

SPECIAL MEETING OF JULY 6, 1962

A special meeting of the Milwaukie Planning Commission was held on the sixth day of July, 1962 for the purpose of a hearing on a zone change and such other business necessary to come before the Commission at this time.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Earl S. Burdick.

Present: Chairman Earl S. Burdick; Commissioners Roger Hollingsworth, Cecil N. Nickles, Leonard Mullan and Max Thompson, and Clerk Ellen Martin. Absent: Commissioners Earl Clay, Marvin Shrock, John O. Sheldahl and Henry Stewart.

The Chairman opened the hearing on the proposed zone change from 3-R-1 to Industrial Zone for the Palmer-Cole and Stose properties (Tax Lots 15 and 120 and North Mintone Homes, John Garrett D.L.C.) and called for any objection to the same. There was no person present who objected and no written objection had been received. It was moved by Mullan and seconded by Hollingsworth that the Commission recommend to the City Council that the zone be changed on these properties from Zone 3-R-1 to Industrial Zone. Motion carried and so ordered.

Mr. Hollingsworth presented the following Resolution from the Jr. Chamber of Commerce

WHEREAS, the City of Milwaukie does not have an official flower, and
WHEREAS, the City of Milwaukie does not have a distinguishing pseudonym (nickname)
and
WHEREAS, most cities use a pseudonym (nickname) or have a trade name which distinguishes it from other cities, and
WHEREAS, the Dogwood tree (Cornus nuttalli) is native to the City of Milwaukie,
and
WHEREAS, the oldest and largest Dogwood tree in the world is in the City of Milwaukie, and
WHEREAS, the popularity of the Dogwood Tree can well be attested to by the number that are planted in the yards of the residents of the City of Milwaukie, and
WHEREAS, the City of Milwaukie is and should be considered the Dogwood City of the West, now therefore
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKIE, OREGON, THAT

Section 1. The official flower of the City of Milwaukie shall be the Dogwood blossom (Cornus nuttalli, Cornus florida, Cornus florida rubra) to be used as an identifying emblem on official uniforms, vehicles, stationary, publicity releases, etc.; as deemed feasible by the City Administrator.

Section 2. The Dogwood blossom emblem shall be recommended for use by civic, fraternal, service, commercial and other recognized organizations in the Milwaukie area in the same manner as suggested in Section 1.

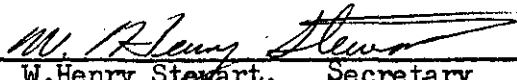
Section 3. The official pseudonym (nickname) of the City of Milwaukie shall be The Dogwood City of the West. This name is to be used in conjunction with the official City Flower

It was moved by Nickles and seconded by Mullan that the Commission approve the Resolution and recommend its adoption by the City Council. Motion carried and so ordered.

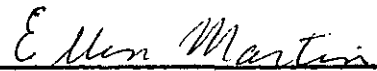
Plans and plot plans for a Jr. Jigh School, to be located at Lake Road, east of Kellogg Creek Acres, were laid before the Commission. After viewing the plans it was moved by Nickles and seconded by Hollingsworth that the plans be approved and t at the building permit be granted. Motion carried and so ordered.

A proposed plat of Reed Addition, south of Thompson Road, was laid before the Commission by the Clackamas County Planning Commission. The proposed plat showed 77th and 78th Streets to be dead ended at the south, with a 60 foot run around with the two foot of land at the south ends of these streets being reserved as private property. It was moved by Nickles and seconded by Thompson that the Plat be accepted and that the Commission recommend to the Clackamas County Planning Commission that the two foot strip at the south ends of these streets be deeded to Clackamas County. Motion carried and so ordered.

On motion duly made and carried the meeting adjourned.
