Budget Committee to consider cost savings

Milwaukie's Budget Committee, consisting of the City Council and five citizens, will hold a special session in January to consider a \$4 million bond measure that would save money and retain core services.

The Budget Committee is tasked with approving and adopting the City's budget. This year the Budget Committee will weigh placing a bond on the May 2014 ballot and gain

input from its independent citizen members before moving forward with general obligation bonds. With voter approval, general obligation bonds would be sold to refinance early payment of the \$4 million debt for Milwaukie's share of light rail construction costs. The bond proceeds would refinance the debt at a lower interest rate and save the City money and preserve its General Fund.

Currently, the debt is being repaid from the City's General Fund, using funds which support police protection, library and parks. Refinancing the debt would allow the City to maintain funding for these core services.

"We think these savings in interest payments are worth taking a close look," says Milwaukie Finance Director Casey Camors.

Finding a cause close to heart

The holidays are typically a time of year that many people are more aware of the needs of their community whether it be through canned food or toy drives or lightly used blanket donations for the homeless. The holidays lend well to shine a spotlight on these causes, but they are causes that need year-round attention.

While the city always appreciates and needs more volunteers, people should volunteer with an organization that is close to their heart. This is why I chose Haiti.

I recently returned from a two week humanitarian trip where I worked with healthcare professionals teaching rural Haitians about basic health care, germs and the spread of disease. *(To the left is one of the photos I took while*

I was there.) The healthcare professionals also treated nearly 1,000 people for a variety of illnesses, injuries and infections. Some patients had conditions which needed further medical attention. It was difficult to see these people leave while not knowing if they would indeed go to the hospital. In Haiti, there is one doctor for every 15,000 people and a single doctor visit can cost close to a month's worth of income.

I urge you to find a cause that is worthy of your time, and to give the donation, at any time of year, that of yourself. It can make you appreciate the insignificance of first world problems vs. third world problems. It also gives you a perspective by being able to look at the world through a different lens.

Two Key Positions Hired

The City of Milwaukie filled two important positions in its Community Development Department with the recent hiring of Denny Egner as the Planning Director, and John Stelzenmueller as its Building Official.

"Milwaukie has always struck me as a place with a strong sense of community identity and pride," Denny said. "Light

Rail and Milwaukie Riverfront Park are setting the stage for significant reinvestment and redevelopment in the downtown and neighborhoods. The challenge for the Planning Department is to make sure that the coming changes are consistent with the community's vision and its sense of identity."

Egner comes to the City by way of Lake Oswego, where he was Assistant Planning Director, and more recently, the State of Oregon's Department of Land Conservation and Development. His primary duties with Milwaukie will be to oversee the Planning Department's operations.

Stelzenmueller has extensive experience previously with the City of Tualatin's Building Department and also worked as an inspector for the City of Milwaukie many years ago.

A flooding problem is more than meets the eye

When it comes to Public Works, there's often much more than meets the eye. For example, during periods of heavy or prolonged rains, the stretch of 37th Avenue between Railroad Avenue and International Way east of the Milwaukie Marketplace pools with water.

It's an unpleasant, recurring problem. Water covers the roadway, the sidewalk, and over time, the standing water can damage the street surface. But there's a reason this is a recurring problem, and it has to do with protecting the Minthorn Wetlands that lie just to the east, and the methods used to preserve natural resources and filter and clean storm water runoff on-site to protect and improve water quality.

In coordination with the Wetlands Conservancy, the City's Department releases water through the area's storm system in a measured manner so that flows do not rush through the Minthorn Wetlands and destroy sensitive wildlife habitat, and do not rush through the City's pipes and stir up sediment that would enter customers' water.

If you spot a recurring flooding problem, call the City's Stormwater Department at 503-786-7687, but also please keep in mind there might be a reason behind that recurring problem.

The City's first celebration station

With New Year's revelry on the mind, this month's column focuses on Milwaukie's most infamous place of celebration. Known as Gratton's Grove, Country Club of Milwaukie, Hotel Belle, Milwaukie Tavern, and Milwaukie Club, it's most infamous name was the Friar's Club. Started around 1905 by owners Isaac Gratton, who owned a Milwaukie lumber mill, and M.G. Neese, the Milwaukie Club was a roadhouse, billiard room on the carline near the mouth of Johnson Creek. The "Club" says a lot about Milwaukie's history with our civic neighbors, our civic pride, and our early independence from Oregon City and Portland.

July 21, 1905 ~ Senator Brownell and JE Hedges defend Mr. Gratton and Mr. Neese against charges of public indecency, disturbing public peace, and injuring public morals. The defense's argument: "ninety percent of the population of Milwaukie endorses the action of the council in granting the resort a license in favor of the club being continued."

August 11, 1905 ~ Milwaukie Club is raided. "Players at the Milwaukie Club last evening made a hasty exist through the nearest windows under the idea that a band of highwaymen had descended on them." *The Milwaukie Bee* reported on the closing of Milwaukie Club. In the article it charges *The Oregonian* for public awareness of the gambling house only when the Milwaukie Club decided not to continue to advertise in its daily paper.

September 26, 1914 ~ Now under operation of Julius Wilbur, the Friar's Club is still under scrutiny. The charge is producing intoxicating liquor on the premises and selling liquor on Sunday's. The Governor and the State District Attorney warn Clackamas County officials if action is not taken, the State Militia would be placed on the doorstep of the establishment. It is the first and only time in Oregon State history that martial law was used.

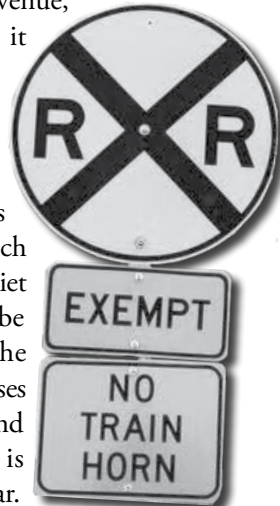
July 8, 1921 ~ The historic Friar's Club in Milwaukie, once famous as the last stand for legalized gambling in this district, is destroyed by fire at 1 a.m.

Quiet Zone almost complete

The City has gained approval from ODOT Rail and the Federal Rail Administration to establish a Quiet Zone along the Union Pacific line so trains are no longer required to blow their horns when passing through Railroad Crossings in town - whether that be during the day, or the middle of the night.

The City has budgeted and constructed a series of improvement projects at the crossings to install additional safety measures required of the Quiet Zone, and now that they're completed, the City is working with Union Pacific, which runs along Railroad Avenue, to quiet its horns as it passes through town.

The Portland - Milwaukie Light Rail Project is constructing the improvements at the Tillamook Branch crossings, and that Quiet Zone is expected to be in place in 2015. The Tillamook Branch passes through Downtown and is the one light rail is being constructed near.

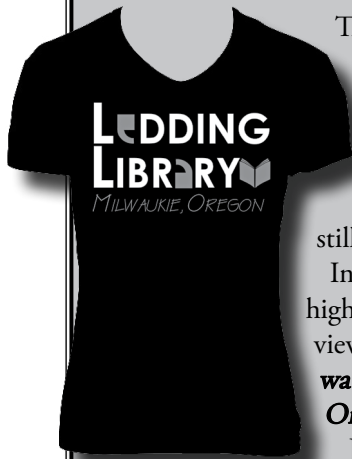
The Chief's Corner

Review and comment on next year's capital projects

The City's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) prescribes which major infrastructure projects will be funded and constructed in the coming years.

Road maintenance and improvement projects, stormwater, wastewater and water improvement projects are all accounted for in the CIP, and the proposed projects for 2013-2014 will be on display for public review at an Open House on Weds., Jan. 22nd, from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Public Safety Building.

Major projects include the City's Wasterwater Clay Pipe Replacement Program, paving for the Street Surface Maintenance Program, and the 17th Avenue Multiuse Trail.

Public comment will be considered and incorporated into the CIP final draft that will go before the Citizens Utility Advisory Board in February. After the CUAB review, the CIP is incorporated into the draft 2013-2014 Budget, which undergoes its own public review process.

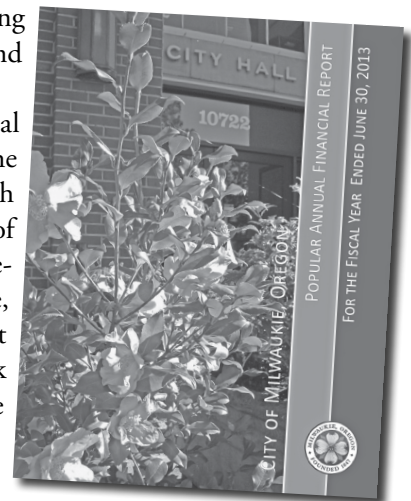
