Budgeting for the future

For Neighborhood Association Chairs David Aschenbrenner and Art Ball, being members of the City's Budget Committee and setting the City's spending priorities is an empowering and rewarding proposition.

"The budget is a long-term shaping and planning tool for the future," David explained. And by mapping the City's financial future, David says he feels he's helping provide the framework that supports the City's goals and vision.

Art agrees, saying his work on the Budget Committee gives him the sense he's making a tangible contribution to his local government.

"I feel like I'm an integral part of the City," Art said. "I feel like I'm at the heart of the City."

The Budget Advisory Committee is made up of five citizens, and joins the five City Councilors to comprise the Budget Committee. The Advisory Committee meets throughout the year with City Manager Mike Swanson to discuss the upcoming and future budgets, which as Art and David explain it, is a step towards the overall goal of incorportating more citizen input into the budget process.

"We're getting a lot better picture



of what the business is about," Art said. "And that's the right thing to do."

The Budget Committee is focusing its efforts as the 2002-2003 Fiscal Year rapidly approaches. On April 15, 2002, Mike will present the Commitee the budgets the City's Departments have submitted, and shortly thereafter, Department Heads will meet with the Committee in public meetings to explain their budget requests. Meeting times and dates had not been set at the time of print. All Budget Committee meetings are open to the public, and Art and David strongly urge residents to get involved.

"If citizens want us to do justice by them, they need to let us know what they're thinking. Otherwise they'll be stuck with our thoughts."

Popular collection event set

Milwaukie's widely popular Down To Earth Day collection event is scheduled for May 4, 2002. The event will begin at 8:30 a.m. and close at 1:30 p.m.

This once-a-year event gives Milwaukie residents a chance to unload yard debris, scrap metal, old furniture, small appliances and general trash at Dumpsters stationed at three sites throughout the City.

Like last year, Lewelling Elementary

and Linwood Elementary will provide Dumpsters for collection. However, instead of Rowe Middle School being the third site, this year Ardenwald Elementary will host the final spot.

A fee is charged for each vehicle attending the collection sites. Fees range from \$2 for a car load to \$8 for a large truck load. Unmounted tires are accepted at \$1.50 each. No hazardous materials will be accepted.




Mayor and City Manager head to capital to lobby for funds

Milwaukie Mayor James Bernard and City Manager Mike Swanson flew to Washington, D.C. to ask legislators for federal transportation dollars to fund two local road improvement projects.

Mayor Bernard said Milwaukie is the first city of our size to place a request on Congress's list of transportation projects. The two projects the City hopes to secure funding for are the rebuilding or resurfacing projects slated for the stretch of Lake Road between 37th Avenue and Linwood Avenue, and the stretch of Rail Road Avenue between 34th Avenue and the Highway 224 Interchange. Both projects feature the addition of sidewalks and bike lanes.

Mayor Bernard and Mike traveled with other JPACT members on March 5-7, 2002 to not only lobby for our City's projects, but to demonstrate region-wide support for larger-scale projects that impact the region. JPACT is Metro's Joint Policy Advisory Committee on Transportation that is made up of local city and county elected officials, Tri-Met, the Port of Portland, ODOT, DEO and Clark County and Clackamas County representatives.

Mayor Bernard said that while he doesn't expect the City's projects will receive immediate funding, he said gaining face time with Senators Gordon Smith and Ron Wyden, and State Representatives Darlene Hooley, Earl Blumenauer and Peter DeFazio could boost the potential for funding in the future.



Cable show highlights City's past

In one episode of "Milwaukie Yesterday," Ray Renfrow, the once longtime pharmacist and owner of Perry's Pharmacy, talks about the years he and his parents lived on Elk Rock Island maintaining the kerosene lamp that warded off river craft and how he earned money sweeping the floors of the island's dance hall.

Such interesting and entertaining stories are the norm for the program airing on Milwaukie's public access cable channel 23, and Portland's public access channel 11.

The show is hosted by Milwaukie resident, former Mayor and current State Representative Carolyn Tomei, and she speaks with Milwaukie residents who have memories and lineage that sometimes reach back into our City's first years of existence.

Molly Jo Hanthorn helps find funding for the show, and she hopes the program is building a sense of community.

"I think it's very important we share all of the parts of Milwaukie's past," Molly said. "It's a way to come together instead of arguing about "me" and "mine." We're trying to create more "us."

City Manager discusses budget

As City Manager Mike Swanson describes it, this year's budget process is just as much about regaining the public's confidence as it is making sure the numbers balance out.

Mike says the City is building on last year's efforts to make the budget more accessible and understandable to the public, and that he's listening to the citizen-lead Budget Advisory Committee and examining other city's processes in refining our own.

"We really want to open things up," Mike explained. "This (year's budget process) is about regaining people's trust. That's what the process is supposed to be about."

The format of last year's budget and

this year's budget provides written information that lends meaning to the line items and numbers.

Mike has met with all of the City's Department Heads to discuss their proposed budgets, and on April 15, 2002 Mike will kick off the formal budget process when he presents the City's Department's budgets to the Budget Committee

The Neighborhood Associations will each receive a copy of the proposed budget, and public Budget Committee meetings not yet scheduled at the time of print will follow in April and May.

"We want a process that allows people to plug into it, because we want people to plug into it," Mike said.

Take advantage of hazardous waste event

On Friday, April 26, and Saturday, April 27, 2002, Metro will host a free Household Hazardous Waste Roundup at Linwood Avenue Church of Christ (10110 SE Linwood Ave.).

This is a perfect opportunity to unload hazardous materials such as herbicides, pesticides, oil-based paints and old medications.

The Roundup hours are from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

At the Saturday collection, Clackamas County staff will coordinate a thermometer exchange at which people can turn in their mercury thermometer for a digital one at no charge. Only about 500 thermometers will be available, so come early!

The City Code Corner

The City's "Scattered Rubbish and Composting" section of Municipal Code is designed to keep properties from looking trashy and to keep compost piles neat and orderly.

The section pertaining to scattered rubbish prohibits the accumulation of any material anywhere on the property that a neighbor might deem "offensive" or "unsightly." This could describe any number of conditions, everything from a discarded couch to a heap of yard waste.

As far as composting goes, the code prohibits compost piles that are noticeably stinky and/or are attractive to rats, raccoons and other disease carrying vectors. (See the compost bin article below for bin information.)

The City realizes different folks have different ideas of what "offensive" and "unsightly" is, and for that reason Steven Campbell, the City's Code Compliance Coordinator, is always more than happy to work with residents to develop a compromise that works best for those involved. Third MDDA & Rotary cleanup ready

The Milwaukie Downtown Development Association and the local Rotary club will continue their waterfront cleanup efforts on April 6, 2002 when they focus their attention on removing blackberry bushes from the riverbank.

The April effort will mark the third cleanup event the MDDA and Rotary have organized — the first two work sessions removed about 40 yards of trash and rubbish.

Those interested in cleaning up one of the City's greatest assets are asked to assemble just north of the Jefferson Boat Ramp at 9 a.m. and to bring shovels, gloves, and determination.

Parade switches directions

The Milwaukie Festival Daze Parade will head in the opposite direction from previous years when it starts from the Southgate Theater in the northern industrial area and finishes at Rowe Middle School in the Lake Road Neighborhood. The parade will be held Saturday, June 15.

The route will travel south down Main Street to Monroe Street, make a left onto Monroe to 21st Avenue, head down 21st to Lake Road and finish at Rowe. Because Rowe is building in their parking lot and the number of parade applicants has dramatically increased, organizers have determined there simply isn't enough room to use Rowe as a staging area.

This year's event will also be a little different in that each evening will feature a different theme. Friday night, June 14, is Country Night, complete with square dancing and live country music. Saturday will be all about the Blues with Duffy Bishop, Robbie Laws and Richard Day-Reynolds filling out the bill. And on Sunday, Fathers' Day, there will be a classic car show and Johnny Limbo and The Lugnuts will play the hits from the 50's and 60's.

Island Station's March meeting was well attended and Chair Rick Farasy was glad to see so many new faces seated at the table.

Most in attendance were attracted by the meeting's agenda featuring Basil Christopher, the Oregon Department of Transportation engineer working on the sidewalk improvement project at McLoughlin Boulevard and 22nd Avenue and City Manager Mike Swanson.

Basil explained the project will still go to bid in May, but that Metro's recent purchase of property in the area that's to be developed into the "Trolley Trail" will call for some coordination between the two projects.

Basil said he's been working with Metro to secure an agreement, which he cautioned could take some time. Basil said he plans to push forward with the project on the property ODOT owns while he continues his work with Metro.

Mike addressed a host of issues of concern to Island Station residents, with the removal of the Kellogg Sewage Treatment Plant receiving the most attention. Mike said the City is trying to establish a partnership with the County and illustrate to the region that it's to everyone's economic benefit to remove the plant.

LAKE ROAD

Where: Rowe Middle School

We enjoyed a great turnout, about 45 people, at our March meeting, with the proposed subdivision drawing the most attention.

An employee of Centex Homes, David Cady, and Ric Givens, a contracted consultant, showed us a map of a proposed development of 19 lots bordering Lake Road. The zoning for the area is R-7 (minimum 7,000 sq. ft lots), and they plan to build homes that are between 2,200-2,600 sq. ft.

Our residents posed a number of questions; ranging from the possibility of selling some of the land for a park, saving trees, preserving the wetlands, testing for soil contaminates, and about the additional traffic that may result.

In regards to the purchase of land for a park, it was explained the purchase price would have to equal the profit they'd earn if the parcel were developed.

We were assured Centex builds quality homes that will enhance our Neighborhood's value. They weren't sure what trees could be saved, but suggested those standing near Lake Road in one of the two wetlands could be preserved. The homes on Vernie Avenue

that back up to the parcel will have a street next to their back yards, but Centex advised us a hedge and trees spaced 30 feet apart would be planted as a buffer.

Because their plans call for disturbing a wetland area, Centex suggested creating a smaller wetland elsewhere in the county. From what I understand, wetland creation is a beginning science and often isn't successful. One purpose of a wetland is to prevent toxic runoff from entering streams. At the site Centex hopes to develop, there are wetlands that serve this filtering function for Kellogg Creek, which runs along the south side of the site. I would like to see the wetlands



Like the State and County, the City of Milwaukie unfortunately has not been able to avoid a budget shortfall and the lack of funds presents numerous problems for the City.

Significant factors creating the major part of the problem can be credited to uncollected property taxes, nonpayment of franchise fees and a sharp reduction in interest revenue.

The Milwaukie City Manager and his staff in concert with the Budget Committee have been concentrating on balancing the budget with minimal effects on all services provided by the City. To begin with, the City Manager has requested each department to come up with a 10% overall savings for the 2001-2002 budget year. A reduction of this magnitude will undoubtedly have a detrimental influence on City provided services. However, this will place the City in a better position to balance the 2002-2003 budget.

Budget meetings are open to the public and anyone interested in more information should attend these meetings.

Unwanted activity in and around Furnberg Park (adjacent to the Cedarcrest subdivision) was the primary focus of our February meeting. Residents voiced their concerns about the behavior of young people of high school age, who often frequent the park in the mid-afternoon. Loitering, littering, speeding cars and minor acts of vandalism were the most common problems expressed.

Because of it's proximity to the park, LaSalle High School students were cited as possible suspects. Principal Bill George

expressed his concern about several incidents, and stated that the school sees itself as a "good, responsible neighbor" in the community. He pledged his administration's support in eliminating any troublesome activity. He said that some monitoring had already begun, and that he felt that not all the young people were current LaSalle students.

Milwaukie Police Chief Kanzler said that since the complaints had come in, more patrol monitoring of the area has occurred. He instructed residents to give detailed information on suspicious activity to the police as quickly as possible - after the event has occurred or even as it is happening. Residents also expressed the need to have curfew signs posted in the park, because in the past young people had also used the park as a "hangout" at night.

They also wanted to see more playground equipment installed so families with younger children would be encouraged to use the park more often.

Other meeting activities:

- Mike Schaufler, who is running for a position on the Clackamas County Commission, spoke to us about his qualifications and visions for the Commission.
- Milwaukie Programs Specialist JoAnn Herrigel encouraged those
 present to attend a Mother's Day walk sponsored by the City's
 Parks and Recreation Department on May 12, 2002. (See article on page 4 for more details) JoAnn said that if enough
 citizen volunteers are found, several walks of this nature could
 be done in various parts of Milwaukie throughout the year.
- A proposal to change the Linwood meeting date from the 4th
 Thursday to the 2nd Thursday of the month was voted on and accepted.

Our April meeting will be held on the second Thursday of the month, April 11, 2002. Our main topics of discussion will be annexation and what that will mean to our Neighborhood and region. We will also hear how the City will be dealing with "in-fill" issues (i.e., flag lots). See you there!

Our March meeting was attended by 30 neighbors. Thanks to Dorothy Snowhill for getting the word out; several residents from 36th Street came to provide input on Providence Milwaukie Hospital's plan to expand the Emergency Room for the hospital. Richard Smith showed diagrams for the proposed one-story addition which will be sited east of the main building. Parking will be replaced and additional spaces will be provided to meet the demand.

Our Portland and Milwaukie Police Officer liaisons attended and reported on the crime activity during March — mostly car break-ins and vandalism. She combined a beautiful slide show with a narrative on the many battles fought to preserve this natural wonder. It is remarkable that the Friends have accomplished so much in the face of the constant pressures applied by the many interests that want to control or develop it. The latest City crime statistics indicate an overall increase in our Neighborhood of 4.9% last year in Part 1, or major, crimes, and a 17.3% drop in Part 2 crimes.
