And the survey says ...

A majority of Milwaukie residents polled in early June feel like the City is heading in the right direction, enjoy Milwaukie's small-town feel and proximity to Portland and were exactly split as to whether or not they would support a bond measure that would preserve the City's core services.

The public opinion research firm, DHM Research, provided City Council with the results of

the poll at its June 18th Regular Session meeting. Three hundred Milwaukie voters randomly selected participated in the poll over a four-day period.

The results also provided Council a sense of the projects and services residents value most, and how satisfied they were with those services.

Council considers Library's future

Compiling information from staff interviews, a pair of public meetings and almost 300 survey responses, the consultant funded by private donations, FFA, will provide City Council a report outlining the findings of its needs assessment at its July 2nd, Regular Session meeting, held at 5:30 p.m. in City Hall.

FAA will also share several basic renderings illustrating that an on-site expansion is an option to meet current and future service needs.

Ledding Library is more than 20,000 square feet smaller than the national standard for a service area of Milwaukie's size, and the study is looking at ways the library can expand to serve its population and its

A prolific artist, having completed his 10,000th

Building Milwaukie

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

Milwaukie Riverfront Park

Two grant applications were submitted in April 2013 by the City to assist with development of Riverfront Park. One for redevelopment of the boat ramp, associated parking, McLoughlin access improvements and a small restroom. The second grant is for construction of a trail, relocation of some overhead utility wires, and some initial site work. The grant requests were for \$1.2 million and \$221,000, respectively. Grant award announcements are expected to be made in July 2013.

17th Avenue Bike Pedestrian Path

This project will result in the design and construction of a bike-pedestrian path on 17^{th} Avenue, similar to that of the Springwater Corridor Trail, from Milwaukie Riverfront Park north along 17^{th} Avenue to Ochoco Street, where it will intersect with the Springwater Trail Corridor in the future. Staff is currently working with Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) to select a design firm that will manage the project for ODOT and the City. Completion of this project is expected by late summer, 2015.

Milwaukie's Transportation System (TSP) Update

Twenty-seven citizens, with representation from the City's seven neighborhoods, discussed the City's transportation priorities at a public meeting on June 3rd. At the very top were Neighborhood Greenways on Monroe Street and Stanley Avenue, improvements to Railroad Avenue, and Kellogg Dam removal with a new pedestrian undercrossing. A report summarizing the results of the meeting will be available in early July for public review prior to the start of its adoption process this fall.



City Hall garden blooms

To signal its support of community gardens and emergency preparedness, City employees teamed with members of Milwaukie Community Gardens in building the City Hall Garden.

A group of about a half dozen built the raised bed with materials donated from Milwaukie Lumber outside City Hall the first weekend in June and was planted with herbs and vegetable starts donated by Kim Olson, a prolific gardener who always helps with the Friends of the Ledding Library Plant Sale.

Resident starts a revolution

In 1889 William Simon U'Ren, a Wisconsin-born lawyer, settled in Milwaukie. U'Ren became sick and without any family, the kindly local growers, the Lewelling's, cared for him. The reformminded Lewelling's handed William Simon U'Ren a book entitled *Direct Legislation*, a study of Swiss political reform.

Mr. U'Ren found his life's calling - create legislative tools for the people to govern themselves - create tools for democracy! U'Ren created the "Oregon System" or I&R: The initiative, referendum, and recall. The Populist Party adopted the principles and Mr. U'Ren started a revolution, where citizens had a voice in creating, amending, and abolishing laws and politicians by popular vote.

Among the laws passed by I&R: the popular vote of State Senators which lead to the 17th Amendment; establishment of the first presidential primary election system, empowering voters to recall elected officials, making voting records public information, and giving women the right to vote.

Police donate bikes to local kids

Sixty Milwaukie school children from five City schools received refurbished bicycles last May as part of the Milwaukie Police Department's Bike Giveaway program.

Officer Billy Wells (from left), Chief Bob Jordan, and Cadet Ken Simac visited Ardenwald, Milwaukie, Linwood and Lewelling Elementarys, and Rowe Middle School, and presented students who had been selected by school staff with a bike.


The Chief's Corner

According to sources, about 200 people go to the emergency room every day with fireworks-related injuries in the month around the July $4^{\rm th}$ Holiday.

To avoid injuries caused by fireworks:

- · Never allow children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities. Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers.
- · Back up to a safe distance immediately after lighting fireworks.
- Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire and to douse spent devices before putting them into the trash.
- ullet Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly. Following these guidelines will help keep your $4^{
 m th}$ of July Holiday celebrations safe.



City's Downtown projects

Light Rail work creates road closures, detours

During the summer and fall of 2013, the Light Rail project will reconstruct several downtown crossings which will require road closures (illustrated above) and detours.

The work will result in new rail crossings that include some of the safety measures required for the Quiet Zone designation that will silence, unless in emergencies, freight train and light rail train horns as they pass through town.

The intersection work also includes new sidewalk, curb, pedestrian crossings, and underground utility work.

- SE Washington Street completed end of June
- SE Harrison Street closed July 8-15.
- SE 26th Avenue at McLoughlin Boulevard will be permanently closed beginning Aug. 1.
- **SE Monroe Street** will be closed Aug. 5-25.
- SE McLoughlin Boulevard will be closed between Washington Street and River Road Aug. 16-19 from 10 p.m. Friday through 5 a.m. Monday.
- **SE Adams Street** and 21st Avenue, Oct. 21- Nov. 3. Closure and detour maps posted at **www.trimet.org/pm**.
