For the second year in a row the Milwaukie Rotary Club turned out in force to clean Downtown Milwaukie's streets and planted and natural areas as part of last month's Earth Day celebration.

Bond measure passes

Milwaukie's Bond Measure to refinance light rail construction debt in order to retain core services and save City money passed by a 54.7% to 45.3% margin, according to the Clackamas County Elections Division.

Council has given staff direction to move forward with a competitive sale of the bonds, meaning broker banks or dealer banks will bid on the bond's terms, and the City will select the lowest cost bidder.

Bid opening is scheduled for June 25th, with bond issuance scheduled for July 9th.

I want to thank Milwaukie voters for their support in passing Measure 3-439 last May.

Our voters quickly sized-up the situation and seized this opportunity to preserve what makes our City great.

My council colleagues and I attended many public meetings to spread the word. Voters told us this was a “no-brainer” - a one-time chance to save taxpayers’ money and retain core services. This will save hundreds of thousands of dollars - up to \$365,000 a year - for 20 years. This money can now be used to sustain core services including police protection and library hours.

In particular, I want to thank those Neighborhood Association chairs and their members who actively supported the measure. I also want to thank the Budget Committee for carefully weighing the merits of the measure, and offering its support.

Now that the bond has passed Council and staff will continue to actively find ways the City can work more efficiently and be strong stewards of our taxpayers’ dollars. Cost-saving strategies will continue to be a part of the discussion as we work toward adopting our next biennial budget for 2015-2016.

The mission of the City of Milwaukie is to maintain and enhance Milwaukie as a good place to live, work, and play which is clean, safe, responsive, and provides quality services.

With the support of Milwaukie voters, and passing this bond, we are much better positioned to continue our pursuit of Milwaukie’s vision.

Budget nearing adoption

After a series of public meetings focusing on reviewing the proposed budget for the 2015-2016 biennium, the Budget Committee is expected to approve the budget for Council’s consideration at a meeting to be held Thurs., June 5th, at 6 p.m. in Milwaukie City Hall.

Council will then consider formal adoption of the budget at the Regularly Scheduled Council Meeting on Tues., June 17th, at 7 p.m. in City Hall’s Council Chambers.

In the Works | *Project Updates from Engineering Department*

17th Avenue Multiuse Path

To kickoff the project's design phase a community ride was held on May 21st to give staff and members of the biking community a first-hand look at the stretch of 17th Ave. between Harrison and the Springwater Corridor that will be reconstructed to better accommodate motorists, cyclists and pedestrians.

Project staff encourages those interested to visit the project page on the City's website, find it under the Projects tab in the brown banner, and review the project information packet and submit comment before June 15th so the consultants can incorporate public input before design begins.

Monroe Street Waterline Replacement

Construction will begin in June to replace 1,400 feet of old cast iron pipe susceptible to cracking and leaking with new ductile iron pipe that is stronger and more long-lasting between Main Street and 28th Avenue. Construction will run through August.

Council considers murals

City Council will review and hear public testimony regarding a proposal for new City Code that will exempt murals from current sign regulations and define and permit Art Murals in Milwaukie at its June 3rd meeting.

As proposed, Art Murals may be permitted as either Public Murals or Original Art Murals. Artists and community groups may choose which type of mural process they would like to pursue. Public Murals may receive grant funding from the City upon approval through a rigorous committee review process. Original Art Murals may be permitted through an objective review and a fee may be charged for the permit.

In October 2013, the Clackamas Fire District set a goal of training 10,000 seventh and eighth grade students and their families in "Hands-Only CPR" within the North Clackamas and Oregon City School Districts by June 2014.



Most people who experience cardiac arrest at home, work or in a public location die because they don't receive immediate CPR from someone on the scene. Properly administering CPR can more than double a person's chances of survival.

A true Museum mystery

Upstairs in a Milwaukie Museum glass case at 3737 SE Adams St. is a display of Veterans memorials to Wars of the past. Items range from a radiacmeter used in the Korean War to measure radiation exposure, an Operation Desert Storm Oregon Army National Guard Banner, to World War I and World War II clothing, medals, and artifacts.

But one thing in the display case goes beyond the normal course of War memorabilia, something found 100 years later after it was fired.

She may have been looking for potatoes or carrots, but Mrs. Fred Baker found something quite different while digging her garden on Harmony Road 70 years ago.

A cannonball. An uncommunicative, four-pound ball of iron.

Other cannonballs similar to Mrs. Baker's have been discovered in the same general area east of Milwaukie. The ball may have dropped off a caisson during a hurried march to battle (or retreat). Or perhaps it was one of those fired with such explosive

blast but so little effect. Beneath its coating of rust and dirt, the cannonball remains an enigma that tells no secrets.

If you do not have time to visit the Milwaukie Museum on Saturdays and Sundays from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., visit the display at Linwood Elementary on June 13th Movie Under the Stars sponsored by the Linwood Neighborhood. Admission is free. The display and other events will start at 7:30 p.m. lasting until dusk when the movie will start.

Summer is the time when we see a lot of garage sales and recreational vehicles around town. Please be aware that our code prohibits the parking of motorhomes, travel trailers, and boats in the right-of-way, which includes the street and the gravel shoulder of our streets. Please park these vehicles in your driveway, even if you are just loading it up with supplies before you head out of town.

Garage sales are okay in the City as long as more than two aren't held in a calendar year and they don't last more than 72 hours. Also, please do not put signs for the sale in the right-of-way or on utility poles - that's a violation of our Sign Code. If you have questions, please call me at 503-786-7409. Kids, teens and adults can all earn prizes for reading this summer by joining Ledding Library's 2014 summer reading program: Fizz, Boom, Read!

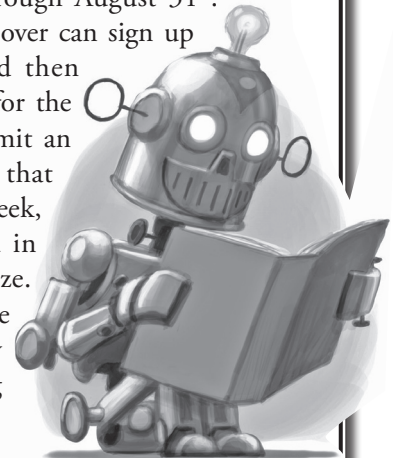
All ages are welcome to participate; even babies and toddlers can join in the fun by keeping track of the time that someone reads to them.

Tacoma Station Boardwalk Will Be Built

TriMet and the Creek Committee [Johnson Creek Watershed Council, Ardenwald/Johnson Creek Neighborhood and others] have reached an agreement to proceed on the educational boardwalk at the Tacoma Light Rail Station. Construction is scheduled for this year.

The 125 foot-long boardwalk will begin near the station platform and run to an overlook by Johnson Creek and the new side channel habitat, funded by the Creek Committee, that was constructed last year. Along the boardwalk will be five educational signs describing both the history of the site and about environmental features and watershed restoration.

The agreement is a result of negotiations between the two parties. TriMet agreed to find \$50,000 worth of savings in the budget and to not place a deadline on fundraising. The Creek Committee, which has already raised \$150,000 towards the boardwalk, promised to continue efforts to raise another \$50,000.

Donors of \$100 or more to the boardwalk will have their names engraved on the handrailings. To donate to the boardwalk, visit <http://jcw.org/engraving/>.

The boardwalk will be a great addition to our Neighborhood and is readily accessible from the Springwater Trail. We encourage everyone who can, to donate to this worthy endeavor.

On May 20th the City Council granted our Neighborhood's appeal to reverse the Planning Commission's approval of Northwest Housing Alternative's open-ended zone change request.

Three Councilors (of five) agreed that the applicant failed to meet the requirement to explain how their project met the City's required eight-point criteria. The applicant ignored the issues of parking, already a serious problem around NWAHA, nor did they mention how their three-story office building, plus doubling the current

density, would impact the character of our Neighborhood.

We appreciate that Council listened and understood how damaging the proposal would have been. We and councilors were troubled by the vague 'concept plan' that failed to disclose the actual use to which the nine properties would be put. We are sure that we will hear from this organization again.

We are still working on the Moving Forward project. Issues are extreme buildings, tax subsidies, parking, traffic, and City giveaways to developers. You can find the project on the City website. It's worth your time.
