A copy of the initiating proposal hereby approved is attached hereto marked Exhibit "B" and by reference made a part hereof.

### ORDINANCE NO. 1831

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF \$750,000.00 GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF OREGON CITY AUTHORIZED BY CHARTER AMENDMENT DESIGNATED AS CHAPTER VII-H, ADOPTED BY THE LEGAL VOTERS OF OREGON CITY AT A SPECIAL CITY ELECTION ON JULY 22, 1975, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That there shall be issued and sold as soon as may be practicable and as provided by law, \$750,000.00 par value of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, general obligation bonds dated October 1, 1975, numbered consecutively from 1 to 150 inclusive, to bear interest at a rate or rates of not to exceed a net effective rate

of seven per cent per annum payable semiannually on April 1st and October 1st of each year, with principal and interest payable in lawful money of the United States of America, to be negotiable in form with appropriate interest coupons attached and to be in denominations of \$5,000.00 each. Said bonds shall mature serially in numerical order and shall be payable in fifteen annual installments of principal as follows:

\$30,000.00 on October 1, 1976 \$30,000.00 on October 1, 1977 \$35,000.00 on October 1, 1978 \$35,000.00 on October 1, 1979 \$40,000.00 on October 1, 1980 \$40,000.00 on October 1, 1981 \$45,000.00 on October 1, 1982 \$50,000.00 on October 1, 1983 \$50,000.00 on October 1, 1984 \$55,000.00 on October 1, 1985 \$60,000.00 on October 1, 1986 \$65,000.00 on October 1, 1987 \$70,000.00 on October 1, 1988 \$70,000.00 on October 1, 1988 \$70,000.00 on October 1, 1989 \$75,000.00 on October 1, 1989

with the right reserved to Oregon City, however, at its option, to redeem in inverse numerical order at par and accrued interest on October 1, 1984, and on any interest day thereafter, any or all of the bonds of said issue maturing after October 1, 1984. The principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon.

The bonds of the issue of which this bond forms a part, maturing after October 1, 1984, may be redeemed by the said Oregon City, at par value and accrued interest upon October 1, 1984, and upon any interest day or days thereafter, in inverse numerical order in part or in the entire amount of the issue outstanding at call date, upon notice given at least fifteen (15) days prior to the redemption date specified therein, by publication thereof in one issue of a newspaper printed and published within the County of Clackamas, State of Oregon. From the date of redemption designated in any such notice, interest upon the bonds so called for payment shall cease.

This bond is one of a series of bonds amounting in the aggregate to the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$750,000.00), par value issued for the purpose of providing funds for the cost of improving and enlarging the existing water distribution system within and without Oregon City, and is issued under the authority of an election duly called and held in said City on July 22, 1975, and Ordinance No. 1831 of said City approved September 3, 1975, providing for the issuance of said bonds.

For the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on this bond, the full faith and credit of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, together with all net revenues received by the City water department derived from the sale of water within and without the City, are hereby irrevocably pledged.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions, and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuing of this bond have been done, happened, and been performed in regular and due form as required by law and the Charter and Ordinances of Oregon City and that this bond is an obligation of said City, and that the total indebtedness of Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, including this bond, does not exceed the statutory or constitutional limitations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor and attested by its City Recorder under the corporate seal of said City, and has caused the annexed interest coupons to bear the printed facsimile signatures of said Mayor and Recorder, all as of this 1st day of October, 1975.

That all the recitals and statements in the aforesaid bonds are true and the full faith and credit of Oregon City, together with all net revenues received by the City water department defined as gross revenues after expenses for maintenance and operation are hereby pledged to each successive holder of each of said bonds for the punctual payment of the principal and interest thereof when and as the same become due.

The Mayor and City Recorder of said City are hereby authorized to have said bonds printed in a suitable manner and to execute the same on behalf of the City and deliver them to the Treasurer of Oregon City who shall deliver them to the purchaser in exchange for the purchase price thereof at Oregon City, Oregon.

Section 2. The Commission shall each year make a special tax levy in an amount sufficient, with other available funds, to pay the principal and interest of the bonds hereby authorized.

Section 3. The City Recorder of said City is hereby directed to publish notice of sale and advertise said bonds for sale at least once eack week for not less than two consecutive weeks in the Enterprise-Courier, a newspaper or general circulation, printed and published within Oregon City, Clackamas County, Oregon, which notice and advertisement shall call for sealed; written bids for the purchase of said bonds to be presented and filed with the City Recorder at his office in the City Hall of said City on or prior to the hour of two o'clock p.m., on the 9th day of October, 1975, at which time and place said bids shall be publicly opened for consideration and further that the Commission of Oregon City will meet at the hour of 8:00 o'clock p.m., on the 9th day of October, 1975, in the Commission Chambers in the City Hall of said City to consider said bids so opened and to accept or reject any bid so made. Said notice shall further state that the Commission reserves the right to reject any and all bids and shall state that each bid shall be accompanied by a certified check or cashier's check on a bank doing business in the State of Oregon in an amount equal to two per cent of the par value of the bonds offered for sale as evidence of good faith on the part of the bidder, shall further state that the opinion of Messrs. Rankin, Walsh, Ragen & Roberts, attorneys at law of Portland, Oregon, shall be deemed sufficient as to the legality of the issuance and obligation of said bonds, and that the publication of such notice for two weeks, being two insertions, shall be deemed sufficient publication of said notice, provided, further, that if no satisfactory bid is received for the sale of said bonds at the time above specified, then the Commission may readvertise the bonds in a manner and under conditions provided in this Ordinance and as provided by law.

Section 4. That the bonds hereinbefore mentioned were duly authorized by the legal voters of said City at a special election held within the City of Oregon City on Tuesday, July 22, 1975, at which said special election the legal voters of said City amended the Charter of said City by adding thereto a new chapter designated as Chapter VIII-H, wherein and whereby Oregon City, acting by and through its Commission was authorized and empowered to construct new and enlarge existing water supply distribution and storage facilities, within and without the boundaries of the City of Oregon City and to acquire real property necessary to accomplish such improvements, and wherein said City was further authorized and empowered, through its Commission to issue and sell negotiable general obligation bonds of Oregon City in such form and bearing such provisions as the Commission may deem most likely to enhance their value and insure their salability, in the sum of \$750,000.00, and further authorizing the said Commission to expend the proceeds, with any other available funds, in payment therefor.

Section 5. Inasmuch as this Ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, public health and safety of Oregon City in this: That it is necessary that the existing water distribution system be improved and enlarged immediately and that the bonds for the financing thereof be sold immediately, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission and approval by the Mayor.

Read first time and ordered published at an adjourned regular meeting of the Commission held on the 14th day of August, 1975, and to come up for second reading and final passage at a regular meeting of the Commission to be held on the 3rd day of September, 1975, at the hour of 8:00 p.m.

## ORDINANCE NO. 1832

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE III, CHAPTER 3: WATER DEPARTMENT, SECTION 25: TURNING ON WATER WITHOUT AUTHORITY, AND SECTION 28: WATER RATES, SUBSECTION (A) 2, OF THE 1963 CITY CODE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Title III, Chapter 3: Water Department, Section 25: Turning on Water Without Authority, of the 1963 City Code, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

3-3-25: TURNING ON WATER WITHOUT AUTHORITY:

After the water has been shut off at the curb cock, if it should be turned on by any person other than an employee of the Water Department, the water will be again shut off, a section of the service pipe removed, and service will not be furnished until the arrears, current month and additional charge of five dollars (\$5.00) for shutting the water off and turning it on, are paid.

The foregoing rules and regulations must be strictly complied with in every instance, and water must be paid for by all premises supplied according to Section 3-3-28. Employees of the Water Department are not permitted to make any exceptions whatever.

Section 2. That Title III, Chapter 3: Water Department, Section 28: Water Rates, Subsection (A) 2, of the 1963 City Code, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

2. Senior Citizens over sixty-five (65) with three-quarter inch (3/4") meter (with assets of only owning their own home and an annual maximum income from all sources of four thousand eight hundred dollars (\$4,800.00) or less):

First 1,000 cu. ft. \$5.45 minimum

Next 3,000 cu. ft. 0.22 per 100 cu. ft.

All Over 4,000 cu. ft. 0.20 per 100 cu. ft.

Senior Citizens requesting the special lesser rate must make annual written application for this rate in person in the water office and must certify as to meeting the criteria of the lesser rate.

Section 3. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of Oregon City in this: That it is necessary that the requirements for senior citizens water rate be changed immediately and that a current realistic rate be established for shutting water off and turning it on, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission and approval by the Mayor.

Read first time and ordered published at an adjourned regular meeting of the Commission held on the 14th day of August, 1975, and to come up for second reading and final passage at a regular meeting of the City Commission to be held on the 3rd day of September, 1975, at the hour of 8:00 p.m.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE IV: BUILDING REGULATIONS, CHAPTER 5, SECTION 5: SIGNS IN RESIDENTIAL ZONES, OF THE 1963 CITY CODE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

OREGON CITY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That Title IV: Building Regulations, Chapter 5, Section 5: Signs in Residential Zones, of the 1963 City Code, be and the same is hereby amended by changing the first sentence of said Section 5 to read as follows:

4-5-5: SIGNS IN RESIDENTIAL ZONES: In "R-1", "R-2", "R-3", "R-4" and "R-4-0" zoning districts, in addition to those signs allowed without permit as described in 4-5-4, the following signs shall be allowed by permit. If illuminated, illumination shall be external to the sign.

Section 2. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of Oregon City in this: That it is necessary to provide for regulation of signs; therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission and approval by the Mayor.

Read first time and ordered published at an adjourned regular meeting of the Commission held on the 14th day of August, 1975, and to come up for second reading and final passage at a regular meeting of the City Commission to be held on the 3rd day of September, 1975, at the hour of 8:00 p.m.

## REGULAR MEETING

The regular meeting of the City Commission was held on the above date in the Commission Chambers at  $8:00~\rm p.m.$ 

Roll call showed the following present:

The minutes of the previous meeting, copies of which had been mailed to each Commissioner, were approved.

James Baily, City Planner, gave a report on a special meeting of the Oregon City Planning Commission to discuss site plan review procedures. Mr. Baily informed the Commission that the Planning Commission will prepare finalized site plan review procedures for the Commission's approval.

The City Commission was given the Planning Commission's recommendation on the zone change request of Groner-Brayson for property located on Pleasant Avenue, from R-2 to R-4 zone. Mr. Baily informed the Commission that the Planning Commission recommended denial of the zone change request. Mr. John Groner was present and requested that the City Commission continue the decision on the zone change to allow his attorney to prepare for a reply. The Mayor asked if there was anyone else present to protest the zone change. Mrs. Jeannette Flick of Dimick Street was present to oppose the change. It was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to continue the discussion on the Groner-Brayson zone change to the September 11 meeting.
