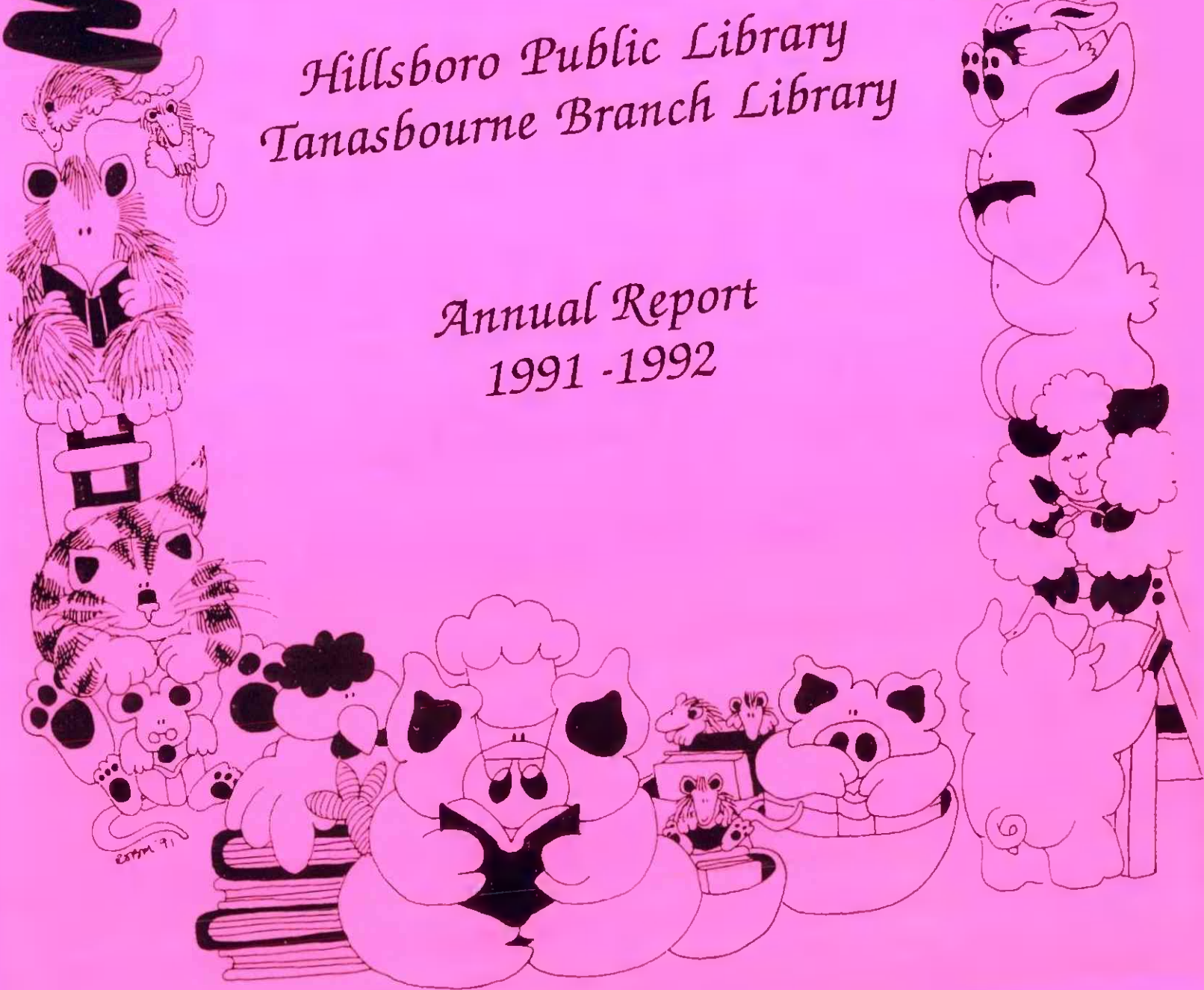

This 1991-1992 Annual Report is submitted to you by the Board of Trustees and Staff of the Hillsboro Public Library. The purpose of our report is to provide a brief review of library activities this past year and to offer a statistical comparison of our program over previous years. As you study this report, please feel free to call for clarification or further information.

Statistics indicate phenomenal increases in use of both Hillsboro facilities during the past fiscal year. The Technical Services Division reported an increase of 16% in circulation of materials at the main facility and 20% at the branch facility.

The Reference and Adult Services Division also experienced unprecedented increases in business. At the main facility, the number of questions asked and answered increased by 68%, while at the branch facility, the increase was 57%.

The Youth Services Division has consistently operated one of the most successful summer reading programs in the state. The total number of summer readers completing the program at both facilities last fiscal year increased by 15% over the previous year.

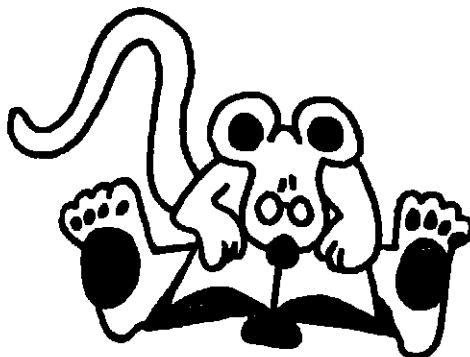
On the downside, Hillsboro's main facility book collection size has not kept pace with demand for materials because there has not been an appreciable increase in collection development funds for many years. More items were borrowed from other libraries for use by Hillsboro patrons than were loaned in fiscal year 1991-92. There were not enough titles or copies of titles owned and available at the main facility to satisfy the immediate needs of local residents.

When the Tanasbourne Branch Library opens its doors in new quarters during fiscal year 1992-93, the anticipated increase in business will generate more revenue for Hillsboro's library operations since the Washington County Cooperative Library Services (WCCLS) serial levy reimbursement formula is based on circulation. Hillsboro's libraries received 55% of their operating funds from WCCLS in fiscal year 1991-92.

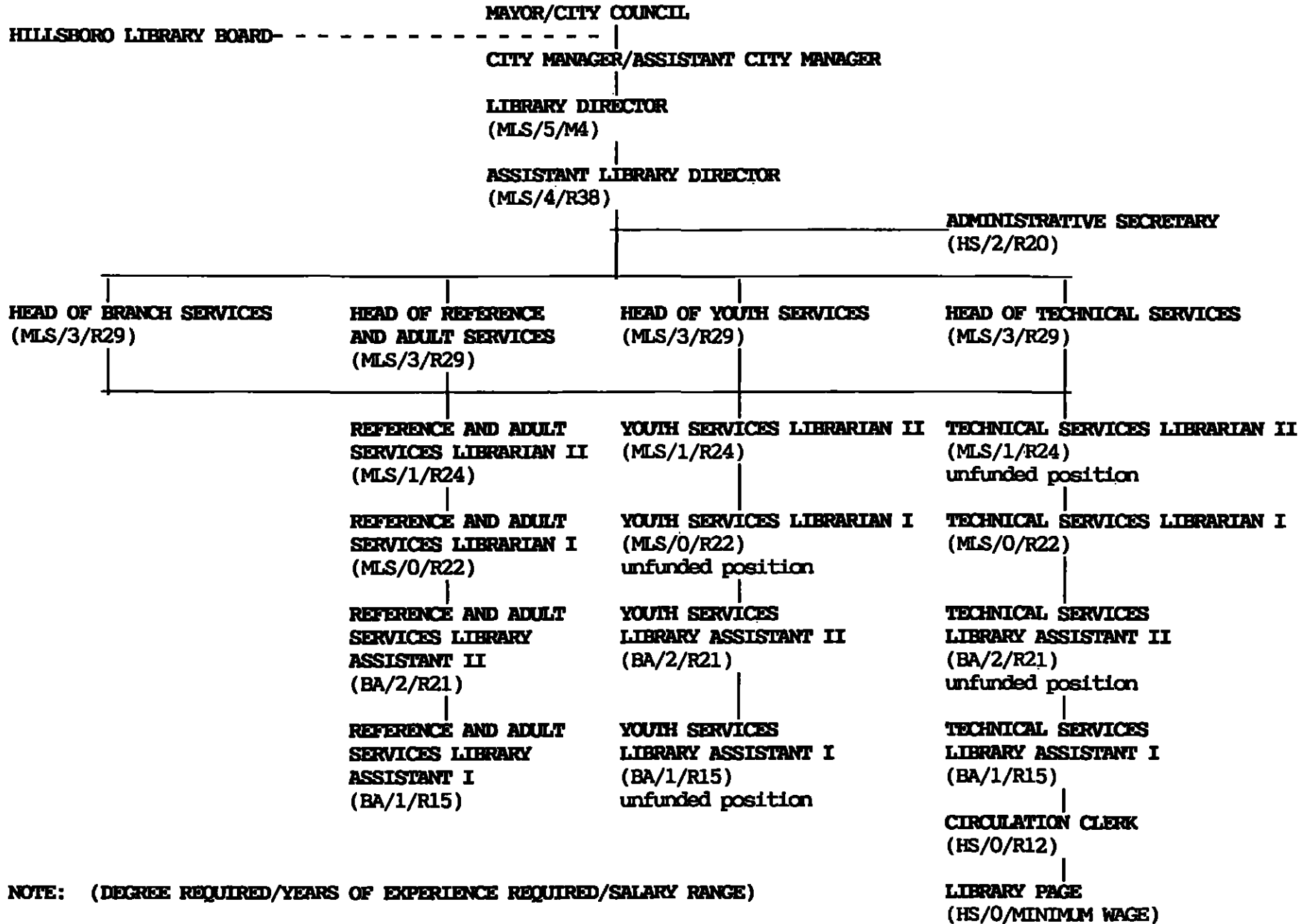

II. LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES (Continued)

1. Deposits include payments for lost items and funds earmarked for replacement items; expenditures are for replacing exact titles or subject areas.
2. Deposits are from donations; expenditures are for programs and book or audiovisual materials.
3. Most donations are now given through the private, non-profit Library Foundation of Hillsboro. Occasionally, the Hillsboro Garden Club, the Tualatin Valley Garden Club, and the Coffee Club donate funds for purchase of memorial books for former members, and those funds are processed through the Trustee Fund.
4. The 1992/93 fiscal year will be the last for expenditure of this bequest by Mrs. Dion in which she specified that large print books and books-on-tape be purchased with funds from her estate.
5. Deposits include Copico fees for the public photocopiers, Cascade Business Machines fees for the public typewriter, laminator fees, microfilm copies, census microfilm orders, and donations to the piggy bank at checkin; expenditures include laminating supplies, census microfilm deposits, payments for lost Inter-Library Loans, gifts, and programs.
6. These funds are being saved for possible use in a future capital building program.

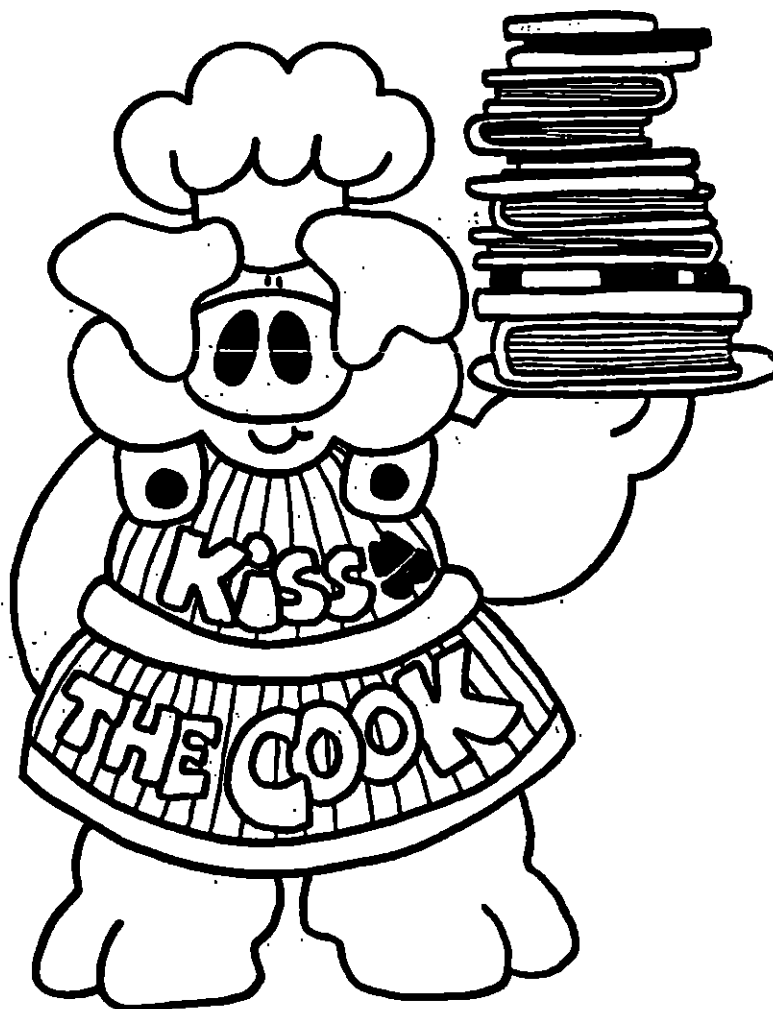

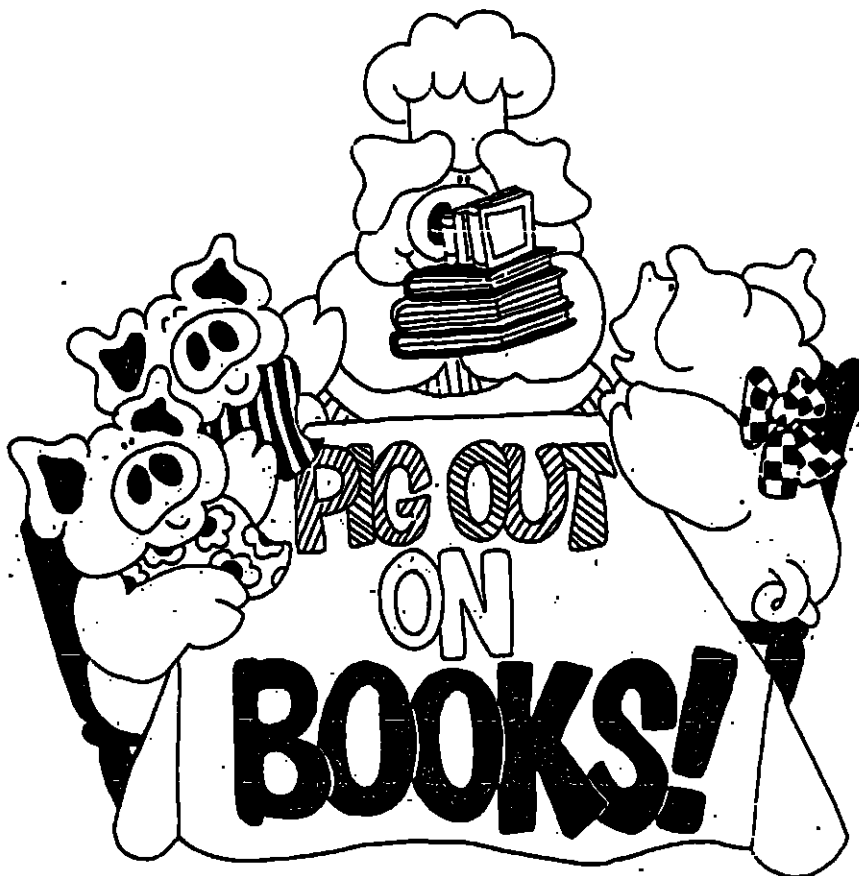
