BY-LAWS OF *THE FRIENDS OF THE CARNEGIE CENTER*, A NOT-FOR-PROFIT CORPORATION

ARTICLE I ORGANIZATION

1. The name of the organization shall be *The Friends of the Carnegie Center*. The purpose of the Friends of the Carnegie Center will be to further the services of the Carnegie Center in Oregon City by supporting the marketing, fund raising, educational and art programs currently in process and for those developed in the future.

2. The organization may at its pleasure by a vote of the membership body change its name.

ARTICLE II PURPOSES

The following are the purposes for which this organization has been created:

- a. To unite a group of individuals that are interested in supporting the programs at the Oregon City Carnegie Center.
- b. To help to market the center and enhance the resources needed to keep the Carnegie Center functional for all members of the Oregon City community.
- c. To support the staff and management as well as the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee on the development of the Carnegie Center.
- d. To participate in fund raising activities to secure materials and aid beyond that which the city budgets for support of the Carnegie. These funds could come through gifts, memorials, bequests and other projects.
- e. To assist the staff where practical in program development, volunteer support and other areas where needed.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

Membership in this organization shall be open to all individuals who manifest their interest in the organization by financial support.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

The annual membership meeting of this organization shall be held on the 15th day of June and every year except if such day be a legal holiday, then and in that event, the Executive Board shall fix the day but it shall not be more than two weeks from the date fixed by these By-Laws.

The Secretary shall cause to notify every member in good standing at his/her address as it appears in the membership roll book in this organization a notice telling the time and place of such annual meeting.

Regular meetings of this organization shall be held at the Carnegie Center on the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.

The presence of not less than 25% percent of the members shall constitute a quorum and shall be necessary to conduct the business of this organization; but a lesser percentage may adjourn the meeting for a period of not more than 4 weeks from the date scheduled by these By-Laws and the secretary shall cause a notice of this scheduled meeting to be sent to all those members who were not present at the meeting originally called. A quorum as herein before set forth shall be required at any adjourned meeting.

Special meetings of this organization may be called by the president when he/she deems it for the best interest of the organization. Notices of such meeting shall be mailed or e-mailed to all members at their addresses as they appear in the membership roll book at least five (5) days before the scheduled date set for such special meeting. Such notice shall state the reasons that such meeting has been called, the business to be transacted at such meeting and by whom it was called.

ARTICLE V VOTING

At all meetings, except for the election of officers, all votes shall be by voice. For election of officers, ballots shall be provided and there shall not appear any place on such ballot that might tend to indicate the person who cast such ballot.

At any regular or special meeting, if a majority so requires, any question may be voted upon in the manner and style provided for election of officers and directors.

ARTICLE VI ORDER OF BUSINESS

ARTICLE VII OFFICERS

The initial officers of the organization shall be as follows:

President: Vice President: Secretary: Treasurer:

The *President* shall preside at all membership meetings.

He/She shall present at each annual meeting of the organization an annual report of the work of the organization.

He/She shall appoint all committees, temporary or permanent.

He/She shall see all books, reports and certificates required by law are properly kept or filed.

He/She shall be one of the officers who may sign the checks or drafts of

the organization.

He/She shall have such powers as may be reasonably construed as belonging to the chief executive of any organization.

The *Vice President* shall in the event of the absence or inability of the President to exercise his/her office become acting president of the organization with all the rights, privileges and powers as if he had been the duly elected president.

The Secretary shall keep the minutes and records of the organization in appropriate books. It shall be his/her duty to file any certificate required by any statute, federal or state.

He/She shall give and serve all notices to members of this organization. He/She shall be the official custodian of the records and seal of this organization.

He may be one of the officers required to sign the checks and drafts of the organization.

He/She shall present to the membership at any meetings any communication addressed to him as Secretary of the organization.

He/She shall submit to the Board of Directors any communications which shall be addressed to him/her as Secretary of the organization.

He/She shall attend to all correspondence of the organization and shall exercise all duties incident to the office of Secretary.

The *Treasurer* shall have the care and custody of all monies belonging to the organization and shall be solely responsible for such monies or securities of the organization.

He/She must be one of the officers who shall sign checks or drafts of the organization. No special fund may be set aside that shall make it unnecessary for the Treasurer to sign the checks issued upon it.

He/She shall render at stated periods as the President shall determine a written account of the finances of the organization and such report shall be physically affixed to the minutes of such meeting.

He/She shall exercise all duties incident to the office of Treasurer.

No officer shall for reason of his office be entitled to receive any salary or compensation

An internal audit of the books of this organization shall be conducted annually .

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

All committees of this organization shall be appointed by the Board of Directors and their term of office shall be for a period of one year or less if sooner terminated by the action of the Board of Directors.

The permanent committees shall be:

a. Executive

b. Membership

c. Nominating

ARTICLE IX DUES

The dues of this organization shall be as follows:Student (under 18) \$ 10.00Senior (60+)\$ 10.00Individual\$ 25.00Family\$ 50.00

These dues are per year and shall be payable on January 1 of each year.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be altered, amended, repealed or added to by an affirmative vote of not less than 25% percent of the members.

ARTICLE XI COMPENSATION AND DISSOLUTION

No member of the friends as such shall receive any of its earnings or profits or be paid a salary, except reasonable compensation for services in effecting one or more of its purposes, and no person shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any corporate assets upon dissolution. Upon dissolution of the Friends of the Carnegie Center, after making provision for the payment of all liabilities of the Friends of the Carnegie Center, the surplus assets will be paid to the Oregon City Carnegie Center. However, should the named recipient not be qualified, all assets shall be distributed for like education or charitable purposes.



OREGON CITY PARKS & RECREATION Activity Report

Month of: May 2004

Highlights of the past month:

Aquatics

- The swimming pool has been very busy with end of school year parties this month.
- Summer program registration began May 29th. Because it was memorial weekend, registration began a little slow, but picked up steam the following week.
- Repairs were made to the wading pool fill valve.
- Since the summer term is a little longer than usual, we have added sessions of swimming lessons, aqua camp and the summer recreation swim team program.

Carnegie

- Garden show was well received. Some of the moveable walls were painted bright colors, so the show looked festive. Some patrons commented that it was sad to see it come down.
- The summer Trail News has been mailed and planning is beginning for the fall edition.
- Registration for new classes is coming along slowly, while the established classes are doing well.
- Broken dishwasher has been replaced, free of charge, due a manufacturers defect.
- Playground equipment is very popular with use by children in morning, teens in afternoon and adults in the evening.
- "Sheer Delight" Exhibit at the Ermatinger House is wonderful. Textile and Clothing exhibits are bringing in new and repeat visitors to the Ermatinger House.

Pioneer

- The annual Health Fair was held on May 26th. There were 28 vendors on site, and approximately 150 participants. Evaluation forms included very positive comments, and vendors would like to return next year. Clackamas County Licensing will approve next year's event for continued education for adult foster care providers.
- The trip to the Tillamook Cheese Factory was successful with 20 participants.
- We provided four dine out trips with an average of 15 participants each week.
- Julie has attended the weekly chamber meetings to highlight the Pioneer Center Program.
- Glen Tadina's band plays old time swing dance songs every other Wednesday. Participation has been between 75-90 people attending. This has been a very positive event bringing in seniors of varying ages.
- The Center Hosted the Blue Ribbon Task Force meetings twice this month.
- Kathy participated in the formal proclamation of Clackamas County "Senior Center Week, May 9-15th".
- Kathy and Beth made a presentation to West Linn seniors who had requested ideas for possible donations.

- Beth conducted a promotional talk to West Linn Methodist church and Optimist club.
- Many high need maintenance items were completed this month, including 112 fluorescent light bulbs replaced around the Center's hallways, basement and offices. Painting finished in the kitchen, gutters were cleaned and some exterior areas with spider infestation were cleaned.
