Monroe Greenway project kicks-off

The project to develop a Concept Plan for Monroe Street as a Neighborhood Greenway is kicking off this month.

"Neighborhood Greenways" are low-volume, low-speed routes that provide safe connections across the City for bicyclists and pedestrians, while calming motor traffic to make the street safer for all residents and users.

A Project Advisory Committee

(PAC) has been formed to guide the work of a consultant with expertise in this kind of design. The PAC is comprised of representatives from the four NDA's along Monroe Street (Historic Milwaukie, Ardenwald, Hector Campbell, and Linwood), along with representatives of the local Bike Milwaukie group, PSAC, and the County's Ped-Bike Advisory Committee,

with technical advisors from the County Planning office, Clackamas Fire District, and City Engineering and Public Works Departments.

The first meeting of the PAC is scheduled for Weds., Sept. 3rd and will include a tour of Monroe Street from west to east.

Over the next 4 to 6 months, there will be at least two public

Milwaukie Museum showcases exhibit



Buckle up for belt blitz

With the support of state grant money Milwaukie Police will be sending out extra traffic patrols from Aug. 25th thru Sept. 7th, to tighten up seat-belt and child safety seat compliance.

Milwaukie Officers will target roadways where unbuckled accidents result in the most harm - McLoughlin Boulevard, Highway 224, Lake Road and other arterials.

Statewide crash fatality and injury rates have dropped 54% and 24% respectively since passage of the adult belt law in 1990. The law, combined with active enforcement, has resulted in a 2013 Oregon belt use rate of 98% for all occupants, placing Oregon among the top two belt-use states in the U.S.

Over one hundred city, county and state police agencies utilized safety belt overtime grants in 2013.

Phase II Milwaukie Riverfront Park Construction

In September work on the new parking lots and drive-ways at the southern portion of the site will be completed. Construction of the new restroom will begin and the piles for the new floating dock will be driven. The new boat ramp will also be installed in September, and the utility poles that run through the site will be relocated to the east next to the path along McLoughlin Boulevard. (See construction photos on the City's website.)

17th Avenue Multiuse Path

The project team is meeting with adjacent property owners to discuss potential impacts as the design progresses. The project will create an at-grade travel lane for bikes and pedestrians on 17th Avenue between Harrison and the Springwater Corridor. An Open House will be held in October to gain feedback and staff will report back to Council a draft design. The target is to complete the design by the end of the year.

Street Surface Maintenance Project - Monroe Street

The 2014 program year of the Street Surface Maintenance Program (SSMP) is reconstructing Monroe Street (from McLoughlin to Oak Street). The portion between McLoughlin and 21st Avenue will be a grind and overlay while the portion from 21st Avenue to Oak Street will be a complete reconstruction. Detours will be in place to route traffic around construction. There will be short periods where residential access will be limited. The road work is expected to be completed in September.

Utility rates on the rise

August utility bills reflected increases in the Water, Wastewater, and Stormwater rates that were passed by City Council as part its adoption of the 2015-2016 Biennium Budget. The wastewater and stormwater increases were based on expert rate analyses' taking into account capital costs, increases in personnel costs and materials and service costs. All were recommended by the City's volunteer Citizen Utility Advisory Board.

The City anticipates that utility rates will continue to rise to keep up with system maintenance, improvement and the overall increases in costs year over year. The average customer will see an increase of \$9.02 per month, or 11%.

A tree of the Pioneers at Museum

Outside the Milwaukie Museum at 3737 SE Adams St. grows a Clackamas County Heritage Tree. It is a scion of a Yellow Bellflower Apple from the Luelling and Meek Nursery of Milwaukie.

Mystery surrounds this apple tree for no one knew or remembered when it originated. "The original tree in Burlington, NJ, was large and old. There is no doubt that it was an old colonial fruit."

With each advance of civilization on our continent the Yellow Bellflower readily found a home for the apple grew up with the pioneer and grew old with the pioneer. The apple arrived in the Oregon Country by a strange mode of transportation. It fell to Henderson Luelling and William Meek of Iowa to begin a westward trek of nursery wagons with the first introduction of grafted, standard-fruit varieties into the West. It is said that one of the grafted trees was a Yellow Bellflower that reached Oregon in 1847.

The tree, purchased by Albert Kelley for his donation land claim came from the Luelling and Meek Nursery of Milwaukie.

Much has happened since the first sale of fruit trees from Luelling and Meek Nursery. The Yellow Bellflower was planted from Mexico to Canada and a few still exist.

In 1976 Larry McGraw with the Home Orchard Society and the Milwaukie Historical Society organized the planting of this Bicentennial Yellow Bellflower apple tree at the Milwaukie Museum.



Moving Forward project in high gear in September

The goal of the *Moving Forward Milwaukie* project is to remove barriers and encourage appropriate development in Milwaukie's commercial areas. In September, the *Moving Forward Milwaukie* project team will engage the Project Advisory Committee (PAC), City Council, Planning Commission and public to review plan and code changes that aim to revitalize Downtown Milwaukie.

City Council will discuss proposed financial tools to stimulate development in Downtown and Central Milwaukie at the Sept. 16th work session, and will discuss revising the downtown Public Area Requirements (PARs) to encourage investment at either the Sept. 18th or Sept. 23rd study session. *(Please check the project website under the Projects tab on the City's homepage for the most up-to-date information.)*

The Planning Commission will begin a discussion of proposed draft plan and code amendments for Downtown on Sept. 9th and 23rd. Both meetings begin at 6:30 p.m. and are held in City Hall. A public event to present proposed code changes for Downtown will be held Sept. 25th at 6 p.m. at a location to be determined. The PAC will meet Sept. 29th at the Public Safety Building at 6 p.m. to discuss the Central Milwaukie Land Use and Transportation Plan.

Four City parks get the go

The North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District and the City are moving forward with developing Master Plans for three Milwaukie parks - Balfour Park in the Ardenwald Neighborhood, Bowman and Brae in the Lake Road Neighborhood, Kronberg Park in the Island Station Neighborhood, and construction drawings for a fourth park - Wichita Park in the Linwood Neighborhood. The selected architect will work with residents in developing visions for the Master Plans, and public meetings will be held this fall.

Support The Moving Wall

Members of Milwaukie's American Legion, City staff, and volunteers met onsite at Milwaukie High School last month to begin detailed planning for hosting The Moving Wall - a half-size traveling replica of the Vietnam Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C.

The City and Legion have partnered in the national Vietnam 50th Commemoration Program, which requires the City and Legion to organize two commemorative events a year for three years. Hosting The Moving Wall in July of 2015 is the initial kick-off event. With the Wall arriving in less than a year, organizers are working to secure volunteers and financial support. 
