Volunteer As a Disaster Responder BR PREPARED

Milwaukie's CERT Team was founded in 2010 in response to the 2008-09 winter ice and snowstorm that badly affected the Portland area. There are now nearly 40 active members and another 15 reserve members. Members meet for drills, practice exercises and participate in other training opportunities within the Portland area.

Milwaukie CERT members are committed to helping their own families and their neighbors following a disaster event, and expect to perform other activities as assigned by the City's Emergency Manager at that time. Duties may include helping at emergency shelters, providing damage assessment and light search and rescue operations.

Equipment for CERT members has been provided through the generosity of Celebrate Milwaukie, Inc., the Milwaukie Rotary Club and the City of Milwaukie. Federal funding has also paid for some equipment and training.

Those interested in training in CERT complete a 15 hour long on-line course (at the www.citizencorps. gov/cert/IS317) plus a one day final hands-on test.

The Chief's Corner

The theme for the Pilot this month is volunteerism. There are several opportunities for community members to offer their time through the Milwaukie Police Department.

PSAC: The Police Department works with the community through the Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC). PSAC has a representative from each of the City's official 7 Neighborhood District Associations and several "At Large" members. The PSAC is an excellent way to give back to the community on public safety projects such as the Officer of the Year Dinner,

the Prescription Drug drop off program, Document Shred Day and the Bike Give Away program.

Police Reserves: For those wanting more, the Police Department has an active Police Reserve program. Police Reserves are trained, and serve, as armed Police Officers. They are required to complete the same rigorous application process as a full-time police officer, to include a medical physical, a background investigation, a psychological examination, a physical fitness test and graduation from the Police Reserve Academy. The Reserve Academy runs for 5 months-2 nights a week and every Saturday. A successful Reserve Officer has all the authority of a full-time officer and is required to carry a firearm while on duty. Reserve Officers must be 21 years or older and serve a minimum of 20 hours a month to stay current.

Cadets: The Police Department has a very successful Police Cadet program. Police Cadets must be between 16 and 21 years old. They are subjected to a background investigation and must complete the Cadet Academy, requiring 3 months of Saturday instruction. Cadets are required to serve 16 hours a month. Cadets assist with City events and at crime scenes. The Cadet program is an excellent opportunity to explore law enforcement as a future career.
