# Highlights of the past month:

## Aquatics

- The wading pool outside of the municipal pool facility was painted before it opened this summer.
- This summer's lesson program is going very well. Registration numbers are strong and due to the long summer term, we have added a couple of extra sessions.

## Carnegie

- The summer Kids Art Camp successfully took place at the Pioneer Center.
- The Hank Weber show and reception was very well received.
- The gallery has been listed in Oregonian A&E.
- We have experienced an increased interest in more art classes by the public.
- Our new Tribal Belly Dance went well this summer.

## Pioneer

- June's trip took 20 participants to Silver Falls State Park.
- We conducted 4 dine outs with an average of 12-14 participants per trip.
- Glen Tadina's band plays old time swing dance songs every other Wednesday. Participation has been between 75-90 people attending. This has been a very positive event bringing in seniors of varying ages.
- The Center hosted four Blue Ribbon Task Force meetings this month.
- Presentation by Kathy and Beth to West Linn seniors last month produced a donation of \$300. \$100 is earmarked for meals on wheels and \$200 will be used for a community picture frame to display local artwork.
- Beth attended West Linn Seniors pot luck.
- Staff made 2 visits to the West Linn Senior Center.
- Jackie developed a theme tree for dining room.
- Julie procured donations for 4<sup>th</sup> of July picnic food at the center.
- Spring and fall class rosters have been developed with CCC.
- We are working with AARP to arrange for volunteers through their employment training program.
- We are currently working with Berry Park Retirement Center to develop a fundraiser to be held in September.
- Building Maintenance: painting completed in the dining room, dishwasher and steamer repair completed, front window fixed, the moveable wall that divides the classrooms was replaced, building windows washed

## Recreation

- Summer day camp registration levels are up a little from last year.
- "Teen Scene" attendance is slowing down to about 150 kids per week now that school is out.

## Cemetery

- Broadleaf spraying of cemetery completed
- Mowing continues
- Hand watering of grounds/ lawn areas
- Spot spray shrub beds and curbs
- Continue leveling of headstones

- Atkinson rest room roof completed
- Install Sportscraft Dock signage

- Fill holes in lawn areas/ select parks

## **Concerns and Challenges:**

## Aquatics

• The pool continues to experience maintenance issues: The building's water service pipe is leaking again and will probably need replaced. One of the rooftop air conditioning units has undergone repair again. The outdoor wading pool isn't draining properly due to problems with its old plumbing. The Natatorium steam heating coils are deteriorating and leaking. They will need to be replaced at a cost of around \$9,000. It will take 4-6 weeks to have new coils fabricated.

### Carnegie

• The Blue Ribbon Committee is recommending that the center become self-sustaining within two years. Accomplishing this will be a difficult task and may involve relying more heavily on volunteers, reducing hours/ days of operation and increasing our art sales commissions, among other things.

#### Pioneer

- Reception area volunteers need more volunteers, more time for training.
- Need to recruit more people to assist with the Meals on Wheels program to maintain a strong pool of volunteers.
- Donation boxes need to be more secure. Options are being reviewed.
- Recent transportation issues include bus breakdowns, not passing DEQ, and misinformation on vehicle registration.
