## Giving Much & Gaining Much



## Council adopts budget

The City Council adopted the 2015-2016 Biennium Budget at its June 17th meeting.

The budget reflects the \$4 million bond revenues approved by the voters in March that allowed the City to refinance its light rail construction debt, relieve pressure on the general fund, and preserve core City services.

## coming to town

The City of Milwaukie and American Legion Post #180 are partnering to bring the Moving Wall - a traveling replica of the Vietnam Memorial Wall in Washington DC - to town in order to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War.

The Moving Wall is a half-sized replica of the DC monument that displays the more than 58,000 American casualties of the conflict. The Wall will be open for viewing July 23<sup>rd</sup> through July 26<sup>th</sup>, 2015 on the Milwaukie High School grounds and there will be a commemoration ceremony on Sat., July 25th.

As of now, Milwaukie is the only confirmed stop of a Vietnam Memorial Wall in 2015. The City and Legion are working with community partners to organize and fundraise for the event.

July in Milwaukie provides great opportunities to get out and enjoy events such as First Friday (which in July will be on Fri., July 11th) and to wander the streets of our Downtown enjoying the many restaurants, sidewalk cafes and retail establishments. It is through this pedestrian experience we really are

able to connect to the quality of life that so many of us moved to Milwaukie for.

The City is working with our citizens to better understand how they would like to see the Downtown area evolve. This understanding will take place through the ongoing efforts of our Planning Staff and the project they are calling "Moving Forward Milwaukie." It is an opportunity for the residents of Milwaukie to let the Planning Staff know what they DO want to have happen to our Downtown ... and what they do NOT want to have happen.

So, as you stroll the Downtown imagine the year 2020. The scale of buildings, the pedestrian experience and the small town feeling. Is it still there?

The scale of buildings and the pedestrian experience are key to the quality of a downtown. As you walk, imagine "what if this 2 story building were now 4 stories tall ... or 5 stories ... or 6 stories." What would that feel like? A good example of that is found along Interstate Avenue in Portland up near North Skidmore and North Killingsworth Streets. Can you imagine what those buildings would look like along Main Street or 21st?

Now take a drive to Oregon City's recently revitalized downtown. What is the pedestrian experience there? How do the 2 and 3 story buildings feel as you walk by along their Main Street? How does it feel to walk the streets of Lake Oswego, or Sellwood along 13th Street?

The examples of what the future of Downtown Milwaukie could look and feel like from a pedestrian perspective are out there. Experience them and bring your best ideas and examples back to our Planning staff and to your elected representatives on City Council.

Let us all know what scale of buildings and pedestrian experience you want to see for your children and grandchildren in Downtown as we "Move Milwaukie Forward" ... and into the future.



## Murals get the go-ahead

Murals are a unique form of art that add character to an area and contribute to a community's identity and sense of place. At the June 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, City Council unanimously adopted code language that defines two options for permitting art murals in Milwaukie and exempting them

Effective July 3<sup>rd</sup>, Murals may be permitted as either Public Art Murals or Original Art Murals—each having different limitations and review processes.

on your building? If you would like to install an art mural that covers up to 100% of a wall face and is subject to a community review process, please contact Grady Wheeler at 503 786-7503 or wheelerg@MilwaukieOregon.gov.

If you want to limit your art mural to 40% or less of the wall through an administrative review process, you can obtain a permit through the Planning Department. Call 503 786-7630 or email planning@MilwaukieOregon.gov for application information.

## In the Works

Project Updates from Engineering Department

#### Phase II Milwaukie Riverfront Park Construction

Work is well underway and has been focused on the south end of the site to construct a parking area and the new access point to the Kellogg Treatment Plant. Between July 1<sup>st</sup> and Sept. 30<sup>th</sup>, the old Jefferson Street boat ramp will be decommissioned, the new ramp and dock will be constructed just to the north of Kellogg Creek, vegetation in and near the river will cleared, and old piles will be removed from Kellogg Creek.

#### 17th Avenue Multiuse Path

With the survey complete the City is developing baseline information to begin designing the project that will link the Trolley Trail with the Springwater Corridor. The design will be further informed by the comments gathered at a community ride that was held on May 21<sup>st</sup> to give staff and members of the biking community a first-had look at the stretch of 17<sup>th</sup> Ave. between Harrison and the Springwater Corridor. The target is to complete the design by the end of the year.

#### Monroe Street Waterline Replacement and Repaving

In July 1,400 feet of old cast iron pipe between Main Street and 28th Avenue that's susceptible to cracking and leaking will be replaced with new ductile iron pipe that is stronger and more long-lasting. After the waterline work is completed in early August, Monroe Street from McLoughlin Boulevard to Oak Street will be reconstructed by digging up the road base, rebuilding the base with cement-treated base, and then resurfacing the road with six inches of asphalt. After construction, the roadway will be restriped.



## Groundbreaking brings excitement, and cash

A crowd of more than 120 people gathered at the shore of Milwaukie Bay to witness Congressman Kurt Schrader, Milwaukie Mayor Jeremy Ferguson and other state and regional

dignitaries break ground on Phase II of Milwaukie Riverfront Park on June 6<sup>th</sup>.

Congressman Schrader and the Mayor addressed the more than 120 citizens assembled, as did a host of state and regional dignitaries. Milwaukie kids got into the act, too, wearing toy construction helmets, digging in a sand pile with toy shovels. As part of the proceedings, Jim Bernard, President of Celebrate Milwaukie Inc. and Calckamas County Commissioner, presented the Mayor with



a check for \$5,000 to support further development of the Park.

With construction now underway, the Jefferson Street Boat Ramp and access to the park are closed through the end of the year.

## A remnant of a summer spot

Upstairs at 3737 SE Adams St. next to the Permanent Wave Machine sits an encased alligator skin. The Museum artifact speaks of the time when Milwaukie was the resort town of Portland.



Where Crystal Lake Apartments and part of the Industrial Park now sits near Harrison Street was an 18-acre park "where the action was" for 30 years before the park closed in 1936 in the depths of the Great Depression.

In 1906 Otto Witte, a retired pharmacist, began Crystal Lake Park by digging a big hole for a lake. The hole quickly filled with crystal clear water

from springs beneath it, giving the park its name. The lake was stocked with 10,000 trout and Mr. Witte would charge a small fee for fishing it.

Soon the Wittes built a house, bowling alleys, swimming pools, a midway, picnic tables, indoor cooking facilities, a zoo, and a dance hall. The dance hall was so big Mr. Witte used to polish the floor by driving a Model-T into the hall and dragging bales of straw around the floor.

In the middle of the dance hall was the Milwaukie City limits boundary line. In those days Milwaukie had an ordinance declaring the proper distance, positioning, and familiarity of dance partners. Milwaukie even had a dance hall inspector who would monitor the activity.

The park was a huge success. It brought in 15,000 visitors a year, ranging from \$.05 cents to \$.25 cents for admission.

The alligator, who died of pneumonia during a cold winter at the zoo, is a simple reminder of an attraction of the past, Crystal Lake Park.

Enjoying festivities on the Fourth of July is one of summer's highlights and fireworks are synonymous with our celebration of Independence. To avoid injuries caused by fireworks:

Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities • Recognize sparklers can cause injuries •Never try to relight or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully • Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap • Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly • After fireworks complete burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket.

## Building Milwaukie

### **Community Development Projects**

#### Moving Forward Milwaukie

Since the project began in June 2013, the project team has conducted a great deal of outreach, research, and analysis. Now, that work is turning into action. During the next few weeks, the Planning Commission, Project Advisory Committee, and Council will be reviewing a draft Action and Implementation Plan (AIP) for Downtown and Central Milwaukie that will remove barriers for the types of development the community wants to see. Once Council adopts the AIP (tentatively scheduled for July), work will begin on a package of plan and code amendments for downtown and a land use and transportation plan for central Milwaukie.

#### Monroe Street Greenway Concept Project

With Council approving the necessary agreement with ODOT, the funding agency and project partner, City staff is now working with the selected consultant to finalize the project kickoff, which includes the first meeting of the Project Advisory Committee.

The project will include at least two workshops where stakeholder views and design elements will be discussed. Those interested are encouraged to contact Associate Planner Brett Kelver at 503-786-7657 or **kelverb@MilwaukieOregon.org**.

Summer has certainly arrived and with it, parks planning. Island Station spent much of our June meeting discussing the upcoming work this fall at Spring Park with North Clackamas Parks & Recreation.

For those of you new to the Neighborhood or town, Phase I of Spring Park construction created the pocket park several years ago next to the street. Phase II of construction will begin around Labor Day of this year and require temporary closure of the park. Many of us in Island Station love that more folks have been coming down to the river and bringing picnics, dogs, and families to visit Spring Park and Elk Rock Island (as we do on a daily basis!), but greater foot traffic has widened the current dirt path that runs right along a sensitive natural wetlands area. This fall's Phase II will therefore move the current path away from the wetlands over to an area that's less steep and muddy in our rainy seasons - which will be great for

visitors and residents alike. An overlook to view the river will also be constructed.

Along these same lines, there are lots of changes afoot in the parks to our north. Construction of Riverfront Park has made it unsafe to use the river trail along Kellogg Plant, so fencing has been put up on the north end of the trail. The Trolley Trail and Bluebird Avenue are good alternate routes for walkers and bikers.

We'll talk a bit more about the parks and brainstorm some upcoming Neighborhood tours (heritage trees and plants, history, food?) at our July meeting – hope to see you there! Cheers,

Our community garden has only one plot left. Gardeners are enjoying the fruits of their labor, literally, as 24 new blueberry plants have been planted. More than 25 pounds of produce each week is being donated by gardeners to neighbors who need help feeding their families. The OSU Master Gardener Program provided a grant that helped purchase compost.

During these long and warm summer days many are walking and biking through our Neighborhoods. Please watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists, remember the speed limit in almost all our Neighborhoods is only 25 mph.

Also, if you live in a two or more story home and have children living with you or likely to visit, for less than \$15 you can install window guards or wedges that could prevent falls.

A reminder to be cautious with fireworks — extinguishing them correctly in a bucket of sand or water, not using illegal fireworks and keeping a hose nearby in case of small fires. Fire pits and barbecue grills also pose dangers — keep them away from combustible materials and the side of the house.

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training is scheduled August 2<sup>nd</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup>. If you would like to be trained to help your family and neighbors following a disaster, contact *Gregg.Ramirez@clackamasfire.com*.

Last month Jean Baker retired as Neighborhood Chair but she's promised to come to meetings and keep our planners on their toes.

The Moving Forward project continues to be of concern to many in our community. There are those that are okay with 4-6 story buildings as long as they aren't near their homes, and preferably in someone else's Neighborhood. Others of us prefer 2-3 story buildings similar to what is already in the Downtown and more to scale for a small Downtown.

I recently found this description that could apply to Downtown Milwaukie:

A community of small scale structures that appear and operates like a traditional small town. It is typically composed of an assembly of smaller mixed use structures often centered on a square or other public space or gathering area, such as a body of water, transportation route or landmark building. Development to encourage pedestrian friendly, creates a sense of community and attracts people to the downtown in the same manner and using similar design concepts as historic small towns and neighborhood centers.

This is how Lake Oswego describes its downtown and what their development code promotes.
