Quiet Zones go into effect on May 1st

Starting May 1st a rail quiet zone, where freight and light rail trains only need to sound their horns in case of emergency, goes into effect at Mailwell Drive in the North Industrial Area, and at Harrison, Monroe and Washington streets, and 21st Avenue at Adams Street in Downtown.

In a quiet zone, freight and light rail operators are not required to blow their horns as they approach a crossing, although they may use the horn at their discretion.

Be safe to stay safe!

- Obey all signals at these crossings
- Remain behind safety gate arms
- Do not attempt to cross as the safety gate arms lower or while bells or lights are on
- Always expect a train – even if you don't hear a horn
- Never cross while bells and lights are on

Change is on its way

Change is coming to Milwaukie. It is an exciting time we are living in. The long awaited Riverfront Park is nearing completion and TriMet has begun testing trains on the new Light Rail tracks. Earth Day brought a huge group of volunteers out to help refresh planting beds and pick up trash throughout the city. Spring

is here, summer is just around the corner and the growth of Milwaukie is evident everywhere we look.

One area of interest is the growth in Milwaukie's downtown zone. The Planning Department has developed some initial ideas about how the downtown zone might grow. This of course brings up an issue that many cities have struggled with ... Density. Creating a vibrant and active city is clearly a common goal. How we accomplish that is being actively debated. A key growth question is ... "how does Milwaukie remain vibrant and retain the positive amenities we all moved here for or grew up with?"

Again the question of Density rises to the surface. Will we be required to change our downtown to achieve the Density that Metro has in mind for us? Or will we be able to retain the small-town feel with a walkable, pedestrian oriented business district?

How will Milwaukie retain "the charm of Mayberry but avoid the Density of Manhattan." Will we soon see proposals for 4, 5 and 6 story buildings? What does a 5 story building look like and feel like as a pedestrian walking next to it. How does it affect our access to daylight, our view of the sky, the riverfront and our historic landscape?

As a city councilor I am very interested in your feedback on this issue of Density so please email me your thoughts.

Recycling options abound

Feeding fowl is a foul

Feeding local birds creates more problems than you might think. Feeding ducks and geese bread (or other foods that wildlife don't typically find in nature) is not digested well by the animals and causes them to poop more than they would if they were foraging on their own. If you've been to Milwaukie Riverfront Park, you know this is a problem.

Furthermore, the 'people food' that the ducks get from our citizens has little nutritional value for the animals anyway. And while ducks may seem to enjoy being fed and it's fun to do so, it's not doing the wildlife any favors. It makes them more reliant on hand outs and more domesticated which makes them more vulnerable to predators.

And finally, the geese are supposed to migrate, but since there is ample food for them here they just stay year-round as a resident population.

The Chief's Corner

If you haven't noticed there are A LOT of changes to traffic control devices in the downtown area, especially around the light rail station and Milwaukie High School.

The four-way-stops at Washington and 21st Avenue have changed to traffic lights. There are also lights east of the tracks on Washington and south of Washington on 21st Avenue. These new lights are timed to work with the train and the light at Hwy. 99E and Washington Street.

I was watching traffic at the end of the school day when the High School students were released and believe me, it was BUSY! Sometimes if we have driven the same route for the last 10 years we can drive on autopilot. We might miss those changes and run a light or have a collision if we don't pay close attention. Take your time through this area and pay attention to your surroundings.

MFM spurs development

The Planning Commission and City Council have been hard at work reviewing draft amendments for the City's commercial areas under the *Moving Forward Milwaukie* (MFM) project.

The Planning Commission recommended approval of the downtown plan and code amendment package on March 10th after two study sessions to discuss the amendments.

The first City Council hearing on downtown plan and code amendments will be on May 5th at 7 in City Hall. The amendments consolidate zones to expand potential uses, make redevelopment less onerous, and address how new development looks.



The second Planning Commission hearing on Phase 2, the Central Milwaukie plan and code amendments, will be on May 12th at 6:30 p.m. in City Hall.

The third and final of the project, Neighborhood Main Streets, is kicking off with a public event on May 6th at 6:30 p.m. at the Public Safety Building. This phase cleans up the City's code in smaller neighborhood commercial areas to allow a wider variety of businesses that people in the neighborhood can use and enjoy. The project includes preparation of new design standards for redevelopment so that new or expanded buildings complement the surrounding neighborhood.

An Open House sharing the Neighborhood Main Street plan and code amendments is tentatively set for June 3, at a time and place to be determined.

Riverfront was home of Mill

Milwaukie's Standard Mill was not just a place of great commerce but a lasting piece of Milwaukie and Oregon History that withheld and changed nature.

Standard Mill was built by Joseph Kellogg, WJ Bradbury, and HW Eddy. It was located at the mouth of Kellogg Creek and turned the Tualatin Wheat Fields into the purest flour in Oregon. The machinery was designed by Kellogg but was crafted by the volunteer fire chief, Peter Taylor. The ingenuity of the millwright in inventing an apparatus for the separation of blue-

pod and other foreign matter that got into the grain and which in the grinding discolored the flour. They constructed the first elevator in this country, powered by Kellogg Creek.

The brand of flour sold was Red Cross. It shipped mostly from Whitcomb's boat enterprise all over the Willamette, Columbia, and California mines and cities.

The Standard Mill created Kellogg Lake. The creek was first dammed in 1858 to run the grinding mill and elevator.

The Standard Mill's hey-day dwindled and closed in 1879, as Portland became



the Port of Delivery. It stood on the Riverfront for a long time vacant, empty as a reminder to the time when Milwaukie was a powerhouse in Oregon economy. In 1901 it finally fell, but remains in the hearts of Milwaukians till this day.

You can learn more about Milwaukie's history by visiting the Milwaukie Museum at 3737 SE Adams St. every Saturday and Sunday from 1 - 5 p.m.

Phone app saves lives

Partner with us to save a life ... Clackamas Fire is offering PulsePoint, a free smart phone app designed to empower everyday citizens to provide life-saving assistance to victims of sudden cardiac arrest. If the cardiac emergency is in a public place, the PulsePoint app will alert citizens in the vicinity of the need for bystander CPR simultaneous with the dispatch of advanced medical care and directs these citizen rescuers to the exact location of the closest publicly accessible Automated External Defibrillator (AED).

This free app is now being used across Clackamas County as early notification when a call to 911 happens within the community. Early notification, being trained in hands-only CPR, and accessing an AED can save a life. Help our firefighter/paramedics increase the survival rate of cardiac arrest by learning the basics of hands-only CPR, how to use an AED, and downloading PulsePoint.

Adams Street work to begin in May

Work on the Adams Street Connector Project will get underway at the end of May and will create an active pedestrian boulevard with street furniture and trees to connect Milwaukie's future downtown light rail station at 21st Avenue and Lake

Road with Main Street and Dogwood Park.

Construction is anticipated to be completed by the end of June. The area is envisioned to host street fairs, concerts and other community events.

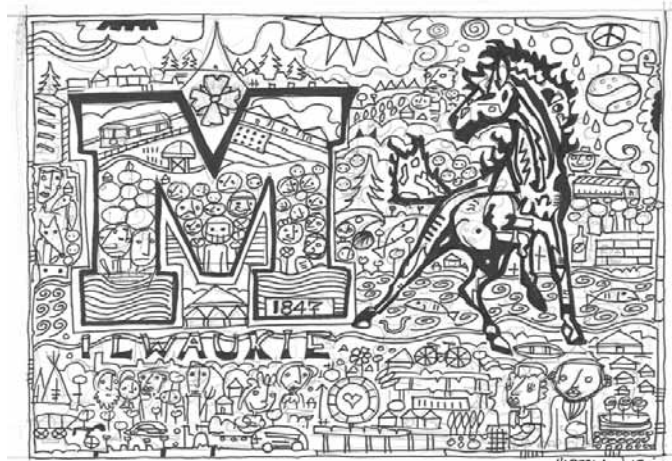


May is Plant Sale season

Water line mailing info

A number of residents have received a mailing from HomeServe USA. The mailing informs recipients that they are responsible for the maintenance and repairs of their exterior water lines, leaving them liable for repairs which could potentially cost thousands of dollars.

The Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises residents to read the notice very carefully, particularly the portion that says "HomeServe is an independent company separate from your local utility or community." The BBB notes that while the company is correct when they say homeowners are responsible for the maintenance and repair of their water lines—from the street to the meter - the warranty coverage they offer is optional, not mandatory. The BBB recommends the following tips: *Never agree to any contract over the phone without first receiving it in writing; *Read the service contract very carefully; *Review your homeowners insurance policy or call your insurance agent to see if cover-age is already provided; *Check the BBB website at www.bbb.org for issues.
