## City Manager Search Narrows

The process for finding the right City Manager for Milwaukie has been ongoing. At the time the position closed in August, the City had 51 applicants from around the United States. After a vetting and interview process, the candidate pool was narrowed to six candidates. In early September the City hosted an open house for five of the six candidates to meet and greet the public. The following day the candidates were each interviewed by three separate stakeholder groups: neighborhood leaders, City Council and City Staff. (The sixth candidate was not immediately available.) The City is currently working on vetting the sixth candidate and doing background checks as part of the standard City hiring process. Should Council make a decision to offer the position to one of the candidates, and the candidate accepts the offer; an announcement will be made after the terms of a contract are agreed upon.

## Get Moving Milwaukie!

Summer seemed to come and go in a flash and fall is already knocking at our door. School is in full swing and Halloween will be here before we know it. Though the changing of the seasons may make many of us want to stay indoors, a brisk walk outside will do us all good. A recent Harvard study shows that walking at a moderate pace (3 mph) for up to 3 hours a week (30 minutes

a day) can cut the risk of heart disease in women by as much as 40%. This is the same benefit you would get from aerobics, jogging, or other vigorous exercise. The benefits to men are comparable. Along with its benefits to the heart, walking improves circulation, helps breathing, combats depression, bolsters the immune system, helps prevent and control diabetes, helps prevent osteoporosis and control weight. Walkers have fewer incidences of cancer, heart disease, diabetes, and stroke. They live longer and get mental health and spiritual benefits. As Henry David Thoreau says "An early- morning walk is a blessing for the whole day".

Earlier this year, the Surgeon General's office and First Lady Michelle Obama launched the "Let's Move" campaign, with the goal of ending childhood obesity within this generation. The campaign aims to get healthier food in schools, encourage children to get physically active and promote the availability of healthy food choices in America.

A recent study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association revealed that two-thirds of American adults and nearly one-third of America's children are overweight or obese. U.S. Surgeon General Regina Benjamin, MD stated obesity is contributing to a growing list of deadly chronic health conditions, including high blood pressure, high cholesterol, type 2 diabetes and heart disease. According to the U.S. government obesity-related illness costs the nation \$147 billion a year, with obese Americans spending 42 percent more per year for medical care than the non-obese.

National Walk to School Day (Wednesday, October 6th, 2010), would seem the perfect opportunity to begin a walking program not only for yourself but for your children. So get out there, be safe in your walking endeavors and remember to stop, look and listen before you cross the street.

Have you noticed that when you trim a tree in the spring it comes back with a vengeance by fall? Autumn is an excellent time to trim trees and shrubs before winter weather hits.

Vegetation hanging over streets and sidewalks can cause damage to vehicles and also prevent people from using the sidewalk.

Also, vegetation can block important signs such as Stop, Yield, Street Name, and Speed signs.

According to City Code the abutting property owner is responsible for ensuring that the signs, streets and sidewalks are clear for safe passage.

## The Chief's Corner

October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month. In a survey of Oregon women age 20-55, nearly one-third reported one or more forms of violent victimization during the prior 5 years. One in ten women experienced partner violence and 13% reported having been stalked. A survey of young Oregon women indicates that 30% of 11th grade females and 24% of eighth grade females said that an adult had intentionally hit, physically hurt, and/or had sexual contact with them.

The costs of domestic violence in Oregon are estimated at over 50 million dollars a year-- 35 million for direct medical and mental health services.
