Sewer rate dispute continues

After failing to reach agreement on an interim sewer rate through a mediation process, the City of Milwaukie and Clackamas County Service District No. 1 (CCSD #1) will now turn the matter over to an arbitration panel.

The future of the Kellogg Creek Treatment Plant and the long-term rate will not be arbitrated. (For updates on this issue, as well as more information about the City's vision for Kellogg, visit www.watersmartriverfront.org.)

Mediation negotiations ended when the City refused the District's "last and final" offer. The District did not respond to a counter-offer made by the City.

it," said Mayor Jeremy Ferguson. "It would have dramatically increased costs to city residents and assessed them for growth within the entire district. Our counter-offer attempted to strike a middle-ground. I'm disappointed a settlement wasn't reached."

The arbitrators will set a rate for the period of August 2009, when the District terminated its contract with the City, through June 2012. The arbitration ruling is expected by June.

There will be a great variety of perennials, annuals and hanging baskets for sale at reasonable prices. All proceeds will benefit the Ledding Library.







South Downtown Plan resumes

City Council approved a contract with Walker Macy/LMN Architects for planning and urban design services for Phase IV of the South Downtown planning project at its April 6th meeting.

The 'South Downtown' describes the area between 99E and 21st Ave. from west to east, and Washington Street to Lake Road from north to south.

The completion of Phase IV will result in a single concept that refines the ideas of prior work, but adds much more detail in describing a design for a plaza, land parcelization, circulation strategies, integrating light rail and



associated development, and park connectivity.

Walker Macy/LMN will assemble a citizen-based Steering Committe that will help the design team develop a set of maps and diagrams that explain a vision for the site.

An Open House will be held in July to give citizens a chance to review the work and to help refine the concept as it moves to compleion. The design team is expected to deliver its preferred concept by October.

May is National Bike Month and a good time to be aware of the more vulnerable users of our roadways.

The better weather and the longer daylight hours are a natural draw as our children head out on their bikes.

When driving around cyclists, drivers should: 1) check the bike lane for bikes, 2) always signal when turning to alert others, 3) pass cyclists with plenty of room to spare, 4) don't honk at cyclists or follow too closely, 5) allow cyclists to use crosswalks (it's the law), 6) look when opening your driver's door, 7) use caution in residential areas as many cyclists prefer these lesser used routes, 8) use good manners in general while driving.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS How to be ready in case of an emergency



Thinking about how you and your familiy will cope during an emergency situation, whether it be through flooding conditions, a snow storm,

or something as large as an earthquake, can be disconcerting. But if you are prepared, you will be able to take care of yourself and others until help arrives. This

information has been compiled from the resources listed on the reverse side of this handout. Please visit these websites for more information.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS KITS

Authorities suggest that you should have a kit with enough supplies for at least 4 days. You might want to begin with the items on the "Essentials" list and add, as you can, the remaining items.

It is suggested that you store the essential items in a "go" bag, like a duffle bag with roller wheels, and keep these supplies easily accessible both in your home and vehicle(s).

KEEPING YOUR PETS SAFE

During recent natural disasters, many animals were abandoned and left without care. Here are some helpful tips to plan for the emergency care of your cats, dogs, birds and other animals.

Prepare yourself. Have a plan to get away. Develop a buddy system so that neighbors, friends or relatives watch out for your animals if you are away. Watch news reports for flood warnings, storm warnings, wild fire warnings. Keep animals inside the house so if you need to move quickly you can do so.

Many emergency shelters will not allow your pet inside unless contained in a carrier. Unless the disaster is wide-spread and an organization opens a temporary shelter for animals, the caretakers of reptiles should pre-arrange locations with friends or relatives to temporarily house their pets.

TAKE THE FOLLOWING STEPS:

- Have pets micro-chipped
- Make sure pets have a collar with ID tags
- Be sure to have a photo of you and your pet for ID purposes.
- Include pet and owner information on your pet carrier
- Contact motels and hotels outside local area about policies on pets
- Keep a list of pet-friendly places.
- Prepare a list of boarding facilities or vets who could shelter a pet in the event of an emergency
