

MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 13, 1948

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

708th MEETING

The seven hundred eighth regular meeting of the Council was held on the thirteenth day of September 1948.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Sperr.

Present: Mayor Sperr; Councilmen: Hamlin, Mortensen, and Nelson; Manager Taber, Attorney Kirkpatrick and Recorder Martin. Absent: Councilman Frady.

The minutes of the seven hundred seventh regular meeting of the Council, held on the twenty-third day of August 1948, were corrected as written.

The minutes of a special meeting of the Council, held on the seventh day of September 1948 were read and approved as read.

Mr. Charles Walden brought before the Council the matter of rounding off the S.W. corner of Railroad Avenue and Oak Street, making a wider intersection and eliminating the necessity of making a double turn to get into Monroe Street at Railroad Avenue.

It was moved by Nelson and seconded by Mortensen that the Mayor appoint a committee to make a survey of the matter, that Manager Taber place stakes along the proposed S.W. boundary of the intersection, and that upon approval of the proposed boundary by the committee, that Manager Taber be authorized to proceed with negotiations with the Southern Pacific Co., owners of the property, to obtain the right of way for the cut back. Motion carried and so ordered. The Mayor appointed the following committee: All members of the Council, Manager Taber, Attorney Kirkpatrick, Officer Delp, and Mr. Charles Walden.

There was considerable discussion in regard to hiring a Municipal Judge, the Recorder pointed out to the Council that while the work in the police department had greatly increased, which increases the work in the Municipal Court, yet, few cases go to court, most of them being handled by bails posted. It was decided that Attorney William Charack be invited to come before the Council to discuss the matter.

It was moved by Hamlin and seconded by Nelson that the following bills be allowed and that the Recorder be directed to issue warrants for the payment of same.

MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 27, 1948

COUNCIL CHAMBERS

709th MEETING

The seven hundred ninth regular meeting of the Council was held on the twenty-seventh day of September 1948.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Sperr.

Present: Mayor Sperr; Councilmen Hamlin, Mortensen, Frady, and Nelson; Manager Taber, Attorney Kirkpatrick and Recorder Martin.

The minutes of the seven hundred eighth regular meetin of the Council, held on the thirteenth day of September 1948, were approved as written.

Manager Taber reported that he had heard by telephone from War Assets Administration to the effect that they had turned the City's bid for purchase of surplus property in Kellogg Park, over to the Legal Department for the transfer to be made. Mr. Taber stated that the department representative with whom he had talked told him that W.A.A. had received formal protest from the Scott Estate but that the City of Milwaukie had complied with all necessary requirements in submitting their bid, and, though we had no written assurance, Mr. Taber felt satisfied that the transfer would soon be made. Manager Taber stated that while the property could not be
