Subject: West Linn Parks & Regional Parks Conversation??

Dear Oregon City Parks & Recreation Advisory Board:

I'm on the West Linn Parks & Recreation Advisory Board and am one of the newest members. We are amidst the process of updating our Master Plan and I'm curious about what other cities in our area are working toward and how they are doing it. Because our cities are so nearby, I frequently run into Oregon City folks in our parks and yet I haven't made the effort to find out more about your parks and your upcoming plans. I'd like to find out more from anyone interested in discussing our regions parks and how we manage them.

One of the exciting things we are working on in West Linn is starting the Willamette River Trail. Phase one will hopefully be under construction this summer and will run from the mouth of the Tualatin River toward the falls as close as possible (we think we can get a viewing platform that will actually have a view of the falls. Ultimately, we envision the trail extending north through parks, easements, and a few neighborhood streets until it connects with Lake Oswego's trails. I'm curious about an integrated vision with the historic trails system that Oregon City offers. I think the whole vision could be that much more amazing if a good walking path across the old bridge could connect folks to the Oregon City system too.

One of the other items we are trying to understand is what population have we not served with our parks. I wonder if at certain parks or events you are running into West Linners, seeking amenities that your park s im offers? (I run into Oregon City folks at our dog park at Mary S. Young). Our unscientific (no survey) hunch is that we aren't really serving the adult athletes, but we've been doing a great job for the kids. If this is the case, then potentially your system of parks is helping out with that. I don't think that's inherently bad, as long as there is an equality of balance in what the citizens of the two cities are aware of and utilizing.

We are still looking toward finding a location for a pool. We have talked about the possibility of an alliance with any of the neighboring cities in creating a pool. Unofficially, I'm wondering what you think of that idea. I'm concerned that it could be piles of red tape to administer, but on the other hand it would be a relief to share the risk.

Our final struggle is expense of land inside the UGB and the fears of putting parks outside the UGB and invalidating the intention of that boundary.

On another note, I've gotten involved with a local conservation group in hopes that they will become strong allies in getting grants and so forth to add to our trails and parks. They've done a good job of that for the city of Lake Oswego, and they are a regional group looking to have a region wide view of green space. You might be interested in attending an introductory meeting to their organization next week. Other regional officials will be attending also to find out more. (David Bragden, Metro Council President and Tim Wood, Director of State Parks)

I'm hoping this can turn into a really good interface of public/private groups working toward more green space throughout the area. I've included the invitation to Three Rivers Land Conservancy meeting below.

At the general meeting of the McLoughlin Neighborhood Association held on January 6, 2005 the membership voted unanimously to pursue re-naming Senior Center Park to something more appropriate for the neighborhood in which it resides. Initial suggestions included **McLoughlin Neighborhood Park**. If the Advisory Committee agrees that the park can be renamed, we would submit name choices for your approval. It is our intent to gather suggestions from all areas of the City in this choice.

We are also interested in keeping open the idea of placing a monument stone in the park that would memorialize the late owner of B&B Leasing for his civic support of Oregon City. We have not had the opportunity as of yet to discuss this idea with the members of his family or the company.

We believe that the name Senior Center Park is no longer appropriate as the park has undergone a facelift and is more focused on young families. This is an exciting opportunity to make a positive change in our neighborhood and we would appreciate your support.

We look forward to moving ahead with this plan. Thank you for your time.
