It went away due to budget restraints, and also because we thought the printed Pilot wasn't read very much. However we have heard what you had to say both at Neighborhood Association meetings and comments to City Hall. So it is back with 10

printed editions each year as before, with thanks to the City Manager who has managed to save the money needed for The Pilot elsewhere in the budget.

Also welcome home to the Mayor. Hope you enjoyed your trip and refreshed your batteries. I can't tell you how many people asked me where you were!

Over the coming months we have some hard choices to make. The commitment a few years ago to fund the light rail project with \$5 million is now a burden to the City. Fortunately we managed to negotiate a payment deal with TriMet, but we have had to be very selective filling staff vacancies, and find other savings, to make the first two payments.

Over the next few weeks some of you may be contacted to complete a survey to help the City decide how it will fund the future TriMet payments. Please take the time to respond and give your opinions. It is important the Council understands how you want these payments made by raising new revenue, for example with a bond measure, or by continuing the cuts to services. As TriMet has clearly demonstrated with Clackamas County, they are prepared to resort to the courts to enforce agreements.

It is also important that if you opt to not raise new revenue and want services cut, you tell us which ones you are prepared to accept being cut. It is your City and we represent you. In order to do so you have to give us some guidance, and tell us what services you consider reasonable to cut, and which you don't.

The City's Planning Department is selecting consultants for the project's next phase - drafting downtown code and plan amendments for adoption in the spring of 2014.



# Help weigh transportation project priorities

The City Council is encouraging residents to review the projects listed in its Transportation System Plan (TSP) and recommend (1) what the City's top priorities for funding should be, (2) if any of the existing projects should be reprioritized, and (3) if there are projects that need further study or concept planning.

The TSP is the City's long-term plan for making transportation improvements. The TSP addresses multiple modes of travel:

- Pedestrian
- Bicycle
- Public Transit
- Freight
- Street Network

It also identifies issues related to Neighborhood Traffic Management and Downtown Parking. By identifying and prioritizing transportation needs, the TSP guides the City's investments for improving the transportation system.

A public meeting will be held on Mon., June 3<sup>rd</sup>, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., at Milwaukie Christian Church (5197 SE King Rd.) to discuss TSP priorities.

A worksheet is available on the TSP Update project website to guide those interested through this evaluation process.

library programs and special purchases.



750 dollars is the maximum fine for urinating in public

8 Feet clearance over the sidewalk for trees and shrubs

9.28.080 requires dogs to be on-leash when at a park (except in an off-leash area)

10 days is the amount of time typically given to remedy a violation

11 .04 is the chapter that handles special event permits

12 feet clearance over the street for trees and shrubs

#### Get the latest at the booth

Voted Best Farmer's Market in Portland last year, the Market is not only a great source of produce—it's Milwaukie's living room. It's the place where people meet up, visit with each other and get the low-down on the latest Milwaukie news.

This is why, in the spring of 2005, one of Milwaukie's dedicated neighborhood volunteers had a great idea. He suggested the City help put together a community information booth to be featured at the Market. It seemed like the perfect venue for getting the word out about important City issues as well as a great way to encourage participation in Milwaukie's neighborhoods. And so, in 2006, the City rolled out the Community Booth and has been featuring at the Market it ever since. It was this innovative approach to community engagement that earned Milwaukie the League of Oregon City's "Good Governance Award" in 2006—which was proudly accepted by our Milwaukie resident, Dave Aschenbrenner, the neighborhood volunteer who came up with the idea.

Milwaukie's Community Booth features information about city and regional projects—both planned and underway. Come by and visit the booth on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Sundays of the month.



## Council intent on learning community values

"What would you say the two biggest issues facing Milwaukie?" "Which City services are most important to you?" "How satisfied are you with these services?" are just several of the questions a professional polling firm will be asking Milwaukie residents in early June.

The Council decided to commission the poll in order to get a better sense of resident satisfaction with City services and to better understand which services are most valued and should therefore be protected should budget and service cuts be made.

The effort marks the first scientific survey that's been conducted in Milwaukie in well over a decade and will provide a strong depiction of how our community feels on a wide-range of issues.

The public opinion research firm, DHM Research, will present Council its findings at the June 18<sup>th</sup> Regular Session meeting, at 7 p.m., in City Hall.

#### You think roads are bad now?

Since the beginning Milwaukie's roads have been a work in progress.

The streets were hazardous with stumps of harvested trees and bumps of smaller trees yet to be harvested. The streets were drawn on the town map, but it was more of a thoroughfare for pigs, cows, dust in the dry season, and mud in the wet season.

Since many of the residents resisted spending money on street improvements, walking after sunset required a lantern to avoid a broken neck from walking in the dark on the

streets. Also, you had to avoid the hogs and cattle wallowing in the mud or rubbing their bodies against buildings.

One brave lady in the mid 1850's, Mrs. Lewelling, created a petition that all horses, hogs, and cattle should be kept off the streets.

In the 1870's there was a social event that earned \$65 for the first sidewalks in Milwaukie, then in 1903 incorporation of the City created sewer lines and water mains.

So today, which is worse? Stumps? Farm animals? 7000ft of torn up street? Or a goose and a couple of flaggers?

#### **Grants submitted for Riverfront**

This month the City will learn if it will be awarded grants that would build the next phases of Milwaukie Riverfront Park in the spring of 2014.

One grant was submitted to the Oregon Marine Board and would rebuild the boat launch, add a boarding float for the public to walk on for boats to tie up to, and build two parking lots for boat-tow -vehicles and cars.

The second grant was submitted to the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department and would regrade the northern portion of the park, relocate the utility poles, construct a riverside pathway and install plants and a structure along the riverbank to prevent erosion and enhance fish habitat.

#### The Chief's Corner

With summer on the way more of us will be taking to a local river or a backyard pool. Before you dive in, take a moment to think about safety.

The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that about 260 children under the age of 5 drown annually in swimming pools and spas. To prevent accidental drowning, ensure that the pool or spa is completely enclosed with fencing or other barriers that would keep out little ones. In addition, closely supervise children who are near water; knowing how to swim does not make a child drown-proof. Finally be prepared in the event of an emergency. Learn how to perform CPR and keep rescue equipment and a phone near the pool.

Taking these few precautions will enhance the safety of our little ones.


