.

We understand that the City was not required to include the community when the initial project changed to this multi-housing development. It is our hope, however, that you will be more inclusive of the communities impacted by proposals prior to approving developer's plans. Many of us lived in Portland prior to moving to Milwaukie and we left there hoping to find more livability in Milwaukie. We want to be involved in decisions involving our community going forward. The developers do not live in our neighborhoods, and they do not know our needs or accessibility. Your best resource is the people who live here and yet those of us who have spoken up at the meetings have felt more patronized than respectfully listened to when we expressed concerns. I've attached your prior email for reference, especially for the benefit of the City Council members I've added to this thread.

This project was first introduced over three years ago, and at the time, public comment was taken. However, there have been significant changes to the original plan since then, with little to no opportunity for community feedback on those revisions. This has only deepened residents' concerns about the transparency, consistency, and oversight of the process.

In your response to concerned neighbors, you noted: "There is a push to have the state revise this Type II review and notice requirement, since it creates an inaccurate sense of opportunity to block or significantly affect the decision." That line unfortunately sums up how many of us have felt the City has handled this process, treating community input as an afterthought rather than a meaningful part of the review.

I believe our elected officials, who are meant to represent the voice of their constituents, should be aware of how inconsistencies in code enforcement and administrative oversight are directly impacting our neighborhood.

Contractor Status & Compliance Issues

Did you know that the builder contracted for this project, Shah Housing Solutions LLC, has been listed under Administrative Dissolution with the Oregon Secretary of State since January 30, 2025? It's unclear how work has begun on this project without the company first returning to good standing.

Safety Concerns

As mentioned previously, I've already sent photos showing vehicles **parked on the newly designed sidewalk**, but here's another example from today involving one of the subcontractors. We continue to observe drivers going the **wrong way down the one-way street**, despite clear signage. This behavior has become routine, not occasional.

Your repeated response has been to "wait and see", but this ongoing pattern is exactly what neighbors warned about from the beginning. It's especially frustrating that the **original drawings called for a bollard**, yet the City waived that requirement based on a technicality.

We're also concerned about being the **test case for a sidewalk design** that's clearly confusing to both drivers and pedestrians—and already causing safety issues. These problems will only worsen with the addition of eight homes on this lot, and potentially eight more across the street if that parcel is developed as expected.

Additionally, the **arborvitae creating a dangerous visual obstruction** is still in place, as shown in the photo below. When code enforcement was contacted, we were told that if the property owner chose not to comply, **resolution could take months** (screenshot of that response is also attached). It seems we'll be "*waiting and seeing*" on this issue as well. Seems like something you should require resolution on prior to green lighting any future steps on this project.

Lack of Adherence to Codes

Current city code mandates a specific number of parking spaces for townhomes, which has been dismissed in this case as an "apparent strivers' error". It's concerning that the City can **subjectively dismiss** this kind of requirement, particularly when it has a major impact on residents.

Furthermore, you stated that the parking requirement doesn't apply to quadplexes, but there is **no reference in the code** that clearly distinguishes this difference. That ambiguity, paired with inconsistent enforcement, leaves neighbors wondering whether the rules are being applied equitably.

Not Having the Impact You Think You Are

You've shared that this development aligns with statewide goals to expand affordable housing and promote eco-friendly neighborhoods. These are admirable goals in theory, but the execution in our neighborhood tells a different story.

The City is removing parking options while increasing the number of residents who own cars. While we are near a bus stop and not far from a MAX station, that doesn't reflect where people actually work, or the existing public transit infrastructure between those points. Most residents who can afford these homes will need a car to reach their jobs.

Unless there's a plan to **require a percentage of these units to be Section 8 or truly affordable**, the affordability goal isn't being met, it's simply displacing the parking and access needs of current and future residents. Current state of the plan is only set to profit the developer, not the community you state that you are trying to help.

Additionally, there are **ongoing accessibility concerns** across Milwaukie. Many sidewalks are unusable for people with disabilities or families with strollers. And in places where street parking is allowed, **streets are becoming too narrow** to safely accommodate two-way traffic, adding yet another safety issue to the growing list.

I appreciate the comments you provided in response to the public notice posted and mailed for the middle housing land division applications MHLD-2025-001 and MHLD-2025-002, which relate to the development happening at 5026 and 5036 SE Harrison St. It's an opportunity to explain the background and context for the regulations that are allowing the project.

Conclusion

The increase in residential units that the proposed MHLD development brings will obviously be a change for residents in the area. I have attempted to provide the background and context for the new rules that have set the stage for this and other similar developments in the future.

I understand that new policies that increase the use of public streets for resident parking— thereby reducing the on-street parking available to existing residents is a change from what has occurred in the past. I also recognize that current residents may be surprised at the number of units being added to the neighborhood, which is also a change. The state of Oregon has recognized that we are facing a large housing crisis. More units are needed to both accommodate folks that need housing and folks that need a variety of housing choices. These new policies help to accomplish the goals.

I expect to issue the notice of decision for both MHLD applications early next week (the week of April 7). That will start a 15-day period for filing an appeal. I have attempted to explain why I don't believe the MHLD process is a viable avenue for challenging the quadplex developments themselves. These units are allowed outright, and there is no land use application for needed for the units to be built. The MHLD application meets the provisions in the code.

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

I appreciate you proposing a potential solution, but blocking the street with bollards will not solve the deeper issues and I fear it would actually cause more sidewalk parking, while simultaneously making a street unusable to residents. Personally, I would like to see the northern sidewalk extended to Home Avenue, where it can be protected from the road by a curb and vegetation strip, and have Harrison Street expanded to be a street with a curb and parking. The woonerf street has already proven insufficient for the current level of development and will only become more inadequate when 20 more houses are built and occupied. The garage that it was created to preserve has already been detached from the house it was a part of and converted into a duplex. The scope of this development has more than quadrupled from what we were told when the woonerf street was agreed upon as a compromise and the street needs to be reconfigured to accommodate the greatly expanded size of this project. One of the reasons I am so concerned about on street parking is that we have already had multiple people park on the sidewalk of the woonerf and we have construction crews illegally park

for convenience nearly every day that construction work is being done. If people cannot find spaces to park legally now, why should we have any confidence in the adequacy of current on street parking when 20 additional houses are built? Reconfiguring the Harrison Street extension would provide more on street parking and would physically prevent cars from parking on the sidewalk.

I want to echo the concerns already shared by my neighbors.

This proposal doesn't address the root issue created when the variance was granted allowing your garage to remain, which resulted in a narrower roadway. There should be a full-width road with proper sidewalks and curbs for pedestrian safety.

When you increased the number of homes in our neighborhood, the city should have reassessed the parking situation. Two street parking spots are not sufficient. While I understand the city can't require off-street parking, I do believe they can require more adequate street parking to accommodate the added density.

If you're genuinely coming to the table with us, I hope you'll bring a proposal that meaningfully addresses the full scope of the problems this development has caused instead of shifting the responsibility onto the city.

Amaya et al,

For reference, I'm (re-)attaching the site plan that Alec sent earlier with a proposed walkway leading to Home Avenue from the four rear units at 5026 & 5036 SE Harrison St. We received and reviewed the idea and confirmed it should meet the applicable code requirements, which focus on providing a pedestrian walkway to a public street—Alec's proposal would do that. The walkway needs to be at least 3 ft wide and constructed with a hard surface material. So, that is a workable alternative if Alec chooses.

My understanding of the other question below about whether the proposed quadplex on the lot where the re-routed walkway would go is as follows—the proposed quadplex would still be built, with the shared walkway running across the northern portion of that lot (Lot 4 from the 2022 subdivision). I'll let Alec confirm—I don't think he received Amaya's email with the question.

I wanted to provide an update on a couple of the issues mentioned in this thread.

First, regarding the parking situation on Harrison Street, I will be formally requesting a modification to the site plan. My proposal is to shift the pedestrian access for the four rear units, which do not have dedicated parking, to Home Avenue instead of Harrison. As you know, there is more on-street parking available on Home Avenue, and I hope this change will help alleviate some of the parking congestion on Harrison that many of you are concerned about. Please be aware that this would be a deviation from the previously approved plans, so its approval is not guaranteed. I will certainly keep you informed of the outcome.

Second, I want to clarify that I own the south side of the development only. Regarding the arborvitae on Home Avenue, I also agree that they present a significant safety concern. I have already contacted Tim Salyers to request that the street be temporarily closed at Home Avenue until this issue can be resolved. Unfortunately, I do not have control over the trees themselves, and it appears the current property owners are resistant to having them removed.

I hope this provides some clarity, and I will continue to update you as I have more information.

Thanks again for the continued correspondence on this. As I noted previously, I will address the range of issues brought up in this thread during the May 6 Council meeting. This will include:

- Clarification re: the land use decisions and state regulations that got us to where we are today, and a response to the overlay idea proposed below: While I truly appreciate the frustrations raised and the ideas proposed, the city is limited in many ways due to new state laws and can't adopt code that contradicts what is mandated under House Bill 2001 (Middle-Housing Bill) or the state's Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities (CFEC) rules.
- Clarification re: city authority regarding contractor license review and approval: I also appreciate the questions raised on this topic. We are consulting with state building code staff to confirm our understanding of what cities can and can't consider in terms of approving a building permit.
- Update on code enforcement re: arborvitae: Please

know we agree with the need for these shrubs to come out for visibility reasons. Code enforcement has communicated a deadline of May 4 to the property owner, and I believe they may be coming down today.

• Response to feedback on the Harrison Street connection

Allison, to your question about what you and other neighbors can do, I recommend you tune in or attend that May 6 meeting to hear my full response and, if you'd like, provide further public comment at that time for staff and Council to consider.

To clarify how that May 6 meeting will look: When we get to the community comments portion of the meeting, the Mayor will ask me if there is any response to comments submitted at or since the last meeting. That is where I will provide my full response. Then members of the public are welcome to testify and provide further comment (up to three minutes each). Council and staff do not respond to newly received comments at the meeting; any new comments provided will be responded to (if they require a response) at the following meeting. Council can also consider putting an agenda item on a future meeting if they so choose.

Thanks again for including us in this thread. Staff will likely limit our responses until that May 6 meeting just so we can ensure a full, complete, robust response to all points raised. I also have again removed all Councilmembers except the Mayor to avoid violations of the public meeting law but will be forwarding this to all Council for their awareness.

Hello everyone,

I would like to voice my support for Allison's proposal to reconsider the extension of Harrison St. and would also like to know the next steps to try to make this happen. As construction has moved forward, we have already experienced frequent issues with work crews parking illegally as there are simply not enough places for them to park their vehicles. I anticipate that as the houses are built and occupied, these problems with parking will continue due to the increased number of cars in the neighborhood. I would like to see the Harrison St. extension revised to be a two way street with curbed sidewalks on both sides. This would also likely eliminate the problem of cars parking on the sidewalk while allowing emergency vehicles to easily enter the area. Additionally, building the street out would provide more on street parking to whoever would be living in the new houses, which would do a lot to address one of the primary concerns that I have (not enough parking and unsafe and illegal driving and parking of vehicles near our house).

I would also like to note again that the arborvitae are still creating a significant safety concern that I have repeatedly contacted code enforcement about, with no resolution of the issue. It was my understanding that removing vegetation over 3 feet high that blocked visibility was a condition of approval for the development and I would like to see this addressed as soon as possible, preferably before construction continues as warnings alone clearly are not working to resolve the issue. It is difficult both to see cars when crossing Home Ave in a car and to be seen by cars when using the crosswalk as a pedestrian. We have had cars not see us until the last minute while walking our two young children in their stroller. It is extremely frustrating to have public amenities be difficult and unsafe to use because of one person's refusal to follow regulations. For reference, I've attached a photo of the arborvitae and the responses I have received from code enforcement.

Hi Everyone,

I want to thank everyone for being engaged with the development happening on Harrison Street. Engagement

whether in opposition or support is what being part of a community is and shows people are passionate about making this a lasting and vibrant place to live.

I want to lay out some information that I think gets to the heart of some of the opposition to development on Harrison Street:

- The Mission Park neighborhood and surrounding area was zoned R5 until June 2022.
- The proposal to continue Harrison street and divide the existing lots facing Home St. into additional new lots on Harrison was approved in March 2022, while zoned R5.
 - I know this led me to believe there would be no more than four new homes in the neighborhood.
 I think many of us in the neighborhood were very surprised, and feel a bit tricked, about the exponential change in allowed density.
 - The timing of these changes further feels like we were purposefully deceived about what was going to happen in the neighborhood.

Proposals

There are two things I would like to see examined regarding the neighborhood:

- 1. I would like to propose an overlay zone that limits density building to 50% of the maximum allowed by city code when there is an existing parent lot that has maximized density building within 100 feet.
 - a. This is in line with the spirit of density housing while maintaining the character of a neighborhood. Duplexes, etc. could still be built within 100ft of the maximized parent lot, but it would prevent one single area from being oversaturated with one single type of dense housing.
 - i. Ex. The parent lots at 5026 and 5036 Harrison Street are being built to

maximum density currently. My lot, which is within the 100 ft, would be limited to 50% of the allowed maximum.

- ii. Additionally, if something like this had been in place prior to construction, only 5026 or 5036 Harrison Street would have been allowed to build to maximum density, in this case four small homes. The neighboring lot would have been limited to two homes or a duplex.
- b. I'm proposing this specifically for our neighborhood, although I would encourage the city to look at this at a larger scale. Adopting a compromise policy like this will likely prevent many future situations similar to this one in other neighborhoods.


2. I would like to propose the extension of Harrison street is re-evaluated and takes the new increased population of the neighborhood into account.

a. The decision to make it a one way was made when the assumption was R5 compliant homes would be built on the new lots. Now under MD zoning, the one way status, width of the street, visibility, number of cars entering the neighborhood from 51st, etc. may no longer be appropriate or safe.

Next steps

What are the appropriate steps I can take as a citizen to request these two proposals?

- From the other emails on the chain I've learned there is a City Council meeting on May 6th.
 - I will plan on attending.
- I can provide public comment here.
 - Is this how I can ensure my concerns are addressed at the May 6th city council meeting?
- Emma, Brett- What else can I or the community do to follow the processes in place to express our concerns and work with the city towards a mutually agreeable solution?



Again, I want to thank you for taking the time to write in and share your concerns. I appreciate the frustrations expressed and look forward to sharing more information about how we got here and the path forward in a couple weeks.

Hello,

I share the same concerns that have been brought up by neighbors. I appreciate you proposing a potential solution, but blocking the street with bollards will not solve the deeper issues and I fear it would actually cause more sidewalk parking, while simultaneously making a street unusable to residents. Personally, I would like to see the northern sidewalk extended to Home Avenue, where it can be protected from the road by a curb and vegetation strip, and have Harrison Street expanded to be a street with a curb and parking. The woonerf street has already proven insufficient for the current level of development and will only become more inadequate when 20 more houses are built and occupied. The garage that it was created to preserve has already been detached from the house it was a part of and converted into a duplex. The scope of this development has more than quadrupled from what we were told when the woonerf street was agreed upon as a compromise and the street needs to be reconfigured to accommodate the greatly expanded size of this project. One of the

reasons I am so concerned about on street parking is that we have already had multiple people park on the sidewalk of the woonerf and we have construction crews illegally park for convenience nearly every day that construction work is being done. If people cannot find spaces to park legally now, why should we have any confidence in the adequacy of current on street parking when 20 additional houses are built? Reconfiguring the Harrison Street extension would provide more on street parking and would physically prevent cars from parking on the sidewalk.

Amaya et al,

For reference, I'm (re-)attaching the site plan that Alec sent earlier with a proposed walkway leading to Home Avenue from the four rear units at 5026 & 5036 SE Harrison St. We received and reviewed the idea and confirmed it should meet the applicable code requirements, which focus on providing a pedestrian walkway to a public street—Alec's proposal would do that. The walkway needs to be at least 3 ft wide and constructed with a hard surface material. So, that is a workable alternative if Alec chooses.

My understanding of the other question below about whether the proposed quadplex on the lot where the re-routed walkway would go is as follows—the proposed quadplex would still be built, with the shared walkway running across the northern portion of that lot (Lot 4 from the 2022 subdivision). I'll let Alec confirm—I don't think he received Amaya's email with the question.

I wanted to provide an update on a couple of the issues mentioned in this thread.

First, regarding the parking situation on Harrison Street, I will be formally requesting a modification to the site plan. My proposal is to shift the pedestrian access for the four rear units, which do not have dedicated parking, to Home Avenue instead of Harrison. As you know, there is more on-street parking available on Home Avenue, and I hope this change will help alleviate some of the parking congestion on Harrison that many of you are concerned about. Please be aware that this would be a deviation from the previously approved plans, so its approval is not guaranteed. I will certainly keep you informed of the outcome.

Second, I want to clarify that I own the south side of the development only. Regarding the arborvitae on Home Avenue, I also agree that they present a significant safety concern. I have already contacted Tim Salyers to request that the street be temporarily closed at Home Avenue until this issue can be resolved. Unfortunately, I do not have control over the trees themselves, and it appears the current property owners are resistant to having them removed.

I hope this provides some clarity, and I will continue to update you as I have more information.

Thanks again for the continued correspondence on this. As I noted previously, I will address the range of issues brought up in this thread during the May 6 Council meeting. This will include:

- Clarification re: the land use decisions and state regulations that got us to where we are today, and a response to the overlay idea proposed below:
 While I truly appreciate the frustrations raised and the ideas proposed, the city is limited in many ways due to new state laws and can't adopt code that contradicts what is mandated under House Bill 2001 (Middle-Housing Bill) or the state's Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities (CFEC) rules.
- Clarification re: city authority regarding contractor license review and approval: I also appreciate the questions raised on this topic. We are consulting with state building code staff to confirm our understanding of what cities can and can't consider in terms of approving a building permit.
- Update on code enforcement re: arborvitae: Please know we agree with the need for these shrubs to come out for visibility reasons. Code enforcement has communicated a deadline of May 4 to the property owner, and I believe they may be coming down today.
- Response to feedback on the Harrison Street connection

Allison, to your question about what you and other neighbors can do, I recommend you tune in or attend that May 6 meeting to hear my full response and, if you'd like, provide further public comment at that time for staff and Council to consider.

To clarify how that May 6 meeting will look: When we get to

the community comments portion of the meeting, the Mayor will ask me if there is any response to comments submitted at or since the last meeting. That is where I will provide my full response. Then members of the public are welcome to testify and provide further comment (up to three minutes each). Council and staff do not respond to newly received comments at the meeting; any new comments provided will be responded to (if they require a response) at the following meeting. Council can also consider putting an agenda item on a future meeting if they so choose.

Thanks again for including us in this thread. Staff will likely limit our responses until that May 6 meeting just so we can ensure a full, complete, robust response to all points raised. I also have again removed all Councilmembers except the Mayor to avoid violations of the public meeting law but will be forwarding this to all Council for their awareness.

Hello everyone,

I would like to voice my support for Allison's proposal to reconsider the extension of Harrison St. and would also like to know the next steps to try to make this happen. As construction has moved forward, we have already experienced frequent issues with work crews parking illegally as there are simply not enough places for them to park their vehicles. I anticipate that as the houses are built and occupied, these problems with parking will continue due to the increased number of cars in the neighborhood. I would like to see the Harrison St. extension revised to be a two way street with curbed sidewalks on both sides. This would also likely eliminate the problem of cars parking on the sidewalk while allowing emergency vehicles to easily enter the area. Additionally, building the street out would provide more on street parking to whoever would be living in the new houses, which would do a lot to address one of the primary concerns that I have (not enough parking and unsafe and illegal driving and parking of vehicles near our house).

I would also like to note again that the arborvitae are still creating a significant safety concern that I have repeatedly contacted code enforcement about, with no resolution of the issue. It was my understanding that removing vegetation over 3 feet high that blocked visibility was a condition of approval for the development and I would like to see this addressed as soon as possible, preferably before construction continues as warnings alone clearly are not working to resolve the issue. It is difficult both to see cars when crossing Home Ave in a car and to be seen by cars when using the crosswalk as a pedestrian. We have had cars not see us until the last minute while walking our two young children in their stroller. It is extremely frustrating to have public amenities be difficult and unsafe to use because of one person's refusal to follow regulations. For reference, I've attached a photo of the arborvitae and the responses I have received from code enforcement.

Hi Everyone,

I want to thank everyone for being engaged with the development happening on Harrison Street. Engagement whether in opposition or support is what being part of a community is and shows people are passionate about making this a lasting and vibrant place to live.

I want to lay out some information that I think gets to the heart of some of the opposition to development on Harrison Street:

• The Mission Park neighborhood and surrounding area was zoned R5 until June 2022.

- The proposal to continue Harrison street and divide the existing lots facing Home St. into additional new lots on Harrison was approved in March 2022, while zoned R5.
 - I know this led me to believe there would be no more than four new homes in the neighborhood. I think many of us in the neighborhood were very surprised, and feel a bit tricked, about the exponential change in allowed density.
 - The timing of these changes further feels like we were purposefully deceived about what was going to happen in the neighborhood.

Proposals

There are two things I would like to see examined regarding the neighborhood:

- I would like to propose an overlay zone that limits density building to 50% of the maximum allowed by city code when there is an existing parent lot that has maximized density building within 100 feet.
 - a. This is in line with the spirit of density housing while maintaining the character of a neighborhood. Duplexes, etc. could still be built within 100ft of the maximized parent lot, but it would prevent one single area from being oversaturated with one single type of dense housing.
 - i. Ex. The parent lots at 5026 and 5036 Harrison Street are being built to maximum density currently. My lot, which is within the 100 ft, would be limited to 50% of the allowed maximum.

- ii. Additionally, if something like this had been in place prior to construction, only 5026 or 5036 Harrison Street would have been allowed to build to maximum density, in this case four small homes. The neighboring lot would have been limited to two homes or a duplex.
- b. I'm proposing this specifically for our neighborhood, although I would encourage the city to look at this at a larger scale. Adopting a compromise policy like this will likely prevent many future situations similar to this one in other neighborhoods.


2. I would like to propose the extension of Harrison street is re-evaluated and takes the new increased population of the neighborhood into account.

a. The decision to make it a one way was made when the assumption was R5 compliant homes would be built on the new lots. Now under MD zoning, the one way status, width of the street, visibility, number of cars entering the neighborhood from 51st, etc. may no longer be appropriate or safe.

Next steps

What are the appropriate steps I can take as a citizen to request these two proposals?

- From the other emails on the chain I've learned there is a City Council meeting on May 6th.
 - I will plan on attending.
- I can provide public comment <u>here</u>.
 - Is this how I can ensure my concerns are addressed at the May 6th city council meeting?
- Emma, Brett- What else can I or the community do to



<u>here</u>. If you are unable to make the meeting, I also plan on submitting my responses in writing so that they can be part of the record and shareable with the neighborhood.

Again, I want to thank you for taking the time to write in and share your concerns. I appreciate the frustrations expressed and look forward to sharing more information about how we got here and the path forward in a couple weeks.

I share the same concerns that have been brought up by neighbors. I appreciate you proposing a potential solution, but blocking the street with bollards will not solve the deeper issues and I fear it would actually cause more sidewalk parking, while simultaneously making a street unusable to residents. Personally, I would like to see the northern sidewalk extended to Home Avenue, where it can be protected from the road by a curb and vegetation strip, and have Harrison Street expanded to be a street with a curb and parking. The woonerf street has already proven insufficient for the current level of development and will only become more inadequate when 20 more houses are built and occupied. The garage that it was created to preserve has already been detached from the house it was a part of and converted into a duplex. The scope of this development has more than quadrupled from what we were told when the woonerf street was agreed upon as a compromise and the street needs to be reconfigured to accommodate the greatly expanded size of this project. One of the reasons I am so concerned about on street parking is that we have already had multiple people park on the sidewalk of the woonerf and we have construction crews illegally park for convenience nearly every day that construction work is being done. If people cannot find spaces to park legally now, why should we have any confidence in the adequacy of current on street parking when 20 additional houses are built? Reconfiguring the Harrison Street extension would provide more on street parking and would physically prevent cars from parking on the sidewalk.

(I don't think Amaya's email included Alec's recent note, so I'm adding it back in below my response. I am copying Alec as well, since I don't think he was on the To-list for Amaya's note.)

Amaya et al,

For reference, I'm (re-)attaching the site plan that Alec sent earlier with a proposed walkway leading to Home Avenue from the four rear units at 5026 & 5036 SE Harrison St. We received and reviewed the idea and confirmed it should meet the applicable code requirements, which focus on providing a pedestrian walkway to a public street—Alec's proposal would do that. The walkway needs to be at least 3 ft wide and constructed with a hard surface material. So, that is a workable alternative if Alec chooses. My understanding of the other question below about whether the proposed quadplex on the lot where the rerouted walkway would go is as follows—the proposed quadplex would still be built, with the shared walkway running across the northern portion of that lot (Lot 4 from the 2022 subdivision). I'll let Alec confirm—I don't think he received Amaya's email with the question.

I wanted to provide an update on a couple of the issues mentioned in this thread.

First, regarding the parking situation on Harrison Street, I will be formally requesting a modification to the site plan. My proposal is to shift the pedestrian access for the four rear units, which do not have dedicated parking, to Home Avenue instead of Harrison. As you know, there is more onstreet parking available on Home Avenue, and I hope this change will help alleviate some of the parking congestion on Harrison that many of you are concerned about. Please be aware that this would be a deviation from the previously approved plans, so its approval is not guaranteed. I will certainly keep you informed of the outcome.

Second, I want to clarify that I own the south side of the development only. Regarding the arborvitae on Home Avenue, I also agree that they present a significant safety concern. I have already contacted Tim Salyers to request that the street be temporarily closed at Home Avenue until this issue can be resolved. Unfortunately, I do not have control over the trees themselves, and it appears the current property owners are resistant to having them removed.

I hope this provides some clarity, and I will continue to update you as I have more information.

Greetings Heather, Allison, and all,

Thanks again for the continued correspondence on this. As I noted previously, I will address the range of issues brought up in this thread during the May 6 Council meeting. This will include:

- Clarification re: the land use decisions and state regulations that got us to where we are today, and a response to the overlay idea proposed below: While I truly appreciate the frustrations raised and the ideas proposed, the city is limited in many ways due to new state laws and can't adopt code that contradicts what is mandated under House Bill 2001 (Middle-Housing Bill) or the state's Climate-Friendly and Equitable Communities (CFEC) rules.
- Clarification re: city authority regarding contractor license review and approval: I also appreciate the questions raised on this topic. We are consulting with state building code staff to confirm our understanding of what cities can and can't consider in terms of approving a building permit.
- Update on code enforcement re: arborvitae: Please know we agree with the need for these shrubs to come out for visibility reasons. Code enforcement has communicated a deadline of May 4 to the property owner, and I believe they may be coming down today.
- Response to feedback on the Harrison Street connection

Allison, to your question about what you and other neighbors can do, I recommend you tune in or attend that May 6 meeting to hear my full response and, if you'd like, provide further public comment at that time for staff and Council to consider. To clarify how that May 6 meeting will look: When we get to the community comments portion of the meeting, the Mayor will ask me if there is any response to comments submitted at or since the last meeting. That is where I will provide my full response. Then members of the public are welcome to testify and provide further comment (up to three minutes each). Council and staff do not respond to newly received comments at the meeting; any new comments provided will be responded to (if they require a response) at the following meeting. Council can also consider putting an agenda item on a future meeting if they so choose.

Thanks again for including us in this thread. Staff will likely limit our responses until that May 6 meeting just so we can ensure a full, complete, robust response to all points raised. I also have again removed all Councilmembers except the Mayor to avoid violations of the public meeting law but will be forwarding this to all Council for their awareness.

Hello everyone,

I would like to voice my support for Allison's proposal to reconsider the extension of Harrison St. and would also like to know the next steps to try to make this happen. As construction has moved forward, we have already experienced frequent issues with work crews parking illegally as there are simply not enough places for them to park their vehicles. I anticipate that as the houses are built and occupied, these problems with parking will continue due to the increased number of cars in the neighborhood. I would like to see the Harrison St. extension revised to be a two way street with curbed sidewalks on both sides. This would also likely eliminate the problem of cars parking on the sidewalk while allowing emergency vehicles to easily enter the area. Additionally, building the street out would provide more on street parking to whoever would be living in the new houses, which would do a lot to address one of the primary concerns that I have (not enough parking and unsafe and illegal driving and parking of vehicles near our house).


I would also like to note again that the arborvitae are still creating a significant safety concern that I have repeatedly contacted code enforcement about, with no resolution of the issue. It was my understanding that removing vegetation over 3 feet high that blocked visibility was a condition of approval for the development and I would like to see this addressed as soon as possible, preferably before construction continues as warnings alone clearly are not working to resolve the issue. It is difficult both to see cars when crossing Home Ave in a car and to be seen by cars when using the crosswalk as a pedestrian. We have had cars not see us until the last minute while walking our two young children in their stroller. It is extremely frustrating to have public amenities be difficult and unsafe to use because of one person's refusal to follow regulations. For reference, I've attached a photo of the arborvitae and the responses I have received from code enforcement.

- a. This is in line with the spirit of density housing while maintaining the character of a neighborhood. Duplexes, etc. could still be built within 100ft of the maximized parent lot, but it would prevent one single area from being oversaturated with one single type of dense housing.
 - i. Ex. The parent lots at 5026 and 5036 Harrison Street are being built to maximum density currently. My lot, which is within the 100 ft, would be limited to 50% of the allowed maximum.
 - ii. Additionally, if something like this had been in place prior to construction, only 5026 or 5036 Harrison Street would have been allowed to build to maximum density, in this case four small homes. The neighboring lot would have been limited to two homes or a duplex.
- b. I'm proposing this specifically for our neighborhood, although I would encourage the city to look at this at a larger scale. Adopting a compromise policy like this will likely prevent many future situations similar to this one in other neighborhoods.

2. I would like to propose the extension of Harrison street is re-evaluated and takes the new increased population of the neighborhood into account.

a. The decision to make it a one way was made when the assumption was R5 compliant homes would be built on the new lots. Now under MD zoning, the one way status, width of the street, visibility, number of cars entering the neighborhood from 51st, etc. may no longer be appropriate or safe.

 Next steps What are the appropriate steps I can take as a citizen to request these two proposals? From the other emails on the chain I've learned there is a City Council meeting on May 6th.
 I will plan on attending.
 I can provide public comment <u>here</u>.
 Is this how I can ensure my concerns are addressed at the May 6th city council meeting?

My concern is that the construction workers will be forced to park in the limited spaces that we all have available if they cannot use the left side of the road on Harrison in the Mission Hills development. Is there a possibility of reviewing the no-parking at the end of 51st where it connects to Harrison street? The street is more accessible now and that area was designated no parking because of the dead-end street in order to allow emergency vehicles to turn around. Opening up that side of the street now could create nice parking for the workers and new residents in the area. The City has said they will look at other ways to make this neighborhood more liveable, creating parking where none is provided at the home is a great place to start. Thanks for responding to this chain and for your willingness to engage with the neighborhood. As part of these discussions I'd encourage you to include a conversation

about the City's optional decision to allow for cottage cluster (disconnected quads) developments.

My understanding is that while the state law allows for density up to quadplexes on previous R5 lots, the City voluntarily opted to allow for an additional option to permit the cottage cluster model. I raise this because I think a lot of the concern/frustration from neighbors is arising from the layout decision to pack these tiny houses in with no spacing, as opposed to more balanced approaches we've seen in mid-size housing elsewhere in the area.

For example, just a couple of blocks over there are duplexes and triplexes that have driveways that allow for more space, density, and sufficient off site parking for vehicles. Those houses also sold immediately because they are providing amenities that homeowners/renters are looking for, and it prevented transportation and infrastructure disputes. Elsewhere these cottage clusters have remained unsold for months and are increasingly likely to get snatched up as rental units rather than individual ownership.

I respect and understand that the City may not be able to do anything to limit the state law, but I do think it's worth considering if these additional permitted decisions are potentially creating more problems than solutions to develop affordable mid size housing and balance livability concerns. Apologies if my understanding of the cottage cluster ordinance is inaccurate.

The Council will likely be holding this Middle Housing Town Hall in the latter half of July – it will be in the July Pilot and widely advertised ahead of time. So please stay tuned for more details on that.

I saw that the Police Department has promised more patrols, so I hope at least some of the problems caused by the construction crews will come to an end. Thank you for your patience as well as your perseverance on this.

That said, I do think it is time that the rest of the Council saw your concerns, so I have asked the City Recorder, Scott Stauffer, to add this email chain to the Council packet for next Tuesday's meeting (regular session). I believe that Mr. Stauffer has captured the various emails that came across (it is not one clear through-chain). The packet will go out tomorrow, and this, like any other communications about items *not* on Tuesday's agenda, should appear in the back of the packet.

Also, ever since the testimony and emails on this, I have been in conversation with City Manager Sagor about the need for more public education and discourse around middle housing – what we are mandated to do/allow by the state and what tools we have to address or try to minimize impacts to neighborhoods. Not focused exclusively on your neighborhood, but on a cross-section of the proposals and projects that have been submitted and approved around Milwaukie. The Council will likely be holding this Middle Housing Town Hall in the latter half of July – it will be in the July Pilot and widely advertised ahead of time. So please stay tuned for more details on that. I saw that the Police Department has promised more patrols, so I hope at least some of the problems caused by the construction crews will come to an end. Thank you for your patience as well as your perseverance on this.

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Lisa,

Thanks for responding to this chain and for your willingness to engage with the neighborhood. As part of these discussions I'd encourage you to include a conversation about the City's optional decision to allow for cottage cluster (disconnected quads) developments.

My understanding is that while the state law allows for density up to quadplexes on previous R5 lots, the City voluntarily opted to allow for an additional option to permit the cottage cluster model. I raise this because I think a lot of the concern/frustration from neighbors is arising from

the layout decision to pack these tiny houses in with no spacing, as opposed to more balanced approaches we've seen in mid-size housing elsewhere in the area.

For example, just a couple of blocks over there are duplexes and triplexes that have driveways that allow for more space, density, and sufficient off site parking for vehicles. Those houses also sold immediately because they are providing amenities that homeowners/renters are looking for, and it prevented transportation and infrastructure disputes. Elsewhere these cottage clusters have remained unsold for months and are increasingly likely to get snatched up as rental units rather than individual ownership.

I respect and understand that the City may not be able to do anything to limit the state law, but I do think it's worth considering if these additional permitted decisions are potentially creating more problems than solutions to develop affordable mid size housing and balance livability concerns. Apologies if my understanding of the cottage cluster ordinance is inaccurate.

As these emails have pointed out again, parking is an issue in this neighborhood. My concern is that the construction workers will be forced to park in the limited spaces that we all have available if they cannot use the left side of the road on Harrison in the Mission Hills development. Is there a possibility of reviewing the no-parking at the end of 51st where it connects to Harrison street? The street is more accessible now and that area was designated no parking because of the dead-end street in order to allow emergency vehicles to turn around. Opening up that side of the street now could create nice parking for the workers and new residents in the area. The City has said they will look at other ways to make this neighborhood more liveable, creating parking where none is provided at the home is a great place to start. We have no doubt folks will need to park their vehicles. The other two new developments near our neighborhood are very attractive and do allow for parking, something Alec could have considered on this project. From what I've read and what the City said, their hands are tied if a developer submits a proposal that does not include parking. The lack of parking on this project is the inconsideration of the builder,

Regional Vision Framework (DRAFT 05-27-25)

This is a draft of the Regional Vision Framework based on a synthesis of key themes from the Work Group's exercises and discussions as well as the framework documents submitted by workgroup members. In addition to vision, mission, goals and KPIs, this draft includes two other sections (guiding principles and program strategies) that were added to more fully capture the workgroup's input.

Vision

The workgroup will select from three options:

- <u>Option A</u>: Everyone in the region can access an affordable, stable place to call home, along with the supports they need to recover and thrive.
- <u>Option B</u>: The region supports stable and thriving communities through a compassionate, coordinated and clear response to homelessness.

Option C: Homelessness is rare, brief and nonrecurring for anyone who experiences it in the region.

Mission

To achieve this vision, we will create a coordinated and integrated regional system of care, built on shared goals and guided by regional leadership, oversight and accountability.

Guiding Principles

- 1. Respond to the homelessness crisis with urgency.
- 2. Ensure that every person experiencing homelessness or housing instability in our region can access the services they need—no matter who they are, where they are or what door they enter.
- 3. Center the dignity and needs of people experiencing or at risk of homelessness, pairing compassionate support with clear expectations.
- 4. Advance equity by improving service access and outcomes for communities disproportionately impacted by housing instability and homelessness.
- 5. Strengthen cross-sector partnerships and coordination to align housing with other essential services, including healthcare, mental health and substance use recovery services.
- Create an adaptable structure that is data-driven and responsive to continuous feedback and improvement.
- 6. Serve the diverse needs of the region, providing jurisdictions the flexibility to create tailored solutions to address local priorities and needs within a shared regional framework.
- 7. Support solutions that foster safe, livable and healthy communities for everyone in our region.
- 8. Cultivate public trust through transparency and accountability.
- 9. Build the capacity and sustainability of the nonprofit organizations that are the backbone of effective program implementation.

Regional Goals

More detail on each of the regional goals is provided in the tables in the next section.

System goals

- 1. A **regional governance structure** with clear roles and responsibilities, effective leadership and oversight, and cross-jurisdictional coordination
- 2. Regional **consistency and alignment** in policies, program standards, contracting, and performance measures across jurisdictions and programs

Program Strategies

Implementing jurisdictions will develop their own programs, budgets and implementation plans to meet local needs and contribute to the regional goals, guided by a regional menu of strategies that include:

<u>Access</u>

- **Outreach and engagement:** A comprehensive system of street outreach and access centers to connect people experiencing homelessness with services and address their immediate housing barriers.
- Service connections: A regionally integrated coordinated entry system that efficiently connects people to easily accessible services and housing.

Prevention

 Homelessness prevention: Programs to prevent people at high risk of homelessness from losing their housing due to temporary crises through short-term financial assistance and problem-solving supports.

Stabilization

- **Emergency shelter:** Access to a range of shelter options to provide people experiencing homelessness with interim stability and connect them with pathways to stable housing.
- **Stabilization programming:** Transitional housing with intensive, specialized services for people with serious behavioral health and medical conditions, providing structured pathways from shelter to housing.

Housing

- Housing navigation: Assessment of housing barriers and needs, support to address immediate housing barriers, housing search and application assistance, and assistance with move in costs.
- Housing access: Strategies to increase the availability of housing units through affordable housing development, expanding access to rent assistance, and strengthening landlord partnerships.
- **Housing placement:** Rapid rehousing and other programs providing short- and medium-term rent assistance combined with supportive services for people who can maintain housing long-term.
- Permanent supportive housing: Long-term housing assistance and intensive services to support housing stability for people with a disability who have experienced prolonged homelessness.

Services

- Supportive services: Case management, individualized service plans and connections to tailored wraparound supports to meet each person's unique needs.
- Housing stability: Housing retention support, connections to wraparound services, and assistance with
 income and employment growth to support people to achieve long-term housing stability.

Cross-system partnerships

- Coordination with health and behavioral health systems: Integrated strategies to provide seamless
 connections to appropriate housing supports at different stages of care.
- Public safety partnerships: Coordinated strategies to prevent discharges into homelessness, reduce the impact of homelessness on public safety system resources, and support community livability.

Subject:	2024 SHS audit recommendation status updates

MEMO PURPOSE

In 2023, Metro's independent, elected Auditor Brian Evans conducted an audit of the Supportive Housing Services program. The audit, including staff responses, was released in January 2024. It noted meaningful progress on earlier recommendations from an audit conducted in 2021 and highlighted opportunities to enhance coordination and data reliability. Auditor Evans found that strengthening role clarity, improving performance measurement systems, and planning for long-term sustainability would help ensure the program delivers on its goals and maximizes the impact of investments.

The 2024 SHS audit made a total of 18 primary recommendations with five additional sub recommendations, for a total of 23 recommendations:

- 11 recommendations are fully implemented, including eight primary recommendations
- 11 recommendations are in process, including nine primary recommendations
- One recommendation has not been implemented

The status of each recommendation (Implemented, In Process, or Not Implemented) and a short summary explaining the status is below. The summary information below was provided to Auditor Evans by the Metro Chief Operating Officer in February 2025. Some status updates include additional information from Metro staff if a response milestone was reached between February and May 2025.

IMPLEMENTED

- **Recommendation 1.** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Set up a process to ensure each oversight body gets timely information about each other's work.
 - Implemented. Metro staff engaged with the Co-Chairs of the Supportive Housing Services Oversight Committee (SHS OC) and Tri-County Planning Body (TCPB) in January 2024 to shape the frequency and content of the updates they would receive to ensure access to timely information. Beginning in February 2024, each committee began receiving monthly progress reports and the latest approved minutes from the respective committee in their meeting packets. Additional efforts to ensure each oversight body gets timely information include quarterly updates from committee counterparts and monthly meetings between Co-Chairs of both committees.

Additionally, Metro Council now receives more frequent updates about the program and each oversight body's work according to an engagement calendar (see "recommendation 2" for details). Staff have also begun work to review the SHS OC committee construct (see "recommendation 3" for details).

- **Recommendation 2:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Increase the frequency of program updates to Metro Council.
 - Implemented. At the beginning of 2024, Metro Housing directors gathered feedback from Metro Councilors on SHS program information and update needs. In partnership with the Office of COO, Housing developed a calendar for providing program updates to Metro Council, increasing the number of public Supportive Housing Services (SHS) work sessions and ensuring timely, ongoing program oversight. While the increased engagement has included presentations from TCPB and SHS OC Co-Chairs, the counties declined the invitation to present directly to Council.
- **Recommendation 3:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Get input from Metro Council, Tri-County Planning Body, and Regional Oversight Committee about the variety of experience needed to provide independent oversight among the members of the Regional Oversight Committee (SHS OC).
 - Implemented. Metro staff gathered input from Metro Council on the expertise and experience needed among members of the SHS OC through briefings in January and February 2024, and the SHS OC itself through a survey in March. Staff also met with the SHS OC Co-Chairs in February 2024 to discuss the topic.

Council feedback raised a need for more impartiality in the membership which was integrated into Metro Council President Peterson's review of recruitment pools and candidates. Additional feedback (from Council and SHS OC) highlighted the need for more representation from those with lived experience of homelessness and from certain business sectors. These priorities shaped the recruitment approach for new members in summer 2024.

Evaluation results were not formally shared with committee members and Metro Council, nor was Metro Code updated in Fall 2024 as was expected. Implementation of these results have been paused while Metro Council considers a consolidated committee structure as a part of the SHS reform discussions.

Those discussions have included membership requirements and representation for the new proposed oversight body. If reforms go into effect, Metro Code will be updated accordingly.

- **Recommendation 6a:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Ensure the Regional Oversight Committee can fulfill its responsibilities by: Providing a full list of responsibilities assigned to it.
 - Implemented. Staff reviewed all SHS OC language related to roles and responsibilities across governing documents and organized these responsibilities by area of focus. Staff shared this document with the SHS OC in January 2024, and it now is included in every committee packet. In September 2024, staff provided an updated version to clarify financial responsibilities. This list remains integrated into presentations before key bodies of work (such as the annual report and work plan review) and serves as part of the onboarding process for new members.

Governance and oversight have been topics of focus in several of Metro Council's public work sessions about SHS Program reforms, and priority issues for many stakeholders. In December 2024 Metro Council signed Resolution No. 24-5436 directing staff to prepare a package of policy proposals that would include "the establishment of a new regional housing and homelessness oversight structure that improves coordination and collaboration in investments to address homelessness and affordable housing needs across the region." The Resolution provided specific guidance about the proposed new oversight structure, including that there be a single committee, as opposed to the current layered roles of the SHS OC and TCPB.

Due to the dynamic and evolving current state, management commitments from the original audit to updates governing documents are on hold.

- **Recommendation 6b:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Ensure the Regional Oversight Committee can fulfill its responsibilities by: Providing sufficient data to evaluate administrative spending and make recommendations.
 - Implemented. Quarterly financial reporting templates were updated beginning in FY23-24 Q1 to include Metro and county administrative expenditures (previously, the quarterly reports only included Metro's administrative and overhead costs). The SHS OC is now provided this information in quarterly financial reports and via presentations by Metro staff. The year 2 (FY22-23) annual regional report incorporated this information in the regional financial overview (Exhibit E). The annual reporting template was updated again in July 2024 to include administrative spending requirements for service providers and for the first time, the counties provided a breakdown of administrative spending for service providers as part of their FY23-24 annual report. This information was provided to the committee for review in January 2025 and their initial analysis will be included in the FY23-24 annual report.

- **Recommendation 11a:** Metro Housing should: Use existing data to provide more context for county and regional performance by adding the following to quarterly and annual reports: Retention and returns to homelessness compared to the number of people served.
 - Implemented. Retention rates for permanent supportive housing and rapid rehousing and returns to homelessness were reported in the FY23-24 (year 2) county annual reports and integrated in the FY23-24 annual regional report that was released in Spring 2024. In addition to the overall metrics, the data has been disaggregated by race to see how well the system is supporting households of color. The annual report templates have been updated to include a methodology for how to track retention rates and returns to homelessness at a regional level, but quarterly reports will not be updated (due to the timing of data entry, annual reporting is most effective).
- **Recommendation 11b:** Metro Housing should: Use existing data to provide more context for county and regional performance by adding the following to quarterly and annual reports: The capacity of permanent supportive housing compared to the overall need.
 - Implemented. In addition to tracking progress on the work plan's regional goals, an important measure of SHS progress to date is the number of permanent supportive housing units created with SHS funding in comparison to the overall need. Beginning with the FY23-24 annual reports, information on the number of SHS-funded PSH units added and the number of households in need will be captured. The number of households in need of PSH in 2021 will be used as a baseline to understand how need is changing over time.

The information will not be captured on quarterly reports because the data points are best reported annually due to the time needed to extrapolate conclusions on data.

- **Recommendation 12:** Metro Housing should: Create a process to check the accuracy of county quarterly and annual reports and require counties to identify if they have revised data reported previously.
 - Implemented. The quality and compliance team, hired in March 2024, is responsible for checking the accuracy of county quarterly and annual reports, working directly with counties to address questions and/or errors and sending quarterly review letters to each county. The quarterly review letters capture Metro's analysis of the data, outline data from previous quarter reports that need to be updated and include outstanding questions for counties. This report evaluation process has been documented.

As of March 2025, a data-sharing agreement between Metro and the tri- counties is signed and executed; Metro expects access to raw and disaggregated data from the Homeless Management Information System in August 2025. This information is instrumental in validating the data provided in the reports.

Work to refine annual and quarterly templates is underway; Metro continues to work in partnership with the counties to document updates to reporting templates.

- **Recommendation 13a:** Metro Housing should: Update reporting templates to: Add data about the percentage of the counties' total spending that comes from SHS.
 - Implemented. Metro began engaging with county staff in February 2024 to discuss updating the reporting templates to require information on leveraged funding. Leveraged funding was added to the FY23-24 annual report template but because Metro cannot obligate counties to report on non-SHS funding sources or activities, none of the counties provided the financial data needed to allow Metro to understand the percentage of the counties' total spending that comes from SHS.

The counties have expressed disagreement with Metro about this being financial data they are required to submit, as it is outside of the scope of SHS. As part of the SHS reform discussion with Metro Council, there is strong consensus on obtaining all leveraged funding for homeless services from implementing partners. This is another potential avenue to be able to operationalize this recommendation in the future.

- **Recommendation 13b:** Metro Housing should: Update reporting templates to: Add line items for spending on each service type provided.
 - Implemented. Metro staff first met with the counties in February 2024 to discuss updating the reporting templates, including the budget service lines in the financial reporting workbook, and gathered feedback. The financial reporting templates for FY25 were then edited in collaboration with the counties, and a final version went out in July 2024 that was updated to align financial reporting categories with programmatic reporting to support analysis and oversight. Starting with the FY25 Q1 reports that Metro received from the counties in November 2024, there is now, for example, a budget line item specific to "shelter" for all counties, rather than a budget line item that may include shelter among other costs. This is true across all program areas (e.g. Permanent Supportive Housing, eviction prevention, regional strategy implementation, etc.)
- **Recommendation 17:** The Tri-County Planning Body should: Advise the Regional Oversight Committee and Metro Housing about best practices for communicating program results to ensure understanding.
 - Implemented. Members of the Tri-County Planning Body and SHS Oversight Committee are regularly updated on each other's meetings and work with meeting notes for each body being shared in the meeting packets of each committee.
 Moreover, Metro hosts a monthly joint Co-Chair meeting for all three Housing Department committees (SHS OC, TCPB and Affordable Housing Bond Oversight Committee) to facilitate partnerships, collaboration and awareness. Metro Housing

staff attend every TCPB meeting and every co-chair meeting to review potential opportunities for communicating program planning to the public.

IN PROCESS

- **Recommendation 4**: The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Document criteria and processes for monitoring up to 25% of county program activities.
 - In process. Per the Intergovernmental Agreements (IGAs), Metro is able to monitor up to 25% of county program activities. Metro staff began working with a third-party contractor in January 2024 to develop a monitoring framework and the department hired two quality and compliance staff members in March 2024 to lead this work.

The framework, supplemental policies and procedures were provided to county partners in March for initial feedback, but the counties did not want to work with a third-party contractor to develop the monitoring framework. Metro agreed to working directly with the counties and hosted two monitoring work sessions over the summer; a final framework draft was developed based on those discussions and counties had until October to provide feedback.

The counties provided significant revisions to the final framework draft which has necessitated ongoing conversation between parties before resolution and finalization of the monitoring framework. As such, Metro was unable to initiate monitoring for each county as intended in early 2025; Metro could not begin monitoring until the framework is finalized. The IGAs requires that Metro and the counties jointly develop and agree to the monitoring plan (Section 6.5.3: "Ahead of any monitoring event under this section, the Parties must develop a written plan describing how Metro will conduct its review.")

Metro Housing leadership met with county leadership to address these final barriers in winter of 2025. Metro came to framework agreement with Clackamas and Washington Counties and monitoring is expected to be in summer of 2025; conversations between Multnomah and Metro are ongoing.

- **Recommendation 5:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Document criteria and processes for implementing corrective action plans.
 - In process. Multnomah County was under a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) for FY24. This was the first time Metro had entered into a CAP with a county under SHS, and it enabled staff to move beyond the broad framework provided in the IGAs toward a more practical understanding of the needs and process for future CAP agreements.

In the fall of 2024, the Office of the COO, Metro Housing, FRS and OMA held a series of meetings to document the CAP process and timeline between Metro and Multnomah County. This included identifying areas for process improvement. For

example, the ambiguous authority in the IGAs prolonged the CAP negotiation timeline and strained resources for both parties.

Metro Council is actively discussing and considering reforms to the SHS program, specifically to improve governance and accountability, and increase clarity of roles and responsibilities. During implementation planning of these reforms, Metro Council and staff will formally document criteria and processes for when and how to implement corrective actions.

- **Recommendation 6c:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Ensure the Regional Oversight Committee can fulfill its responsibilities by: Providing sufficient data to evaluate spending on Populations A and B.
 - In process. Counties sent Metro FY23 spending by Population A and B in December 2023 with the expectation that this information would be regionalized and included in the FY22-23 annual regional report. This was the first time counties had reported this information to Metro. After reviewing, Metro staff determined that due to variability in reported service types, data availability, assumptions and allocation methodologies, the information could not be used to determine spending by Populations A and B for FY23 and therefore could not be included in the FY22-23 annual regional report.

Metro outlined these concerns in a memo to SHS OC and the counties in January 2024. The spending information on Populations A and B that the counties provided and the memo that Metro sent outlining concerns were included as exhibits in the FY23 annual regional report, which was published in March 2024.

To address issues and improve reporting for FY24, Metro Housing staff sent out guidance to the counties on tracking and reporting Population A and B and worked in partnership with the counties to update templates. The reporting template was updated in January 2025; counties filled out the template that same month so Population A and B information will be included in the FY23-24 annual regional report but a formal recommendation from SHS OC on population spending will not. The counties' included more robust data in their FY24 reports, but there were still inconsistencies in service type categories, allocation methodologies, assumptions and definitions. Work is underway to address these issues.

- **Recommendation 6d:** The COO's Office and Metro Housing should: Ensure the Regional Oversight Committee can fulfill its responsibilities by: Including data and recommendations about administrative spending and spending on Populations A and B in the annual report to Council.
 - In process. The FY22-23 (year 2) regional annual report included information about Metro and county administrative expenditures in the regional financial overview (Exhibit E) but due to variability in reporting methodologies, spending on Populations A and B could not be included. A high-level analysis on administrative

spending for service providers is included in the FY23-24 (year 3) regional annual report.

- **Recommendation 8:** Metro Housing should: Clarify the goals related to serving 5,000 people and 10,000 households.
 - In process. In January 2024, staff reviewed materials that referenced the 5,000 and 10,000 goals and updated all materials for consistency (program documents, budget/financial material, website content, reporting tools and work plan templates). In June 2024, Metro issued a memo to county partners with clarifying definitions and direction to adopt the new definitions and to update county-specific material (website, etc).

To date, the Metro SHS Work Plan is the only Metro document that does not reflect the updated definitions. Updates to the Metro SHS Work Plan are on hold as part of the ongoing SHS Program reform discussions.

- **Recommendation 9:** Management Housing should: Define which service types are used to report on progress towards the 5,000 and 10,000 goals.
 - In process. In June 2024, Metro issued a memo to county partners to capture the current state of services reflected in the 5,000 and 10,000 goal and to provide clarity on which service types counted toward which goal (this memo also included the clarified definitions for the 5,000 people and 10,000 households described in recommendation 8). The counties expressed concerns about the service types defined in the memo, and a workgroup was planned to be established to address and finalize the service type definitions. It's important to note that Metro and the tri-counties have yet to sign a regional data-sharing agreement and Metro Council has requested more information about the obstacles and needs. Establishing a workgroup about specific service type definitions will be postponed until further direction is provided by Metro Council.

Due to the ongoing discussions and discrepancies, the FY23-24 (year 3) report will not include information on this.

- **Recommendation 10:** Metro Housing should: Develop a performance measure to evaluate the quality of services provided.
 - In process. Metro Housing hired the quality and compliance team in March 2024 to assist in the work of advancing quality measures. To further support this work, Metro Housing sought a third-party expert to bring technical expertise, address immediate needs in program evaluation and to help establish quality measurements. The consultant identified was Portland State University's Homelessness Research & Action Collaborative (HRAC).

While it was originally anticipated that the scope of work would be developed with the consultant in March 2024, Metro Housing executed an IGA with HRAC in May 2024 after additional review by both parties. Since then, Metro staff has worked with HRAC toward a completed scope of work / work order. Work to develop a scope of work is currently underway.

The work order would include, among other things, program evaluation for SHS. This body of work is expected to launch in FY26.

- **Recommendation 14:** The Tri-County Planning Body should: Research relevant studies of the program impact on SHS' target populations.
 - In process. All research performed on behalf of TCPB has been in service of building a more coordinated, interconnected housing and homelessness system where clients can expect a baseline level of care and service providers have access to the tools and training they need to provide that care at a similar level across the region.

Research on each of the six goals (Landlord Recruitment and Retention, Coordinated Entry, Healthcare System Alignment, Employee Recruitment and Retention, Training, and Technical Assistance) was presented to TCPB by November 2024.

While there has been some progress on developing budgets, metrics and initial strategies for each goal, there continues to be disagreement on what it means to regionalize these efforts. TCPB's lack of authority has limited their ability to direct specific actions or next steps. Ensuring the SHS program is regional in nature, and can be measured with clear performance indicators, is a key priority in the SHS reform discussions Metro Council is engaging in.

Staff are scheduled to present and finalize all implementation strategies to the TCPB and SHS OC by August 2025.

- **Recommendation 15:** The Tri-County Planning Body should: Research best practices for communicating program results to increase understanding among decision-makers and the public.
 - In process. While the original commitment was to hire a consultant to support the development of a communications plan, the Housing Department's Communication Manager (who had been recently hired at the time of the SHS Audit), implemented a range of communication best practices to broaden education about the SHS program. Efforts have included earned media, social media, paid community media, email marketing and robust storytelling across Metro news channels. The ongoing discussions about SHS reform have led to a depth and breadth of stakeholder engagement that have been critical in informing proposed programmatic changes but have limited the ability to develop a long-term communications strategy. If

programmatic reforms move forward, Housing Communications will work with Metro Council, jurisdictional partners and internal leadership to develop a proposal on how to proceed.

Work is now underway to develop a regional strategic communications plan; procurement is expected to launch in summer of 2025 and a scope developed for a regional communications strategy by the end of 2025.

- **Recommendation 16:** The Tri-County Planning Body should: Advise Boards of County Commissioners, Metro Council, and Metro Housing periodically on the results of the research.
 - In process. In addition to bimonthly councilor updates on the TCPB's regional goals, in October 2024, at a Metro Council work session, Council received a briefing on the TCPB with a focus on Landlord Recruitment and Coordinated Entry implementation strategies. Briefings on the remaining four goals will be presented to Metro Council once the TCPB has approved their companion implementation strategies this summer.

Due to the highly political nature of the SHS reform process and its connection to the TCPB and its work, staff have delayed presentations to the County Boards of Commissioners. Representatives from each of the boards remain full members of the TCPB and – in coordination with respective County staff – continue to share information with their colleagues.

- **Recommendation 18:** The Tri-County Planning Body should: Use research, program data, and financial projections to inform strategies for the regional program.
 - In process. Qualified consultants were contracted to provide research, stakeholder engagement, data scans, scenario planning, budget development, and other tasks as needed to support the co-development of regional strategies with county partners for Landlord Recruitment and Retention, Coordinated Entry, Employee Recruitment and Retention, and Healthcare Systems Alignment. The work has informed the regional strategies approved for two goals (Landlord Recruitment and Retention and Coordinated Entry) by the Tri- County Planning Body, with the remaining strategies being presented for approval to the committee and SHS OC by May 2025. TCPB received its first quarterly implementation and financial report on the Landlord Recruitment and Retention strategy in January of 2025. A quarterly reporting timeline has been established for the rest of the year.

Final approval of TCPB strategies by the SHS OC is expected by August 2025 and work is underway to draft a regional strategy plan outlining implementation and how strategies to meet the regional plan are informed by research, program data and financial projections. A draft regional plan is expected by the end of 2025.

NOT IMPLMENETED

- **Recommendation 7:** Establish an annual process for Metro Council, Tri-County Planning Body, and Regional Oversight Committee to review the funding allocations for each county and adjust if needed.
 - Not implemented. Metro finance staff has elected to not revisit the SHS allocation methodology at the current time because of the direction by the Council to work on developing a reform package, as well as the lack of data to inform a meaningful review of the current methodology and development of a reasonable alternative.

Staff will continue to assess the tax program and determine if a methodology review in the future is appropriate.

Progress on audit recommendations is communicated to the Metro Council, Metro Auditor and the public through several channels. Each year, all Metro departments with active audit recommendations submit progress reports to the Metro Chief Operating Officer or provide updates upon request. The Chief Operating Officer compiles an annual report that outlines the status of all implementation efforts and shares it with the Metro Auditor's Office.

To ensure transparency, the <u>Metro Auditor's Office maintains a public dashboard</u>, which details the status of audit recommendations made over the past five years. Data for this dashboard is pulled from the Metro Auditor's analysis of audit reports as well as the annual information provided by Metro departments.

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
