



Citizens to be asked about bond priorities

Milwaukie residents will be surveyed this fall to hear their opinions on the City of Milwaukie's long-term funding priorities.

Information gained from the survey will help City Council decide what projects might be included in a bond measure for the May 2013 ballot.

A telephone survey will contact 300 registered voters to seek their views on possible funding measures to support some of the City's priority projects:

- Saving more than \$700,000 by paying off the City's obligation for a portion of light rail construction costs, taking advantage of today's low interest rates.
- Completing Milwaukie Riverfront Park
- Constructing new Neighborhood parks
- Expanding Ledding Library

The 10-minute survey will be conducted by DHM Research, Oregon-based public opinion research experts. The firm has prior experience with surveys in the Milwaukie area.

TSP changes ready for public review

The latest draft of the proposed updates to the Transportation System Plan (TSP), the document that prioritizes the City's road, bike, and pedestrian projects, is now available for public review.

The document can be accessed from the City's website under the Planning Department page. Hard copies of the draft are available for review at City Hall, Ledding Library, and the Johnson Creek Boulevard office.

A public meeting reviewing the latest draft will be held on Thurs., Sept. 5th, at Milwaukie Presbyterian Church (2416 SE Lake Rd). An Open House will be held 5 to 6 p.m., and a presentation and group discussion will take place from 6-8 p.m. The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on Sept. 10th, and Sept. 24th, if necessary.

Growing Community

Lindsay Scheu spent her first time volunteering at the Garden picking tomatoes for the food bank



In the March 2012 *Pilot* we visited with Tony Ionetta - a guy with a vision of creating a community garden that grew relationships as much as it did food for Milwaukie families that are in need.

He said it was going to happen - that it was just a matter of time. He was right.

In just its second season the Good Roots Community Garden has already produced more than 4,000 pounds of food for the food bank that's on-site, and that doesn't even count the produce volunteers have taken home.

Tony said that in the first year seven volunteers fueled the garden. This year's it's around 50 people of varying financial and gardening backgrounds.

"Half the volunteers are food bank clients or former clients," Tony said. "The motto is give what you can, take what you need."

It's not uncommon for people to drop by the garden located at 1908 SE Courtney to donate some food and spend time picking produce. For Tony, that's the real value of the garden - having people come together and building community.

"This is just a vehicle to integrate people," Tony said. "They come here and see life growing, have conversations. We didn't expect great numbers this early, but we got great numbers."

It has been a long, warm summer in Milwaukie enjoyed by students and parents alike. Despite the challenges of navigating Light Rail construction closures, many of our citizens have made it to the Library to participate in Summer Reading programs, adult classes and weekly lunch-time concerts in adjacent Scott Park.

Last month alone, 64,491 items were checked out from Milwaukie's Ledding Library. 22,439 library patrons visited in July. That is more than the total population of Milwaukie walking through the doors of our library ... every month. 1,697 children and 507 teens also signed up for the Summer Reading program. More than 450 books were read by our members in the Adult Summer Reading Program. In addition, there were 2,634 computer sessions logged last month.

The Wednesday concerts in Scott Park have allowed over 600 people to enjoy the variety of music while enjoying food provided by Jill Younce of Painted Lady Coffee House.

All told, there were 59 different programs offered by the library in July this year, all managed by the Library staff and 923 hours of volunteer time. In all of the Clackamas County System of libraries, Milwaukie is second only in patrons served to the Lake Oswego branch. It is very clear how important the Ledding Library is to our community.

A recent study paid for by the Library Foundation donor funds, supports a finding that the Library is in need of more room at its present location. We are not meeting the Oregon Library Association size standards given the amount of space we use to house the collection and provide programs. This study by the Architectural firm FFA has found that there is a way to expand the Library on the existing site and bring the library into conformance with the Oregon Library Association standards. Look for that report and renderings of potential expansion at the City of Milwaukie website.

Milwaukie clearly loves Ledding Library ... and the Library loves to serve the thousands of people who pass through the doors, seeking to read and learn more with each visit.

Pair of popular Library programs resume in Sept.

Hundreds of people pack the Library Pond House to enjoy the Milwaukie Poetry Series and the Ledding Cultural Forum and both kick off their 2013-2014 seasons in September.

The Poetry Series kicks off on Sept. 11th, at 7 p.m. with Ralph Salisbury, Professor Emeritus of the University of Oregon, author of 11 books of poetry, three books of short fiction, and a just-published, prize-winning memoir.

Molly Gloss, author of "The Hearts of Horses," begins the Cultural Forum on Sept. 5th, at 7 p.m. Gloss is a winner of the Oregon Book Award, a Pacific Northwest Booksellers Award, the PEN West Fiction Prize, the James Tiptree Jr. Award, and a Whiting Writers Award.

Grants aim for 'lingering'

Milwaukie is accepting grant applications from residents, businesses, social and spiritual organizations within City limits that will bring visitors to the community and get them to "linger longer" to shop, eat and recreate.

The program is a part of the Clackamas County Community Partnership Program and is funded through the County's transient lodging tax dollars. Last year's awards supported a short-film fest, the Davis Graveyard Halloween display, and more. The application can be found on the City's homepage.

Building Milwaukie

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

In late August Milwaukie's Planning Department sent letters to Downtown Milwaukie property owners that presented the following proposal: if the property owner is willing to commit to building a project in Downtown within the next five years the City will provide a team of consultants that will create a complete redevelopment concept for the site that includes City Council review and public buy-in so that a successful, profitable project will result.

The aim of this public/private partnership is to spur redevelopment and help the City develop the strategies and tactics it needs to incentivize the kind of pioneering redevelopment it envisions.

To be considered, Downtown partners are asked to submit an application that briefly outlines previous redevelopment efforts, an explanation of how the property could contribute to a growing Downtown, and an assessment of how strong the commitment is to redevelop the property within the next five years.

The effort is a component of the second phase of the *Moving Forward Milwaukie: Enhancing Our Commercial Districts*, an initiative to bring new economic opportunity to Milwaukie's commercial zones. A public kickoff meeting for Phase II is scheduled for Oct. 3rd. More details to follow.

The project will identify new economic development tools, zoning or code changes, and public investments to help build healthy and thriving commercial districts.

In the first Phase, the *Fresh Look Milwaukie: Downtown Road Map* phase, the community established a vision for Milwaukie's commercial nodes.

Future phases will address several specific issues that have been identified by the community, including: a major "refresh" of the existing downtown zoning code and Framework Plan, funding the desired streetscape improvements, higher standards for new commercial/office development throughout the City, addressing existing, underutilized commercial areas that have potential to serve the neighborhoods.

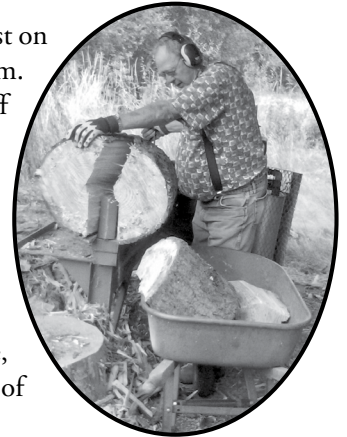

The City Hall Sculpture Garden will be full of people this September - people themed sculptures, that is. The Milwaukie Arts Committee (artMOB) selected the theme of "People" to bring a more human element to the garden.

"Dual," by Francisco Salgado, (*right*) is a large red figure consisting of two parts - male/female creating one form. "Let's Dance," will be fabricated by Jen Ellsworth for the garden. Made from recycled tanks, the curves of the tanks suggest the motion of a dancing figure. "Atomica Familia," also by Salgado, is inspired by the notion that the nucleus of society is the family.

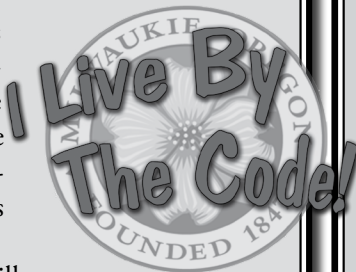

The Chief's Corner

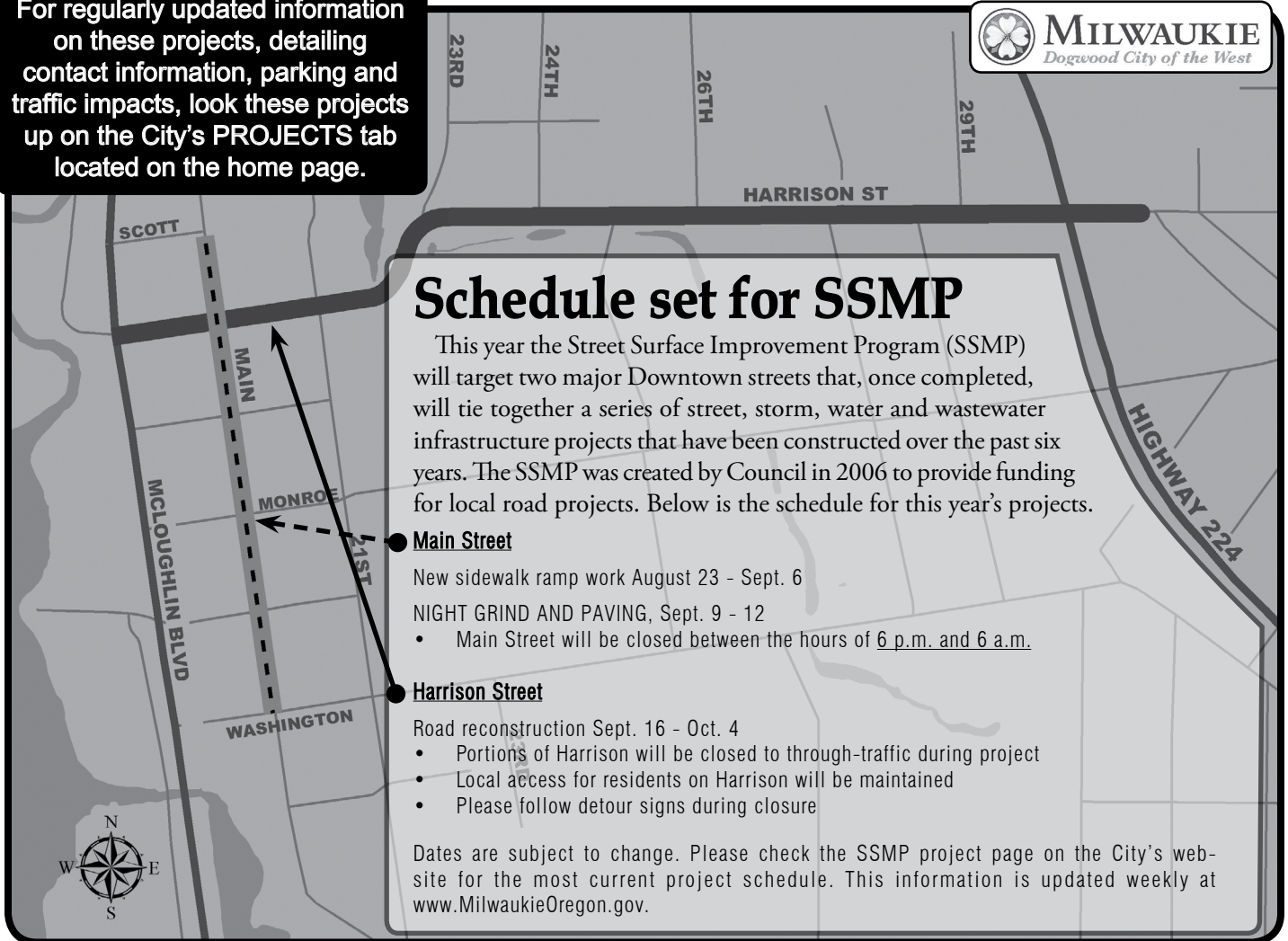

September is Back-To-School month. Parents, teachers and children may disagree on whether this is a reason to celebrate or not, but for sure, our children will be out of the house earlier, walking or riding a bike to school or waiting for a school bus.

Drivers should be especially cautious at this time of year, as there will be more pedestrians and bicyclists out there at the same time, most noticeably in the morning.

I will be asking our Traffic Unit to be a little more visible near the schools at school opening and closing times, so drive a little slower in the morning, especially on your Neighborhood streets and near schools.

Schedule set for SSMP

This year the Street Surface Improvement Program (SSMP) will target two major Downtown streets that, once completed, will tie together a series of street, storm, water and wastewater infrastructure projects that have been constructed over the past six years. The SSMP was created by Council in 2006 to provide funding for local road projects. Below is the schedule for this year's projects.

- **Main Street**
 - New sidewalk ramp work August 23 - Sept. 6
 - NIGHT GRIND AND PAVING, Sept. 9 - 12
 - Main Street will be closed between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- **Harrison Street**
 - Road reconstruction Sept. 16 - Oct. 4
 - Portions of Harrison will be closed to through-traffic during project
 - Local access for residents on Harrison will be maintained
 - Please follow detour signs during closure

Downtown infrastructure projects wrap up

A pair of projects protecting infrastructure underneath the ground will wrap up in September - the Wastewater Clay Pipe Replacement Program and Phase II of the Harrison Street Water System Improvements.

The City has 21,218 feet of Vitrified Clay Pipe (VCP) in active service that is more than 80 years old, is susceptible to chemical attack at its joints, is brittle, and due to its short lengths and numerous joints, are more prone to infiltration and leakage. This summer the program replaced more than 2,000 feet of VCP on Downtown streets scheduled to be paved by the Street Surface Maintenance Program (SSMP).

Phase II of the Harrison Water System project replaced old cast iron pipe with joints made of lead with new pipe made of ductile iron and rubber gasket joints. Additionally, the project replaced old service lines that were leaking with new service pipe to adjacent properties, replaced fire hydrants, and installed a considerable number of new valves that will improve City crew's ability to localize shut off areas.

QZ work creates closure

Construction on the final Union Pacific Railroad intersection that will allow the City to put its Quiet Zone into place will require closing a small section of Railroad Avenue north of Adams Street for three to five days late in September. (*See cross-hatched area below.*)

Improvements include median installation, improved signage, and a realignment of Railroad Avenue.



Each Neighborhood Association has a Land Use Chair monitoring applications the City receives. To help track the process, these are upcoming Land Use/Development Review hearings, and Planning

Commission (PC) Agenda items. Dates are subject to change. Check the City's website for details.
