TOWN HALL, MILWAUKIE, OREGON, JULY 2ND 1918.

The one hundred ninety-sixth regular meeting of the Council was held on the above named date. Meeting called to order by Mayor Snyder. Present, Mayor Snyder, councilmen, Shindler, Grasle, Miller, Bates and Seavey. Recorder Mathews, Treasurer Streib and Marshal Riley. The minutes of the one hundred ninety-fifth regular meeting of the council held on 4th day of June, 1918, were read and approved as read. Mr. Morgan of the Lakewood Mutual Water Users Association was present and asked the Council to reduce the rates of the water used by them from 20 cents per 100 Cubic feet to 15 cents per 100 cubic feet for all water used over and above 2500 cubic feet during the months of June, July, August and September. Upon motion of councilman Grasle duly seconded and carried, the rates charged the Lakewood Mutual Water Users Association for water was reduced to 15 cents per 100 cubic feet for all water used over and above 2500 cubic feet during the months of June, July, August and September.

Upon motion duly made and carried, the Auxillary of the 65th Artillery, U. S. A. was granted a special dancing permit without cost. The report of the Treasurer was read and ordered placed on file. A communication from Stephen Carver requesting the Council to modify the franchise of the ~~XXXXXX~~ Oregon City and Portland Railway Company was read and the Recorder instructed to notify Mr. Carver that the Council would not modify the franchise in any way.

Upon motion duly made and carried, the matter of paving Harrison Street and Washington Street was left with the Street Committee.

Moved and seconded that the Council meet at the City Hall on the 29th day of July, 1918, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock A. M. Motion carried. The following bills were read and allowed by the Finance Committee and upon motion duly made and carried, the Recorder was instructed to draw warrants in payment of the same:
