Task Force considers economic impacts

A Citizen Task Force is winding up their work on Minor League Baseball feasibility in April.

The Task Force will be hearing reports from two firms working on the economic impacts associated with the possible ballpark project.

The Leland Consulting Group made a preliminary report in March recommending that the City look for opportunities to promote the development of restaurants and nightlife around the ballpark, which itself should be planned to host music events. CSL, another economics firm, will be presenting attendance, revenue and job impacts at the meetings on April 5th and 19th.

The Task Force is also outlining a Good Neighbor Agreement that will help determine how the ballpark will be operated. The Task Force is preparing to send City Council a set of recommendations that would be the basis for a Good Neighbor Agreement with the Ardenwald and Historic Milwaukie NDA's.

On May 15th, the City Council will receive a formal presentation on Phase 2 Feasibility and a complete set of Task Force recommendations, and is expected to vote on whether the project should take the next step toward a public vote on financing.

Residential Standards getting a long look

The Planning Commission has held three public hearings on the Residential Development Standards Project and will continue its discussion in April.

The Commission is mulling over and directing staff on how to refine several aspects of the proposed zoning code amendments. This project is proposing changes to the policies that shape the design and types of new and expanded single- and multi-family development, with the goal of creating a better set of standards that do not inadvertently discourage investment but result in a higher level of quality when projects are constructed.

The Planning Commission will hold the fourth public hearing on proposed changes to the City's residential development standards on Tuesday, April 10th, at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall. The current draft proposal, and much more background about this project, is available on the City website.

Walk Safely Projects slated for Neighborhoods

The Walk Safely Milwaukie pilot project will take another significant step this April when construction begins on a new crosswalk that will provide an important pedestrian link to the Lewelling Neighborhood's Ball-Michel Park.

The Walk Safely Milwaukie Program empowers Milwaukie's Neighborhoods to identify and implement local projects and other citizen-led activities to make walking in Milwaukie a more comfortable and commonplace experience.

The Lewelling project will break ground in early April and will add new curb and sidewalk at the NE corner of Stanley and Willow Streets, as well as a new crosswalk to the Neighborhood park. The project was proposed by the Lewelling Neighborhood Association, recommended to City Council for funding, and approved by Council. The project is budgeted at \$23,000.

The project will be the second pedestrian improvement project under the Walk Safely Milwaukie Program. Last fall 300 feet of sidewalk was added to Home Avenue in the Hector Campbell Neighborhood. Later this spring another Walk Safely crosswalk project will be constructed in the Island Station Neighborhood.

The Walk Safely Milwaukie Program is in the second year of its three year pilot program. Neighborhoods will again propose projects for PSAC's consideration in Fiscal Year 2012-2013.



Budget season underway

Milwaukie's Budget Committee reviews the annual City budget document to recommend an approved budget to the City Council for adoption. The Committee includes five citizens and the City's five City Councilors.

For the 2012-2014 budget, the Budget Committee will face some tough budget challenges. Some key considerations this year include:

- **Maintaining services with existing revenues and rising costs;**
- **Transitioning from an annual to a biennial (2-year) budget cycle;**
- **Funding the City's match for the Portland-Milwaukie Light Rail project;**
- **Rate increases for storm water, sewer and water.**

All budget meetings are open to the public. Testimony is accepted at the official Budget Committee meetings.

The event will allow citizens to anonymously drop off unneeded or expired prescription drugs for safe disposal.

The basic CERT course covers Disaster Preparedness, Disaster First Aid, Fire Prevention and Suppression, Light Search and Rescue and Disaster Psychology. The Saturday class is the final hands on training for individuals who have completed and passed the IS 317 on-line course.

Students will have the opportunity to become a part of the Milwaukie CERT Team or other local area teams and receive additional skill training while being prepared to assist your community when needed.
