The Commission was informed that the Civil Service Commission has appointed Chet Locke as the Civil Service Examiner.

A letter was read from R. L. Schroeder, Assistant State Highway Engineer, acknowledging the City's letter on painting of the old Oregon City-West Linn bridge and informing the City that the Highway Division is short of funds and cannot justify expending funds for beautification.

The Commission was informed that the City has received \$86,132 from Federal Revenue Sharing, \$15,026.63 as the City's share of State Highway Revenues and \$2,352.93 in cigarette tax.

The City Commission was also informed that the funeral for former Street Superintendent Morris Dunwoodie will be Friday, October 8, at 1:30 p.m., Hillside Chapel.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned to Thursday, October 14, 1976 at 8:00 p.m.

ADJOURNED REGULAR MEETING

An adjourned regular meeting of the City Commission was held on the above date in the Commission Chambers at $8:00~\rm p.m.$

Roll call showed the following present:

Glenn D. Parrott, Mayor Dean Nichols, Commissioner James A. McKnight, Commissioner Alfred Simonson, General Manager John A. Buol, Recorder John C. Anicker, Attorney

The minutes of the previous meeting, copies of which had been delivered to each member of the Commission, were approved.

The City Commission was informed that the Planning Commission did not make a recommendation on the Reddaway and Associates' report on the civic center facility and the moving of the police station to the Red Soils area. The Planning Commission suggested setting a meeting with the City staff and the City Commission to continue discussion on the location of these facilities.

Gary Reddaway, Architect, was present to inquire of the Commission if it's possible to open the agreement and renegotiate the agreement on the civic center complex since it states that they will meet with the committees four additional times and two of those meetings have been held, with future meetings scheduled. The Commission requested that the City Manager and Reddaway and Associates meet and work out an amendment to the agreement to be submitted to the Commission for their approval.

The City Commission was read the report from Marybeth Arbuckle, Librarian, and the Oregon City Library Board on establishing a service fee to outside-city users. The City Librarian, Marybeth Arbuckle, discussed the problems with the Commission and informed them that presently the City has from 300 to 400 applications pending for library cards from citizens outside the city limits.

Miss Arbuckle stated that the Library Board recommends a \$15.00 fee for outside-city users. The Commission inquired about the cost to process a library card and Miss Arbuckle stated that it is estimated to cost \$2.00 for processing, plus, on interlibrary loans, there is approximately \$1.00 charge and approximately \$1.00 charge for postage in mailing the books to individuals on inter-library loans.

City Commissioner McKnight suggested the establishment of a \$19.00 annual fee for a family for those residents outside the city limits. Mrs. Alayne Woolsey spoke about the hardship to the unemployed and to senior citizens. Sandy Belozer and Rod Geier both spoke on the establishment of a fee and Mr. Geier stated that the Community College library is open to the public but the borrowing of a book is limited to one week for non-students.

Mayor Parrott spoke on the establishment of the fee and stated he favors the fee of \$15.00, as suggested by the Library Board, instead of the \$19.00 fee. After discussion, it was moved by McKnight, seconded by Nichols, that the City of Oregon City establish an outsideusers fee for the public library at \$19.00 per family for all patrons who are not residents or property owners in Oregon City, and that a family shall be defined as one person or two or more persons related by blood, marriage, legal adoption, or living together as a single housekeeping unit in a dwelling unit.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols. Nays: Parrott.

Chris Blodgett inquired about the \$4.00 additional fee and the amount of revenue generated from this fee over the \$15.00.

It was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to continue the street vacation of part of Lot 4, Block 10, Oregon City (11th and Main Streets) to the November 3rd meeting of the Commission.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

Betty Hart for the New Outlook Early School was present requesting funding for their school located on Bradley Road. Mrs. Hart explained the type of school to the Commission and stated that children attend from the ages of 4 to 9 years, and the program that they are trying to develop at this new school. Mrs. Hart stated that they are applying for funds from foundations and from the federal government but in the interim they need additional financing of approximately \$5,000. Sandy Belozer inquired about contacting Oregon City School District for funds.

After discussion, it was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to continue the request of the Outlook Early School and the three other requests from Clackamas County Youth Commission, Children's Commission, and Clackamas County Legal Aid, to the November 3rd meeting of the Commission.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

The Manager stated that the letter from the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners asking for the City's support for public works projects under the Public Works Act of 1976 has been changed from the original request in their letter dated September 29, 1976. The Manager stated that there are representatives from the County here who would like to present their application to the Commission and request support from the City.

John Doherty of Clackamas County Juvenile Department was present and stated that the juvenile department is making application to expand their present building from 3,000 square feet to 8,000 square feet at an estimated cost of \$422,000. Mr. Doherty stated that he has preliminary drawings of the expansion to present if the Commission is interested in reviewing the expansion program. Mr. Doherty also requested support from the City for this project.

It was moved by McKnight, seconded by Nichols, to authorize the Manager to prepare a letter to be sent to the Board of County Commissioners supporting the Clackamas County Juvenile Department on their application for funding under the Public Works Act of 1976.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

Richard Wick of the Dog Control, Clackamas County, was present requesting support on their application for expansion to their building from 725 square feet of office space to 2800 square feet. Mr. Wick stated that he also has plans of the proposed expansion and would answer any questions that the Commission might have regarding the application.

After discussion, it was moved by McKnight, seconded by Nichols, to prepare a letter to be sent to the Board of County Commissioners supporting the Clackamas County Dog Control on their application for funding under the Public Works Act of 1976.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

A letter was read from Craig Adams, operator of the State Theatre, requesting permission to redo the exterior facing of the State Theatre building owned by the City. Mr. Adams was present and stated that the exterior will be covered with a cedar material and requested authorization to replace the exterior facing. It was moved by McKnight, seconded by Nichols, to approve the request of Craig Adams, operator of the State Theatre, subject to the approval of the City Building Department.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

Mr. Adams also inquired about his lease which will expire in the next two years. The Commission and Mr. Adams held a discussion on the lease and the Commission suggested that Mr. Adams prepare a new lease agreement and submit it to the Commission for their discussion.

Craig Nickles of the Downtown Merchants Association was present to discuss improving bus service with Tri-Met in downtown Oregon City. Mr. Nickles stated that the turning of buses at the corner of 5th and Main is a real problem for Tri-Met's 40-foot buses, and requested the removal of the 30-minute parking space in front of Pacific Northwest Bell. Mr. Nickles stated that he had a petition signed by 31 merchants requesting the removal of the parking space at 5th and Main. The Commission reviewed the history of the removal of the parking space and the City Recorder informed them of the previous discussions with the property owners at this location. The City Manager stated that Tri-Met plans to establish a bus shelter at 6th and Main Streets. Chris Blodgett spoke in favor of removal of the 30-minute parking spot.

The Commission also discussed the cutting of the radius at the intersection of 5th and Main and the City Engineer explained to the Commission the type of radius that will be required at this intersection.

After discussion, it was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to authorize the City Attorney to prepare a resolution removing the 30-minute parking space in front of Pacific Northwest Bell and to authorize the changing of the radius at the intersection of 5th and Main Streets.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

Continued discussion was held on the petitions for sewer and street local improvement district on Fir Street and Molalla Avenue. The Commission was informed that Jack Parker of Parker Northwest has now requested to sign the petition. The Manager informed the Commission it will be necessary to prepare engineering drawings and estimated assessments for the submission of the local improvement district. It was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to authorize the Manager to have engineering plans and estimated assessments prepared on the formation of the local improvement district at Molalla Avenue and Fir Street.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

The Commission was presented with architectural agreements for the applications under the Public Works Act of 1976 from Gary Reddaway on the proposed recreation building, from Stevens, Thompson & Runyan, Inc. on covering of the reservoir, and from Stuart Mockford for the addition to the mausoleum. The Manager stated that it will also be necessary to prepare an agreement for the curbs and sidewalks for South End Road, Warner-Parrott Road and Linn Avenue.

It was moved by McKnight, seconded by Nichols, to authorize the signing of the three architectural agreements and an agreement with Stevens, Thompson & Runyan, Inc. for the curbs and sidewalks.

ORDINANCE NO. 1862

An Ordinance amending Title II: Commissions and Boards, Chapter 2: Civil Service Commission, Section 18, Subsections (A) and (C), of the 1963 City Code, and declaring an emergency.

Oregon City does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Title II: Commissions and Boards, Chapter 2: Civil Service Commission, Section 18, Subsections (A) and (C), of the 1963 City Code, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

- (A) Any persons employed in positions subject to civil service at the time such position first becomes subject to civil service, and who have been employed by the City continuously for a period of at least thirty (30) days preceding the date when that position became subject to civil service, hereby are inducted permanently into civil service in the positions then held as if such persons had been permanently appointed under civil service after examination and investigation.
- (C) Within ninety (90) days after a position first becomes subject to civil service, the Manager shall file with the Treasurer, Auditor, Comptroller or similar officer of the City a statement giving the names, residence, occupation, length of continuous service and compensation of each person holding that position and declaring whether each person is or is not eligible for induction into civil service as provided in Subsections (A) and (B) of this Section.

Section 2. Inasmuch as this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of Oregon City in this: That it is necessary to bring the Oregon City Code in conformity with Federal regulations, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Commission and approval by the Mayor.

Read first time and ordered published at an adjourned regular meeting of the Commission held on the 14th day of October, 1976, and to come up for second reading and final passage at a regular meeting of the City Commission to be held on the 3rd day of November, 1976, at the

hour of 8:00 p.m.

The Commission was presented with new agreements with Shuell & Son Auto Wreckers and the City on the towing of abandoned vehicles. It was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to authorize the Mayor and the City Recorder to sign the agreement on behalf of the City of Oregon City.

The Commission was presented with a report on the traffic control at A. V. Davis, Holmes Lane and Telford Road from the City Engineer and the Traffic Sergeant of the Police Department concurring with the request of the petitioners to place a stop sign at the intersection of A. V. Davis Road, Holmes Lane and Telford Road and a new crosswalk. It was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to accept the recommendation and to authorize the City Attorney to prepare the necessary resolution.

Ayes: McKnight, Nichols, Parrott. Nays: None.

Continued discussion was held on the purchase of the park site at Pearl and Eluria Streets (4 acres). The Manager stated that he has been contacted by the owner of the 61 acres located outside the city limits. The City Manager stated that he has at this time not been able to study and make a recommendation on the purchase of the park. Chris Blodgett spoke on the 61 acres outside the city limits. This was continued to the next meeting of the Commission.

The Commission was read a letter from Gil W. Bellamy, Administrator, Oregon Traffic Safety Commission, regarding funds that are available for railroad grade crossings and the City Manager recommended that the City apply for funds from the Traffic Safety Commission to place gates at the intersection of 17th Street railroad crossing. The Manager stated that the improvements would be paid with funds 75% from the State, 20% from the railroad and 5% from the City. The Manager read a report from the Police Chief and the Traffic Sergeant recommending that the City apply for funds for this improvement. It was moved by Nichols, seconded by McKnight, to authorize the Manager to make application for funds for gates for the railroad crossing at 17th Street from the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission.

A letter was read from Randy Shutt, Head Coach, Oregon City-Swim Club, requesting use of the municipal swimming pool on December 18, 1976. It was moved by McKnight, seconded by Nichols, to authorize the use of the pool on December 18, 1976 by the Oregon City Swim Club.

Bill Parrish, City Engineer, gave a report to the Commission on the appearance before the CRAG Transportation Committee meeting which was held this morning on October 14, 1976.
