



Parks appointed interim mayor

Citing her extensive experience working with the region's business community and volunteering in the city, the four Milwaukie City Councilors unanimously appointed Wilda Parks to serve as Mayor during its Regular Session meeting of Feb. 17th in City Hall.

Parks will serve until the mayor elected in the May 19th election is sworn in at a Council Meeting in June 2015. Parks has been serving on the Milwaukie Planning Commission for the past two years.

May election to seat next Mayor

With the resignation of Jeremy Ferguson in January, the City is accepting petitions for the position of mayor for the May 19th Special Election between Feb. 6th and March 10th. The successful candidate will fill Ferguson's unexpired term through the end of 2018.

To file for candidacy, one must be a qualified elector of the State of Oregon and resident of Milwaukie for six months prior to the election, or since Nov. 19th. The mayor earns a \$300 a month stipend.

Setting a new direction

For months now Greg Hemer and members of the Milwaukie Historical Society have been pounding the pavement trying to drum up volunteers and memberships as the Museum reaches this turning point in its history.

Once a "house museum" that displayed an assortment of items from different eras, the Society is retooling its collection to be an "interpretive museum" with regularly changing exhibits that showcase an aspect of Milwaukie's unique history.

This dramatic shift comes with the help of a team of professional curators and a year of diligent work cataloging and organizing every item of the three-floor historic home located at 3737 SE Adams St., implementing policies and procedures, and setting a five-year direction for the Milwaukie Museum.

"We know what we are, and what we want to be," Greg says.

Now the Museum showcases three interpretive displays entirely unique to Milwaukie and provides a research library on a wide range of Milwaukie subjects you literally can't find anywhere else -- not in any other library or in the vast expanses of the internet.

With a direction and a plan to get there, Society members are looking for volunteers to implement the curator's strategies to refine the Museum's collection and residents, groups or businesses to buy annual memberships to cover

Monroe Open House set

A Draft Concept Design for the Monroe Street Neighborhood Greenway will be shared for review and further discussion at a Workshop on Wed., March 18th, from 6 - 8 p.m. at Milwaukie Christian Church, located at 5197 SE King Rd.

This project aims to make Monroe Street a low-traffic, low-speed street that provides safe, quiet routes for motorists, pedestrians, and cyclists. More than 60 people attended the first Open House in December, and input shared then has been considered by the City's design consultant and Project Advisory Committee, which is comprised of citizens and participating agencies, in generating the draft to be shared on March 18th. Feedback gained will inform further revisions to the Draft Concept Design that will be presented to City Council.

With a final Concept Design in place the City can begin looking for funding to start implementing the Plan.

Fire bond on May ballot

One of Clackamas Fire District #1's top priorities is to plan for the replacement of capital assets to include emergency fire apparatus, firefighting and communications equipment, replacement and construction of fleet maintenance and training center facilities, and to make needed improvements to community fire stations and facilities.

Clackamas Fire District #1 is seeking voter approval to issue general obligation bonds to finance capital costs for improvements across the Fire District. Specifically, if approved, this measure would fund the construction and equipping of new facilities, purchase emergency apparatus and firefighting equipment, and improve Fire District facilities focusing on safety and service delivery. A measure will be on the May 19, 2015 ballot.

Milwaukie Riverfront Park - Phase II Construction

- The floating dock has been installed.
- Staff anticipates receiving the final ODOT Access Permit soon. The Permit will allow the contractor to begin:
 - Closing the entrance at Jefferson Street,
 - Modifying the entrance and signals at Washington Street,
 - Realigning the western curb line along McLoughlin south of Washington, and
 - Add medians within McLoughlin south of Washington to prevent left hand turn movements
- Bathroom construction is progressing off-site.

The "final draft" plans are being prepared by Lango-Hansen, the project consultant, with the next steps being to bring the concept plans for Balfour, Bowman-Brae and Kronberg to the Planning Commission and/or the City Council for approval.

A dramatic Museum makeover

Milwaukie Museum has been going through a transformation. Just in the past several months the Museum has created *Made in Milwaukie*, *Milwaukie Historical Timeline*, and the *History of the Wise Home* exhibits. In mid-March the Museum will display *Curiosities from the Museum's Collections* - a display of Milwaukie's history shown in a unique light.



Along with the new exhibit the Museum will be unveiling its most important asset to our history. The Museum will have a larger, more accessible research library full of information on people, places, events, and groups that have formed Milwaukie's history. The research library is comprised of written text, newspaper articles, and photographs that are most likely unavailable on the internet.

These changes have happened mainly because of the Museum's curator team,

Alder, LLC. Morgen Young, Mia Anderson, and Val Ballestrem of Alder, LLC have transformed the Museum into a workable and viable Museum for our City's future. The Milwaukie Historical Society and Milwaukie Museum would like to sincerely thank them for their service. We would also like to thank the citizens of Milwaukie and Milwaukie City Council for supplying the funding for the curators.

The Wall gaining support

With the arrival of the Moving Vietnam Wall less than six months away the effort is gathering financial and volunteer support from veteran's groups, the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners, private citizens and Milwaukie's Neighborhood Associations.

The planning team will be focusing on securing off-site parking and bus/shuttle service for Saturday, the peak day of activities that include the main ceremony at the wall and the City-organized Honoring Military Service and Sacrifice parade which will be routed through downtown Milwaukie.

The City Code Corner

As spring approaches many homeowners will begin to work on their properties including work in the right-of-way. Right-of-way describes the area between the boundary lines of a public way, including sidewalks, streets and the areas not formally part of a sidewalk or street. The right-of-way is different for every property.

When you're thinking about a project near the street, sidewalk or gravel shoulder you probably need to check in before you start. Work in the right-of-way may include planting or removing a tree, paving a street or driveway approach, or repairing a sidewalk. Permits can be obtained at the Johnson Creek Building at 6101 SE Johnson Creek Blvd. As always I am here to help you with any questions you may have at 503-786-7409.

Code project spurs growth

The Moving Forward Milwaukie project is revising the City's code to facilitate and encourage the kinds of development the City's residents want in Milwaukie's commercial areas.

Planning Commission will hold the adoption hearing on the Downtown Plan and Code Amendments on March 10th. City Council is scheduled to discuss the draft amendments at its March 26th study session. The draft amendments and staff reports can be found at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/planning/cpa-14-02. These amendments consolidate zones to expand potential uses and make redevelopment less onerous and address things like how new development looks and functions.

The Planning Commission's first work session on the Central Milwaukie Plan and Code Amendments on March 10th will focus on the area's Land Use and Transportation Plan. The draft plan and code amendments can be found at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/planning/central-milwaukie-land-use-and-transportation-plan.

The first public hearing on these amendments is tentatively scheduled for April 28th. These amendments address allowable uses, design standards, and creating connections to and through Central Milwaukie.
