Larry Potter, newly hired Park and Facilities Operation Supervisor was introduced and he share some of his priorities for OCPRD facilities: Safe and clean are his two top priorities.

Approval of Minutes: Motion by Woods, 2nd by Bailey to approve the minutes of the June 26th meeting, passed. Motion by Oerter, 2nd by Woods to approve the minutes of the September 25th meeting, passed.

Old Business:

Park SDC Report: A work session with Don Ganer and staff is scheduled for next week and the Work Session with PRAC and the Commission for Nov. 1 at 6PM.in Commission chambers.

Carnegie Name Change: This item will be discussed at the McLoughlin Neighborhood Association meeting on November 2. Bill Daniels will attend.

Carnegie Concerts: An evaluation meeting was held on October 18. Suggestions of items to be included with these notes were made. The attached notes reflect PRAC's comments. A tiered sponsorship proposal will be developed. Concerts will be moved to Rivercrest Park next summer while the Carnegie Center is under construction.

Waterfront Master Plan

& Bank Stabilization Plan: Jerry Herman discussed his concerns regarding the timing of both of these plans. Dee shared some comments which staff had developed for the Urban Renewal meeting to be held on October 25 at 6PM. Michael Mason drafted another point to be added to staff's comments regarding NMFS regulations. (Attached)

After further discussion it was agreed that PRAC continues to support moving ahead with both the Bank Stabilization and Waterfront Master Plans. PRAC members were encouraged to either attend the Oct. 25th meeting or contact Commissioners to discuss this issue prior to the meeting.

New Business:

Doug invited PRAC members to the *First Oregon City Visioning* meeting to be held at the Pioneer Center, Saturday, November 4, 9AM-2PM.

Priority Use of Fields: Bill Woods brought up a concern regarding the use of fields, especially softball/baseball fields but it also involves soccer fields. With the limited number of fields available during any given season, and the growing number of youth involved in sports, we may need to look at setting some priorities of use. Staff will research information from other local departments and bring back a proposal in November.

Director's Report: Dee highlighted some of the items on her written report. The **Chapin Park** planning process is moving through the approval process. The Community will continue to have the opportunity to respond at both the Planning Commission phase and again when the recommendation is sent to Commission.

Dog Parks: Robert Bailey brought up the subject of dog parks. One of the people who have voiced concerns about the Chapin Park planning process rides the bus with Robert and she has talked to him, and written to Dee regarding the possibility of developing a dog park (off leash area) in Oregon City.

Park Signage: Dee has asked Larry to review our recommendations for Park signs and she has also met with Ken Dauble and his volunteer sign group. Their vision has really expanded and she suggested that they take their vision to the Oregon City Visioning event and share it with the larger community.

Carnegie Playground Equipment: Is it time to begin working on this project again? Only phase I and II of the Carnegie Projected are funded—building only.

Meeting was adjourned by Chair Bill Daniels at 9:15 PM.

Carnegie Summer Concert Recap

Meeting date: Wednesday, October 18. 2000

After considerable discussion, the following conclusions and recommendations were reached:

Summer 2001 Concerts will be held at Rivercrest Park:

This decision was reached based on results of a customer survey as well as a belief that these community concerts should promote the feeling of community within Oregon City. Other reasons included support from the Rivercrest Neighborhood Association.

This will be a one-year move, with a planned return to the Carnegie Center/Library Park following the re-opening of the Carnegie Center.

This decision was made now because the renovation will not start until January and it was felt that obtaining Sponsors would be more difficult if we did not have a set location for the concerts.

Split the Bucks Program:

The group believed that this should be re-instated with the proceeds going to support first the concerts next Carnegie/Library Park programs.

Sponsorship opportunities:

A tiered Sponsorship Program needs to be developed allowing for the following opportunities:

- 1. Name Sponsor: Name would appear as the overall Concert Sponsor.
- 2. Event-night Sponsor: Sponsor would be shown as the sponsor the event which would include sponsorship of the band as well as providing or controlling the main course meal sales for that night.
- 3. Band Sponsor: Sponsor and group of Sponsors would underwrite the entire cost of the performance and would be listed on the program and introduced from the stage as the Sponsor of that night's band.
- Concert Sponsor: Names and logos of this group of sponsors would be displayed on all Concert publicity and would be listed on concert stage banners.

5. Friends of Summer Concerts: Anyone who wanted to make a donation to the summer concert fund. A letter recognizing their tax-deductible donation would be sent. If appropriate, names would be listed in some publications.

Reserved to City and/or Parks and Recreation:

The summer concert series will continue to be a program of Oregon City Parks and Recreation, a division of the City of Oregon City. The City will continue to book all performers, process all payments to performers, arrange for necessary event amenities (stages, restrooms, garbage, etc.) provide on-site coordination and public liability insurance coverage.

In return, certain rights will be reserved for the City, Parks and Recreation, and/or their Friends Groups:

Beverage Sales (a system will be worked out with each food vendor so that the beverage can be purchased with the meal and the location of cold beverage sales will be relocated.)

Sales of all non-main course food items as well as non-food item.

Parks and Recreation Staff will develop the Sponsorship Structure and revise all contracts prior to December 31, 2000.

It was also agreed that any request or decisions regarding the concerts should be made in a timely and professional manner. All requests to make additions or changes to the current concert procedure will be made a minimum of three working days prior to the affected performance.

At the October 24th Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee meeting, the following items were added:

- 1. All groups providing food services will be required to have a current Food Handlers License and insurance which meets all City requirements for indemnification.
- 2. Neighborhood Associations should be included in mailings to groups interested in providing food service at the concerts.

Dear McLoughlin Neighborhood Association Members:

I am sure that you all share my excitement as we move into the Carnegie Center Renovation Project. While we are busy finding storage and office space for the Carnegie Art Center/recreation program during the construction, we are also looking forward to the Grand Re-Opening Events next Fall.

At a Carnegie Summer Concert meeting on October 18, there was considerable discussion regarding the location for next summer's concerts. Due to the uncertainties of construction and a strong feeling on the part of current concert sponsors that a decision regarding location be made prior to going out to recruit concert sponsors, it was decided to move the concerts to Rivercrest Park for next summer. This will be a temporary, one-year move.

This was not any easy decision to make. The concerts have become a vital part of the Historic McLoughlin District and provide a strong attraction for visitors to this area. We discussed at length, the possibility of completing portions of the construction, which would impact the concerts, first allowing for summer park use. Because the project will not begin until January, the uncertainties of renovation projects on building this old, and the need to begin selling concert sponsorships in January, the decision needed to be made now instead of later. I hope that you, as a neighborhood association will understand and support this decision.

At this point, I believe it would be premature to move ahead with placement of new playground equipment without considering the rest of the park. The currently unfunded Phase III of the Carnegie Renovation Project is slated to consider the issue of the grounds and surrounding area. I would welcome the chance to sit down with a group from the McLoughlin Neighborhood Association as well as members of the PRAC to share ideas and discuss possibilities for this area. A big hurdle for this project will be obtaining funding for both planning and construction phases.

Dear Dee,

Here is the language discussed by the PRAC last night regarding the critical importance to development on the waterfront:

Environmental Regulation: An important example of the need for this plan stems from the National Marine Fisheries Service's ESA 4(d) rule on Lower Columbia salmon. The rule emphasizes local government planning to avoid action-by-action review by NMFS to determine whether there are "takes" of threatened or endangered fish. A waterfront master plan can be written to satisfy the 4(d) rule and avoid numerous and lengthy reviews of the City's permit decisions. Without a plan, development for any purpose will be stymied by the length of federal review.
