King Road reuse project to hold Open House

Milwaukie's revitalization efforts aren't construction of three other buildings on restricted to the Downtown.

Proof lies in the redevelopment project slated for the King Road Super Center located at the intersection of King Road and 42nd Avenue.

The landowners, Gene and Pat Dierenger, have reached an agreement with Safeway for the construction of an approximate 49,000 square foot grocery store for the site, and the Dierenger's are considering a phased approach for the

the site.

Work could begin as early as this summer with the construction of a new facility for the Super Burrito Express followed by the deconstruction of the existing restaurant. In the location of the old Super Burrito, the property owners are proposing to construct a new building featuring retail and office uses.

The largest structure currently housing the Hi-School Pharmacy and other tenants would be demolished after that. Existing tenants will have the opportunity to relocate in the newly constructed buildings.

Plans are contingent on meeting the approval of the City's Planning Commission. The Dierengers will present their proposal at the July 8th meeting.

The applicant will need to submit a transition area plan that demonstrates how impacts to the surrounding residen-

McLoughlin project makes significant step

Creating better access to our Riverfront and Downtown is a fundamental component of building a better Milwaukie.

The City moved a step closer in this direction when it selected a local consulting firm, David Evans & Associates (DEA), to perform the final design for the McLoughlin Boulevard improvement project.

The project will improve safety, pedestrian access, and beautify McLoughlin Boulevard between Harrison Street and the Kellogg Creek Bridge, and is an important element of the City's adopted Downtown and Riverfront Plan. The City is currently in contract negotiations with

This year entrants will begin gathering at the Clackamas ESD builiding at 7:30 a.m., with judging taking place at 8:30 a.m.

Councilor offers system of evaluation

Given our continuing trend of significant revenue shortfalls, we need to critically and objectively analyze what services Milwaukie should provide in the future. This requires a multistep process to evaluate all City services. This includes determining the actual cost of providing the service as well as the minimum level at

which a service can operate, and still be cost effective.

The Need for Priorities

Any service provided by the City must serve a recognized public need. Any service that advances community safety, health, welfare or quality of life meets this basic test. Many services will meet the public benefit test. However, it is not possible for the City to be all things to all people. Given limited and diminishing resources, the City must establish priorities in order to be sure that the core services it provides to citizens create the greatest public benefit possible. This priority-setting process will help to ensure that the City remains a fiscally viable organization with the ability to provide future community service needs.

The final result of the analysis could be the assignment of priorities of each current major City function and service into one of these categories:

Required: Services mandated by Federal or State law.

Essential: Fundamental and basic. Valued by citizens as something they cannot live without or cannot be disregarded. Deliver under all circumstances (but may have to vary level of service provided depending on available resources).

Preferred: Strong preference for providing. Reasonable possibility of allocating dollars.

Discretionary: Delivered only when certain criteria are met. Unlikely significant dollars (if any) would be allocated.

Transition Elsewhere: To be provided by other service agencies or contracted out.

Eliminate: May be temporary or permanent.

We need your help.

We need your input right now! We need you to tell us what services are most important to you. Attend your next Neighborhood meeting and tell them what you think. Call, write or e-mail the City Council, City Manager or Neighborhood Chairs. Tell a City employee if you get the chance. We need to know what your priorities are.

Milwaukie has been characterized by many as a "Diamond in the Rough". We have tremendous potential to be the most outstanding City in the State of Oregon. You may have already seen the exciting activity in the form of new buildings and businesses moving into our Downtown area. Well, wait until you see what's next! What is it you ask? Get involved and you will learn all about it.

The decisions we make today (getting involved or not getting involved) will impact our future for decades to come. Together we can take it to the next level because Milwaukie is truly a great place to live.

Proposed Budget goes before Council June 16th

The Budget Committee approved City Manager Mike Swanson's balanced budget in April and now it will go before City Council for the adoption hearing scheduled for June 16th in City Hall.

City Council can either accept the proposed budget as is, or make changes to any of the Budget's funds, but not in excess of 10% of each funds' budget.

The only change made to Mike's proposed budget was to transfer \$50,000 from the Contingency Fund to the Library Fund. The funding will not increase any positions, but will fund additional hours for part time employees to make up the work load left after three librarians retired earlier this year.

Public comment will be recorded at City Council's June 16th meeting.

tial properties will be minimized. Components of the transition area application include a traffic mitigation plan, site beautification strategies such as providing new curb and sidewalks, planter strips and street trees. In order to gain the Planning Commission's approval, the application will also address parking requirements and the community's street design standards.

The Dierengers are holding an Open House at the site on June 11th from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., and residents will have an opportunity to review site plans, ask questions and offer comment.

Pay utility bills without hassle

The City of Milwaukie now offers a free program where customers' bimonthly utility bills are automatically withdrawn from their checking accounts so they don't have to worry about writing checks, paying for postage, or accumulating late fees if payments are past due.

The Auto Pay program still provides residents with a bill, but the payment is automatically deducted on the date the bill is due. To sign up for the Auto Pay program, fill out the application that was included in your May or June Utility Bills.

The program carries no obligation. Those who try Auto Pay but don't like it can get out by simply providing a written notice. If you have any questions, or would like another application, please call Utility Billing at (503) 786-7525.

North Main Project progresses

While the old Safeway site comes crumbling down, City Staff continues working with Peak Development in developing a mixed-use development project that will breathe new life into the Downtown's core.

The North Main Street project currently calls for a 4-story building with about 19,600 square feet of space with retail uses on the bottom floor, and one and two bedroom apartments and

condos on the upper floors. The current proposal calls for 42 apartments and 14 condos.

Staff will provide City Council with a project update at the June 16th Work Session held in City Hall.

Project Manager Jeff King reports



the City was awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Mt. Hood Economic Alliance to help fund the 21st Avenue extension that will access the project and the Ledding Library.

Book Sale changes venue; Library changes hours

The sale will be held throughout the Centennial Summer Celebration, Friday through Sunday, June 20-22 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day.

Thousands of books, CDs, videos, records and sheet music collections will be for sale, all at great prices. And there will be a table full of gift items to purchase as well as a raffle featuring great prizes. The raffle drawing is at 4 p.m. on Sunday, June 22nd, and participants need not be present to win.

In other Library news, if City Council adopts the budget proposed by the Budget Committee on June 16th, there will some changes at Ledding beginning July 1st.

Firstly, fines on all materials will be increased to 25 cents per day, but with a cap set at \$3. The new fee schedule will help bring in much-needed revenue. On the brighter side, Library patrons will be able to check out DVD's and Videos for a whole week, rather than just three days.

Finally, if the budget is adopted, the Library's new hours will be from noon to 9 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, from noon to 5:30 p.m. Thursday through Saturday, and on Sunday, operating hours will be from noon to 5 p.m. 🕀

City Code Corner

Nothing can clutter a Neighborhood quite the way an improperly stored car can. Cars parked in the lawn or that are up on blocks in the driveway just doesn't look good. For that reason, Milwaukie maintains a code that prohibits and limits such activities.

All vehicles - cars, trucks, trailers - need to be stored in driveways or gravel side yards. Furthermore, vehicles that are partially dismantled or do not carry a valid license cannot be stored for more than ten days anywhere on the property. And finally, vehicles used for commercial purposes (like trucks or work vans) need to be screened or stored from the view of the street.

Get a peek of trails projects

The weekend of June 7th and 8th marks National Trails Weekend, and our region is celebrating with a pair of walks that will give area-residents a glimpse of what the completed Trolley Trail and the Tree Bridges Project will look like.

On Saturday, June 7th from 10 a.m. to noon residents can walk a section of the Trolley Trail, the future 6-mile multiuse trail between Milwaukie and Gladstone. The trail will be built on a former streetcar line and be mostly in its own right-of-way, separated from streets and motor traffic.

Metro purchased the corridor in December 2001 and is currently working in partnership with the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District, City of Milwaukie and Friends of the Trolley Trail to complete the master plan and to secure funding to develop the trail.

Walkers will meet at the front of Oak Grove Elementary School at 2150 SE Torbank Rd. in Milwaukie.

On Sunday, June 8th from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. residents can walk the final missing one-mile of the Springwater Trail in the Sellwood neighborhood of southeast Portland. This section will connect the recently completed Springwater on the Willamette to the Three Bridges Project. Trail hikers will also explore the old railroad berms where the new bike and pedestrian bridges will be built over Johnson Creek, McLouglin Blvd. and the Union Pacific Railroad tracks.

Those interested should meet at the Sellwood Riverfront Park trailhead.

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DEA and expects to begin project work in June of this year. The design process will take approximately one year, and construction is projected to begin in the summer of 2004.

The total project cost is estimated at approximately \$4.1 million dollars; which includes design, right-of-way acquisition and construction.

The City has received \$1.9 million in Federal grants and \$2 million in State grants to complete the project.

Representatives of the City's Community Development,

Planning, Engineering, and Neighborhood Services Departments will participate in the project along with a Project Advisory Committee that includes representatives of ODOT, Federal Highway Administration, and others.

Public outreach will be conducted throughout the design process to incorporate the interests of Downtown businesses, residents and the Riverfront Board.



HISTORIC MILWAUKIE

Milwaukie is a small geographic spot full of pride, friendship, and togetherness. It only stands to reason we help one another both in mind and body. You may well have noticed the rains are subsiding and now all thoughts turn to living outside again. The Historic Milwaukie Neighborhood thought it would be a good time to get outside and enjoy the summer.

Some tips to ensure your joy often start with safety. How about a little yellow jacket control? This is a good time to get out those yellow jacket traps to get the queens before they start making nests and new little yellow jackets to pester you and your picnics. Since we had a mild winter, the yellow jacket population should be larger than usual, so be forewarned.

Dancing through the garden, you may notice the rhodys looking somewhat pale after a healthy bloom. I once thought it was NOT necessary to deadhead, but found out that old blossoms encourage insects and disease, so get out and deadhead (take the old blossoms off). This is also the best time to get the rhodys healthy; fertilize shortly after the buds have blossomed.

Here's a quick note on an ecological approach to a healthy lawn and garden through pest control. Mimic nature. Use what she uses for best results.

Aphids are the pox of many leafy plants and flowers! Guess what? Lady Bugs feed on the little green pests, munching as many as 1,000 each during its lifetime. To guarantee a useful

colony of these bright red-orange helpers, buy some! They are readily available all bagged up for easy handling and use, and can be found at most garden supply stores.

Other nasty critters live in the soil or at ground level: root weevils munching your Rhodys; fleas and flea larvae awaiting the family pets; and particularly the crane fly, poised to brown spot that lush green lawn. Put the sprayer down; no chemicals needed here. Try using nematodes in areas of concern. These microorganisms will easily free your yard of many pests never to be seen or heard from again. Garden supply stores carry them in easy release form.

Know both nematodes and lady bugs, used properly, offer proven safe and easy results without harmful toxins - give 'em a trv!
