Tips to Stop a Barking Dog

- Find out why your dog barks, then treat the problem.
- Train your dog using the water method:

Have a plant mister filled with water.

When your dog barks, say "Quiet (name)!" Squirt some water in the dog's face when it is barking.

If it moves away, repeat saying quiet and give one more squirt.

Pet and praise your dog when it is quiet. Soon, your dog will stop barking when you say





- Don't leave your dog outside alone for a long time.
- Keep your dog indoors at night and times of high neighborhood activity.
- Create a visual block such as a fence or hedge.
- Consider obedience school.

Mediation Services

Are you caught in a conflict with your neighbor? Have you been meaning to talk to your neighbor about a problem, but not known how to go about it without making the problem worse? Give neighborhood mediation a try.

Mediation is a free, confidential service available to help you resolve those sticky situations that can arise between neighbors. Mediators are trained in conflict resolution and do not take sides in resolving issues. They help you and your neighbor sort through your differences to find mutually agreeable solutions.

What's a Regional Center?

The Historic Milwaukie neighborhood, which includes downtown, is a large part of Milwaukie's Regional Center. "Regional Center" is a term used to define the part of Milwaukie which will be the focus of new housing, commercial and retail activity. The boundaries also include portions of Ardenwald, Island Station, Lake Road and Hector Campbell neighborhoods.

The city is beginning to plan how the regional center will look and function. The Regional Center Steering Committee is overseeing the project. The committee includes members of the City Council and Planning Commission, as well as people from the Milwaukie Downtown Development Association, the Park and Recreation, and Traffic Safety & Transportation boards.

Additional opportunities for citizen input will be provided through three advisory groups dealing with commercial, transportation, and housing issues. Neighborhoods will be asked for representatives to be on these committees.

The public is invited to attend Steering Committee meetings, 6 pm, the third Monday of every month at the Public Safety Building. Call Jane Leeson, Public Involvement Coordinator, at 786-7658.
