Caring for a community

Council to review water and sewer rates

Council will consider adjusting the City's sewer and water rate at it's regularly scheduled meeting on Nov. 18th, at 6 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers. Public testimony will be considered before a decision is reached.

Council was set to adjust the water rate in September, but decided to hold off because of the impact the volumebased sewer charge, which was implemented in July, has had on some customers' bills.

The volume-based sewer charge was designed to charge customers in proportion to their usage rather than charging everyone the same fixed rate. However, some residents' bills have raised quite considerably, and Council wants to Please see Rates on page 2

McLoughlin project builds advisory team

Work is beginning on the McLoughlin Boulevard Improvement project in earnest, and the City is teaming up with regional partners to implement a process that ensures the public has opportunities to weigh-in throughout the project.

The goal of the project, scheduled for 2005, is to improve safety along McLoughlin Boulevard in Downtown Milwaukie and to stimulate activity between the Riverfront and business district. The project will beautify McLoughlin Boulevard between Harrison Street and the Kellogg Street Bridge by incorporating multi-modal improvements like set back sidewalks, street trees, and landscaped medians.

The City has entered into an agreement with David Evans and Associates (DEA) to complete the design of the project and has received approval to have the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) conduct the right of way acquisi-

Working through design and finance considerations, the City of Milwaukie and Peak Development continue to refine plans for the North Main Project at the former Safeway site.

Project Manager Jeff King hopes to present the latest designs and funding strategies at an Open House in late fall or early winter. Please check the Pilot and the web site for further details.

At the time of print, plans called for two Main Street-facing buildings. One with retail on the ground floor and apartments on the top floors; the other building to house condominiums. A stand alone residential building is proposed beside the Masonic Lodge, and a plaza and parking area is also proposed.

How important is it to you that we have safe roads to travel on? Are potholes a problem for you? Does it matter if the water from the street floods your yard?

As I'm sure you have noticed, we continue to get further and further behind on keeping up with road repair. This is not new, but it is getting to the critical point where we simply have to do something.

Keep in mind, doing nothing means our streets will continue to get worse at a faster rate and cost 4 to 5 times as much to repair. It's like any other repair, like your roof or your car, the longer you wait to fix it, the more it's going to cost.

Here are some "Road Facts" about Milwaukie:

- Milwaukie has over 75 miles of roads (150 lane miles) with a value in excess of \$90 million. We need to find a way to protect and maintain our investment.
- Milwaukie roads are rapidly declining. The backlog of needed repairs and capital improvements have grown each year and now equal an estimated 3+ million dollars.
- Milwaukie currently spends only \$594,560 a year on road maintenance compared to annual spending needs of \$1,130,000.
 Clearly the City is getting further and further behind. We are only able to spend less than ½ the amount we need to keep our streets in safe condition.
- Timely maintenance saves money. Renovation of road pavement rated in "fair condition" in year 15 of a 20-year life cycle will cost \$1.00 per unit. Waiting until pavement is in very poor condition will cost \$4.00-\$5.00 per unit.
- Many of Milwaukie's roads are rated below fair condition. Key arterials like King Road, Lake Road, Railroad Avenue and parts of Harrison Street are rated at very poor/near failure condition.

As you can see our situation is very serious! We need to dedicate the necessary funds right now. Having said that, let me be clear that if we were to ask you for dedicated money to fix our streets, all monies collected would go to Milwaukie roads only. All monies collected would be clearly dedicated to road maintenance only. The money could not be used for any other purpose under any circumstances.

We need to address this issue head-on, but without a collision. Now is the time to decide how we are going to fix our streets. We need to hear from you right now on what you would like to do to make our City streets safe to drive on.

King Road businesses will make the move

Last month the Pilot reported the King Road Redevelopment Plan had gained Planning Commission approval and the first phase of construction would begin before year's end.

Many questions arose as to which businesses were going to make the move from the King Road Super Center complex into the new mixed-use office and retail building that's planned for the northwest corner of the site.

Gene and Pat Dierenger, the owners of the property, report that of the tenants currently operating from the shopping center, Hi-School Pharmacy, Tiki Hair Salon, Mailhouse Plus and Dierenger Property Inc. will make the move to the new building once it is completed.

In the first phase of construction, tentatively set for November, a new home for the Super Burrito restaurant will be constructed. Once completed, the old restaurant will be demolished and the new 8,500 square foot mixed-use office will be constructed in its place.

tion. Funding for the project includes \$2 million in state bond funds, \$1.9 million in federal funds, and a local match of approximately \$220,000 from the City.

Representatives of the City's Community Development, Planning, Engineering, and Neighborhood Services Departments will participate in the project along with a Project Advisory Committee (PAC), comprised of representatives from the City, ODOT, Metro,

the Riverfront Board, the Neighborhoods and Downtown businesses. The PAC will make recommendations on project alternatives to the design team, and the design team will carry these recommendations forward to Council.

Public outreach beyond the PAC will be conducted through a series of public open houses, Council and Planning Commission meetings, the City's website, and the Pilot.




Library hosts toy drive

Tips for winter driving

Whether we like it or not, fall is giving way to winter and that means slicker road conditions and unfortunately, more traffic accidents.

Traffic Officer Larry Giddings says that when it's wet out, the over-arching rule of thumb is to slow down. Another thing to be conscious of is that when it's slick out, traction is hard to maintain, and therefore drivers' steering, acceleration and braking needs to be smoother. The harsher the action, the more weight shift occurs and the harder it is to control the vehicle. So if you jerk the wheel or stab the brakes, you are much more likely to lose traction and begin to slide.

Also keep in mind that it takes longer to stop on slick roads, so increase your following distance. \blacksquare

The City Code Corner

The City of Milwaukie takes pride in its urban forest and actively protects trees in the City's right of ways and natural resource areas.

Unfortunately, in the past several months, there have been a number of instances where residents have cut down or majorly pruned trees in these protected areas.

Before majorly pruning a tree, which is cutting more than 20% of the tree, or cutting down a tree, check with the Milwaukie Planning Department about obtaining a permit. The permits maintain specific guidelines and instructions to assist the applicant through the process.

If you're not exactly sure where the right of way is, or are unsure if a particular tree is in a natural resource area, contact the Planning Department at (503) 786-7630. Cutting down a tree in a protected area may result in a fine of \$500 and paying the estimated value of the tree.

Transit Center group suggests new light rail alignment

When City Council adopted the South Corridor Locally Preferred Alternative it also passed a resolution calling for the City's North Industrial landowners to work with staff from the City, Metro, ODOT and TriMet and Neighborhood leaders to develop mitigation strategies for any possible impacts a transit center might bring to the industrial area.

The group has been meeting since September and is exploring a host of options that remedy current and future access, circulation and parking issues.

Recently the group has begun examining a set of light rail options that shift

the light rail line to the east along the Tillamook Branch rail lines. This would limit impacts by shifting light rail away from existing businesses. With moving the line and related transit center off of McLoughlin, the group has suggested placing a transit center in the south end of Downtown Milwaukie, and constructing a park and ride facility on the west side of Kellogg Lake, off of McLoughlin.

All options are in the discussion stage, and will continue to be evaluated. An open house will be held in December. For more information please contact Michelle Gregory at (503) 753-4976.

Two major construction projects are scheduled for Downtown Milwaukie in the next few years, and intense studies are underway for both.

First and foremost is a combination of a transit station and park and ride for the Milwaukie Corridor (see page 3). A working group consisting of North Milwaukie business owners, Neighborhood Association officers, City, Metro and TriMet staff and consultants are meeting to form a transit plan for the South Corridor that can gain public approval and shape

the future direction of the City's growth. At present eight different sites, or combinations thereof, are under consideration. A public open house should be scheduled by early December. Should funding be secured, the project is slated to start in 2008 and be completed by 2011.

The second project under study is the McLoughlin Boulevard Improvement Project between Harrison Street and Kellogg Lake, due to begin in 2005 (see page 1). The result will be a more even traffic flow and an easier, safer access from the Boulevard to the City. One of the benefits of the project will be to draw a percentage of the 40,000 cars that travel McLouglin Boulevard into the City for shopping.

These two major improvements will greatly enhance the City's new Downtown and Riverfront revitalization goals.
