## City sells bonds

Because of the soundness of its financial standing, the City was able to secure an even lower interest rate than it was forecasting when it sold the bonds voters approved in last May's election.

The City's interest rate with TriMet on its \$4 million light rail construction debt was at 5%,

but with the 2.86% True Interest Cost the City locked-in last month, the City will save \$587,000 over the 20-year life of the bond.

In addition to bettering the 5% interest rate of the TriMet obligation, with selling these bonds the City will pay off TriMet and alleviate the pressure of making these payments from the City's General Fund.

Thanks again to the Milwaukie voters for approving the selling of these bonds.

In April 2013 the City and Milwaukie Legion Post #180 entered a partnership to join the nationwide Department of Defense's Vietnam 50<sup>th</sup> Commemoration

program, which stipulates the City and Legion organize two commemorative events a year for the next three years. Hosting The Moving Wall next year will be the first major event.

Thousands are expected to visit the monument to pay homage, and Jerry Craig of the Legion, community members, and City staff have been meeting since last spring to plan the event, and are putting a call out for volunteers to help create an experience that honors those from Milwaukie and the nation whose names are on the monument.

There is nothing quite like a pleasant stroll from your home and through your Neighborhood.

Whether you have a destination in mind like a park, or the grocery store, or you are just out enjoying the weather and connecting with your neighbors, nothing makes a

community more livable than the ability to walk safely through its streets. As a child I was prone to wander and explore, first on foot and later on my bike. To this day it is one of my greatest pleasures.

In many parts of Milwaukie, that lovely and simple desire is, at best, uncomfortable, and at worst, downright dangerous. Most people you talk to would agree with this and most City Councilors through the years have espoused the importance of sidewalks on busy streets. Our Transportation System Plan has a long list of desperately needed sidewalk infrastructure, and yet we do not prioritize the actual building of sidewalks. "It's too expensive" we are told, "The City can't afford it." On the surface, leaving everything else exactly the same, they are right. The City runs a very tight ship financially. The question is: What are our priorities? If we truly believe that a walkable City is a more livable, vibrant, happy City, then we need to put our money where our mouth is.

Nowhere are safe streets more important than around our schools. A small group of proactive citizens have begun working with the schools to prioritize the needed infrastructure that would allow kids to walk and bike to school safely. If you would like to be involved, please contact me.

The next and most crucial step is for the City to prioritize the funds necessary to start the process of making our entire City safe and comfortable to walk through.

## Buckle up for belt blitz

With the support of state grant money Milwaukie Police will be sending out extra traffic patrols from Aug. 25<sup>th</sup> thru Sept. 7<sup>th</sup>, to tighten up seat-belt and child safety seat compliance.

Milwaukie Officers will target roadways where unbuckled accidents result in the most harm - McLoughlin Boulevard, Highway 224, Lake Road and other arterials.

Statewide crash fatality and injury rates have dropped 54% and 24% respectively since passage of the adult belt law in 1990. The law, combined with active enforcement, has resulted in a 2013 Oregon belt use rate of 98% for all occupants, placing Oregon among the top two belt-use states in the U.S.

Over one hundred city, county and state police agencies utilized safety belt overtime grants in 2013.

## City Hall kiosk unveiled

Controls, the Milwaukie Rotary Club, Celebrate Milwaukie Inc. and Bob's Red Mill, the City unveiled its new information kiosk outside City Hall on July 11<sup>th</sup>.



Mary and Linda championed the

idea to establish a place where residents could go in times of an emergency to gather response information.

The kiosk will also display information about community events, City programs and sustainability information.

## BE PREPARED

## In the Works

Project Updates from Engineering Department

#### Phase II Milwaukie Riverfront Park Construction

The in-water work to remove the old boat ramp, pilings and vegetation is on-schedule and the old parking areas have been ground down into material that will be used in the new parking areas called for as part of Phase II construction. The site is now being regraded and will be reseeded. In August the park's new entrance and parking areas at the south end of the site will be constructed in order to shift workers to the Washington Street exit at the end of the month.

#### 17th Avenue Multiuse Path

Design on the multiuse path that will link the Trolley Trail with the Springwater Corridor is underway and the project team is meeting with nearby property owners such as Waverly Golf Club and the Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery to make sure they are informed and their concerns are resolved as design is finalized. The project will create an at-grade travel lane for bikes and pedestrians on 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue between Harrison and the Springwater Corridor. The target is to complete the design by the end of the year.

#### Monroe Street Waterline Replacement and Repaving

With the installation of 1,400 feet of new, more earthquake resistant, longer-lasting ductile iron waterline pipe between Main Street and 28<sup>th</sup> Avenue wrapping up in early August, Monroe Street, between McLoughlin and Oak Street, will then be reconstructed. After construction, the roadway will be restriped temporarily.

## Climbing artifacts on display

Upstairs at 3737 SE Adams St. in the Milwaukie Museum you will find a display of rock climbing gear from the early 1970's. This is no ordinary set of climbing gear though. The gear was used by Dean Caldwell, a Milwaukie High School graduate to climb The Wall of Morning Glory or Dawn Wall, a face of El Capitan in Yosemite National Park, for the very first time.

The climb was not easy. According to the book, *Climbing in North America* by Chris Jones, Caldwell and Warren Harding started in early October, choosing a different line from those taken on earlier attempts. With 300 lbs. of gear they took 12 days to reach the level of the previous attempted climbs. A four-day storm forced them to cling on the rock face in their "bat tents."

After 20 days, 1,000 feet was left to reach the summit. No one had stayed on a climb this long. The Park Service sent out a helicopter rescue party, only to be told by Cardwell and Harding, "the rescue is unwanted, unwarranted, and will not be accepted." On the 27<sup>th</sup> day the climbers pulled themselves over the rim to a slew of television cameras. The climb was hailed as the greatest climb since Mt. Everest.

#### Moving Forward Milwaukie

For several months the project team has been meeting with the Advisory Committee, Planning Commission, and City Council to draft and finalize the Action and Implementation Plan (AIP) for downtown and central Milwaukie. Council is tentatively scheduled to adopt the AIP on August 19<sup>th</sup>. In the meantime, work has begun on a package of plan and code amendments for downtown and a land use and transportation plan for central Milwaukie. The Advisory Committee will discuss draft downtown code amendments and a land use concept for Central Milwaukie on August 13.
