WHAT WE HEARD AT THE 2ND PUBLIC MEETING....

Overall Character/Planting

- Like the use of Native Plants
- Like keeping the existing tree canopy/minimal grading to protect the roots
- Perimeter screening planting that allows some views into the park

Desired Programmatic Elements

- A central looped pathway similar to the location shown in Option 3
- A central play area, similar to the locatoin shown in Option 3
- Small shelter near the play area
- A more direct connection from the neighborhood to the east to the shelter and play area, similar to Option 2
- A few picnic tables throughout the site
- A Play Area with opportunities for a variety of ages, not just young children
