Highlights of the past month:

Aquatics

- A group of 83 elementary school children with the 21st Century Learning Centers participated in a swimming pool party on April 12.
- We conducted Lifeguard Training courses over spring break with 18 participants. We have received many employment applications from the trainees.
- Two of the Aquatics staff will be attending a pool and spa operations workshop focusing, in part, on upcoming changes to the State Pool Operations Code.
- The Spring Brochure has filled our swimming lesson program. In fact, almost every class has a very large waiting list.
- Attendance was 8,500 for the Month of March.

Carnegie

- Carnegie Arts League Spring Tea tickets sold out (5 people on wait list, 3 on future tea list) money raised will help purchase a sound system.
- Children's Museum received a \$500 donation from Evelyn Morlan.
- Preliminary re-landscaping of plants which were removed during the renovation has been completed. A volunteer from the McLoughlin Neighborhood Assoc. has developed a landscaping plan, which provides for full build out. Staff is reviewing this plan.
- 5 artists are juried into the Art Center.
- Carnegie art classes (painting and watercolor) and Open Studio going well.

Recreation

- Egg Hunt at Rivercrest was great success. Good weather and good turnout.
- Kids Day April 1st successful.
- Parent and Child classes are gaining popularity
- Yoga and Pilates (new form of fitness—like yoga) classes going well
- Spring brochure brought many positive responses

- Fence line and beds have been sprayed for weeds.
