

Milwaukie's Regional Center Planning Underway



Milwaukie is continuing plans to revitalize our downtown and surrounding areas through the "Regional Center Master Plan." Last fall we began the detailed work to define how our award-winning Community Vision will guide efforts to manage growth, enhance economic vitality, and protect neighborhood livability in the Regional Center. Zoning changes to allow denser and different types of residential developments, mixeduse commercial/residential developments, and neighborhood commercial activities are future possibilities.

The Regional Center Master Plan process involves three citizen Working Groups (Commercial, Transportation, Housing), technical advisors, and a Steering Committee. These folks will recommend a plan to the Planning Commission for ultimate adoption by the City Council. Public participation in formulating this plan is more than important — it is fundamental! Riverfront Plan: Surveys Returned

The city has received over 400 responses to the riverfront survey included in the November flier mailed to every household and business in Milwaukie. Urban Services Who Should Provide Them?

Think ahead twenty years. What type of government agencies will provide the most efficient and effective services? Where should existing cities expand within Clackamas County? Should new cities be established? These are the questions being examined in the Clackamas County Urban Services Agreement Project.

State law requires that cities, counties and special districts develop "urban services agreements," for all land inside the urban growth boundary. Urban services are defined as fire, parks and recreation, planning, roads, sanitary sewer, surface water management and water.

Nineteen local governments, including Milwaukie, are participating in the Clackamas County project area. They are developing options to answer the question, "Who will provide urban services in the future?" Representatives from the participating governments have been reviewing economic, technical, and policy-related data. They will soon be forwarding their recommendations for public comment and review.

A meeting to review the preliminary recommendations will be held from 7 - 9 pm, Thursday, January 23, at the Public Safety Building, 3200 SE Harrison. For more information, or to be added to the project mailing list, please call 786-7545.

Storm Water Management: Project Gets Underway

Two new projects to reduce flooding in localized areas will begin in February. Both are funded by storm utility rate-payers and represent a continuing investment in the City's physical infrastructure. The first project will add 800 feet of pipe and catch basins to Monroe Street between SE 40th and SE 37th Avenues. It will collect street water and prevent it from flooding yards, damaging sidewalks, curbs and retaining walls. It should reduce the likelihood of ice on this steep street during cold winter weather.

A second project will replace pipe on Washington Street east of 32nd Avenue.

Additionally, it will replace and extend the line on 33rd, 34th, and 35th Avenues south of Washington. The effort will significantly reduce flooding of yards, garages and sidewalks.

Construction normally starts from the downhill end and works uphill. Both projects will be completed by May. Details will be explained in a flier which will be distributed to affected residents and homeowners. Christmas Tree Recycling

Don't forget: you can put your Christmas tree at the curb for recycling in place of your regular yard debris, for no extra charge.

First, please remember to:

- remove all tinsel, lights, wires and decorations
- cut the tree in half if it's over 5 feet tall



Sorry, if you flocked your tree, we can't take it. The flocking chemicals make the tree non-recyclable.
