TOWN HALL MILWAUKIE, OREGON, DEC. 5TH. 1916.

The one hundred seventy-seventh (177) regular meeting of the Council of Milwaukie was held on the above named date. Meeting called to order by Mayor Pelton. Present, Mayor Pelton, councilmen Grasle, Snyder, Miller, Shindler and Counsell, Recorder Mathews and Marshal Riley. The minutes of the one hundred seventy-sixth regular meeting of the Council held on the 9th day of November, 1916, were read and approved as read. Mr. Grasle of the Street Committee reported that the drain across Washington Street near Mr. Hager's property had been installed. Mr. Miller reported that the P. R. L. & P. Co. would accept \$75.00 as payment in full for its alleged claim against the Town for lighting. Upon motion duly made and carried, the Recorder was instructed to draw a warrant in favor of the P. R. L. & P. Co for \$75.00 payment in full for all its claims against the Town for lighting to date, and that the warrant be delivered to the Company upon receiving a recept in full payment. Upon motion duly made and carried, the Recorder was instructed to draw a warrant on the 27th. Street Improvement Fund in favor of W. H. Counsell for \$600.00, the same being 80% of the work now completed ascertified toby the City Engineer. The bid of Mr. Rigdon for \$5.00 for the old water tank and tower was real and referred to the Water Committee with full power to act. Moved and seconded that Mr. Carver be notified to convert his locomotives running through Milwaukie into oil burners on or before the figrt day of January, 1917, and if he fails to do so he will be stopped from rurning them through the Town, and his franchise will be revoke. Motion carried. Upon motion duly made and carried, the Mayor was instructed to appoint a member of the Council to accompany the Mayor and Treasurer and interview Mr. paly in regard to reducing the water rates of the Town, whereupon the Mayor appointed Mr. Snyder. The matter of looking after the sidewalk on Myrtle Street was left with the Street Committee. The returns from the City Flection held on the 4th day of December, 1916, were canvass ed by the Council and which showed the following results: For Mayor.
