Making a difference

Jeff Klein made a vow to his wife, Melissa, that once they bought a home he would begin attending Neighborhood Association meetings. It's a promise she may wish he had never made.

Because since he began attending Lewelling Neighborhood meetings three years ago he has become its Chair, invested countless hours in the development of Lewelling Community Park and has been appointed to the City's Planning Commission.

Jeff says his involvement has grown because he can see he and others are effecting real change.

"People have a strong feeling for Milwaukie," Jeff said. "Myself, I see a future for this City and there aren't many

places where you really can make a difference."

One of the areas Jeff's been making a difference is in the effort to spur the development of Lewelling Community Park. On June 13th Jeff rounded up about 25 citizens and outfitted them with t-shirts reading "We Can Dig It, If You Fund It!" and headed down to Champoege Park to illustrate citizen support for the park at an state grant hearing.

Jeff points out that his involvement, especially with regards to the Planning Commission, is time consuming and is only possible because Melissa supports him.

Maybe now she wishes Jeff wasn't always such a man of his word. The City is lucky he is.



Riverfront kicks off!

At a ceremony attended by more than 100 people Governor Kulongoski kicked off the drive to develop Milwaukie Riverfront Park when he took a sledgehammer to the north wall of the Milwaukie Antique Mall on June 22nd.

The Antique Mall and Vic's Willamette View Tavern were the final two buildings to be demolished to make way for the McLoughlin Boulevard Project and the long-sought after Riverfront Park.

99E project ready to go

About a dozen contractors submitted bids for the McLoughlin Boulevard Improvement project and the City opened those bids June 23rd. The City was expected to select its contractor shortly thereafter, but the result was not known at the time of print.

Work on the project, which includes new sidewalks, bike lanes, turning lanes, three signalized intersections for improved pedestrian crossings and new street trees and lights between Harrison and Washington Streets, is expected to begin in early August.

The project is projected to take about 13 months to complete, and the City will be working with the contractor and the project's design team, David Evans and Associates in developing and communicating the traffic control plan. RIVERFEST set for second year

What else combines a parade, a day full of Dragon Boat Races all can participate in, Elvis and the biggest fireworks display in Clackamas County?

That's right, it's **RIVERFEST**! On July 23rd hundreds of Milwaukie residents will congregate on the banks of the Willamette at the Jefferson Street Boat Ramp to listen to live music, participate in Dragon Boat Races and to visit the array of booths that are all geared toward this

year's **RIVERFEST** fitness theme, "**Get Moving With Milwaukie.**" The event's organizer, Ed Zumwalt, said the slogan reflects all of the fast-paced changes the City will see in the next year, with the North Main Project, the McLoughlin Boulevard Project and others.

The day will get started at 10 a.m. with a parade that will wind through the City's Downtown streets. Applications

Summer is here and the forecast in Milwaukie is a very hot one — with activity that is.

The Three Bridges project has begun. When finished it will connect the Springwater Corridor Trail that now abruptly ends in Milwaukie to the west side of the trail. One of the three bridges will be a signature bridge spanning McLoughlin Boulevard welcoming folks to Milwaukie.

When this article arrives in your mailbox, Governor Kulongoski will have taken his mighty golden sledgehammer to the two remaining buildings on our Riverfront getting us another step closer to realizing our dream of developing our Milwaukie Riverfront Park. The Milwaukie Riverfront Board is expected to unveil concept drawings for Milwaukie Riverfront Park and the City will be actively seeking your ideas on what you want in your park.

August will bring us the start of the \$4.1 million dollar McLoughlin Boulevard improvement project. This will involve widening McLoughlin Boulevard, adding new sidewalks, landscaping, and much more. It will make accessing our Riverfront easier and safer. It will be a much-needed facelift for our beautiful City.

The \$15 million dollar North Main Village is set to break ground this summer on the old Safeway site in Downtown Milwaukie. It will bring 9,496 square feet of commercial/retail space. After including the additional housing, the total is 86,064 square feet of new development in downtown Milwaukie. The North Main Village also includes street improvements such as new street lighting, sidewalks, and crosswalks.

Saturday, July 23rd will bring us the **RIVERFEST**. This year, with all of the construction going on Downtown, the celebration has been cut back to a one day event. All of the crowd pleasing favorites will be back though - the popular morning parade, dragon boat races, treasure hunt, live music, and the best fireworks display you will ever see (thanks to Ed Zumwalt, known around town as "Mister Firecracker").

The City Council would love to hear from you. So remember, the second Saturday of the month we meet at the Milwaukie Public Safety Building for coffee and donuts.

Another opportunity to talk with Councilors is at the Sunday Farmers Market. The Mayor is there every Sunday. We will have information and drawings when available of all the exciting projects going on this summer.

Ballfield decision tabled

The Planning Commission was expected to make a decision regarding the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District proposal to add sports fields at North Clackamas Park at its June 14th hearing. But because the first item on the agenda lasted until nearly 10 p.m., Commission decided to table the decision until its July 12th meeting.

"The Commissioners wanted to be fresh before they took a look at the Park District's application," Associate Planner Lindsey Nesbitt said. "They recognize it as a big decision."

City wins erosion control award

Representatives from local jurisdictions have developed a regional awards program to recognize builders, developers and contractors for outstanding erosion prevention and sediment control achievements in Clackamas, Clark, Marion, Multnomah and Washington counties.

On June 10th at the annual Regional Erosion Prevention Awards program the City of Milwaukie presented awards in two categories. Joseph Hughes Construction won the Commercial Site award for the Burrito Express site at the 49th & King Road site and the Conifer Group won the Single Family Site award for their project at 40th SE Monroe St.

In all 31 awards were presented.



Water Line Project

Beginning the second week of July the City's water department will begin a water line replacement project along Lake Road between 21st Avenue and Oatfield Road.

The work includes taking out the old line, which has outlived its useful life, and will be replaced with new 8-inch pipe. Connections from properties' meters to the water main will also be replaced and additional fire hydrants will be installed to enhance fire protection.

The project is expected to take about four months and traffic will be impacted on Lake Road as well as some of the side streets included in the project. Access will never be closed, but the work will cause congestion. Finding alternate routes during the project is advised. Bus stops will also be impacted. TriMet will post information at the stops to be affected.

During work periodic water shutoffs of about 2 to 4 hours will be necessary, but notices will be posted to alert residents ahead of time. For more information please call the Water Department Supervisor Jay Saatkamp at (503) 786-7616 or City Engineer Jay Ostlund at (503) 786-7605.

North Main Update

In the first week of July the City will begin utility work on 21st Avenue and Harrison Street to prepare for the construction on the North Main Development Project to follow in August.

Engineering Director Paul Shirey said disruptions near the intersection will be brief - days, not weeks - and provisions will be made to make sure access to Ledding Library is not too dramatically impaired.

Long pointed to as one of the cornerstones of economic redevelopment for the City's Downtown core, the City will hold a ground-breaking celebration for the North Main Project either in late-July or early August. Please check the City's website and media outlets for further details!

Three Bridges project construction underway

Just as you enter Milwaukie from the north on McLoughlin Boulevard you've probably noticed the grading and shaping of the large berms located on either side of the highway.

This is a part of The Springwater Three Bridges Project and what you see there is the spot where the City's new "gateway" bridge will be installed.

Once the three bridges are in place, one will span the Union Pacific Railroad

tracks and the other Johnson Creek, the Springwater Trail will complete an uninterrupted bike and pedestrian trail linking all the way to Gresham to the east and the Portland Esplanade to the west.

Once the tops of the berms are graded, which requires waiting for the soil to dry out, the pile driving for each end of the bridges will begin.

This is expected to be in the middle of July, and it will be the loudest work of

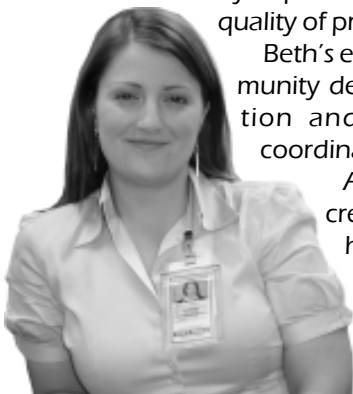
the entire project. The construction crew will be working for 3-5 days in a row, followed by some quiet spells as they relocate their equipment. This will occur intermittently over a period of roughly five weeks.

The first bridge to be installed will be the one spanning Johnson Creek and it is expected to be installed sometime in August. If you have any questions or concerns, please call (503) 786-7503.

How the process works is that a mediator will set up a meeting between you and your neighbor. The mediator will guide you and your neighbor through a dialogue, which will hopefully, allow the two of you to come to an acceptable agreement. The mediator does not find one party right or wrong.
