Sometimes small things are really big things. Take Linwood Neighborhood resident Joel Bergman's perspective on why he is involved with the Milwaukie Rotary Club and community service.

"I find service rewarding because it enhances the community I'm a part of," Joel said. "I think the effectiveness

of service to promote change or strengthen objectives is surprisingly powerful."

Asked where those ideas come from, his answer is disarmingly simple.

"I think it's pretty basic 'golden-rule' thinking; empathy versus apathy," Joel said.


Library toy drive

For the 14th straight year the Ledding Library is collecting toys for Mlwaukie's less fortunate children.



Recently the City of Milwaukie has made an increased effort to outline the elements of a more robust access plan for the disabled in our community. I want to thank Alma Flores, our new Community Development Director, and Chuck Eaton, our new Director of Engineering, for their efforts to help bring the city into

compliance with the ADA.

The federal law known as the Americans with Disability Act (ADA) which passed in 1990 is a constant reminder that we need to ensure "equal opportunity for persons with disabilities in employment, state and local government services, public accommodations, commercial facilities, and transportation."

The ADA defines a person with a disability as a person who has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activity. The ADA also makes it unlawful to discriminate against a person based on that person's association with a person with a disability. All our city projects and private commercial projects must comply with these federal standards.

So as we "move forward" with Milwaukie ... building new bikeways, new skate parks, new parks, new nature trails and commercial patio parklets, and continue our growth as a city with new routes and modes of transportation, let us not forget the members of our community who have a disability, be it visual and/or hearing impairment, mobility and/or mental impairment and make sure that we take care of their needs first ... before we consider our own desires.

After all, most of us have been fortunate enough to bike and walk free of such limitations and we owe it to our citizens to prioritize our efforts to help accommodate those with continued ADA disabilities.

Happy Holidays everyone. Hope this season finds you and yours well. November and December are the months that everyone starts to do their holiday shopping.

If your family is like mine, more and more of that is being done on-line. Avoiding the mall traffic and having items delivered right to your door is hard to argue with.

Unfortunately, it's also the time of year that thieves start patrolling neighborhoods looking for opportunity.

Packages left on the front porch are an easy score. Every year we take reports of stolen merchandise.

If you are going to have a package delivered, try and make sure there will be someone there to accept it. Maybe you can make arrangements to have it delivered to a trusted neighbor or to your office if your employer allows it. Use the tracking numbers to keep track of when the package should arrive. Most of all, if you see someone driving around your neighborhood or snooping around a neighbor's house that you don't recognize, give us a call. We'll come check it out and make sure everything is OK.

Moving Forward nearing the finish line

The Moving Forward Milwaukie Project – an initiative that began in 2013 to stimulate development in the downtown area, key commercial areas in central Milwaukie, and a pair of "Neighborhood Main Streets" that serve surrounding neighborhoods – is nearing completion.

The changes revising the use, development, design standards, and design review procedures for development in Central Milwaukie went before Council on Nov. 3rd, and is scheduled for adoption at the Dec. 15th Council meeting.

Changes that revised standards for the "Neighborhood Main Streets" of 32nd and 42nd Avenues went before Council on Nov. 17th and are anticipated to be adopted by Council at either the Dec. 15th meeting, or at one of the meetings in January. These revisions are intended to encourage attractive, functional commercial areas in central Milwaukie and pedestrian-oriented, neighborhood-serving business districts around segments of 32nd and 42nd Ave.

"It's been a long process that's incorporated a lot of public input," said Senior Planner Li Alligood.



Preserving traditions

Dec. 5th the Umbrella Parade and Tree Lighting Event kicks off the Holiday spirit in Milwaukie. But why do we have this event every year? It is simply a matter of a business group and a high school student wanting to give back to their community?

The first record of a tree lighting event comes from a 1982 City Council Session: "John Burrell, Giving Tree Committee, said the group is now organizing. They plan to improve the tree lighting this year."

Then in 1992 Milwaukie Downtown Development Association (MDDA) sponsored the *Share the Lights Festival*. It included a tree lighting ceremony, Santa photos, kids crafts, and yes an umbrella parade. MDDA disbanded in 1998, thus ending the festival.

Until 2006 when Chelsea Bantz says she was talking with her mom about how sad it was some of Milwaukie's traditions have died off when it occurred to her that she would resurrect the Umbrella Parade for her Milwaukie High School Senior Class Project. She visited the city's Neighborhood Associations and local businesses for funding and awareness. After a lot of hard work and determination, the Umbrella Parade was back. And thankfully to city staff, it's here to stay.

Council considers parking permit increase

At its Nov. 3rd Council Session City Council discussed increasing the cost of monthly downtown parking permits from \$25 to \$40 per month, \$70 to \$115 quarterly, and eliminating semi-annual permits and limiting advanced sales to one month.

Fall is officially hanging over our neighborhood like that morning fog.

Please slow down while driving through the streets of your neighborhood, especially during the morning and afterwork commute times.

Kids making their daily migration to and from school at these dawn and dusk

hours often are forced to walk in the streets and bike lanes near Linwood Elementary because there is not a connecting path of sidewalks. Consider this reminder that there is no bus service for those who live within one mile of the school.

Also keep in mind the many non-profits in your area needing help to provide basic services to our community this season. It is estimated that over 70% of our children that attend Linwood Elementary require reduced or free lunches because they come from financially strapped environments that struggle to put food on their own tables on a daily basis. If a school exceeds 50% need, they are considered a Title-1 school, so as you can see there is a lot of need within our own community.

Teachers at our local school have observed students who come to school hungry and, consequently, have a harder time learning and paying attention.

Consider getting involved with the BackPack Buddies program, which provide basic food needs to students over the weekends so kids don't go without meals outside of the school environment.


