

# Milwaukie's Regional Center Planning Underway

Milwaukie is continuing plans to revitalize our downtown and surrounding areas through the "Regional Center Master Planning Process." We have just begun the detailed work to define how our award-winning Community Vision will guide efforts to accommodate growth, enhance economic vitality and neighborhood livability in the regional center. Zoning changes to allow denser residential developments, mixed-use commercial/residential developments, and neighborhood commercial zones are future possibilities.

The Regional Center Master Planning Process involves groups working (Commercial, three citizen Transportation, Housing), technical advisors, and a steering committee. These folks will recommend a plan to the Planning Commission for ultimate adoption by the City Council. Public participation in formulating this plan is more than important — it is fundamental! # City Conserva Project Undérway

Milwaukie has a new conservation specialist working on ways to reduce use of water, energy and other resources. Nancy Bond was hired to help the city identify conservation measures to reduce operating costs and enhance our environment. One of her first efforts was to conduct a resource audit of the Ledding Library, which will be undergoing a major renovation in upcoming months. She identified several opportunities to save water and energy, and to incorporate the use of recycled materials into the remodeling project. All of her ideas will be reviewed by a committee overseeing the renovation. They will prioritize the options based on practicality, cost-effectiveness and aesthetics. The best ideas, according to these criteria, will be implemented as the program progresses.

Nancy has begun evaluating the efficiency of other city-owned buildings as well as some local businesses. Her work will identify money-saving energy, water and solid waste conservation opportunities. # Storm Drain Utility: Where does my \$4 a month go?

The most frequently asked question at the City of Milwaukie has to be "What is this storm utility charge and what is it paying for?" Read on for more information about this city service.

The goal of Milwaukie's storm water utility is to reduce flooding and ensure water quality in the City's creeks, streams, and lakes. Maintaining the existing system and constructing new facilities are the utility's two main functions. Maintenance includes cleaning pipes, storm drains, drywells, ditches and other parts of the system. This decreases pollution and debris which may harm groundwater or waterways. Construction of pipes, catch-basins, drywells and detention ponds improves the quality of surface water runoff.

Utility staff are working with surrounding jurisdictions to develop a Surface Water Master Plan which will result in improved drainage and water quality. Past projects, funded by rate payers, are listed below by neighborhood.

#### Ardenwald

detention pond maintenance, catchbasin and pipeline cleaning.

Hector Campbell drywell construction, catch-basin installation and maintenance.

Historic Milwaukie catch-basin cleaning and stenciling.

#### **Island Station**

construction of a major pipeline and several catch-basins. re-landscaped with native plants.

Lake Road pipe and catch-basin cleaning.

Lewelling catch-basin and major pipeline construction; detention pond maintenance.

Linwood catch-basin cleaning, and drywell installation.

Printed on recycled paper using soybean based inks

McLoughlin Industrial mapping, catch-basin cleaning and repair.

Milwaukie Business/Industrial pipeline, catch-basin cleaning, and ditch maintenance.

In addition to ongoing maintenance, the following major improvements have been completed:

- Installed new storm lines on Campbell St., Mason Ln., and 21st & Wren.
- Installed drywells on 48th Ct., Jackson St., Park & Home Ave. and 60th Ave.
- Cleaned ditches on Mallard Way and Oak St.
- Installed new catch-basins and replaced those that were defective.

## New Light Rail Alignment Recommended for Study

It is being recommended that a new alignment for light rail through downtown be added to the Draft Environmental Impact Study (DEIS) currently underway. A preliminary assessment of the Main Street/SP Branch Line indicates the new alternative could prove promising relative to costs, benefits and environmental impacts. The City and Metro began seeking public input in October. The South/North Steering Committee makes

the decision about whether to include the proposal in the DEIS process.
