



### FY 92-93 ACTIVITY SUMMARY

#### Land Acquisition

The most significant addition to the park system during the year was the acquisition of the Noble Woods property. This property is a 36.7 acre parcel located near the geographic center of Hillsboro at 231st and Baseline Road. The site contains some of the oldest remaining stands of evergreen trees in the City and is considered a unique addition to the City's inventory of parkland. Perhaps the most significant aspect of this acquisition was the level of community participation. The Greater Hillsboro Area Foundation organized an extensive fundraising effort and was able to contribute \$100,000.00 towards the initial downpayment and commit to 50% participation in the overall acquisition cost. As the fiscal year ended, the City was in the process of pursuing dedication of adjacent open space tracts to expand the size of the park.

During the year, the City received through dedication, the 1.97 acre open space tract of the Sundown Creek Residential Development. Subsequently, the City acquired a contiguous parcel of .50 acres from Washington County. These parcels are a part of a larger natural area known as the Glencoe Swale.

Due to the rapid pace of development, the number of sites available for future parks is diminishing rapidly. Although funding for park acquisition is extremely limited, the Department continues in its efforts to investigate and evaluate potential sites for future parks.

### Park Development

Fiscal year 1992-93 saw a continuation of development efforts at the Turner Creek and U.J. Hamby park sites. A donation of \$15,000.00 was received to build a new playground at Turner Creek Park and a number of volunteer landscape projects were completed at the site. Additionally, the City received a grant from the Metro Greenspaces Program for the restoration of the Turner Creek woodland area. As the fiscal year ended, work had begun on improvements to the trails.

A tree planting project at U. J. Hamby Park was completed in the fall of 1992. Over 120 trees were planted in the western end of the park to help restore the stream channel. This project was funded with the assistance of an \$8,000.00 grant from the State Department of Forestry.

With the help of donations from the Hillsboro Chamber Ambassadors and the Tualatin Valley Garden Club, work continued on restoration of the 10th Avenue frontage of the

Aquatic Center block. A contract was awarded for new concrete paving between the Pickleball courts and park maintenance crews installed new decorative block planter walls. The Tualatin Valley Garden Club solicited donations of plant material and installed the new plantings in early summer. The "plaza" will serve as the new home of the A & W Burger Family, a designated cultural resource.

During the year, the City received conditional use approval for the development of the Walnut Street Park site as a neighborhood park. As the fiscal year ended, plans and specifications were being prepared by staff to solicit bids for earthwork. It is planned to have the park open to the public in the spring of 1994.

#### **Facilities**

No major improvements were made to existing facilities during the fiscal year.

#### **Beautification**

The City received donations of trees, annuals, perennials and plants from several nurseries for planting in the parks. Volunteers and park maintenance personnel planted these in parks and public spaces throughout the City.

#### Maintenance

Although the improvement of existing facilities development of new sites has greatly increased the demands on park maintenance personnel, the City's parks and public areas continued to receive the high level of maintenance established in recent vears. Park development completed in previous fiscal years has added substantially to the responsibilities the parks maintenance crews. With the impending development of Walnut Street Park and the Noble Woods site. the demands on the parks maintenance staff will continue to increase. In addition to maintenance duties, park crews continue to participate in a wide variety of park improvement projects. Projects completed this year include installation of the new play equipment at Turner Creek Park, installation of new plantings at Shute Park and the Aquatic Center, construction of planters at the Pickleball Courts, and grading work at the Fairgrounds Sports Complex.

### Recreation


Interest and participation in recreation programs continued at the high levels of recent years. Sports programs, particularly men's, women's, and coed softball experienced significant growth. Demand for recreation programs continues to grow and this has placed a heavy burden on the limited recreation facilities within the community.


### RECREATION FACILITY REVENUE

# **SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION**

### PARK AND RECREATION FACILITIES INVENTORY/HISTORY

#### DEVELOPED PARK SITES

Bagley Park - Located at N.E. Second and Jackson, this 1.85 acre site receives extensive use from both the surrounding neighborhood and the downtown business district. The property was acquired by donation in 1925. In 1988, with the help of the Hillsboro Active 20-30 Club, extensive improvements were made to the park including new walkways and a playground. In addition to these facilities, the park includes restrooms, a basketball court, picnic tables, and a small shelter.

Bicentennial Park - In 1975, the Hillsboro Utilities Commission donated this 4.4 acre site to the City for park purposes. A fire substation housing a rescue unit and volunteer training was permitted as a temporary use in 1976 and occupies .8 acre of the site. Development of park facilities began in 1976 with the assistance of a special grant from the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission and donations from local businesses. In 1978, the City received additional grants from the Land & Water Conservation Fund and the State Grant-In-Aid program to continue development of the park. The site now includes a soccer field, playground equipment, restrooms, and a picnic shelter. The location at N.E. 25th and Parkwood allows convenient access from Eastwood School and developed residential areas to the east.

Hillsboro 28th Street Sports Complex - This 19.6 acre field complex is located on the southern part of the Washington County Fairgrounds on N.E. 28th Avenue. In 1975, the City entered into a long term lease agreement with Washington County for use of the property. Development began that same year with the assistance of substantial Land & Water Conservation Fund and Small Business Administration grants. Extensive development of the facility continued through 1983. The site now includes three lighted field areas, two unlighted fields, playground equipment, four lighted tennis courts, a restroom/concession building, and a large paved parking area.

McKinney Park - This 1.79 acre park is located between N.W. Ebberts and Dennis and was acquired by the City in 1964. In 1981-82, a number of renovations and improvements were made to the park with the assistance of a Community Development Block Grant. Currently, facilities include a basketball court, ballfield, playground equipment, restrooms, and walkways.

#### DEVELOPED PARK SITES - Continued

Shadywood Park - Located adjacent to Eastwood School on N.E. 24th Avenue, this 9.3 acre site offers unique recreation opportunities for the neighborhood. The park property was purchased in 1974 with the assistance of a Land & Water Conservation Fund grant. Park development began in 1975 with additional assistance from a number of state and federal grants. In recent years, site development has been done by volunteers and parks maintenance personnel. During fiscal year 1992-93, crews continued clearing, grading, and seeding additional areas in the park. Existing facilities include play equipment, picnic tables, pathways, restrooms, and off-street parking.

Shute Park - Acquired through donation in 1906, this 13 acre site is the City's oldest and best known park. In recent years, a number of improvements have been made to the park with the assistance of a Community Development Block Grant, donations, State Grants-in-Aid, and limited general fund dollars. The site contains several group picnic areas, a shelter, play equipment, walkways, and a performance platform/stage. In addition to the recreational facilities, the park contains the library, the park maintenance building, and the new Community/Senior Center.

Turner Creek Park - This 12.5 acre parcel was purchased in 1988 and is located northeast of Henry School and south of Maple Street. Using funds from the Parks Systems Development Fund, the City began major site development in 1990. Subsequent development has been done by volunteers and parks maintenance personnel. During fiscal year 1992-93 the City received a Metro Greenspaces grant to restore the woodland area in the southwestern corner of the park. With the assistance of a number of different community groups, work began on drainage and trail improvements. The entire project will be completed in fiscal year 1993-94. Facilities include two tennis courts, two youth softball fields, a youth soccer field, paved parking, asphalt pathways, and an enhanced floodplain area consisting of ponds, islands and native plantings.

U. J. Hamby Park - In 1986, Ulin J. Hamby donated approximately 2 acres of property on N.E. Jackson School Road to the City for park purposes. In 1989, the City expanded the park site through the purchase of 4.67 acres of adjacent property. The City began major site development in 1990 using dollars from the Parks Systems Development Fund. Development of the major components of the park occurred in fiscal year 1991-92 with the assistance of a Land and Water Conservation Fund grant. Volunteers and parks maintenance staff have also contributed greatly to the improvement of this park through the construction of footbridges and the installation of landscaping and site furniture. Facilities include a basketball court, picnic shelter, play equipment, pathways, and a natural wooded area.

#### UNDEVELOPED PARK SITES

Noble Woods Park - In 1992, the City acquired a 36.7 acre parcel of forested land at 231st and Baseline Road. The site is one of Hillsboro's oldest and largest remaining forested areas and is located near the geographic center of City. The acquisition of this property was made possible with the generous assistance of the Greater Hillsboro Area Foundation. With an extensive community Foundation fundraising effort, the was able to contribute \$100,000.00 towards the initial downpayment and commit to 50% participation in the overall acquisition cost. As the fiscal year ended the department was in the process of selecting a citizen's committee to assist in the development of a Concept Master Plan for the park.

Rock Creek Properties - In 1988 the Department of Parks and Recreation assumed jurisdiction and maintenance responsibilities for the old Rock Creek Sewerage Treatment Plant site. Later in that same year, the City acquired 13.76 acres of floodplain property to the north and adjacent to the site. In March of 1991, the City acquired a 34.26 acre parcel south of the sewerage treatment plant site. This parcel has provided frontage on the Tualatin River. These properties combined provide 61 acres of parkland with over a frontage on Rock Creek mile of and the Tualatin Approximately 43 acres lie within the floodplain leaving 18 acres of "developable" property. It is anticipated that the site will be developed as a neighborhood park with floodplain areas retained in a natural condition.

Walnut Street Park - In 1991, the City received a Community Development Block Grant for the acquisition and development of a neighborhood park in the Henry School neighborhood. Acquisition of 2.5 acres of property at S.E. 18th and Walnut Streets was completed in fy 1991-92. Conditional Use approval for development of the site as a neighborhood park was received in September and at the close of the fiscal year, the department had solicited bids for grading of the property. It is anticipated that park will be open for public use in the spring of 1994.

#### FLOODPLAIN SITES

Brookwood Property - This 3.35 acre parcel was donated to the City in 1989. The site is adjacent to Brookwood Avenue at the point where it crosses Rock Creek. The entire site lies within the 100 year floodplain.

Dairy Creek Properties - In 1988, the City received a donation of approximately 15 acres of floodplain property on Dairy Creek. Subsequently, through donation and purchase, additional parcels have been added and the park now provides 18 acres of natural area with over 2,000 feet of continuous frontage on Dairy Creek.

#### FLOODPLAIN SITES - Continued

Enschede Estates Properties - Two contiguous parcels comprising 21.46 acres were donated in 1987. Located south of Enschede Estates planned unit development, the properties will be retained as natural areas in conjunction with the development of the Jackson Bottom area as a wildlife refuge.

Glencoe Swale Open Space Tracts - In August of 1992, the City received through dedication, the 1.97 acre open space tract of the Sundown Creek Planned Unit Development. The parcel is located south of Glencoe High School and consists of wetland areas and a portion of a pond. Subsequently, in April of 1993, the City acquired a contiguous parcel of approximately .5 acres from Washington County. This parcel was available as surplus property from the County and the City paid only the direct costs associated with the transfer. Both of the parcels are part of a larger natural area known as the Glencoe Swale. As the fiscal year ended, the City continued in its efforts to preserve, through the development process, the natural areas along the swale.

HILLWOOD TRACT OPEN SPACES - In 1977 the City received through dedication a 1.74 acre of open space tract in the Hillwood Subdivision. Subsequently in 1979, an additional 1.44 acre tract was dedicated as part of the third phase of the subdivision's development. These tracts are preserved as open space and receive little maintenance.

### **BUILDINGS AND MAINTENANCE AREAS**

Aquatic Center - The Aquatic Center was funded by a bond issue in 1979 and dedicated in 1981. It includes an indoor pool, wading pool, hydrotherapy spa, sauna, racquetball courts, and exercise room. Located across from Shute Park on S.E. 10th and Maple, the facility operates year round accommodating a wide variety of user groups.

Outdoor Pool - The outdoor pool was constructed in 1952 and is open to the public from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Located next to the Aquatic Center, the pool provides increased capacity for summer lessons and recreational swimming.

Community/Senior Center - Funded by a Community Development Block Grant and Parks Systems Development Funds, this new facility was dedicated in October 1990. The Center provides meeting rooms, a kitchen, and offices, and is used by senior citizen groups during the day and a variety of community groups on evenings and weekends. Located on the west side of Shute Park at SE 8th and Maple, users of the facility have convenient access to a variety of recreational facilities.

#### BUILDINGS AND MAINTENANCE AREAS - Continued

Parks and Recreation Offices - This facility, formerly the bathhouse for the outdoor pool, is located at the corner of SE 9th and Cedar. It was remodeled in 1988 and now provides offices and conference/classroom facilities for the Department of Parks and Recreation. The renovation was accomplished with general fund dollars.

Traffic Islands and Parking Lots - The Department of Parks and Recreation maintains the traffic islands at 10th and Oak and 10th and Main as well as the landscaped areas of City parking areas. Maintenance in the parking areas is funded with off street parking funds and consists of irrigation system maintenance, weeding and plant care. Traffic islands on 10th Avenue were reconstructed in 1990 as part of the 10th Avenue improvement project and as the fiscal year ended, planning had begun for new landscaping and irrigation.

Harold Eastman Memorial Rose Garden - For many years, the Tualatin Valley Rose Society planted and maintained roses at the traffic island at N.E. 5th & Grant. In 1988, the Society expressed an interest in doing additional work to beautify the site. A site master plan was developed and with the help of Mr. Harold Eastman of the Rose Society and volunteers, the effort of implementing the plan began. The City committed some Street Fund dollars and commitments for volunteer labor and contributions were solicited. Shortly after renovation work began, Mr. Eastman died. To commemorate Harold Eastman's efforts on this project and his many years of community service, a number of citizens and service organizations joined together to provide the materials and labor necessary to complete the project. The garden has become a focal point of civic pride and is maintained by parks maintenance personnel and members of the Tualatin Valley Rose Society.

**Pioneer Cemetery** - The Department of Parks and Recreation maintains the 7.79 acre Pioneer Cemetery located on the western edge of the City north of Tualatin Valley Highway. Maintenance of the site includes mowing, weed control, fertilization, pruning, and headstone care. The Cemetery Endowment Fund partially funds the annual maintenance of this site.






