Subject: Renaming of Senior Citizens Park

At your July 25, 2005 meeting you will be considering the subject of recommending changing the name of Senior Citizens Park. To date, this subject has been considered or discussed at no fewer than two formal PRAC meetings and one formal parks naming sub-committee meeting. At your June 27 meeting you requested that I put forth all of the suggested name changes received thus far, for your consideration at the July 25 PRAC meeting. These are as follows in no particular order:

- McLoughlin Children's Park (recommendation of naming sub-committee)
- Richard Bloom Memorial Park
- Bloom Memorial McLoughlin Children's Park
- Library Park Children's Annex
- Children's Annex at the Carnegie
- McLoughlin Plaza Children's Park (McLoughlin Plaza being the name of the broader area including Library Park and the Carnegie Center)

The purpose of your discussion at this point should be focused on making a formal recommendation of a specific name change by a majority vote of PRAC, with guidance from the current Policy For Naming or Changing Names of Parks, Recreation and Cemetery Facilities. Your formal recommendation would then be forwarded to the City Commission for their consideration and final determination on the matter.

#### Oregon City Swimming Pool Facility and Energy Study Recommendations August 1, 2005

The Oregon City Swimming Pool opened in 1965 and has served hundreds of thousands of local patrons over .ne course of its life. Unfortunately, the facility's age is starting to show and much work must be done to tackle the significant deferred maintenance backlog and ensure that the swimming pool can continue to function effectively. Staff recommends approaching this task from the following two angles:

1. This fall, we initiated a complete swimming pool facility energy audit. This energy efficiency program is supported by the Energy Trust of Oregon, who approves and funds the studies and manages the incentive program. Our study was recently completed and reviewed by staff. Three of the study's recommended energy saving measures appear to have great merit, in that they will reduce the amount that the pool spends annually on natural gas and electricity, while providing some much needed facility upgrades.

The three measures we recommend implementing include:

- A. Upgrading our pneumatic heating and ventilation controls with a programmable digital control system
- B. Adding swimming pool blankets and a supplemental ultraviolet light water treatment system
- C. Insulating the boiler and steam pipes.

The anticipated cost to implement these measures is approximately \$104,000. Once completed, we would then receive rebates through the Energy Trust of about \$50,000, leaving the City with a net cost of \$54,000. These measures are estimated to result in an annual energy savings of \$17,000, resulting in a payback period of 3.2 years.

The City can either fund the implementation of these measures up front or it can take out an energy loan from the Energy Trust. The energy loans carry a 4% interest rate and can be structured with flexible payback periods. Generally, participating agencies structure the payback period to coincide with the energy savings payback period (3.2 years in our case) so that implementing the recommended measures actually results in no net cost up front, and then results in significant annual savings once the loan is paid off. Please, see the attached spreadsheet for details.

2. In order to thoroughly study the condition of the swimming pool and make informed decisions about its future, we recommend obtaining the services of an independent aquatics consultant firm to conduct a facility evaluation and consultation. Such studies are commonly undertaken by agencies in our situation and many firms are capable of conducting them. The resulting report would provide us with a thorough understanding of the swimming pool's condition, as well as a description of items in need of repair and projected costs. We might also wish to have the consultant conduct a market analysis to make recommendations about the level and structure of our current user fees.

In addition, the study would analyze other options, including renovation and expansion, considering the pros and cons of the current site vs. an alternate location. While the scope of work can be customized to meet our needs, we anticipate that such a study could be conducted over a 60-90 day period and would cost \$5,500-\$6,500.

#### Highlights of the past month:

#### Aquatics

- Once again, a locker room water pipe developed a leak and was repaired. These pipes are in such poor condition, that we are likely to replace them this fall.
- Summer lessons began quite slowly this summer. Registrations are beginning to increase, however.
- Aqua Camp enrollment is also down a little from last year.
- Ants have invaded the pool the staff has taken a very hard line on trying drive them back.
- We have been seeing many more summer day camp groups attending regular recreational swim sessions than in recent years.
- The wading pools at the swimming pool facility and at Rivercrest Park opened mid June, as did the Carnegie Spray Pool.

#### Carnegie

- Pat Averill Gallery Show does very well. The opening was well attended.
- The recent filming temporarily shut down the area around the Carnegie Center, but the crew made up for it with coffee shop business and some art sales.
- We are currently negotiating a management agreement with Fine Art Starts to assume operation of the Carnegie Center. If approved by the City Commission, we would expect the Center to re-open in September.

#### Pioneer

- Fund raising events Cake sales produce about \$30-\$60 per week.
- Church group rents building every Sunday morning, and Wednesday evenings. We also had three additional rentals on Weekends for weddings.
- The Center conducted 2 trips this month Both were well attended. Roselinn care center went on 1 trip.

- The Center conducted 4 dine outs with an average of 16-20 people.
- West Linn seniors went on 2 dine outs and 1 potluck with 12-15 participants per trip
- Donations: \$2250 for the pioneer donation fund, and \$300 for meals on wheels. Donation fund paid \$1830 for shaved ice machine.
- A heat pump was ordered for the front area of building to replace another failed unit.
- Met with the Art faire coordinators regarding the First timers art faire to be held at Pioneer Center
- Received the van from Canby center. All vans were sent out to have logos put on.
- Assisting with transportation for the Rivercrest day camp program this summer.
- Facility rental fees were approved for an increase effective July 1.

#### Recreation

- Our partnership with Sage School to provide PE classes for their students began in April and will conclude in June for the year. It appears that the school has funds to continue the program in the fall.
- Planning continues for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Celebration Concert.
- Summer day camps and swimming lessons have begun again. Registration has been slower than in recent years, presumably due to the late release of the Trail News.

#### Up Coming Events/ Dates of note:

#### Carnegie

- Concerts in the Park begin July 7
- Bill Brant and Norm Bursheim will each have a 2-week gallery show in July.
- The Center will close on August 1.
- The fall Trail News will be the last one produced as we know it due to the closure of the Carnegie Center. We are exploring alternatives.

#### Recreation

• The City is partnering with the Rotary Club in administering the Oregon Eel Fest in June

#### Pioneer

- Two trips are planned for July
- Dine outs will be held at a variety of Oregon City locations
- Two West Linn dine outs and one potluck are scheduled for July
- The First Timers Art Fair will be held at the Center July 9<sup>th</sup> and 10th

#### **Concerns and Challenges:**

#### Carnegie

#### Pioneer

- Building maintenance continues to be an issue since regular repairs are only completed two days per month.
- We need more reception area volunteers and more time to train them
- We are short on kitchen subs

- Need to continue recruiting Meals on Wheels volunteers to maintain the strength of the program
- Development of fund raising is time consuming, but we are getting up to speed by continuing to make contacts and develop events
- Staff drivers have been off work frequently due to injuries. The resulting heavy use of subs is hard on the budget.
