Mayor Parks called the Work Session to order at 4:00 p.m.

Council Present: Council President Batey and Councilors Scott Churchill, Mark Gamba, and Karin Power

Staff Present: City Manager Bill Monahan, City Recorder Pat DuVal, Assistant to the City Manager Mitch Nieman, Community Development Director Alma Flores, Light Rail Construction Manager Stacy Bluhm, Planning Directory Denny Egner, and Engineering Director Jason Rice

City Manager's Report

Mr. Monahan reviewed the Work and Regular Session agendas and commented on the departure of Stacy Bluhm, the City's Portland-Milwaukie Light Rail (PMLR) Construction Manager. He reviewed the upcoming Council goal updates and noted that Council was scheduled to discuss the Parklet Program in July. He reported that there was no follow-up information from the last Regular Session Audience Participation.

The group discussed the June 15, 2015, Special Meeting to discuss wildlife management issues at Riverfront Park. They commented on the meeting format and expected outcomes, and it was suggested that the Milwaukie Park and Recreation Board (PARB), Milwaukie Riverfront Task Force (RTF), and wildlife experts be invited.

Community Development Update

Ms. Flores reported on the submission of a Metro Construction Excise Tax (CET) grant.

Mr. Rice reviewed items on the Riverfront Park Phase II construction punch-list and he noted his work with the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) for grant funding. He reported that the bid for the Railroad Avenue paving project was out and was tentatively scheduled for Council to approve the contract award in July.

The group discussed Riverfront Park boat ramp dock signage and allowed uses, the kayak launching area, and park rules enforcement issues.

Mr. Egner reviewed ongoing project open houses and noted an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with Portland State University (PSU) for a student fellowship. He discussed the timing of preparing an IGA for the 19th Avenue Woonerf project.

The group discussed the designation of 19th Avenue as Woonerf project and the possibility of designating other streets as Woonerf projects. **Mr. Egner** noted that staff would continue to develop the Woonerf project in consultation with the State.

Council President Batey and Mayor Parks reported that a car sharing company was interested in locating cars near the light rail station in Milwaukie, and **Councilor Power** suggested that Council schedule a discussion about the sharing economy.

Mr. Monahan noted that a discussion about the sharing economy would be scheduled for the July Study Session, and he reviewed the remaining Work Session agenda items.

Wichita Center for Family and Community

Kristin Kinnie, the North Clackamas School District (NCS D) Homelessness Coordinator and the Wichita Center Site Coordinator, provided a report on poverty and homelessness in the NCS D and shelters and services available in Clackamas County.

The group discussed the lack of resources for homeless families in Clackamas County.

Ms. Kinnie reviewed programs offered at the Family Support Center at Wichita Center, and she provided information on how the community can support the programs.

Councilor Gamba asked what the City could do to support the Center, and **Ms. Kinnie** responded by noting the Center's need for staffing and funding.

Council President Batey and **Ms. Kinnie** discussed how the NCS D works with the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District (NCPRD) and the Annie Ross House.

Councilors Power and Gamba noted the need for future Council discussion of homelessness in Milwaukie.

Mayor Parks and **Ms. Kinnie** discussed how the public can support the food and supply support programs run by the North Clackamas Educational Foundation (NCEF).

Mr. Monahan and **Mayor Parks** discussed the Work Session agenda and agreed to move the Light Rail Station Triangle Site Alternatives to after the Regular Session.

TriMet SE Bus Service Enhancement

Vanessa Vissar, with TriMet's Planning and Policy Department, and **Kerry Ayers Palanuk**, TriMet's Service Planning Manager, introduced themselves, and **Ms. Vissar** described TriMet's long-range planning review for the Southeast Service Enhancement Plan (SEP) area which includes Milwaukie. She noted the ongoing community outreach effort and summarized the areas reported to need increased bus service in Milwaukie.

Councilor Churchill and **Council President Batey** noted TriMet's previous discussions with Council, and **Ms. Ayers Palanuk** explained that the SEP was a visioning process to identify what transportation service should look like.

Councilor Gamba noted the need for more east-west service across the Willamette River, and **Ms. Vissar** reported that one proposal would revise the Line 33 route to go from Washington Square across the Sellwood Bridge to the Clackamas Town Center.

Council President Batey and **Ms. Ayers Palanuk** noted the changes to the Line 99 route to downtown Portland that will be start in September 2015.

Ms. Ayers Palanuk noted the increased number of trips planned for bus routes in and around the City of Milwaukie, including on Lines 28, 31, and 33.

Ms. Vissar reported the next steps for the service vision process, and she noted that the Southeast SEP is scheduled to be finalized during the winter of 2015-2016.

Mayor Parks asked if there would be additional opportunities for Council or the public to provide input on the SEP. **Ms. Vissar** replied that TriMet would be communicating directly with local governments and commuters outside of public meetings, and she noted the online input tools available through www.trimet.org.

Mayor Parks recessed the Work Session at 5:47 p.m. and reconvened the Work Session following the adjournment of the Regular Session at 9:56 p.m.

Light Rail Station Triangle Site Alternatives

Mr. Monahan noted that the topic was a continuation of a previous Council discussion regarding the 8,000 square-foot lot next to the Main Street Light Rail Station, known as the Triangle Site. He reviewed the lack of developer interest in the site, and he

discussed a draft IGA that would allow the City to purchase the property from TriMet. He noted TriMet's requests that the transaction be completed by July 1, 2015, that the City maintain the site, make an effort to budget funds to purchase the site, and that the City pursue an active tenant as soon as possible. He reported that City staff had concluded the site, in a gravel state, would be suitable to host food carts by September 12, 2015, for the Grand Opening of the Orange Line. He asked for Council input on the proposed IGA so that staff could begin to work with TriMet to complete the transaction.

Councilor Gamba expressed his support for the IGA.

Councilor Churchill and **Mr. Monahan** remarked on the site lot lines and boundaries.

Mr. Monahan summarized that the City would actively work to take possession of the property and try to get vendors on-site for the Orange Line Grand Opening.

Councilor Churchill asked if there were any known environmental reports on the site, and **Mr. Monahan** reported the transaction was on an as-is basis and that staff would request those types of reports in the negotiations to come.

Council President Batey commented on the popularity of food carts at the Triangle Site with Milwaukie High School (MHS) students.

It was moved by Council President Batey and seconded by Councilor Churchill to adjourn the Work Session. Motion passed with the following vote: Councilors Churchill, Batey, Gamba, and Power and Mayor Parks voting "aye." [5:0]

Mayor Parks adjourned the Work Session at 10:06 p.m.

TriMet's Service Enhancement Plans

At TriMet, we're taking a new look at how transit service can be improved to better serve the Portland metro region. Through 2014 and into 2015, we'll be asking riders, residents, neighborhood groups, local jurisdictions, schools and businesses for feedback to help create a shared vision for the future of transit.

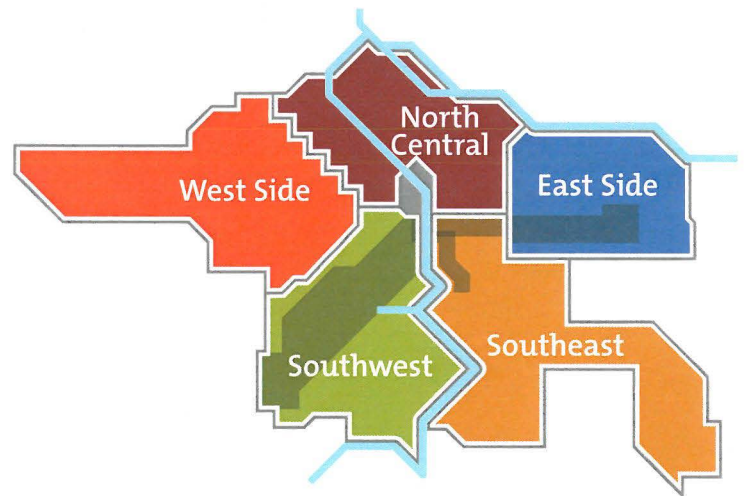
Why create Service Enhancement Plans?

It's been over a decade since we took a comprehensive look at our network of bus services. Changing demographics and increasing population and employment have changed how people need to connect to jobs and services. Now, it's time to work together to create a new, shared vision for how transit can best serve our region.

Process

We have divided our region into five areas: Westside, Southwest, Southeast, Eastside and North/Central. We're conducting a separate planning process within each of the areas.

During the process, we take a look at existing ridership patterns and projected land use changes within each area, and we conduct outreach with communities to learn about desired improvements. We want to hear from as many people as possible, so you'll see us attending neighborhood association and community group meetings, talking one-on-one with employers and institutions, conducting surveys, and attending events throughout the region.



Outcomes

Each Service Enhancement Plan will create a shared vision for what transit could become. Specifically, each will identify:

- near-term bus service improvements that can be made soon with modest cost
- long-term bus service improvements to implement over time
- partnerships with cities, the county and businesses to improve access to bus and light rail stops

Timeline

The vision for Westside was completed in 2014. Work in the other areas is now under way.

- **Westside:** Completed in 2014
- **Southwest:** Ongoing through 2014
- **Southeast:** 2014-2015
- **Eastside:** 2014-2015
- **North/Central:** 2014-2016

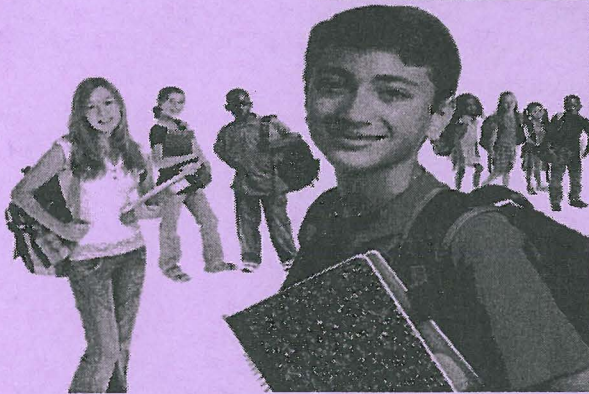

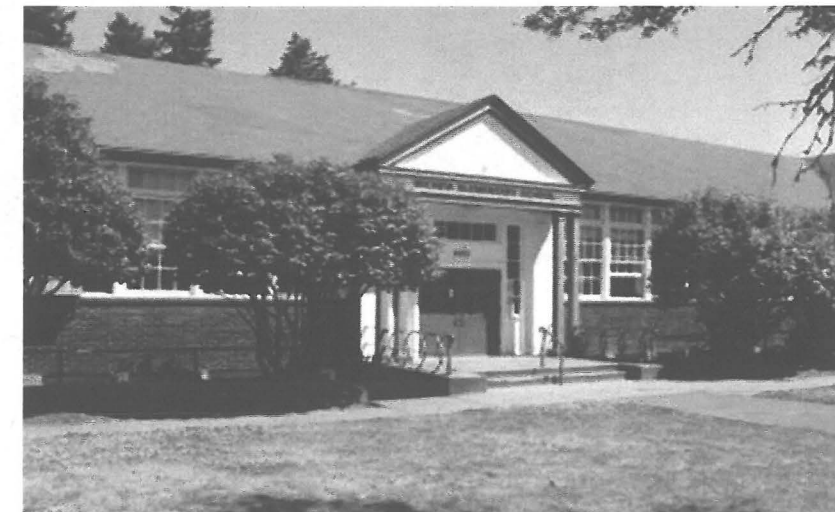
WIC provides services such as nutrition education, supplemental food, breast feeding support and referrals.

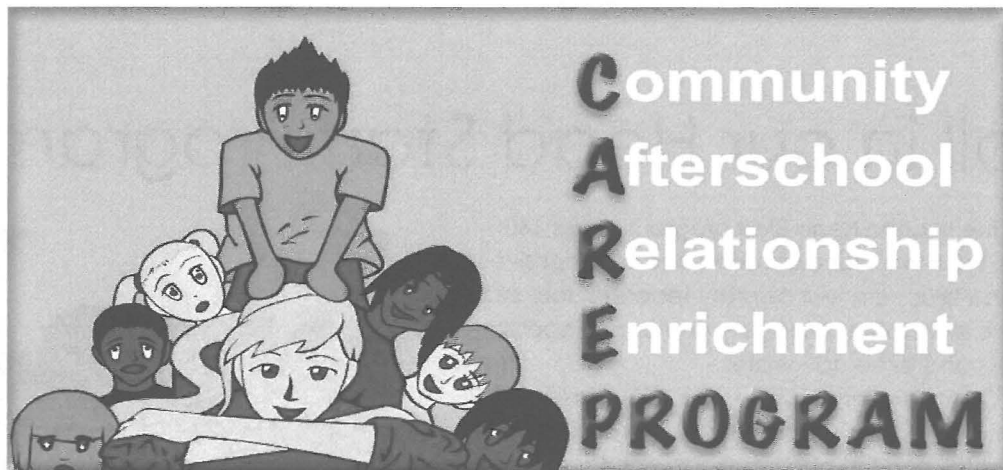
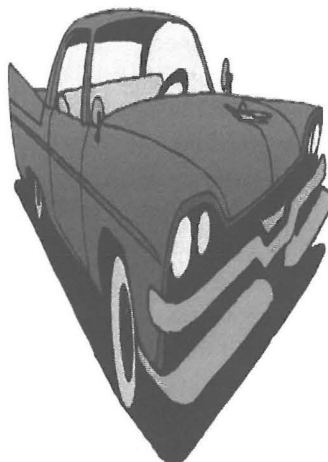

Research shows that students learn better when they are healthy. Our district's Dental Health Solutions for Children program is a grant-funded program that serves students across the North Clackamas School District with a primary focus on elementary school children in Title 1 high-poverty schools.

Some of our families lack dental insurance or regular access to care. Our program's dental wellness coordinators help family access dental care for their children by scheduling school-based services that include dental screenings and mobile dental van visits.

The State of Oregon also offers two programs for our Title 1 elementary school students to help our students have healthy teeth. Those are Dental Sealants that are applied to molars providing many years of decay protection, and daily fluoride offered as a daily mouth rinse.

Lunch Buddy Celebration

No action required. TriMet staff will provide an overview of the SE Service Enhancement Plan process.

HISTORY OF PRIOR ACTIONS AND DISCUSSIONS

There have been no prior actions or meetings on the SE Service Enhancement Plan. On June 3 and October 7, 2014, and on January 6, 2015, TriMet staff updated the Council about plans to change bus routes to better coordinate TriMet bus service with the Portland-Milwaukie Light Rail (PMLR) Main Street station. The SE Enhancement Plan is a separate project aimed at enhancing bus service throughout the southeast portion of the Portland region.

BACKGROUND

Late in 2014, TriMet began the process of conducting outreach and data collection for preparation of the SE Service Enhancement Plan. The enhancement plan is intended to outline priorities for improving bus service, bus stops and street crossings in the communities of Milwaukie, Happy Valley, Gladstone, Oregon City, Southeast Portland (generally south of Division Street), Estacada, and unincorporated urban Clackamas County. As part of the Southeast Service Enhancement Plan, TriMet has held a series of conversations and surveys to gather feedback from riders, community groups, businesses and other stakeholders. The meeting with the Milwaukie City Council on June 2 is an opportunity for TriMet staff to update the Council on what they have heard so far in the process.

TriMet is expected to release a draft vision for service enhancement within the next month. Public feedback on the vision will occur through the summer and development of a refined vision is expected in the fall. A final version is expected before the end of the year.
