Vision Statement Heads to City Council for Formal Adoption

After over a year and a half of public involvement activities, Milwaukie's final Vision Statement is near completion. The Vision illustrates the concepts and ideas to guide Milwaukie's future growth. The five primary areas it addresses include:

Expanded City Center Neighborhoods Accessible Community Riverfront Greenspace Network

Formal adoption of the Vision Statement has been tentatively scheduled for the June 20th City Council Meeting, 7 p.m. at City Hall. The citizen Vision Project Policy Committee will also present it's Action Plans. These outline the goals, actions, roles and responsibilities to accomplish the Vision.

Citizen's Transportation Priorities Highlighted

The Transportation System Plan citizen groups have completed their second report to the community, "The Modes Prioritization Report." This study highlights citizens' ideas about the most important transportation system improvements for Milwaukie. Highlights include:

Priorities for Improvements to Roads

- Make improvements for pedestrians (e.g., sidewalks).
- Improve streets and intersections with high accident rates.
- Calm traffic in neighborhoods
- Bring inadequate street widths up to City standards.

Priorities for Improvements to Walking and Bikepaths

- Complete sidewalk and bike lane networks.
- Make sidewalk and bikeway improvements in areas with high accident rates.

- Highway 22482nd Avenue
- 82nd Avenue
 Johnson Creek Boulevard
- (45th to I-205)
- Interstate-205

- McLoughlin Boulevard
- Stanley Avenue
- Linwood Avenue
- 37th Avenue

East/West

- Monroe Street
- Railroad Avenue
- Lake Avenue
- Olsen Street
- Logus Road
- Springwater Trail

June 23 - 25 is the 24th Annual Milwaukie Festival Daze celebration in Downtown. Festivities start Friday with food booths, a carnival and beer garden. On Saturday, the 10 am parade kicks off the day, followed by horsedrawn wagon rides, group performances and music. It's all cappedoff with a street dance in front of Libbey's restaurant on Main Street.

This year, a highlight of Milwaukie Daze will be an "All-American Fire Muster." Musters are competitions between fire brigades which began as training in the early days of fire-fighting, when fire fighters were all volunteer. Modern day fire musters build on this tradition and include activities such has "Hand-Drawn Horse Cart", "Bucket Brigades" and the ever-popular, "Co-ed Reverse Lay Motorized Pumper event." Milwaukie's Fire Muster is the only one

held as a co-sanctioned event of the Firemans' Muster Associations of Oregon and Washington.

The 50th Anniversary of the end of WWII is also being celebrated. In honor and recognition of the many who served, several special activities are planned. On Saturday, June 24, modern as well as vintage WWII vehicles will be on display. The Milwaukie Elks in conjunction with the 41st Division Association, (Portland Chapter) are sponsoring the military events. President of the 41st Division and Milwaukie resident, Jean Kunz, is the grand marshal of this year's parade. Mr. Kunz served in the 218th Field Artillery Division

On Track with South/North **Transit** MILWAUKIE HIGH CAPACITY TRANSIT

After active citizen input regarding potential light rail alignments, Metro

recently presented the pros and cons of nine different alignments through Milwaukie. These options show the possible routes coming into Milwaukie and heading east toward the terminus at Clackamas Town Center.

Metro, the lead agency for light rail planning, is currently evaluating how the options compare to study criteria. This data will be presented to the community in May and June when a narrowing of the nine options will begin.

At that time, Metro will hold open houses to present the information. Metro has committed to working closely with the City of Milwaukie to ensure the public will have access to alignment information as soon as it is available.
