Town Hall, Milwaukie, Oregon, June 27th. 1932.

An adjourned meeting of the three hundred sixty-third regular meeting of the Council was held on the 27th. day of June, 1932. Meeting called to order by Mayor Miller. Present, Mayor Miller, Councilmen Sanders, Shindler, Dean, Bevington and Dell, Recorder Mathews and Marshal Keck. Upon motion duly made and carried, the bid of C. H. Counsell of \$445.18 for the improvement of 31st. Street from Elmer Street to Madison Street was accepted and the contract for the improvement of said Street was awarded to C. H. Counsell, and the Mayor and Recorder were instructed to execute a contract on behalf of Milwaukie with C. H. Counsell for said improvement. Councilman Dell of the Finance Committee reported that the Committee had taken the matter of the first half of the taxes due Milwaukie with Clackamas County and had been advised that the County had over paid the Town of Milwaukie to the amount of approximately \$4000.00 and had retained that amount out of the taxes due Milwaukie. The plans and specifications for the improvement of Lake Road and a portion of Harrison Street were read, and the same being satisfactory to the Council upon motion duly made and carried, the Recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for said improvement, the bids to be opened at the next regular meeting of the Council. The City Engineer estimated that the cost on Lake Road would be about \$2950.00 and the cost of Harrison Street would be about \$350.00. Upon motion duly made and carried, the Street Supt. was instructed to put in the necessary catch basins in the low places on Lake Road. The application of Henry W. Wiseman for the usual annual vacation was read and upon motion duly made and carried, Mr. Wiseman was granted a two weeks vacation. Upon motion duly made and carried, it was ordered that a truck body, hoist and a new transmission be put on the city truck, No further business coming before the meeting, upon motion duly made and carried, the Council adjourned.
