PROCLAMATION

- **Whereas**, Congenital heart defects are the most frequently occurring birth defect and the leading cause of birth defect related deaths worldwide; and
- **Whereas**, Over a million families across America are facing the challenges and hardships of raising children with congenital heart defects; and
- **Whereas**, Every year 40,000 babies are born in the United States with congenital heart defects; and
- **Whereas**, Some congenital heart defects are not diagnosed until months or years after birth; and

Resolution No. 13-02, Submitting a Measure Amending Section 58 of the Oregon City Charter Regarding Water Rates to the Electors of Oregon City

RECOMMENDED ACTION (Motion):

Adopt Resolution No. 13-02 that submits a measure amending Section 58 of the Oregon City Charter regarding water rates to the electors of Oregon City.

BACKGROUND:

In May 1996, voters approved a City Charter amendment that returned water rates to 1994 levels with provisions that allowed a 3 percent annual increase and required voter approval for any higher increase even in a water emergency.

Section 58 of the City Charter states:

"Upon passage of this amendment to the City Charter city water rates shall be those in effect as of October 31, 1994. The commission may not increase water rates by more than 3 percent annually without a vote of the people. The commission may not declare any ordinance or resolution establishing water rates to be an emergency nor use any other means to prevent their referral to the voters."

After this City Charter amendment was approved by Oregon City voters, Court proceedings occurred because the City's bond holders claimed that the water rates in effect as of October 31, 1994 would not be sufficient to provide contractual coverage for bonded debt. The court results have been interpreted to mean that when our water bonds are paid off in October 2014, the charter amendment provisions will prevail and in October 2014 the water rates will roll back to those in effect as of October 31, 1994 with the allowance of a 3 percent annual increase each year from 1994.

In January 2012, the City Commission adopted the Water System Master Plan. The plan recommended a Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and an annual capital reinvestment program for the existing water system. The plan also provided preliminary rate forecasts to implement the recommended CIP and annual system reinvestment.

In April 2012, a presentation was given to the City Commission at their work session for discussion about the water rate rollback, the approach and process to address the City Charter amendment issue, and the next steps to meet City Commission's 2012 goals to

"Maintain fiscal health and long-term stability" and "Address critical facility needs".

In May 2012, the City executed a contract with Financial Consulting Solutions (FCS) Group to provide financial services including services to prepare a comprehensive Water Rate Study. FCS Group initiated the rate study process in June 2012. In July 2012, the City executed a contract with Barney & Worth (B&W) to provide services for public outreach support during the water rate study.

In August 2012, a citizen based Water Rate Advisory Work Group (WRAWG) was formed. The advisory group, City staff, FCS Group and B&W conducted three meetings together and discussed the water rate issues, 1996 City Charter Amendment, and scenarios for a new City Charter Amendment. During the third meeting on October 30, 2012, the group provided their advice about what the City Commission should do about the 1996 City Charter Amendment and future water rates.

In October 2012, DHM Research, conducted public opinion polls through a telephone poll and online water survey. A report has been prepared with the findings of this research and will be presented to the City Commission.

In November 2012, City staff presented their recommendation of no rollback and an 8% annual water rate cap to the City Commission to provide a solution for impacts of the 1996 City Charter Amendment on future water rates and the revenue stability needed to sustain the existing water system. Following discussion, the City Commission gave direction to staff to provide scenarios for annual water rate changes between 5% and 8%. In December 2012, City staff presented two more water rate scenarios for 6% and 7% annual water rate caps.

Staff's recommendation is adoption of a resolution that submits a measure amending Section 58 of the Oregon City Charter regarding water rates to the electors of Oregon City. The proposed amendment would eliminate the rollback entirely and require an annual rate increase of between 3 percent and 8 percent.

WE ALL COUNT ON DRINKING WATER

Every day Oregon City residents turn on their taps and get safe, clean water. Water is available 24 hours a day—year round—for drinking, fire protection, showers, cooking, and keeping gardens green. Water is also vital to business and industry and indispensable to the local economy and jobs.

Most of us take clean water for granted. We don't often think about what we can't see—the infrastructure that delivers water: water pipe lines, pumps, and storage reservoirs. For less than pennies a gallon, this system transports water directly to our homes and businesses.

Oregon City source of high quality water supply is from the lower Clackamas River.

OREGON CITY'S HISTORY OF DRINKING WATER STEWARDSHIP

Oregon City's rich history goes back to a time before Oregon was a state. Our water system has some of the oldest pipes in the state still in service. Prior to 1915, Oregon City's drinking water was from the Willamette River. After a typhoid outbreak, Oregon City moved the drinking water source to the South Fork of the Clackamas River in partnership with West Linn.

In the 1950s the pipeline from the South Fork could no longer deliver enough water for the growing cities. Voters approved a new water treatment plant on the lower Clackamas River as a better long-term solution. The treatment plant began operation in 1958.

OREGON CITY'S WATER RATES REMAIN COMPARABLE TO PEER CITIES

Customers' monthly water rates pay for ongoing operations and maintenance of the water system, as well as large capital improvements. Oregon City's average residential monthly water rates are comparable to peer communities.

PLANNING FOR A RELIABLE WATER FUTURE

Replacing Aging Water Pipes

Many of Oregon City's aging pipes are nearing the end of their useful life and need replacement. There are 154 miles of water pipes; some pipes are over 100 years old.

Old-aged pipes corrode, creating discolored water that is safe to drink but does not appear clean. Corrosion also reduces the amount of water that can flow through the pipe, limiting fire fighting capacity. Corroded pipes are prone to break, causing localized water outages and property damage.

Proactively replacing old pipes prevents costly emergency repairs and improves water quality. Another

improves fire protection.

Oregon City's pipe replacement

program protects water quality and

benefit: smaller pipes are replaced with larger sized ones, improving fire flow.



To stay ahead of pipe failures, the 2012 Water Master Plan recommends replacing two miles of pipe every year at a cost of about \$2.3 million annually.



Oregon City has a long history of investing in water system reliability; however, in May 1996, voters concerned about rising water rates approved a city charter amendment that returned water rates to 1994 levels. The City Commission's authority to increase water rates was limited to no more than 3% per year, no matter what system repairs, maintenance, or improvements were

needed. Any higher increase would require voter approval—even in a water emergency.

The water rate rollback did not go into effect right away. The City had already borrowed money to pay for water system projects and was obligated to pay back those loans. In 2014, the loans will be repaid and rate rollback provisions are set to take effect. Under the charter, Oregon City water rates will return to near-1994 levels.

City leaders are concerned the 20-year old water rates will no longer raise enough money to operate the water system, threatening the City's ability to provide reliable drinking water service to the community.

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH **OREGON CITY'S WATER SYSTEM?**

1. Failing Old-Aged Water Pipes

Many of Oregon City's aging pipes are at the end of their useful life and need replacement. There are 154 miles of water pipes; some pipes are over 100 years old.

2. Loss of Revenue to Fix the Problem

A 1996 City Charter amendment enacted

by Oregon City voters requires the City (in 2014) to rollback water rates to near-1994 levels. The Charter also restricts water rate increases to no more than 3% per year—even if there is a water emergency.

The 20-year old water rates will not support the needed operations and maintenance of Oregon City's water system nor will it support replacement of old-aged water pipes.

Clean and reliable water is essential to public health, safety, and a strong economy.







WHAT'S THE SOLUTION?

The Commission is considering a new City Charter Amendment to support replacement of old-aged water pipes and support responsible funding of Oregon City's water system.

New City Charter Amendment

The City Charter amendment would remove the water rate rollback provision, retain a cap on annual water rate increases, and provide for small, steady water rate increases of \$2 to \$3 for the average household monthly water bill. The amendment would allow Oregon City to:

- Adequately fund water system needs;
- Retain accountability to ratepayers;
- Provide for predictable rate increases; and
- Yield enough money to pay for water projects and routine system operations and maintenance.

Police Department: ODOT eTicket Grant

RECOMMENDED ACTION (Motion):

Staff recommends the City Commission approve the purchase of the eTicket program for the Police Department pursuant to the requirements of the ODOT grant.

BACKGROUND:

The Police Department was just awarded a grant by the Oregon Department of Transportation for approximately \$74,472.63. ODOT is dispersing money from a Federal Grant for traffic safety. The goal of this grant is to provide money to improve traffic safety by updating law enforcement agencies use of technology. By helping agencies purchase eTicket systems, their hope is to enable officers to spend less time doing paperwork and more time enforcing traffic laws. There was no choice on our part of how the money was to be spent; it was specifically to start an eTicket program. The Oregon State Police, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, and several other agencies in the state have moved to eTicket systems; many more are in the process of transition.

When an officer writes a citation, the written document is in triplicate (actually quadruplicate) and is given to the records department. One copy is sent to the municipal court and the other copies are kept by the police records unit. RECOMMENDED ACTION (Motion):

Staff recommends the City Commission approve the purchase of the eTicket program for the Police Department pursuant to the requirements of the ODOT grant.

BACKGROUND:

The Police Department was just awarded a grant by the Oregon Department of Transportation for approximately \$74,472.63. ODOT is dispersing money from a Federal Grant for traffic safety. The goal of this grant is to provide money to improve traffic safety by updating law enforcement agencies use of technology. By helping agencies purchase eTicket systems, their hope is to enable officers to spend less time doing paperwork and more time enforcing traffic laws. There was no choice on our part of how the money was to be spent; it was specifically to start an eTicket program. The Oregon State Police, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, and several other agencies in the state have moved to eTicket systems; many more are in the process of transition.

When an officer writes a citation, the written document is in triplicate (actually quadruplicate) and is given to the records department. One copy is sent to the municipal court and the other copies are kept by the police records unit. Police Records personnel spend about 10 hours per week entering information from the document into the computer. Court personnel spend about 10 hours per week entering the same information into another computer. With coming changes to traffic enforcement, these hours would increase considerably.

On December 5, 2012 an error was identified that resulted in the initial tiered rates and the February 1, 2011 increases to not be implemented correctly, resulting in the under collection of the Transportation System Development charges on certain residential building permits. A review of the residential permits identified 172 permits that had been issued a certificate of occupancy and were undercharged a total of \$495,337. In addition, 85 permits that had been issued permits for construction, but not the final certificate of occupancy, were undercharged a total of \$302,896.

Proposed Ordinance No. 13-1004 would amend the Oregon City Municipal Code to create an Undercharged Transportation System Development Charge Repayment Program which would require that the undercharged fee for the 85 active permits be paid or that the applicant enter into a long-term repayment plan prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy. The program would allow an impacted applicant to either pay the outstanding balance due with a 20% reduction or enter into a long-term repayment agreement for the total amount due. If the applicant chooses the long-term payment option, the City will charge a 0% interest rate on the principal for the first 24 months. Date: January 31, 2013

Staff has proposed the emergency adoption of Ordinance Number 13-1004, which will amend the Oregon City Municipal Code to allow for the creation of a repayment program for the collection of undercharged transportation system development charges.

On April 1, 2009 the City Commission adopted Resolution 09-02, which created a new methodology, project list, amounts for the City's transportation system development charges (TSDC), effective dates and annual adjustments. Resolution 09-02 (attachment 1) established the TSDC rates and created three rate categories that were based on when a lot was created and when the building permit for that lot was submitted. The category 1 TSDC was initially set at \$3,500.00 and was to increase to \$7,000 (plus annual inflation adjustments) on February 1, 2011. The category 2 TSDC was initially set at \$2,168 and was to increase to \$7,000 (plus annual inflation adjustments) on February 1, 2011. The category 3 TSDC was initially set to \$2,168 and was to increase to \$7,000 (plus annual inflation adjustments) on February 1, 2013. The initial tiered TSDC rates and the February 1, 2011 increases were not implemented correctly, resulting in the under collection of the TSDC on residential building permits.

Staff reviewed all of the residential building permits that were applied for between April 1, 2009 and December 5, 2012, which is the date that the error was identified and corrected. The review identified 172 permits that had been issued a certificate of occupancy and were undercharged a total of \$495,337. In addition, 85 permits that had been issued permits for construction, but not the final certificate of occupancy, were undercharged a total of \$302,896.

Proposed Ordinance No. 13-1004 amends the Oregon City Municipal Code to create an Undercharged Transportation System Development Charge Repayment Program. Adoption of the proposed ordinance would require that undercharged TSDC for active permits, the 85 permits for which a certificate of occupancy has not been issued, would be collected. The program would required that prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy, the applicant that was undercharged the TSDC shall either pay the outstanding balance due with a 20% reduction or enter into a long-term repayment agreement for the total amount due. If the applicant chooses the longterm repayment option, the City will charge a 0% interest rate on the principal for the first 24

months, after which the standard rate will apply. These payment options would be applicable and available to all impacted applicants, whether they have paid in full or not.

Applicants that were undercharged TSDC are eligible for a 1-year program that would allow for the standard deferral of future System Development Charges (SDC), but with an interest rate of 2% for the first year of the deferral, after which the standard interest rate would apply. In order to be eligible for the program, the applicant shall be current on all undercharged TSDC payments per the long-term repayment agreement or shall have paid in full the outstanding balance with the 20% reduction.

Adoption of this Ordinance would codify the City's decision to not collect the \$495,337 that was undercharged on permits for which the certificate of occupancy had been issued prior to December 5, 2012.

Staff worked with the impacted applicants to reach an agreement on the repayment program. 11 of the 16 impacted applicants have signed a settlement agreement, indicating that the repayment program as proposed in Ordinance 13-1004 is acceptable and that they will release the City of all claims arising from the assessment of the undercharged TSDC upon adoption of the ordinance (attachment 2). All impacted applicants, whether they have signed the settlement agreement or not, are eligible for the repayment options and programs proposed in this ordinance.

In response to the undercharged TSDC, additional administrative actions have been implemented to address the errors that have occurred, including: individual fee audits, a multiple verification process for SDC calculations, system approval process for changes to the electronic permit system and reporting of the status of deferred SDCs. The Oregon City Human Resources Department is conducting a pre-disciplinary investigation, which will be followed by the appropriate disciplinary action for affected employees.

A RESOLUTION REPEALING RESOLUTION 97-56, ADOPTING A METHODOLOGY, PROJECT LISTS, AND AMOUNTS FOR THE CITY'S TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CHARGE AND ESTABLISHING EFFECTIVE DATES

WHEREAS, state law (ORS 223) authorizes the City to charge new development for full new growth impact costs to infrastructure;

WHEREAS, City code, Chapter 13.20 (System Development Charge (SDC) for Capital Improvements) implements the statutory authority to impose SDCs on new development and specifically authorizes the City Commission to adopt and modify the amount of the charges and the amount of the charges and the methodology upon which such charges are based; and

WHEREAS, the City's Transportation SDC (TSDC) was last amended in 1997 through Resolution No. 97-56; and

WHEREAS, the costs estimated to accommodate the impacts of new development on the Oregon City transportation system in 2009 exceed the funding potential derived from the previous TSDC calculation; and

WHEREAS, the City has updated Transportation System Plan Capital Improvement Plan (TSP CIP) roadway and bicycle/pedestrian project lists for use in calculating the updated TSDC; and

WHEREAS, the City has updated the TSDC methodology and calculated a new amount in accordance with Oregon Revised Statutes 223.297-315 and Oregon City Municipal Code 13.20; and

WHEREAS, the results of the updated TSP CIP project lists, TSDC methodology, and calculated amount are documented in the attached March 2009 report prepared by FCS Group, Exhibit 1, adopted and incorporated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission that:

Section 1 - Action

- A. Resolution 97-56, enacted on November 19, 1997, is hereby repealed in its entirety and its directions are replaced by this Resolution No. 09-02.
- B. A new TSDC methodology and charge per pm peak hour trip and charge per bike/ped trip are adopted based on the transportation system improvements, trip projections, calculations, and conclusions presented in the FCS Group report (Exhibit 1).

Section 2 - TSDC Details

A. The new TSDC has two components and is hereby adopted and made applicable to all new development within the city limits of Oregon City.

Component 1: Roadway Improvements Project List = \$7,000 per peak hour trip. For outright uses within the Mixed Use Downtown zone and along the 7th Street and Molalla Avenue Corridor, a ten percent reduction will be used for residential development and the lesser of the Shopping Center trip generation rate or the non-residential development's estimated trip generation rate will be used.

Component 2: Bicycle/Pedestrian Improvements Project List = \$202.51 per bike/ped trip

- B. Each cost component for individual developments will be calculated based on peak hour trip generation (Roadway Improvements Project List) and trip generation groups (Bike/Ped Improvements Project List) for the land use and the development size. See Exhibit 1 for these trip generation factors for representative land uses.
- C. The City Engineer may use alternative data when, in the City Engineer's opinion, the alternative data are more reliable and realistic for a particular development than are the trip factors set forth in Exhibit 1.

Section 3 - Effective Dates and Annual Adjustment

- A. Component 1 for the Roadway Improvements Project List described in Section 2 above applies to future development and building permit applications and shall be implemented in two equal increments as follows: Effective 30 days after Resolution No. 09-02 adoption: \$3500 per peak hour trip. Effective February 1, 2011: \$7,000 per peak hour trip (plus annual adjustment as described in Section 3E below).
- B. Component 2 for the Bike/Ped Improvements Project List described in Section 2 above applies to future development and building permit applications and shall become effective 30 days after Resolution No. 09-02 adoption.
- C. For lots or parcels lawfully created prior to adoption of this resolution and situated in a residential zone, the former TSDC defined by Resolution No. 97-56 shall increase by a factor of 1.15 effective 30 days after Resolution No. 09-02 adoption. Component 1 with appropriate annual adjustment shall become effective on February 1, 2011.
- D. For lots or parcels in a residential zone approved by a land use or limited land use decision prior to adoption of this resolution, the former TSDC defined by Resolution No. 97-56 shall increase by a factor of 1.15 effective 30 days after Resolution No. 09-02 adoption. Component 1 shall become effective February 1, 2013. Anytime after February 1, 2011, the City Commission may review the status of the construction market and consider an earlier Component 1 effective date.
- E. All TSDCs described above shall be annually adjusted on January 1 based on the Seattle Engineering News Record (ENR) Construction Cost Index (CCI).

AGREEMENT REGARDING SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT CHARGES

This Agreement and Mutual Release ("Agreement") is entered into by and between _____ ("Developer"), on the one hand, and the City of Oregon City (the "City"), on the other hand.

RECITALS

- A. On April 1st, 2009, The City adopted Resolution No.09-02, which imposed a Transportation System Development Charge ("TSDC") on all development in the City pursuant to OCMC Chapter 13.20 and ORS 223.297 et seq.
- B. The Developer has received a building permit(s) to construct residential development within the City (the Permit"), but had not received a final certificate of occupancy for that development prior to December 5th, 2012.
- C. When Developer obtained the Permit, Developer also paid to the City an amount of money for the TSDC as stated by the City; however, the amount of money paid to the City for the TSDC was not consistent with the TSDC adopted in Resolution No. 09-02 and was significantly less than what was required by Resolution No. 09-02 (the "Outstanding Balance").
- D. All parties hereto are desirous of settling fully and completely their present and potential disputes regarding the TSDC.

AGREEMENT

The parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Developer agrees, that should the City Commission amend its municipal code as described in paragraph 2 below, Developer shall enter into one of the options provided by the City and upon the amendment of the code, all claims, demands, rights of action, causes of action, charges, complaints, hearings, damages, costs, expenses, judgments, liabilities, proceedings or suits, whether known or unknown, liquidated, matured or unmatured, arising from the assessment of systems development charges on the Permit are released.
- 2. The City Commission shall consider enacting a City regulation that will allow the Developer to pay the TSDC through one of the following options:
- a. Pay the outstanding balance of the TSDC as set forth in Resolution No. 09-02 prior to receiving a certificate of occupancy. If a developer chooses this option, the Outstanding Balance shall be reduced by 20%.
- b. Enter into an agreement with the City for long term repayment of the entire Outstanding Balance of the TSDC (a "Long-Term Agreement"). The Long-Term Agreement will include an initial interest rate of 0% for the first 24 months.
- c. Applicants or developers who were undercharged TSDC are eligible for a long-term SDC deferral interest rate of 2% for the first 12 months for future development projects occurring within the City that are subject to SDC assessments. After 12 months, the standard legal

rate will apply. This program will be in effect for one year from the effective date of this ordinance and, in order for an applicant or developer to be eligible for the deferral interest rate, they shall be current on all undercharged SDC payments or shall have paid the Outstanding Balance due.

- d. The repayment programs and options shall be available to all applicants and developers that were subject to a TSDC undercharge regardless if the applicant or developer has paid in full or not on the effective date of the ordinance.
- e. In cases where a Certificate of Occupancy permit had been issued prior to December 5, 2012, the City will not seek payment of the undercharged TSDC.
- 3. Should the City Commission not adopt regulations authorizing the repayment programs identified in paragraph 2 within six months of the date of this Agreement, this Agreement shall have no further force and effect.
- 4. This Agreement does not constitute a statutory development agreement under ORS Chapter 92, nor does it create an agency, partnership, or joint venture between the parties.
- 5. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, representatives, successors and assigns of each of the parties hereto.
- 6. If any action shall be instituted to modify, amend, interpret or enforce the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees, including attorney fees on appeal, together with such other relief as a court may deem proper.
- 7. Any legal action between the parties regarding the Agreement shall be brought in Clackamas County Circuit Court and shall be based upon the laws of Oregon.

Commission Position No. 3: Carol Pauli

Laraine McNiece, Municipal Judge, swore in Carol Pauli as City Commissioner.

Commissioner Pauli thanked the citizens, her family, and friends for their support.

2b. 13-030 Legislative Reports Presentation - Chris Fick, League of Oregon Cities

Chris Fick, League of Oregon Cities, presented a report on the top two League legislative priorities regarding property tax reform. The League was requesting two measures to be placed on the ballot. One would modify Measure 5. He explained the compression caused by Measure 5 and the losses for cities, schools, and counties. The three major problems of compression were that it undermined local control, created spillover effects, and some people did not pay for the voter-approved taxes. The proposed solution was a voter control referral. The second measure would modify Measure 50. He explained the iniquities between real market value and assessed value that Measure 50 created. The proposed solution was a reset of a property's assessed value to real market value at the time of sale or construction.

3. Future Agenda Items

Commissioner Roth asked for an update on the railroad bridge between Oregon City and Gladstone.

4. Discussion Items

4a. 13-047 Recognition of Neighborhood Associations in the City of Oregon City

Nancy Ide, City Recorder, gave a background on this item. The City recognized neighborhood associations by resolution. She explained the purpose of the neighborhood associations was for assistance to the City, but they remained autonomous in nature. Because of their independence, the City's insurance company did not allow the associations to be added to the City's insurance policy.

Bill Kabeiseman, City Attorney, explained the position of the City's insurance carrier. This was a policy question for the Commission, did they want neighborhood associations to be considered part of the City or not. Factors to consider were the cost, independence of the associations, and encouraging people to serve.

There was discussion regarding what the insurance would cover.

Ms. Ide said in order to be covered under the City's insurance, the associations would have to become an instrumentality of the City, but that would not allow them to remain autonomous. Regarding the cost for directors and officers, it would be \$850 per year for a million dollar policy, and if general events were included, the annual cost was \$500.

Mayor Neeley suggested adding to each association's budget the money to pay for their own liability insurance.

Bob La Salle, resident of Oregon City, said another idea was setting up the associations as non-profits or have money budgeted that if something happened, there would be additional funds for attorney fees. He encouraged the Commission to think outside the box to come up with a solution.

There was discussion regarding the chart with the comparisons to other cities. No other city except Milwaukie provided insurance to neighborhood associations.

Paul Edgar, resident of Oregon City, thought the neighborhoods needed to be empowered to express their wants and desires for how the budget was spent and what the priorities were. He thought the associations should remain independent, but the Commission should solicit more communication.

The consensus of the Commission was to get input from the CIC and neighborhood associations on the option of the City giving additional funds for the associations to provide their own insurance. There was also consensus to keep the associations autonomous. A copy of the current neighborhood agreements should be sent to the officers of each association.

5. City Manager's Report

Wyatt Parno, Finance Director, introduced Mireya Mcilveen, new Assistant Finance Director. Ms. Mcilveen explained her background in finance and history.

David Frasher, City Manager, said the Commission Retreat materials were complete. The Retreat would be held on January 11-12.

Bryon Boyce, resident of Oregon City, gave further background on the situation. Several years ago the State had to get involved to do repairs on the bridge and billed Union Pacific. Those repairs had been undermined at this point, and he thought it was a problem. He was concerned if there was a flood the bridge would collapse.

There was consensus for the City Manager to write a letter to the State from the Commission and to include the story about the State intervening before.

Nancy Ide, City Recorder, discussed a revised policy for annual reports by boards and commissions which would be distributed to the staff of the committees to implement.

Maureen Cole, Library Director, announced the William Stafford birthday celebration on January 17. The next First Friday film would be held on February 1.

Mayor Neeley discussed a Metro sponsored levy for open space maintenance that would be on the May ballot.

c. Commission

Commissioner Roth reported on the Commission Retreat.

Commissioner Smith announced the Chair for the South Fork Water Board was the Mayor of West Linn and Vice Chair was the Mayor of Oregon City.





Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (RONR)

This motion is applicable when each of the different parts, although relating to a single subject, is capable of standing as a complete proposition without the others.¹¹¹

The motion is made by saying, for instance, "I move to divide the resolution so as to consider separately...." [2]

A motion to divide the question is not required when a single motion seeks approval of a series of propositions or resolutions on *different* subjects. Any member may obtain separate discussion and voting on any of the unrelated propositions or resolutions by making a demand for separate consideration, at any time before the unified motion is put to a vote. [3]

[edit] Legislative Use

In the <u>British House of Commons</u>, a formal motion is not required to divide the question; since 1888, the <u>Speaker</u> has held that a question consisting of two or more propositions, each of which is able to stand on its own, can be divided on <u>the objection of any</u> [nb] <u>Member of Parliament</u>. [4]

[edit] History

The concept of a division of a question dates back to at least 1640, when the <u>Lex Parliamentaria</u> noted, "If a Question upon a Debate contains more Parts than one, <u>and Members seem to be for one Part, and not for the other;</u> [our emphasis] it may be moved, that the same may be divided into two, or more Questions: as Dec. 2, 1640, the Debate about the Election of two Knights was divided into two Questions." [5]

[edit] Related Motions

Consideration by Paragraph, Consider by Parts, or Consider Seriatim are names for a similar motion whereby a complex motion is broken up to be deliberated part by part. Each part is considered tentatively and amended as necessary, then the whole motion is considered and voted on as a whole. [The part-by-part method would not work for a motion referred to Oregon City voters.] This differs from the motion to divide a question which splits the motion into two or more independent motions that are taken up in sequence. Each new motion is deliberated and voted upon before taking up the next part.
