

City Hosts Earth Day Volunteer Clean Up and Bridge Dedication Event



On Saturday, April 23 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., the City of Milwaukie will host this year's annual Earth Day event that brings together the North Clackamas Urban Watersheds Council, Johnson Creek Watershed Council and volunteers from across the county to help clean up Kellogg Creek. This year, volunteers will remove trash, pull invasive plants, and beautify the area around the new Kellogg Creek Bridge, which connects the south end of Main Street (and the Main Street Orange Line MAX station) to Kronberg Park. This event is part of SOLVE IT, Oregon's largest statewide Earth Day event.

Volunteers will gather at 8:45 a.m. at the southern end of Dogwood Park (11299 SE Main Street) for a short orientation. Work will begin at 9 a.m. and conclude at 11:15 a.m. Afterward, lunch will be served to volunteers and the bridge dedication ceremonies will begin (for more details, see page four). At noon, the Sojourner Elementary Marimba band will perform on the bridge, so bring your dancing shoes!

Volunteer of the Year: David Aschenbrenner

In March, City Council annouced the recipient of the 2015 Volunteer of the Year award is David Aschenbrenner. This award recognizes a Milwaukie resident who has made a significant contribution to the community during the past year.

"In Milwaukie, we rely on volunteers to do a lot for the city, so it gives me a sense of community-building to give back," said Aschenbrenner. "I got started many years ago when a neighbor asked me to get involved with my NDA (neighborhood district association), then I was elected the NDA chair, and it just went from there."

Aschenbrenner was nominated by several Milwaukie residents for his service as the Hector Campbell NDA chair, president of the Milwaukie Historical Society, and board member of Celebrate Milwaukie, Inc. He was also recognized by his peers for his volunteer work

Our city has a great working relationship between City Council and the neighborhoods as well," said Aschenbrenner. "I have a very supportive family too, who's willing to let me volunteer this much."

Aschenbrenner will be formally recognized by City Council on Tuesday, April 5 during the Council meeting and have his name engraved on a plaque at city hall. Listening and Celebrating Our Differences

Recently, area Rotary Clubs, including Milwaukie's, hosted a Peace Symposium dealing with conflict resolution. Much of what I heard was, in many ways, things we already know, but presented in a new voice, with reminders. I'd like to share some of those thoughts, since they are relevant to our City Council, as well as all the city's Boards, Commissions and Committees.

Firstly, be involved! It does make a difference. Speak up; the goal of groups is to have voices that are heard. Various points of view and a multitude of ideas are needed for action. Divergent views cause people (reasonable people) to think, evaluate, shape ideas and arrive at solutions. (as in Council business, area development, all the areas of discussion in the city).

Shared difference is the ability to relate to each other and resolve conflict, and contribute to a healthier, stable, economically-vibrant and socially-thriving community. Your personal skills and personal viewpoints are what continue to make a difference. It's important to accept other possibilities, and to discuss options and variables.

Listening was a thread through all the presentations. Simple enough, but often hard for us to do—we all want to get our ideas out. A speaker, Nancy Pionk, JD, offered that listening is the foundation to change. The process, she said, is Listening, Understanding, Rapport, Influence, and Change. I think that goes along with what I learned some time ago; you have to educate to change. You can't just pop a new idea out to a group or person. You have to go through the steps of educating, and also open to the realization that your ideas may not be the best, listen to the others.

The bottom line for a healthy, active and attractive community is celebrate the differences, expect differences, and don't equate differences with wrongness.

Educator, author and artist Denise Emmerling-Baker was able to spend time at the University of Havana, Cuba in October 2014 as part of the first delegation of U.S. doctoral students to study in Cuba. She was also impressed by their resilience to make do with whatever material goods they could acquire, repair or restore.

Financial Ethics Reporting



In the city's efforts to continually embrace best practices in governing, Milwaukie's finance department has implemented an anonymous fraud and ethics hotline using EthicsPoint.

The fraud prevention is most commonly detected through employee and citizen tips. Having a tool and program in place for employees

and citizens to anonymously report any suspected misconduct is one of the most effective methods for fraud reporting. Residents and city staff can submit a case through a portal to EthicsPoint, where a team of educated professionals take the case. Further follow-up and review of the case is conducted through the anonymous portal.

If you are aware of any misconduct, act or omission that you think violates ethical city practice, the finance department encourages you to visit **www.milwaukieoregon.gov/finance/anonymous-fraud-ethics-reporting** to file a report online or call 1-855-230-6338.

City Code Corner

It's that time of year again when you have to dust off those lawn mowers and cutting shears.



There are some ordinances in the city that restrict the height of vegetation in certain areas. For instance, grass, weeds and wild blackberries are not allowed to be taller than 8 inches. Trees and shrubs overhanging below 8 feet on the sidewalk and below 12 feet on the street must be cut so pedestrians and vehicles can pass underneath safely.

Finally, for our friends at the fire department, residents need to keep a 3-foot radius clear around fire hydrants, in case of a fire, so they can protect you and your family.

Free Prescription Drug Take-Back Event



It's a great time to clean out your medicine cabinet! The Milwaukie Police Department (MPD), in conjunction with the Public Safety Advisory Committee, Milwaukie

Public Safety Foundation and Milwaukie Providence Hospital, will participate in the National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day on **Saturday, April 30 from 9 a.m. to noon**. Anyone wishing to dispose of unused or unwanted medications for free can stop by the Milwaukie Police Department at 3200 SE Harrison Street. Turning-in unused prescriptions can help keep children safer and prevent pill abuse. All drugs collected will be cataloged and placed in the MPD evidence room for destruction.

During the drug turn-in event, the MPD is also offering a free document shredding service for confidential records. Help prevent identity theft by bringing old documents and records you have been meaning to get rid of by having them ground onsite by Docu Shred.

Chain of Survival



CLACKAMAS FIRE DISTRICT #1

Cardiac arrest can occur without warning and can strike immediately. Knowing the signs of cardiac arrest and being part of the chain of survival can greatly improve a victim's chance

of survival. The Chain of Survival consists of five links dependent upon each other:

- 1. Rapid recognition of the cardiac arrest and calling 911.
- 2. Immediate Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). It's vital the cardiac arrest victim receive bystander CPR prior to the arrival of emergency medical crews.
- 3. Rapid defibrillation
- 4. Basic and advanced life support emergency medical services
- 5. Advanced life support post arrest care in the hospital

Immediately recognizing a victim in cardiac arrest, calling 911 right away, performing CPR, and deploying an AED, if available, provides the best chance of survival for cardiac arrest victims. For more CPR or chain of survival information, visit www.clackamasfire.com.



City Hosts Arbor Day Celebration on April 23

On April 23 from 11-11:30 a.m., the city will host a special tree planting in Dogwood Park (11299 SE Main Street) to celebrate Arbor Day. During the event, guest speakers, including Mayor Mark Gamba, will offer some brief remarks and participants will have a chance to help plant a new tree in the park. Afterward, the city will provide those in attendance with free trees to be planted at their own residences.

Tree planting is a national tradition that started with the first Arbor Day on April 10, 1872. This is the first year the City of Milwaukie has held an official tree planting to celebrate Arbor Day, but will become an annual activity. This event is part of the city's effort to achieve Tree City USA status, a nationwide movement that celebrates the importance of an urban tree canopy and improved care for the city's vital trees in its public spaces. Trees enhance the health and well-being of the environment, while adding beauty to the community.

Jerry Zimmerman: A Milwaukie Sports Star



Jerry Zimmerman

April is the beginning of spring for many, but for some of us, it is the transformation of basketball season into baseball season. There is one famous Milwaukie High School (MHS) student that exemplifies this experience—Jerry Zimmerman. He was an accomplished Maroon (now Mustangs) basketball player, but also made his living playing and coaching in Major League Baseball.

The 1952 Maroon (MHS yearbook) states, "But paced by sixfoot, All-State, senior Jerry Zimmerman, the Mustangs ran up 17 wins while losing 9 tilts. Zimmerman led the Maroons through a successful regular season....Zimm-led Maroons swept the district 12 title with Zimm hitting for 31 markers against Molalla." The Maroon continues, "Jerry Zimmerman became the first Milwaukian to be named to the All-State team. Zimm poured in 533 points during the 28-game season. Jerry is no doubt one of the greatest basketball players ever to play for Milwaukie Union High School."

Not only did Jerry Zimmerman dominate the court, he also ruled the diamond. The 1952 Maroon states: "Speedy centerfielder Bill Cunningham, strong armed pitcher Len Zimmerman, and hard hitting catcher Jerry Zimmerman are the nucleus around which coach McKeel has built this year's team."

After high school, Zimmerman was drafted by the Boston Red Sox and traded to the Cincinnati Reds in 1959. He ended his career playing for the Minnesota Twins in 1969. He played in two World Series in 1961 and 1965. He was a bullpen coach for the Montreal Expos from 1969- 1975, then for the Twins from 1976-1980. He ended his baseball career as a scout for the Yankees and Orioles. He is also one of the last acting coaches ever to umpire a Major League game during an umpire strike in 1978.

See to Read - Vision Screenings
Thursday, April 28 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.



Free vision screenings will be offered in the children's library by trained screeners from the Elks Children's Eye Clinic at OHSU. This service is for children ages 3-7, no registration is required.

See to Read is dedicated to the sight and the success of Oregon's children and provides free vision screenings at public libraries across the state. The Elks Children's Eye Clinic at Oregon Health & Science University's Casey Eye Institute is joining with the Oregon State Elks and the Oregon Library Association to detect vision problems in 3-7 year-olds before vision disorders unnecessarily threaten a child's development.

At least 15 percent of all preschoolers have an undetected vision problem that needs to be treated with glasses, which is why Oregon's legislator has mandated a new law that requires all children entering kindergarten to show proof of a vision screening. See to Read is a part of this state wide initiative, aiming for earliest detection. This program is driven by the notion that no child should begin learning to read and write with an undetected vision problem.
