PROCLAMATION

Whereas, at a special city election held in Oregon City, Oregon on the 5th day of December, 1932, there was submitted by initiative petition to the legal voters of Oregon City, Oregon, for their adoption or rejection, an amendment to the charter of Oregon City, to-wit:

AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF OREGON CITY

"A Bill for an Act to amend the Charter of Oregon City proposed and submitted by initiative petition to the legal voters of Oregon City for their approval or rejection at a special City Election held on the 5th day of December, 1932.

. The following is the Ballot Title, the number and form in which the question was printed on the official ballot:

PROPOSED BY INITIATIVE PETITION

"An act to amend the charter of Oregon City to recall commissioners O. A. Pace, Charles H. Caufield and L. O. Harding. The business manager to act as city engineer and fixing the maximum salary of the business manager. A special election to be held January 24, 1933 to elect three new commissioners, the term of office of commissioner to be two years.

Amendment to the Charter of Oregon City, submitted to the voters by initiative petition:

. Be it enacted by the people of Oregon City and Oregon City Does Ordain as follows:

Section 1: That section 32 of the charter of Oregon City be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: The term of office of each commissioner elected under this charter shall be for the term of two years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. His term of office shall commence on the second day of January, after his election in November preceding, unless such date shall fall on a legal holiday, in which case his term shall commence on the following day; the one receiving the highest vote to act as mayor. Provided, however, the term of office of each commissioner now elected and acting shall expire on January 25th, 1933.

Section 2. That section 7 of the charter of Oregon City be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows: The commission shall at the first regular meeting in January appoint a general business manager and a city recorder, whose terms of office shall each be subject to the discretion of the commission and each of whom may be removed by the commission with or without cause. The city manager shall be an engineer of reputable standing who shall perform the duties of manager and city engineer, and his salary from all sources shall not be in excess of \$3,000.00 per annum.

Section 3. That in the event this amendment to the charter be adopted the city commission shall call a special election to be

held on January 24th, 1933, or as soon as it is convenient thereafter, for the purpose of electing three commissioners.

Section 4. That all parts of the city charter in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

And, Whereas, on the 6th day of December, 1932, the canvassing Board did canvass the vote and return on the said charter amendment as made out and signed by the respective election Boards in each of the election precincts, which vote is as follows:

The following ordinance was read the first time and on motion ordered published:

ORDINANCE NO. 1239

An ordinance making the annual tax levy of Oregon City, Oregon for the year 1933, and declaring an emergency.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That there be and hereby is levied upon and against all property within the corporate limits of Oregon City, Oregon, which is assessed and taxable for the year 1933 for state and county purposes, and the hereinafter stated sums of money and for the purposes hereinafter set out, which sums of money are hereby levied pursuant to the general laws of the state of Oregon and which authority is vested in Oregon City by the charter of Oregon City.

Section 2. (1) The sum of \$24,000 to provide a fund to pay the interest and a portion of the principal on \$275,000 refunding bonds.

- 2.. The sum of \$2,650 to provide a fund to pay the interest and a portion of the principal on \$30,000 funding bonds.
- 3. The sum of \$8,000 to provide a fund to pay the interest and a portion of the principal on \$70,000 funding and \$12,000 elevator bonds.
- 4. The sum of \$1,250 to provide a fund to pay the interest and a portion of the principal on \$12,000 fire bonds.
- 5. The sum of \$2,850 to provide a fund to pay the interest and a portion of the principal on \$25,000 city hall bonds.
- 6. The sum of \$2,500 to provide a fund to pay the interest and a portion of the principal on municipal building bonds.
- 7. The sum of \$4,500 to provide a fund for the maintenance of the Oregon City free library.

- 8. The sum of \$4,000 to provide a fund for delinquent taxes on bond interest and principal.
- 9. The sum of \$38461.00 to provide a fund for the general municipal expenses of Oregon City for the year 1933.

Whereas it is necessary that Oregon City, Oregon, raise the said sums of money for the purpose of defraying the expense of government for the year 1933, and it is necessary to protect the peace, health and safety of Oregon City, Oregon, by raising the said sums, an emergency is hereby declared, and this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its final passage and approval by the mayor.

Read first time and ordered published at a regular meeting of the city commission held on the 7th day of December, 1932, and to come up for second reading and final passage at a special meeting of the city commission to be held on the 19th day of December, 1932, at the hour of one o'clock p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 1240

AN ORDINANCE granting to The Pacific Telephone And Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, the right and privilege to do a general telephone and telegraph business and to place, erect, lay, maintain and operate in, upon, and under the streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways within Oregon City, poles, wires and other appliances and conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone, telegraph and allied purposes of communication.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. There is hereby granted by Oregon City to The Pacific Telephone And Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, the right and privilege to do a general telephone and telegraph business within said Oregon City and to place, erect, lay, maintain and operate in, upon and under the streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways within the said City, poles, wires and other appliances and conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone, telegraph and allied purposes of communication. Such wires and other appliances and conductors may be strung upon poles or other fixtures above ground, or at the option of the grantee, its successors and assigns, may be laid underground in pipes or conduits or otherwise protected, and such other apparatus may be used as may be necessary or proper to operate and maintain the same.
