



# City Continues Water Delivery System Upgrade

our Milwaukie water supply is safe. The packed tower aeration system is removing trichloroethylene (TCE) from the ground water. City water system improvements are now focused on the pipes needed to deliver the water to your home or business.

A Public Facilities Plan was completed in 1988. Since that time, about one third of the recommended delivery system improvements have been made. Current plans are to replace all 2-inch supply lines throughout the City by 1995.

These 2-inch pipes are replaced with 4- or 6-inch pipes. The larger pipes provide improved water taste and odor and better fire flows. The existing pipes are galvanized. The new lines will be either plastic or ductile iron depending on contractor's bid prices.

The projects are on schedule. The cost of the projects is included in the water rate. System users can be assured that their water system is being managed with the future in mind.



#### New Mutual Fund Guide

The Ledding Library now subscribes to the Morningstar Mutual Fund Guide. With this guide, we now have current detailed information on over 1000 mutual funds. The guide gives a comprehensive, ten-year history on every fund. Then, performance is compared with:

- Standard and Poors 500 returns;
- all other mutual funds; and
- all other mutual funds with the same investment objective.

The analysts that work for Morningstar regularly interview fund managers and write analyses of the fund's most recent activity and evaluate each fund's performance and risk levels.

For each mutual fund, Morningstar tells how many stocks the portfolio contains; the price earnings rates; the price-to-book ratio; the earnings growth rate and the 30 largest holdings.

The operations section tells who the current portfolio manager is and how long she/he has been with the fund. Plus, all loads, management and performance fees, 12b-1 and redemption fees as well as address and toll-free phone numbers are listed.

Please come to the library and use this valuable new reference source. The Ledding library is open Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 12-8, Fridays and Saturdays from 12-5:30 and Sundays from 1-5.

## VOTE — on Urban Design

Ilwaukie and other cities and counties in the metropolitan region, along with Tri-Met and Metro, will host workshops throughout the area between January 15 and February 18. These sessions will explore what residents like and dislike about development.

Using a Visual Preference Survey\*, consisting of a series of slides, participants rate different types of development patterns. This democratic process engages participants in ranking the types of designs that are most pleasing to them. Their communities can draw upon the Survey conclusions for new development projects.

The results of the workshops will be presented at a citizen summit on March 6, 1993.

This is a unique chance for Milwaukie residents to explore what types of designs "work" from a visual sense, and to vote on those choices. Two of the workshops are scheduled at the Milwaukie Center: January 25, 1993, and February 10, 1993. Both start at 7:00 p.m. and last about an hour and a half.

## A Family Safety Program

any local kindergarten through elementary school children will be participating in Firebusters, a unique family fire and life safety training program, scheduled Monday through Friday, February 1 - 5.

Co-sponsored by the Oregon Fire Education Association and your fire department, Firebusters will cover more than fire safety this year. It will also include earthquake preparedness and drowning prevention life safety topics.

The annual program includes a Firebusters work sheet which children can complete and return as an entry in a statewide drawing for prizes. Answers to the Firebusters questions on the work sheet can be obtained by watching special Firebusters reports on Channel 2 News at 5:00 p.m., February 1 - 5.

The statewide drawing for prizes will be March 15. Prizes include a trip to Disneyland for a family of four, two color televisions with VCR's, four mountain bikes, and four Nintendo Game Boys.

In addition, many local schools will give away Firebusters sweatshirts and T-shirts as prizes. Local schools also may enter an area-wide drawing for free lunches at Skipper's for two classes. Classes with the highest percentage of returned Firebusters work sheets in their schools are eligible.

## **Police Patrol Saturation**

A ll police agencies in Clackamas County, including the Milwaukie Police Department, recently concluded a "saturation patrol" enforcement program aimed at detecting "Under the Influence" drivers during the holiday season.

Sponsored by the Clackamas County Criminal Justice Council, the campaign featured a color poster of fourteen criminal justice agency badges with the slogan, "Fourteen places where the bars are open all night." The District Attorney, Parole and Probation Department, Clackamas Community College Public Safety Department, and Oregon Liquor Control Commission enforcement division participated in addition to the county's ten police services.

The program was based on a Santa Clara County, California, project at the suggestion of Milwaukie Police Chief Charles Mansfield. Safeco Insurance Company was a major financial contributor to the poster phase of the project.
