

Highlights of the past month:

Aquatics

- Our Guard Start Jr. lifeguarding program is going well. The participants will hopefully turn into our lifeguards of the future.
- Revenue for FY 2001-2002 was \$62,381 greater than last year.
- Summer program registration currently totals 875 youth.
- We are putting a lot of time into maintaining the Rivercrest Wading Pool. Its circulation system is old and barely adequate.

Carnegie

- Artist Carrie Moore had a successful show; the opening reception had 200 people in attendance.
- The first session of summer art classes were from July 8-12. The second session will be from August 12-16.
- The outdoor wading pool is open for the first time since the renovation project began.
- The problem we have been having with the air conditioning system has been fixed.
- Thursday evening Concerts in the Park started July 11 and will continue through the end of August.
- The Abernethy Wood Show will run until the end of July.
- Art Camps for kids were held from June 17-20 with an enrollment of 17.

Recreation

- City staff along with over 30 volunteers installed new playground equipment at Rivercrest Park on July 13 and 14. We will be setting the posts in concrete and laying the safety surfacing and expect to open the park by August 2.
- The 3rd Annual Tri-Cities July 4th Celebration was very successful this year. Four bands entertained the crowd from 2:00 PM until the fireworks began at 10:00 PM.
- Summer camps are going very smoothly again this year. Enrollment to date is about the same as it was last year.
- Yoga and Pilates classes continue to be well attended.
- Parks and Recreation staff has been working with the Library Information Network of Clackamas County to create a Family Cultural Pass Program. Each Library now has passes to popular Portland area attractions available for check out.

PRAC MINUTES
JUNE 24, 2002

Attendance: Bill Daniels, Heather Guthrie, Michael Mason, Bill Woods, and Carolyn Orlando

This meeting was devoted to a park tour to familiarize the committee with some of our parks as well as to discuss projects and issues in preparation for a July 22 work session.

Canemah Children's Park: This is the site, which abuts the Metro Greenspaces property that the Neighborhood Association would like the City to control and maintain. A new picnic shelter and tables will be placed on the City owned part of this park this summer, funded by a Metro Enhancement Grant. Dee explained the limitation of development on the property owned by Metro but also talked about the opportunities, which could be available under a joint project. This will be a topic for our July work session.

Hillendale Park: This neighborhood park will be the site of Phase II development this summer, funded jointly from Park SDC and a State park Grant. This project includes, pathways, resurfacing the tennis and basketball courts, installation of two soccer fields and a softball/baseball diamond. There is a proposed trail connection from this park through to Red Soils Court, which is partially funded by the Hilltop Urban Renewal Agency.

Atkinson Park and Buena Vista Club House: This is an under utilized neighborhood park in the McLoughlin Neighborhood. Located on a bluff at the north end of the City, this park has a well maintained but old picnic shelter. The restrooms, which had been vandalized many years ago, have been gutted and locked up. Staff would like to either repair these restrooms or remove them and provide alternative restrooms during the summer months. Without restrooms, it is difficult to rest the picnic shelter for group use. The Buena Vista Club House is available for rent and is also utilized by the Recreation Division for classes and activities.

Rivercrest Park: A drive by of this 1 block long park showed it to be in good condition. New and additional playground equipment will be installed at this site in July. The park is heavily used both by the general public for picnics and events as well as by OCPD for summer programs and special events. The wading pool is operated through a cooperative effort between OCPD and the neighborhood association.

Singer Creek Park: This is one of two specifically designated natural parks under the City's Charter. Over the years it has become very overgrown with weeds and other non-native, invasive plants. Park maintenance crews are working to reclaim this park and open up some of the views so that it will not only be more attractive but safer.

Park Naming Contest: A list of suggested names was provided to all members. It was agreed that each member would review the list and choose their top 5 favorites to be discussed at our next meeting.

Pioneer Center Gift Shop: Carolyn shared that the gift shop at the Pioneer Center will be eliminated in the next month allowing for the space to be better utilized for additional fitness spaces as well as a small private conference room to be used for clinics and tax consulting. The Center will continue to schedule times and places for seniors to sell the items which they make at the center.

DIVISION 60
Operation and Maintenance of Public Swimming Pools
February 7, 2002 - DRAFT

- (a) Properly dispose of materials and fluids that pose a bloodborne pathogen hazard, medical and injury treatment waste in identifiable biohazard waste bags or containers.
- (b) Dispose of all chemicals and chemical containers in a clean, safe and environmentally friendly manner.

NOTE: Check with the pool's solid waste hauler for assistance in properly and safely disposing of these items.

Existing Wading Pools 333-66-145

The requirements in this section apply to all wading pools built before effective date of this revision.

(1) **ENCLOSURES.** All wading pools must be protected by an enclosure at least four feet (1.2 m) high measured from the exterior side of the enclosure, or in compliance with OAR 333-065-0110. Doors and gates must be self-closing and latching. The doors and gates must be lockable if water is maintained in the pool when it is closed.

(a) **Exemption.** If the operator provides an attendant to supervise the wading pool whenever there is water in the basin, an enclosure is not necessary. The attendant will be trained in first-aid and CPR, as listed in 333-66-0020 (16) (b) & (c), and be familiar with the emergency procedures necessary to operate the pool.

(b) Spray pools and water playgrounds, where no water is maintained in the basin, do not need an enclosure

(1) **FILL AND DRAIN POOLS - RETRO-FIT RECIRCULATION SYSTEMS.** All water-retaining wading pools need recirculation, filtration, and disinfection. All wading pools without water recirculation must be renovated, or phased out of use and removed before June 1, 2007. This section does not apply to spray pools using a potable water source to supply the features.

(a) **COMPLIANCE.** Operators of all wading pools affected by this section must provide to the Department or its agent, before December 31, 2003, a plan and timetable for renovation or removal or abatement of the pool.

(A) The plan will be reviewed by the Department or agent health department and an acceptable plan and timetable will be negotiated and/or approved and the operational license renewed or issued.

(B) If a wading pool operator fails to submit a plan by December 31, 2003, or fails to complete renovations or removal by June 1, 2006, the license for the pool will not be renewed and will become null and void.

- (i) After December 31, 2003, wading pools without water recirculation systems and without a license to operate, are declared public nuisances under the authority of ORS 448.060, and;
 - (ii) The Department or its agent, in compliance with ORS 448.060 will proceed with abatement of said nuisance.
- (b) **INTERIM OPERATION.** Wading pool operators operating under this section are required to operate their pool so that the water is changed at least every four hours. This may be accomplished by gradual draining, or by dumping and filling.
 - (A) At opening, and every 2 hours after that, until closing, test the water and add a chlorinating product to reach a residual of 5 ppm. The product will be added in a calculated amount to produce the 5 ppm chlorine. The chlorine product will be approved and labeled for use in swimming pools. A record shall be maintained, as required in OAR 333-066-0110. Do not add chemicals to the pool when children are in the pool.
 - (B) Drain the water at closing each day. Before opening again, thoroughly rinse and brush the basin and remove any debris. Scrub the basin at least once each week with solution containing at least 100 ppm of chlorine. Fill with potable water.
 - (C) Compliance with sec. 333-066-0080 (3) is required for all wading pools without a recirculation system.
 - (D) Drain and clean the wading pool whenever the clarity deteriorates to a level where cloudiness is noticeable when observing a object of contrasting color, in 12 inches of water, from directly above.
- (2) **ENTRAPMENT PROTECTION** for all suction fittings will be provided on all wading pools, except those addressed in sec. (1), before June 1, 2005.
 - (a) **COMPLIANCE.** If a wading pool operator fails to provide entrapment protection by June 1, 2005, the operator will close the wading pool until protection is provided and approved by the Department or its agent or the pool is removed or abated.
 - (A) If corrections are not completed by June 1, 2006, the license for the pool will not be renewed and will become null and void.
 - (i) After June 1, 2006, wading pools without entrapment protection and without a license to operate, are declared public nuisances under the authority of ORS 448.060, and;
 - (ii) The Department or its agent, in compliance with ORS 448.060 may proceed with abatement of said nuisance.

- (b) **DESIGN AND INSTALLATION.** Methods of entrapment protection include:
- (A) Multiple suction fittings. Install two or more outlets of equal size with a minimum 3-foot straight pipe, connected between the fittings. Connect a suction line, the same size as the fitting connector pipe, between the connector pipe and the pump. Install the suction line in the hydraulic middle of the connector pipe. Do not install valving or any other means of isolating an outlet fitting from the other fittings.
 - (B) An anti-vortex cover. The anti-vortex drain cover installation cannot pose a tripping or stubbing hazard to the feet;
 - (C) A 12 x 12 inch (300 mm²) or larger drain grate, or;
 - (D) Pressure sensing valves or electronic sensing systems or other active protection systems that will shut down the recirculation pump when a change in pressure indicative of an entrapment event is detected. The pool equipment may not be restarted by any means other than manually, and only after the pool is inspected for problems.
 - (E) Provide suction relief air on all skimmers for when the mouth is obstructed. Maintain the weir and basket in the skimmer at all times.
 - (F) Other means of entrapment protection approved for use by the Division.
- Note: Entrapment protection is best achieved by using two or more methods of entrapment protection.**

Pool Closure Criteria 333-066-0150

- (1) If one or more of the following conditions or situations is present, it is sufficient reason for the pool operator or responsible supervisor to close a public swimming pool. If the pool operator or responsible supervisor has not already acted on the matter in violation of sub. (a) through (f) below, the Department or its agent will, pursuant to OAR 333-066-0160, order that the swimming pool be closed.
- (a) **CHEMICAL PARAMETERS.** Failure to comply with the disinfectant residuals levels established in OAR 333-066-0080(2)(b), or out of ranges levels for cyanuric acid, pH, or temperature as established in OAR 333-066-0080(2)(b), (c), (f) or (g).
 - (b) **WATER QUALITY.** Failure to comply with the water quality standards established in OAR 333-066-0080(3),
 - (c) **TREATMENT EQUIPMENT.** A non-operational circulation pump, filter, or disinfectant feeder.
