Council adopts its set of Goals

At their July 6 regularly scheduled Council Meeting City Council adopted Goals that will direct policy and solidify their priorities for the next five years.

Council had been formulating their goals for months and the final product reflects opinions and recommendations stated in the Neighborhood Vision Statements, the goals of the Boards and Commissions, those of individual Councilors and the goals of City Departments.

Maintaining and improving the City's livability, cultivating substantive relationships with the citizenry, establishing more open spaces, broadening citizen involvement and revitalizing the Downtown and Riverfront are stated as Council's leading priorities.

In response to these Goals City staff has prepared work plans for each of these objectives. Resources will be allocated and budgets will be developed to implement each objective and some will be accomplished in months, while others may take several years.

Some of the specific objectives listed among council's strategic direction for 1999-2004 are developing and adopting a Citizen Involvement Board, developing a plan to relocate Kellogg Wastewater Treatment Plant within 10 years and modifying zoning and subdivision ordinances.

Citizen seeds Wetlands' survival

Walking the perimeter of Roswell Pond, just one of five wetlands in the community Mart Hughes helps protect and restore, two things become immediately apparent.

One is that he truly enjoys investing his time in such wetlands, and the other is that he knows what he's talking about.

Rummaging through the foliage, Mart spots infant Snowberry bushes and Alder trees most would pass off as weeds. Maybe he's ready to spot such needles in ever-growing haystacks because he designed the planting plans for this site and others in the area. He recommended plants, assessed what would grow where, and helped organize the volunteers who planted them.

Mart does all of this for free. A computer consultant by day, he says he oversees the wetland projects because he enjoys it. He says he does it because it's good exercise, it helps the environment and because it builds community.

Mart studied Biology in college, and as he explains it, the past 10 years he's spent working with wetland restoration projects have served as an extension of his education. A lot of his knowledge about which plants

Kiosks gather Milwaukie Center Plan input

FROM YOUR COUNCIL At Milwaukie Festival Daze three informational kiosks describing the four leading design options for Downtown

and Riverfront revitalization were placed throughout the festival. At the end of two days of polling more than a 150 ballots were collected, and it was clear the option that sparked the most reaction, both positive and negative, was the "Waterway" option (Shown to the right).


This option calls for dredging out several downtown blocks so the Willamette River can be channeled into the heart of Milwaukie. People praised the option for its ambitious vision, while others chastised it for being too unrealistic.

The option that gathered the most broad-based support was the "Parkway" option. This option features a marina at Kellogg Lake, as do the other three options, and an extended park area running between Jefferson and Monroe Streets from McLoughlin Boulevard to 21st Avenue. Spring Creek would be routed through the middle of the park and channeled to the Willamette River.

The "Cap" option received the mildest support. This option buries McLoughlin from Monroe to Jefferson Street, which would allow easier access to the Willamette and create greater development opportunities because of the additional space.

The "Boulevard" option was met with the least enthusiasm. This option would make McLoughlin Boulevard more pedestrian friendly by creating a landscaped median.

These options can be reviewed at a number of locations and we strongly encourage you to make this plan your own. Handouts are available at City facilities, a kiosk is set up outside Ledding Library and one will be set up at each Farmer's Market. The options are also on the Plan's web site -- http:// milwaukieriverfront.org. This site also records public opinion. &



City Manager explains first Waterfront purchase

At a recent meeting a citizen asked: "When did the City start buying riverfront property?" I responded that I thought that it was in the 1960's.

As a part of the current Milwaukie Center Planning Project, I have been looking through city property purchase records. I now think that the first property purchase closed on January 13, 1971.

A document titled "The Milwaukie Waterfront: A Proposal for Action", dated May 25, 1970, seems to be one of the earliest references to buying riverfront property. What is striking about this document is that its governing vision is strikingly similar to the one we are pursuing today as part of our Riverfront and Downtown revitalization efforts.

The document from 1970 outlines

four phases of property purchases. The first phase focused on the Elk Rock Island area, the second phase in the Jefferson Street Boat Ramp area and the third phase was near the mouth of Johnson Creek. The final phase was near the Country Club.

The proposal notes that: "[t]he Willamette River from time immemorial has served man well, but man has not treated it so well in return. The 1967 Legislature recognized that the river and its environs belong to all the people and established the Willamette River Park System program to make it available for the use by the public and to preserve as much of its environment as possible. It is a long-range program, but with proper planning and emphasis in the right direction, the job can be accomplished."

Later the report continues: "[t]he Milwaukie waterfront is small in comparison to the large city fanning out behind

this rather restricted area. Thus, it becomes increasingly important that the City preserve for public use as much of the waterfront as possible. The opportunity is there for a river park, a beautiful riverfront mall in broad view from the new highway as one drives through the City, and a public recreation complex that could be second to none on the Willamette River."

This proposal resulted in action by the City Council and they sought and received a state grant. The contract between the state and City is signed by: Donald W. Graf, David S. Strauss, Bill E. Hupp, Edgar D. Fuller, Jr., and Russell H. Bonner. The City Manager at that time was Paul F. Helton. The grant bought the Spring Park property at what was 1606 Fifth Street (now the end of 19th Street). And that purchase is believed to be the first Riverfront property acquired by the City.

Library reaches new heights

Last year Milwaukie's Ledding Library was the busiest it's ever been since opening its doors in 1965.

For the 1998-1999 Fiscal Year, which just ended in June, the Library circulated more than 381,000 books, compact disks, videos, talking books and books on tape.

Joe Sandfort, a senior librarian at Ledding, thinks the 15% increase from last year is a result of a combination of factors.

One might be the library's recent installation of Internet stations. Joe thinks the stations may be drawing people to the library who then take advantage of other resources once they're there. Joe also points to an increase in the number of Children's Programs and materials for Young Adults as other reasons for Ledding's all-time high circulation.

TCI and City sign contract

The Milwaukie City Council signed a cable franchise contract with TCI Cable at their meeting on July 6.

Under the terms of the new agreement, TCI will hold the franchise for 10 years. They will complete the system upgrade that is currently underway by August of 2001, which will allow for more channels and a potential improvement in picture quality.

Although the agreement does not guarantee the customer service center on International Way will stay open, the contract does ensure a service center will be located within seven miles of Milwaukie. To help guarantee customer service will be responsive, the contract ensures staff persons will be on call to respond to citizens' needs during peak times.

The Public Access Studio will also be maintained and operated by TCI until October 2000, at which time it will close.

TCI also stated that it would honor existing senior accounts so senior discounts granted under the previous agreement are preserved.

Rescue team beats the odds

Competing with Swiftwater Rescue teams with million dollar budgets and crews of hundreds, Milwaukie's Fire Service provider came home from a National Awards ceremony held in Kissimmee, Florida with the highest possible honor.

On June 17 North Clackamas Fire District No. 1's Swiftwater Rescue team won the 1999 Higgins and Langley Swiftwater Rescue Team Commendation for the outstanding work they displayed during several river rescues made earlier this year.

Swiftwater rescues include incidents like drowning rescues, boating accidents and flood rescues. Clackamas Fire District No. 1 makes most of its rescues in or around the Willamette River and each year the 12-man unit typically responds to 50 calls and saves about a dozen lives.

John Olliver, the captain of the team, said the honor is a huge one, especially considering they were competing against teams like New York City and Los Angeles.

"Los Angeles Fire has 800 (fire) stations," John said, "we have eight."



John said it was the floods of 1996 that prompted the District to establish a Swiftwater Rescue team. At that time their water rescue equipment consisted of four life jackets.

Now, just three years later, their team has established itself as one of the best in the nation.

"We made a commitment to do it right and to be the best," John said. "And it's a real tribute to the guys that they went out and did it."

Garbage Rates remain the same

At the June 14th Council work session JoAnn Herrigel, Program Services Coordinator, reported to the City Council that the rates for garbage and recycling would not be increased this year.

Residential and commercial garbage rates were decreased last year by 1.2 % and 1.7% respectively.

Garbage rates have not been increased since 1992. ⊞

Tips to preserve our air quality

Summer is upon us and the hot days are here. With the heat comes the smog created by things like cars, gas mowers and paint.

DEQ and Tri Met, once again will be coordinating a Clean Air Action Alert program this year that will notify the Portland Metro area when, due to high temperatures, air quality is expected to be unsatisfactory. Here are some things you can do to minimize your negative impact on air quality:

Don't drive if you don't have to.
 Take the bus, ride your bike, walk, com-

bine errands if you HAVE to drive.

- Use an electric or push mower if you have to mow your lawn. If you only have a gas mower and you can wait please do.
- Avoid painting and if you do paint, use low-solvent paints.
- Avoid using aerosol hair sprays, deodorants or air fresheners.
- Avoid using lighter fluid. Use a chimney or electric starter for barbecue coals, or cook on a gas grill.

serve as any indication, Mart has learned quite a bit. Last winter, more than 600 native species were planted at the Roswell Pond site and the Pennywood site, and Mart reports each is enjoying more than a 90 percent survival rate.

Roswell Pond is in the Ardenwald Neighborhood, and the Pennywood site is in the Lake Road Neighborhood.

"All in all I'm pleased with what's happened," Mart said. "You've got to be patient and wait for the plants to do their stuff. It takes about 10 years worth of effort to be really successful at a site like (Roswell Pond)."

JoAnn Herrigel, Milwaukie's Program Services Coordinator oversees the restoration projects and says Mart has been crucial in making each a success.

"He's been the driver of the process," JoAnn said. "I rely on him for a lot of things ... without him I wouldn't know what to plant, where to plant it or when. We're lucky to have him." \end{aligned}

I hope that this will be the beginning of many such events for the Linwood Neighborhood in the coming year.




The Linwood Neighborhood Associa-

The always-successful children's reading program will hold its last two ses-


