The committee from the Junior Chamber of Commerce and other interested citizens appeared before the Commission and a discussion ensued concerning the proposed new fire equipment. After some discussion the City Commission informed the committee that they would be in favor of raising by a continuous levy a sum equal to \$55,000 for new equipment and \$18,000 a year for six additional fire men. Although the \$55,000 was not the amount requested by the Junior Chamber of Commerce for new equipment, they did agree to the proposal of the Commissioners. It was further agreed that the City Commission would purchase the kind and type of equipment they thought necessary especially concerning the aerial ladder truck and the number of alarm boxes. The City Manager and the City Attorney were instructed to prepare the proposal for placing on the ballot at a special election to be called in the near future.

Ordinance No. 1358, an ordinance vacating all those portions of Blocks 84, 85, 86, 89, 90, 91 and 92, according to the duly recorded plat of Oregon City, Oregon, lying within the boundaries of that tract of land conveyed to the Board of Water Commissioners of Oregon City in Book 114, page 55, Deed records of Clackamas County, Oregon, recorded January 24, 1910, and all streets and alleys therein as shown on said plat except Center Street, and except those portions heretofore sold (if any) by said Board of Water Commissioners or Oregon City, and declaring an emergency, was read the second time and on motion placed on its final passage, and it appearing from the certificate of Van Hoy O. Ballou, principal clerk of the publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise, that the same had been properly published as required by Charter, the ordinance was passed.

The City Manager brought up the matter of the Twelfth Street bridge and after some discussion was instructed to re-build or replace the present bridge with a similiar structure.

The City Manager brought up the matter of the Municipal Elevator and was instructed to investigate the feasibility of placing a new elevator between the Bluff and the railroad tracks and to secure an estimate of cost for presentation at their next regular meeting.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

A group of citizens appeared before the Commission in response to the Commission's announcement that the meeting would be open to all citizens to discuss the Charter changes recommended to the Commission by the Charter Change Committee at the last regular meeting of the Commission. Mr. Caufield read each change recommended and asked for discussion by the citizens. The results of the discussion were that Recommendation #6 pertaining to having a permanent planning commission authorized by the Charter and Recommendation #7 changing #9, page 6 of the Charter such that a person may become an elected official of the City after living in the City for a period of one year regardless of whether he is a property owner or not be ommitted from the ballot when the recommended changes were presented to the voters at the special election to be called in the near future.

Mr. May, publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise, brought up the question for discussion of the feasibility of having the proceedings of the Commission published. The Commission felt it was too costly and most people were not interested. It was the opinion of the majority of the citizens present that the proceedings should be published. No official action was taken by the Commission.

Commissioner Roake moved and Commission Long seconded that the City Attorney prepare and submit to the Commission at a special meeting on April 18 ballot titles for each of the charter changes recommended by the Charter Change Committee except changes # 6 and #7 and a resolution calling for a special election sometime in May or June for submitting to the voters the recommended changes # 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 8.

The City Manager read the following letter addressed to the City Commission:

March 24, 1949 Oregon City, Oregon 1707 - 11th Street

Oregon City Commission

Dear Sirs:

Almost 2 yrs ago I asked the City Manager about having 2 large fir trees topped, that are dangerous to our property. It seems he cann't get any action on this so I am writting to you as we want something done at once.

If they are not topped, and do blow over on our house or property we will hold the City liable for all damage.

And oblige

Upon motion the City Manager and City Attorney were requested to get in touch with all parties concerned and see if the matter of topping trees could be accomplished in an amiable manner.

The City Manager presented to the Commission a proposal that the voters be asked to approve a continuing levy above the 6% limitation of \$28,000 a year for two years and thereafter \$18,000 a year for the purchase of new fire equipment and the hiring of personnel. Upon motion the City Attorney was instructed to prepare a ballot title for this proposal and to include it in the special election to be called during the month of May or June.

Mayor Caufield announced the appointment of Mr. Ray Rilance to a four year term on the Planning Commission to run from April 7, 1949 to April 7, 1953.

The City Manager read the following letter from the Retail Trades Committee of the Oregon City Chamber of Commerce:

April 1, 1949

Mr. Robert A. Finlayson, Manager City of Oregon City City Hall Oregon City, Oregon

Dear Mr. Finlayson:

The merchants of Oregon City urgently request that the City Commissioners take steps to assure the enforcement of Oregon City's parking ordinance, especially concerning the area on the Super Highway, between Fifth and Eighth streets.

As you know, we are conducting an intensive campaign to bring more shoppers to Oregon City, and it is our desire to provide, as far as possible, parking space for these propsective customers.

Your bringing this matter to the attention of the City Commission will be greatly appreciated.

It was pointed out during the discussion that Dr. Graham Strickland is not a citizen of Oregon City and upon motion the matter was laid on the table until a new name by the petitioners could be suggested.

The City Manager read a letter from Stuard Mockford, Architect, requesting that he be hired to design a new elevator tower for Oregon City. Upon motion the City Manager was instructed to inform Mr. Mockford that the proposed elevator project had not progressed to the point where the City was ready to hire an architect.

It was moved by Commissioner Roake and seconded by Commissioner Long that the following ordinance be passed on first reading.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1359

AN ORDINANCE declaring any unoccupied vehicle parked upon a public street of Oregon City in violation of an Ordinance of Oregon City to be an obstruction therein and a public nuisance, and providing for the removal thereof, and declaring an emergency.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Any vehicle parked upon a public street of Oregon City at a place, in a manner or for a length of time prohibited by an ordinance of Oregon City is, if unoccupied, hereby declared to be an obstruction in such street and a public nuisance and any police officer of Oregon City is hereby authorized to cause the same to be removed to, and impounded in, the depository provided by the City for such purpose or a public garage for storage.

Section 2. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City of Oregon City in this: It is necessary to provide proper regulations of traffic and parking on the streets in Oregon City, therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the City Commission and approval by the Mayor.

Read first time and ordered published at a regular meeting of the City Commission held on the 6th day of April, 1949, and to come up for second reading and final passage at a special meeting of the City Commission to be held on the 18th day of April, 1949, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P.M.
