North Main Street Project Open House set

The North Main Street Project stands as one of the City's greatest opportunities to breathe new life into the Downtown core and as a result, the entire City.

Over the past six months, the consultant group Johnson Gardner, LLC has been examining the old Safeway site in developing a market analysis of potential uses.

The findings will be presented at a North Main Street Project Workshop scheduled for 6 p.m., Wednesday, June 6, 2002 at City Hall. The purpose of the workshop is to report back to the community on the consultant's findings about Milwaukie's attractiveness and marketability to potential developers. The consultant will explain the City's most promising options as well as its limitations relative to potential housing, retail, and office uses.

City staff will discuss a couple of potential options as well as the next steps in the development process.

Because the site is a key component in unlocking the potential of the Downtown core the City is highly interested in communicating these findings with the community and particularly those who expressed their thoughts and desires at the first workshop held in January. Please attend.

Being a part of the solution

In 1997 Donald Hammang and three other Milwaukie citizens founded the Milwaukie Democracy Project (MDP), a grass-roots organization formed with the purpose of recalling three Milwaukie City Councilors they believed were operating outside their constituent's interests.

But the MDP was successful in their recall, and now five years later, much is different. The City has a different Mayor, Council and City Manager, and Donald is the Chair of the Planning Commission.

Donald's work to not only remove, but to build is representative of a philosophy that seems to surface in different aspects of his life.

"If you want a change from the way the things are, you have a responsibility to get involved," he said. "And not only just to get involved, but to stick with it and create a new system."

As Donald explains it, he chose the Planning Commission as the object of his participation because its work goes a long way in governing how the City takes its shape. And for him, the responsible way to grow the City is with eyes trained on what the people want.

"The Planning Commission gives me the opportunity to make sure that as we grow the town we keep the focus on our constituents."

Donald's philosophy of building sustainable change through involvement surfaces in his work as a steward for the Wetlands Conservancy. He's deeply involved in maintaining the City's wetlands and maintains a lush and vibrant habitat in his own backyard.

"I have a desire to work for something that outlasts me," Donald explained.

Identity theft on the rise in City

Last month Milwaukie Police Detective Sergeant Steve Bartol busted a pair of known identity thieves transporting a U-Haul truck packed with garbage bags full of old checks and ATM and credit card receipts stolen from Dumpsters and people's mail.

With the personal information lifted from these materials, criminals can assume another person's identity and put them in financial ruin. Identity theft in

the City is up 300%, and 1,500% in Clackamas County.

Milwaukie Police Department is focusing its efforts on curbing this problem, but there are some simple steps citizens can do to protect themselves from becoming a victim.

1. Because mail is sometimes stolen right from mailboxes, don't mail bills from home, use a drop box.

Since this is my first column and I'm limited in space, I would like to take this opportunity to say what a great staff we have in the City. We are very lucky to have the people we do, and that's because they really care about Milwaukie. I feel privileged to have the opportunity to work with them.

Secondly, I'd like to address the Ledding Library and the great need that exists not only for sustainable funding but to meet projected growth needs. A study just completed envisions a very different library from what we have today and the dollar figures to fulfill that goal are, frankly, astounding. We could build the nation's best library and

never be able to open the doors unless we can guarantee funding for the materials and staff to keep it going. This is a subject we will be addressing soon enough and one I believe we'll find a solution for.

The "Friends of the Ledding Library" is a tax deductible organization and about a month ago I started soliciting funds for the library expansion with the goal of collecting 4.5 million.

Budget Committee forwards budget for adoption

City Council and the five citizens who comprise the budget committee approved City Manager Mike Swanson's proposed budget on May 16, 2002 with only minor amendments. Council is scheduled to vote on the proposed budget at its June 18, 2002 meeting.

As Mike described in his budget message, his primary objective was to formulate a proposal of expenditures that maintains a level of services that reflect the community's desires despite a gloomy combination of stagnant revenues, rising costs, adverse economic conditions, and declining revenues from the investment of City general funds. While this year's budget holds the line, Mike suggests dramatic cuts in personnel and services might plaque next year's

budget if alternative revenue sources are not discovered.

Included in Mike's recommended budget is funding for a Citywide development effort. Rather than focusing attention and resources on just the Riverfront and Downtown, Mike suggests allocating \$48,000 to create a development effort for the entire City.

The budget also adds a position in the Code Enforcement Department in an effort to clean up City properties and streets for present and future-day residents and business owners.

Mike is also calling for a staffing level in the Police Department that will implement the Budget Committee's past directive to maintain a ratio of 1.5 officers for every 1,000 citizens. The proposed budget recommends \$9,000 be made available for each Neighborhood Association as part of the nationally recognized Neighborhood Grant Program. This program matches volunteerism with funding to seed programs created by the Neighborhoods.

The proposed budget also provides resources allowing the Ledding Library to open an hour earlier on weekdays and Saturday beginning July 1, 2002.

Waldorf bid accepted

After almost four hours of deliberation, the Planning Commission unanimously approved the Portland Waldorf School's application to occupy the Milwaukie Middle School this coming fall.

Traffic and accommodating the 366 trips estimated to be introduced when the Waldorf School opens its doors was the focus of attention.

About 70 people attended the hearing, about a dozen spoke in support of the application, three were neither for or against but stressed traffic considerations, and one spoke in opposition.

The City Code Corner

It's the growing season, and while this means gardens will flourish and flowers will bloom, it also means weeds and annoying vegetation like blackberry bushes will also be on the rise.

To keep yards looking well-maintained and to minimize fire hazards, the City's Municipal Code stipulates that weeds, grass, blackberry bushes and other types of out of control vegetation are not to exceed eight inches in height.

North Industrial Land Use study will identify prospective uses

With the help of a major state-funded grant, the City will soon begin a development study of the 200 acre north industrial area situated between 17th Avenue, Highway 224 and the Union Pacific rail line.

The project, known as the North Industrial Land Use Study, is supported by both the Planning Commission and City Council.

Over the next year staff will work with a consultant team to identify market

demand for industrial and other commercial uses that fit well within the project area and help support the City's job base and economy.

The other part of the study looks at how transportation issues like rail and highway factor into future decisions about how the area should develop.

Waldorf administrators emphasized students and their parents would be encouraged to carpool and take mass transit, and pointed to a history of being conscientious neighbors. A traffic study will be conducted during the first year of operation to assure any negative effects are mitigated.

Waldorf said they've adopted a facility use policy mirroring the School District's, which they say means athletic fields and facilities will be available for community use as long as there isn't an existing conflict with Waldorf activities.

The Planning Commission's approval was subject to appeal until May 30, 2002. At the time of print it was not known if an appeal had been filed.


A lot is on tap this summer in the Ardenwald Neighborhood. Here's a list of dates and activities:

Lake Road Neighborhood Association's unanimous vote at our last meeting gave us Rob Kappa as Chair, Susanna Pai as Treasurer, and Debby Patten as Secretary. We later discovered our newly elected Vice-Chair lives outside the City limits, so we still need one.

Also, we would like volunteers to head committees taking on special projects like making sidewalk requests (south side of Lake Road next to Rowe Jr. High), speed limit change requests on Lake Road, and park acquisitions.

City Manager Mike Swanson attended our May meeting and responded to these requests and said he would make an effort to work on them.

Since there are six other Neighbor-

hoods and numerous other concerns for Mike to take care of, we need to keep people involved so these goals are met.

Reis Hoyt made a presentation about the Waldorf School (the largest nonsectarian independent school system) that is moving into the old Milwaukie Middle School. The Ledding Library gave me information on their founder, Rudoph Steiner, and his philosophy "Anthroposophy."

In his own words he explains it as "...a path of knowledge to guide the spiritual in the human being to the spiritual in the universe. It arises in man as a need of the heart of the life of the feeling; and it can be justified only inasmuch as it can satisfy this inner need."

Steiner intended his philosophy to supercede conventional religion, but he worked with various Protestant groups to develop the Christian Community (a modern church) not formally connected but allied. He claimed to discover the secret of man's search for the divine by his theory of spirit cognition, innate in everyone.

According to Steiner, most people are blinded by attention to material phenomena and are liberated from this materialism through contact with the reality of a spiritual world. To achieve this "final wisdom", one must exercise his mental, physical, and spiritual self by meditation and concentration.

In my own opinion, whether or not you can relate to this philosophy is a minor issue. The protection of our only large beautiful landmark and how the school integrates with the community are the important issues.

They seem to respect the historical beauty of the building and it's waterways. Milwaukie's attempt to purchase the building was unsuccessful and it's time to work with them to keep and preserve the landmark and grounds for all to enjoy.



Of the more than 20 predatory sexual offenders (*and 500 registered offenders*) in North Clackamas County, approximately 1/3 - 1/2 live in and around Milwaukie. What is being done to monitor this situation?

According to Clackamas County Community Corrections Officers Mark Rasmussen and Bill Sawyer, the County's Community Corrections staff has a plan of action. In response to Senate Bill 444 (passed in March 2000 which laid out the residency guidelines for predatory sexual offenders), the county notifies neighbors and other child-sensitive institutions two weeks prior to the offender's release from prison. First, a letter goes out to the local police, school district, media, the immediately affected neighbors, any Neighborhood



Association, and known child-care providers. Then, a few days prior to or immediately after the offender moves into his house, neighbors within a several-block area are personally visited by representatives of the county's Community Corrections Department. The offender is then periodically monitored via phone calls and visits by his parole officer.

If you have any questions concerning the operation of this program, contact either of the officials above or Darcy Bakerm, the Department's Supervisor, at (503) 655-8775.

Milwaukie Police Chief Kanzler also mentioned that the City maintains a program known as S.M.A.R.T that allows it's officers to make unannounced visits once each week to the home of a known violent offender. Chief Kanzler pointed out that Milwaukie is the only City in the County to maintain such a program.

Other topics discussed:

- Wanda Drendel has graciously offered to head up the fall Neigh-borhood picnic. Please give her your help when she calls on you to assist. We plan on having great food, entertainment and door prizes.
- Treasurer Dolly Macken-Hambright says that our Neighborhood Association still has plenty of grant funds to use, but needs a few more bright ideas by which we can use them.
 Bring your ideas to the fall meeting!

President Bush has encouraged us all to volunteer time each month in order to improve the lot of our fellow citizens. By taking two hours each month to attend your Neighborhood Association meeting, you can move toward accomplishing this goal! You can effect change in your City at the most basic level by attending, then acting.

We will not gather together formally until our September meeting, which will be held on the second Thursday of that month, September 12, 2002.

It was just a little over a year ago that the seven Neighborhood District Associations came together as one unified

group to assert ourselves as an influence in the City.

It started with our 14 Points, a document outlining our conditions of acceptance for Light Rail. Southeast Portland Uplift had pushed to put the rail back on the table for consideration, although selection committees studying South

Corridor had been instructed to find alternatives to rail. The regional transportation plan stated there was very little opposition to Light Rail here despite our overwhelming vote against it and that the line would be in operation by 2007.

Further information indicated they were going to try it without a vote, so it was decided it was time to act. What will happen is still anybody's guess.

Since we formed our coalition there have been numerous issues that have challenged us, and we've found that our unity has served us well. It isn't as though we were powerless before, but sometimes it seemed like it.

The most significant lesson we've learned is that no matter what happens we must stick together. We are not anti-

City or anti-Council, but we must stress that if we are against anything it is for the good of Milwaukie as a whole.

We must remember to constantly communicate with each other regarding Neighbohrood problems, because what is a problem for one is a problem for all.

Whether it be Lewelling's battle for a park, or Lake Road's development problems, or Linwood's concerns about Harmony Road, it is all one problem.

It isn't that we haven't had disagreements, but we realize that the differences we have and the way we resolve them will only make us stronger.

The unification of the NDA's has been remarkable, and it has made the whole City stronger.


