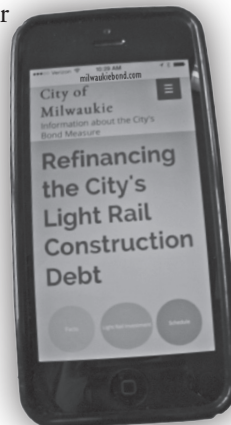
Website offers bond measure information

City roads need more help

Spring is here, the sun is out, the days are brighter and what do we see? Our roads in the same appalling condition as they were last year.

It must have cost a lot of money to build the roads, and it is foolish to allow them to disintegrate the way we are.

Currently we have a city gas tax, utility fee and one other method of raising money for road repairs. These were started some years ago and to date some of our major roads have been rebuilt. But our residential streets, those streets most of us live on, are not being maintained and have reached the point where only rebuilding is a solution.

If we don't start a maintenance program for these streets soon the costs of rebuilding them will be even greater than it is now, and the wear and tear on the vehicles being driven on them will also increase.

We need to start a discussion in the City, in the way we did when the current Street Surface Maintenance Program (SSMP) came into being, to decide firstly to keep the current SSMP running and to add new roads to the list of those being rebuilt, and secondly to decide how to finance the cost of rebuilding our residential streets.

Hard as it may be, we have to consider increasing the fees we have now so as to be able to start to rebuild more miles of road each year than we do now.

A dilapidated road system making our Neighborhoods look run-down will not encourage people to move into Milwaukie, which in turn keeps our property values down. Allowing our roads to disintegrate even further will cost us more money to fix later on.

We have to stop kicking the can down the road.

Budget taking shape

It's budget season and the City's Budget Committee, which is comprised of the five City Councilors and an equal number of appointed citizens, is putting together a balanced budget in a time of dwindling resources.

Tough decisions lie ahead. To provide your input attend one of these meetings.

- Thurs., April 24th, 6 p.m., City Hall Council Chambers: Discuss proposed budget.

- Thurs., June 5th, 6 p.m., City Hall Council Chambers: Approve budget for Council consideration.

The bonds would be payable from property taxes. If the bonds are approved, the additional tax is estimated to cost \$36 per year for a Milwaukie home with a taxable value of \$200,000.

What came first, chicken or brick?

Mysteries from Milwaukie Museum Written by Greg Hemer

Located in a glass display case on the main floor of the Milwaukie Museum at 3737 SE Adams St. sits two oddly marked bricks. One has a cat paw and the other has chicken feet imprints. These bricks bear the easily identifiable markings of Fischer Pottery and Brickyard, and are from the foundation of an old barn that was on the McLaughlin property located near what is now McLoughlin Boulevard and River Road.

Started in 1878, the Fischer Pottery was one of the early clay and commercial ceramic establishments in the Portland area. The 16-acre facility housed many buildings. There was the kiln, an eight-foot square chimney that rose 60 feet, a drying shed, a machine room with a foot-operated potter's wheel, a machine that "stomped out" the pots, a wood-fire steam engine, and a clay cutting machine. The operation grew and expanded to include a brickyard in 1895. Since the price of cord wood used for firing the steam engine rose, Fischer Pottery started to harness the power from Kellogg Creek, where an old sawmill stood. This ended in 1909 when the dam was built.

What did Fischer Pottery and Brickyard make? Butter churns, milk crocks, mugs, cemetery vases, and bricks were popular, but their best market was thundermugs. The poor folks usually bought the plain yellowish brown glazed ones, but the elite purchased fancy chinaware kind with fancy decorations. These were generally placed in a separate piece of furniture called a commode.

So how do we know the markings of the bricks are Fischer Pottery? On the property were living quarters, a small garden, and a barn with horses to deliver the pots, several cows, and chicken coops.

Since bricks need sunshine to dry, the Fischer brickyard was between the barn and the pottery. Even though they tried to keep the chickens fenced-in, they had a tendency to wonder on top of the sun drying bricks.

Apparently the cat was interested in following in the chicken's foot prints.

Fire District increases staffing

On Feb. 24th Clackamas Fire was honored to welcome 15 new firefighter and firefighter/paramedics to our organization.

A number of these new positions are a result of a \$1.9 million federal grant that the Fire District received in November 2013. The new recruits will spend eight-weeks in our training academy and then will be assigned to community fire stations throughout the Fire District. This is the largest recruit class we have had in over two decades.

A limited amount of federal Urban Area Securities Initiative funding was applied for and received over the past month. The Fire District received funding to purchase cardiac monitor defibrillators, a vehicle to transport rescue equipment and support emergency operations in the event of a natural or human-caused disaster, and radio upgrades.



The City Code Corner

It's that time of year again when you have to start dusting off those lawn mowers and cutting shears.

There are some ordinances in our City that restrict the height of vegetation in certain areas. For instance, grass, weeds, and wild blackberries are not allowed to be taller than 8 inches in height. Trees and shrubs overhanging the sidewalk below 8 feet and the street below 12 feet must be cut so that pedestrians and vehicles can pass safely.

Finally, for our friends at the fire department we need to keep a 3 foot radius clear around the fire hydrants, so they can protect all the investments that you and your family have made.

Updates on projects from the Community Development Department

Moving Forward Milwaukie

More than 20 residents weighed-in on a range of issues that will define what future development looks like in the commercial areas of Milwaukie at a public event on March 6th, and now residents can vote online and provide their feedback.

Please view the presentation and take the online survey posted on the Planning page of the City's website. The survey will be open through April 8th so the project advisory committee can consider the input before the project team presents its next set of recommendations to City Council on April 15th.

Those at the Moving Forward Milwaukie interactive event of March 6th indicated they'd support a wide-range of uses on the seven identified opportunity sites, encouraged the City to cleanup and simplify its zoning regulations to remove development barriers, and supported establishing design standards in Central Milwaukie to ensure quality projects.

The Moving Forward Milwaukie Project is a Planning Department initiative to identify and address policy, regulatory, and financial barriers to development in Milwaukie's commercial districts, so that when the project wraps up in 2015, a concrete proposal for a project will be on the table.

Neighborhood Parks Master Plans

The North Clackamas Parks District is reaching out to design firms to develop concept plans for three Milwaukie Neighborhood Parks - Balfour Park, Kronberg Park, Bowman-Brae Park, and construction documents for Wichita Park. With completed designs, the focus will be on identifying funding for construction.

Boat Ramp Closure - Park Construction

While Phase II of Milwaukie Riverfront Park is constructed this summer the Jefferson Street Boat Ramp will be closed, as Phase II's new boat ramp and boarding dock is constructed.

The present-day ramp will shut down in June and the new ramp is expected to be completed this year and ready for use in 2015. Other Phase II work includes a new vehicle access point to the park, a riverside trail along the Willamette River, regrading the site, and planting riparian areas.

The primary responsibility of the Neighborhood Associations and its land use committees is to work with the City to develop and evaluate land use plans and represent our interests at public hearings. We did so at the March 11th Planning Commission meeting by opposing a zone change request by Northwest Housing Alternatives that would allow higher density apartment buildings and a three-story corporate office building at the triangle of Lake Road, Willard Street and 23rd Avenue. Our NDA also voted to challenge any decision to approve this zone change, as we believe it is blatantly illegal.

Moving Forward Milwaukie project: Members of our Neighborhood Association are shocked at the false statements and reports made by John Fregonese, one of the consultants on the team the City has hired for \$254,000, \$30,000

of which the City is paying, to push through Metro's high density redevelopment of our Downtown. At the Planning Commission hearing he claimed citizen support for 5 story apartment buildings when only a few developers and residents supported them at a March 6th project Open House.

Actually, our Neighborhood is supportive of 2-story buildings, and no more than 3 stories. We have documents showing the votes from earlier events. When members of our Neighborhood disagreed with him (on nearly every question) at the recent Open House his response was, "We will have to work on this!" The explanation: more and bigger development equals "adequate cash-on-cash profit" (10%) plus public subsidy and tax-breaks, if the City Council agrees. We are encouraged to hear growing opposition to such giveaways at our expense. Stay tuned.

Linwood is dedicated to improving safety and access around our community, especially near schools and Neighborhood parks. As motorists, let's all be extra careful during our commutes and have patience when schools are having arrivals and dismissals.

Now that spring is upon us more community members will be out walking our beautiful streets and riding bikes. This can be precarious in our Neighborhood considering the lack of continuous sidewalks and safe shoulder access. You can help the walkability in these areas by not leaving out yard debris or garbage cans. Blocking sidewalks and/or obstructing free passage is unlawful and prevents safe passage for pedestrians. Obstructions force bike and foot traffic into the main street corridors and jeopardizes the safety of our community.

If prolonged obstacles interrupt a free passage, I would encourage you to remind your neighbors of the importance of safe access (especially within the 1-mile radius of our public schools where bus service is not provided). You can always report problems to Code Compliance at 503-786-7409.

Another number that we should all have available is Milwaukie's non-emergency number - 503-786-7500. Use this number to report non-injury fender benders, property damage, noise disturbances (such as a late party or barking dog) or if you observe 'suspicious' activities in your Neighborhood. Don't hesitate to call - try to record license plates or clothing of those you're concerned about - keep an eye out and be proactive.
